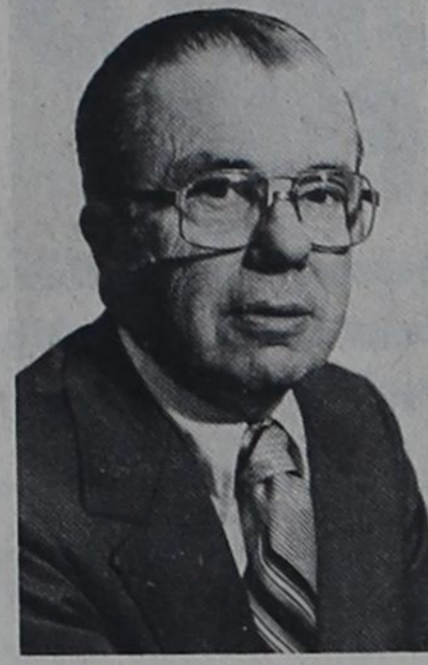

Farwell Area Voters Re-Elect Incumbents

In what election officials termed "a poor turnout," Farwell area voters went to the polls Saturday, April 3, and returned eight incumbents to the nine positions which were at stake.

The only officially contested races were for the Farwell School Board. Three incumbents, Ted Magness with 168 votes, Gilbert Kaltwasser with 152 and Wilbert Kalbas with 148, were re-elected to three-year terms on the school board over Michael Camp who picked up 44 votes. Three persons received one write-in vote apiece.

Doyle Ford with 142 votes were elected to fill the vacant two-year school board post created by the recent resignation of Charles Aycock. The other official candidate, Bo Bartley, got 43 votes. Two persons received one write-in vote each.

In the Farwell Hospital District Board election, all four incumbents were unopposed

and were re-elected to two-year terms. The candidates and their vote included: Carrie

Anderson, 178; Charles Aycock, 177; Don Williams, 175, and Rev. W. T. Perry, 172. Delton Wilbite and Cliff Ennen each received two write-in votes. Nine others received one write-in apiece.

A total of 187 votes were cast in the hospital election and 191 were cast in the local school board balloting.

In the Parmer County School Board election for the county-at-large seat, incumbent Wendol Christian of Oklahoma Lane picked up 160 votes at Farwell. He was unopposed. There were four write-ins each receiving a single vote.

Election Judge Albert Smith said the voting was "a poor turnout" for the Farwell area. Even with few contested races, he said he felt about 500 persons should have voted just to show their support of elected officials.

Three Out Of Seven Elected At Lazbuddie

In the most competitive area election Saturday, April 3, Derrell Jennings, Marvin Mimms and Jerry Don Glover were elected to three, three-year terms on the Lazbuddie School Board out of a field of seven official candidates.

The candidates and their vote included: Jennings, 174; Mimms, 130; Glover, 106; Phil Brockman, 74; Gary Hicks, 61; Darrell Mason, 56, and Robert Ivy, 32.

Marlyn Engelking received two write-in votes and two other persons received one write-in apiece.

