Shivers Lets Appointees Run Department

Opponents of Gov. Allan Shivers have many times repeated the charge that the governor "runs things at Austin with an iron hand," thereby implying that appointees and employees of the state government are merely yes-men or puppets, and subject to act only on the advice and consent of the governor. Such is not the case.

The governor has exercised good judgment in drawing near to him the best department heads possible, and they have come from all over Texas—not just from those areas which have given him voting strength. And these men are permitted to act of their own accord, as is proved this week by a letter on our desk from Marshall Formby of Hereford and Plainview, who was appointed last year to the state highway commission.

"Governor Shivers has never asked us to build one foot of any specific road," says Formby, in a personal letter accompanying a statement to the press. "He thinks the three commissioners should run the highway department without any influence from the governor's office, or any other office, or from any group."

Then, in his press release is the following: Formby said that Yarborough's recent promise to build a \$5,000,000 highway and bridge in Galveston county and along the Gulf Coast, if he were elected Governor, is an example of political promises that would eventually harm the fine Highway department in Texas. His full statement follows:

"I am deeply disturbed when I hear of the dozens of promises that Mr. Yarborough is making to the people offering to build new roads and bridges in various parts of the state.

"For more than a quarter of a century the Highway Department has been completely free of political road and bridge building. The Texas Highway Department has built roads and bridges based strictly on merit and need.

"Texans everywhere take great pride in the Highway Department, stressing the fact that there are no politics in it, and for the good of all Texas I sincerely hope that they can continue to have that pride.

"The present Commission has not spent one dime on a political road or bridge since I have been a member, and I know that the three members would never vote 15 cents to fulfill any political obligation."

Don't Get Sucked Into These Things Unless You're Willing

If you think you don't have to fight to protect yourself from being included in things like new taxes, you'd better wake up and look around a little. If you live in Texas, you will be voting on eleven proposed amendments to the state constitution next November. That's a while off, but you'd better make a mental note to be on hand at the polls and have your mind made up on some specific issues, or you're liable to wake up some morning and find things to be a lot different than you had supposed.

The proposed amendments are being published in full in this newspaper, and we urge you in the strongest terms to read them as though they were the fine print on your life insurance policy, because it is possible that some of them can effect you just as directly.

To be very, very sketchy, here is how the eleven measures shape up, and we remind you that they have already passed the state legislature, and you as a voter are the only thing keeping them from becoming law.

1. Permitting counties of less than 10,000 population to elect an assessor-collector of taxes. This would apply to Parmer County. (HJ 8).
2. Allowing women to serve on juries. (HJ 16).
3. Creating a state building commission. (SJ 10).
4. Establishing four-year terms for county political offices. The present term is two years. (SJ 4).
5. Amending, and in some cases liberalizing, financial assistance to needy persons. (SJ 7).
6. Enabling members of the armed forces to vote. (HJ 10).
7. Swapping out benefits of state and teacher retirement systems to employees and teachers affected. (SJ 6).
8. Making state employees eligible to obtain coverage under the federal social security laws. (HJ 37).
9. Realigning the pay scale of members of the legislature, and allowing them to set the salary of state officers. (SJ 5).
10. Allowing counties to create a county-wide hospital district. (SJ 2).
11. Prohibiting the state from loaning or granting money for toll roads. (SJ 14).

Some of these things we approve; some of them we do not. We will give you our opinions as time for the election draws nearer. Meanwhile, why not read them yourselves? They are in this week's paper.

We drove through Heckville on our way to Midland last week, and saw a thriving little city—there were four businesses, Joe's Country Grocery, Pete's Welding Shop, Boyd's Cafe and one other we can't recall, but it was also named with the fellow's first name.

But there aren't any snobs in Heckville.

Here's how one community swimming club got a \$30,000 swimming pool for \$125 a family. There are 240 families in the club. They now have a concrete pool 75 by 30 feet and a wading pool, 30 by 40 feet. They also have a bath house, a 15-foot concrete apron around the pool for sunning, and approved filtration equipment.

Capital costs, financed by selling stock to members, included \$18,000 for the pool; \$4,000 for bath house; \$3,500 for two acres of land; and \$4,500 for utilities and miscellaneous expenses. Each family pays annual dues of \$10 to cover operating costs.—CHANGING TIMES.

Our recipe this week is one that all the 4-H girls in the county are learning to make—and it is so delicious, we think some of the mothers and other women would be interested. All of the girls in the shop wanted the recipe—so here it is.