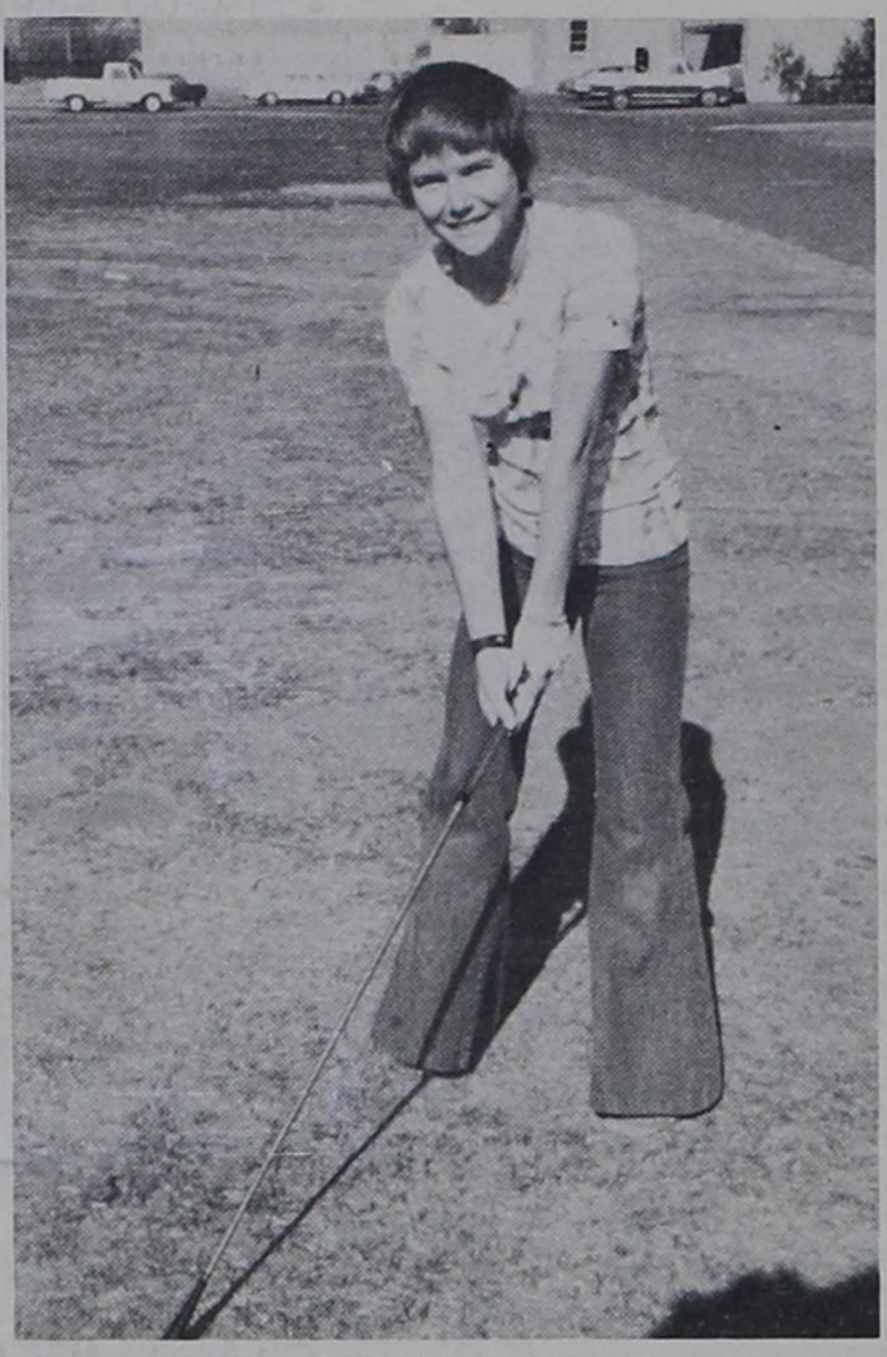

Steel Building Decision Left Up To Local Pair

After a lengthy discussion, the Farwell City Council told a local couple that it was their decision whether or not to erect a steel building in one of the community's better housing areas.

The council met in regular session Monday night, April 5, and heard Mr. and Mrs. A.V. Warren who had requested a building permit to construct a steel building at their residence at 901 Fifth St. in the Ridgecrest Addition.

City officials had delayed issuance of the permit believing deed restrictions on property in that area required all masonry construction.

However, city officials reported Monday night that no restrictions of any kind could be found in searching records

applicable to the addition.

Mayor Gil Patschke said the original "understanding" was that there would be restrictions requiring masonry construction. "Most of us in that addition bought and built there on (the basis of) what the intent was," he said.

Warren said he believed his steel building would "look better" than some of the unpainted fences and concrete block sheds in the addition. "After it's in there I don't think anybody would regret it at all. . . I think it's a whole lot nicer than block without any paint on it," he said.

Councilman Ralph Franse said the decision would have to be left to the Warrens since there are no legal restrictions

involved. Franse pointed out the Warrens had invested in the addition by building their home there and he said he felt they would not build anything which would devalue their property.

Warren said he had "talked" to a few neighbors and would talk to a few more.

Patschke indicated the city would issue the building permit the next time the Warrens request it.

The 24-by-40 foot building would be used as a double garage and storage area. City officials said it would be similar in construction to the Farwell City Barn.

In other business, the council heard reports from City Attorney Charles Aycock on several tax and financial matters.

Aycock said that he had talked to a tax law specialist in Amarillo and the specialist was of the opinion that some tax lots held by the city probably were not handled properly and an attorney would not approve title. Aycock said the city probably should advertise for sealed bids to sell the lots and give a quitclaim deed, leaving it up to the buyer to get the title warranted. He suggested the city write the tax specialist and get his opinion.

Aycock reported the city was "in real good shape" in getting residents who owe for paying to either pay up or make arrangements to pay. "So far (we) haven't had to sue anybody," he said.

Aycock said several persons

were delinquent in paying personal property tax and said some were in arrears back to 1962.

The council also informed City Marshal Ronnie Mitchell of some complaints about livestock within the city limits and asked him to talk with the people involved.

Mitchell said Farwell needed a building code and zoning ordinance to alleviate some of the enforcement problems he encounters.

Patschke said the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission has nearly completed its work on a proposed zoning ordinance for Farwell.

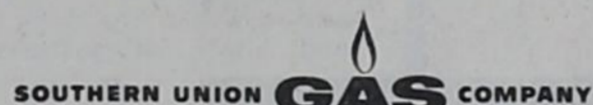

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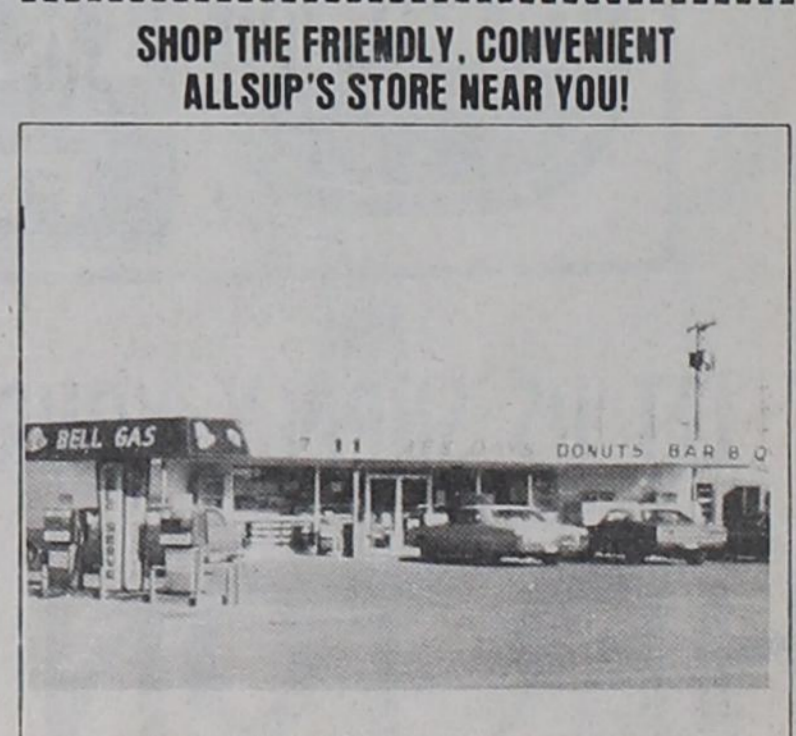

Swine Shortcourse Slated Saturday

Swine producers on the Texas High Plains have a unique opportunity to hear views on selection and management of sows and boars from some of the top experts in the business.

The annual Texas A&M University Swine Shortcourse, this year being offered on the High Plains of Texas as well as on the campus of Texas A&M University, will be held in Plainview Saturday, April 10, at the Hale County Agricultural Center.

Registration will begin at 8 a.m. and the program begins at 8:45 a.m. A registration fee of \$5 will be charged to help

defray expenses of the shortcourse. A copy of the proceedings and a lunch will be provided each participant.

The morning session will get underway with a discussion on modern trends in visual selection followed by a live evaluation of breeding gilts. Shortcourse participants will also have an opportunity to evaluate these gilts and offer their comments.

A third topic will center around a discussion on the value of records in a swine breeding program.

The morning session will conclude with a discussion on the boar's role in disease transmission. This topic should help answer the speculation as to whether or not pathogenic organisms can be passed in the semen of boars to females at breeding time.

The afternoon session will convene at 1 p.m. with a dis-

cussion on pathogenic organisms that have been isolated from aborted pig fetuses during a five-year study. Producers who may have had sows or gilts abort just prior to farrowing, even though they vaccinated for Leptospirosis, would be particularly interested in this topic.

A discussion on the training and management of young boars in commercial operations will be followed by a discussion on managing sows and pigs to

obtain optimum efficiency.

The importance of minerals, particularly the use of trace elements, for efficient sow reproduction will be presented, and the shortcourse will conclude with a presentation of the results of the latest swine nutrition research being conducted by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station.

Swine producers and any related industry personnel are urged to take advantage of this shortcourse.