BANANA BREAD

1/2 cup shortening
1 cup sugar

2 eggs
1 cup ripe bananas, crushed (about three good sized bananas)
1/2 cup nuts (optional)
2 cups flour
1 teaspoon soda
1/2 teaspoon salt

Cream shortening and sugar together. Blend in beaten eggs and fruit. Stir in dry ingredients. Add nuts. Pour batter into greased bread loaf pan. Bake 55 to 60 minutes in moderate oven at 350 F.

From Attorney General John Ben Shepperd came the retort that "I have investigated the whole transaction and there is nothing wrong with it." The contracts,

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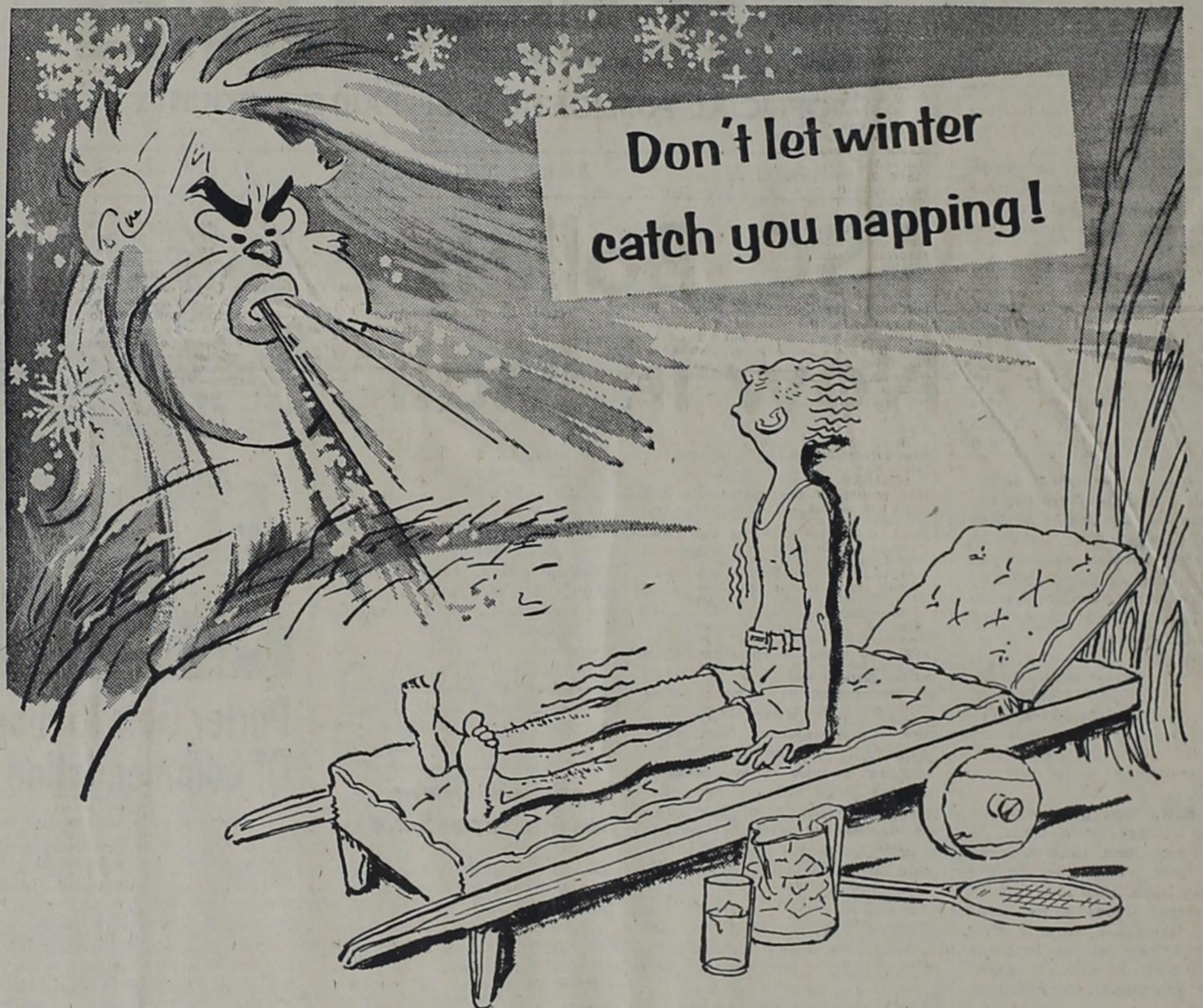

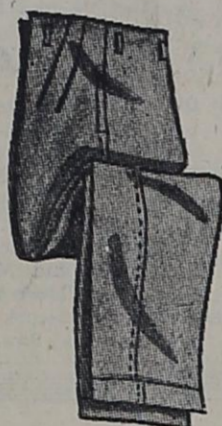