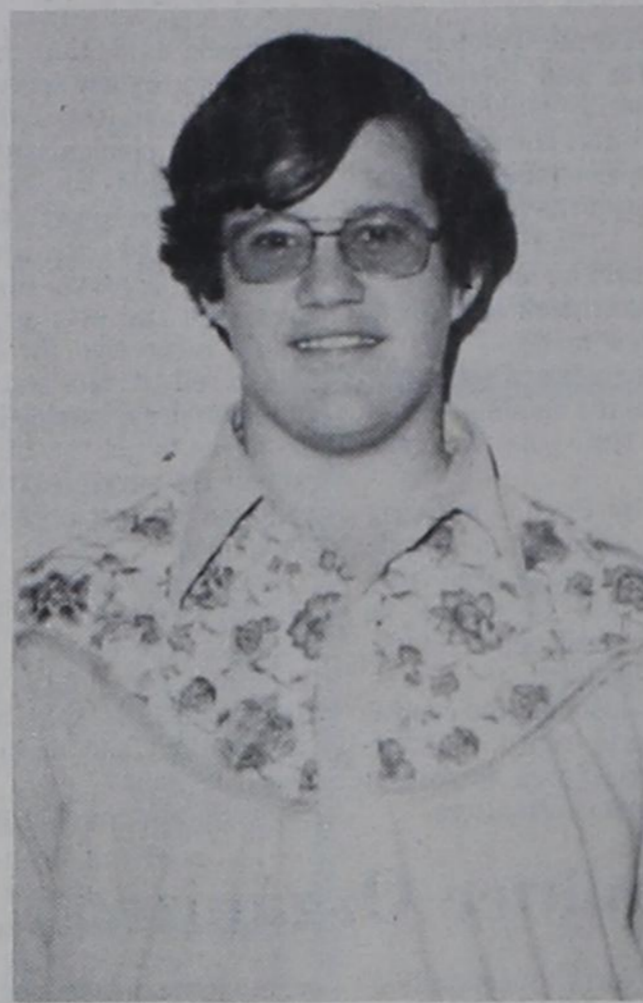

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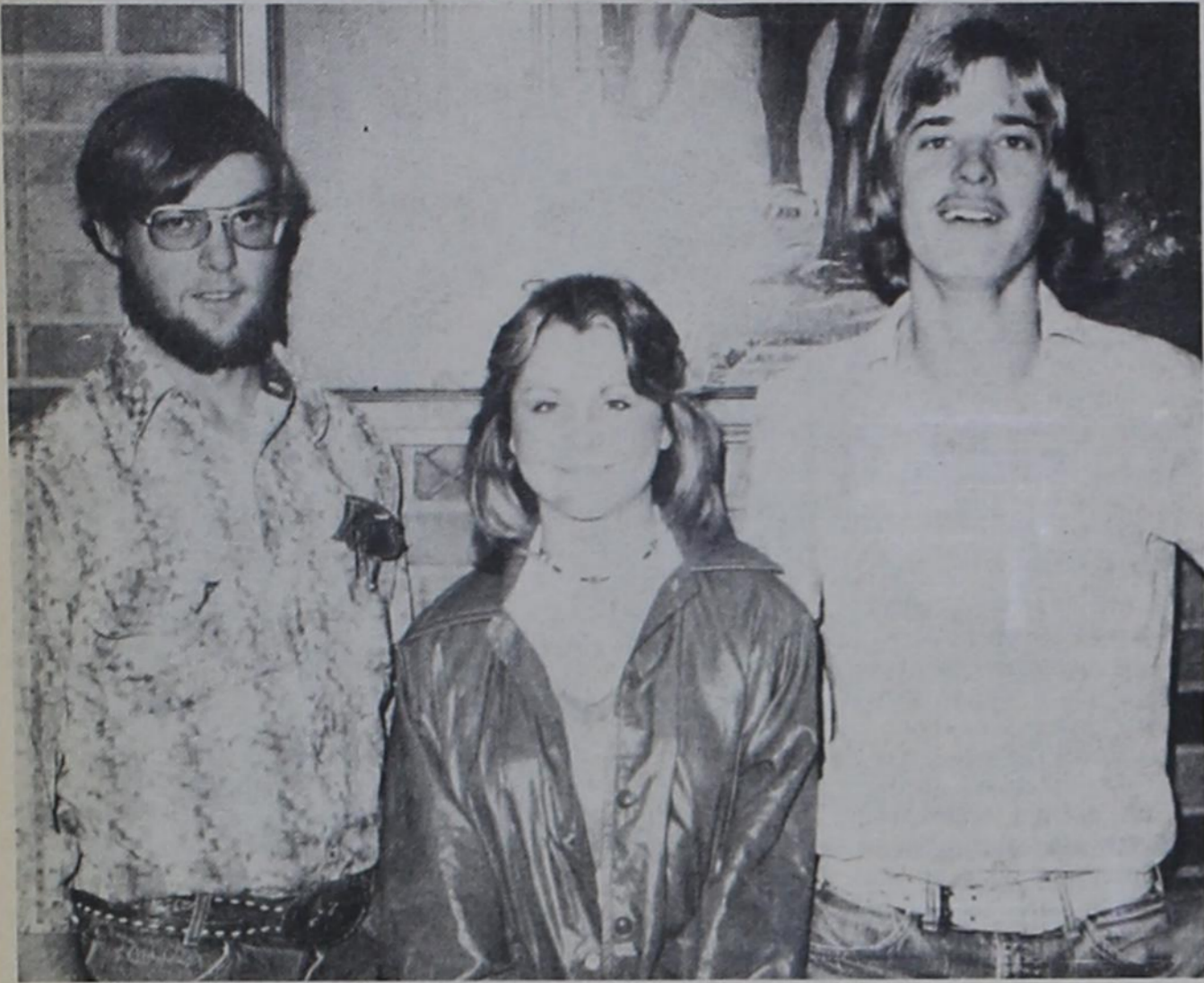

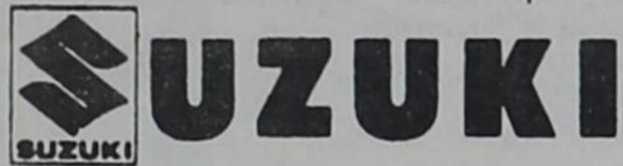
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Farwell Girls Take Thirds, Fourth At District Meet

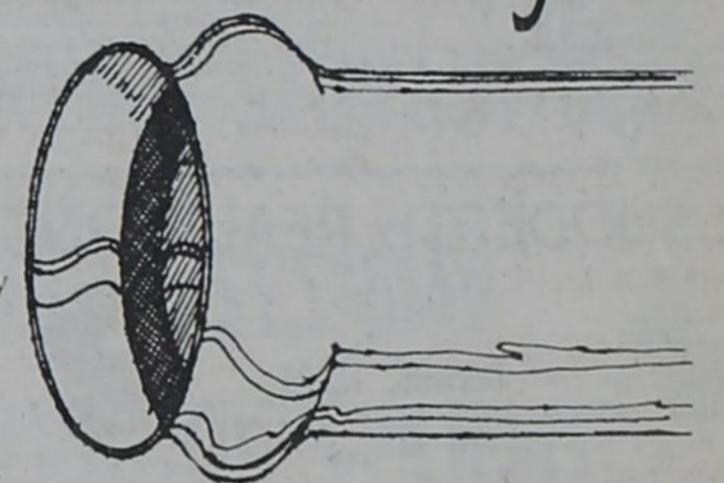

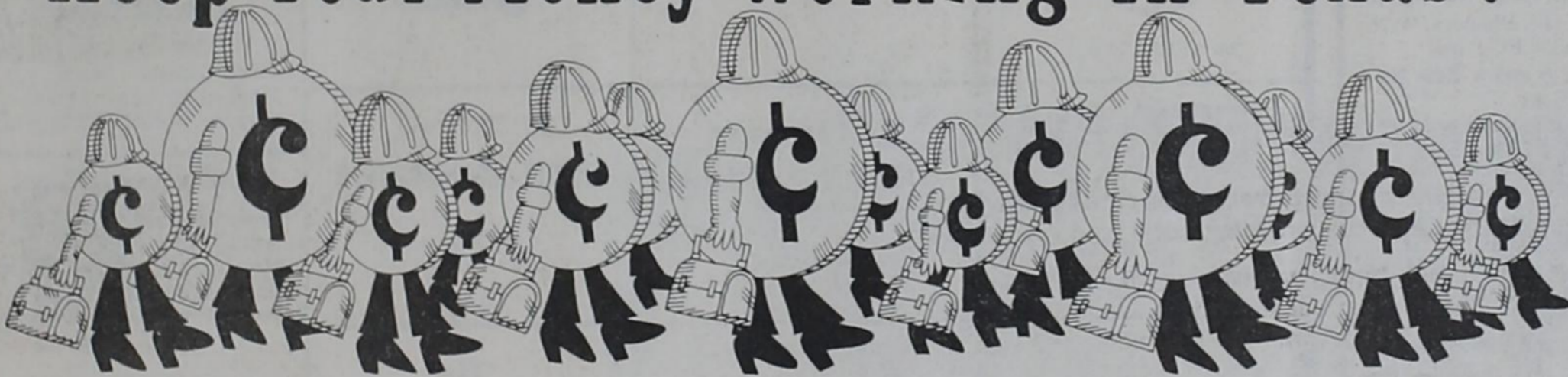

"SICKNESS AND SIN"

One thing that really concerns this writer about modern life, is how sin is constantly called sickness. A man commits some moral outrage and they say he is sick - they even tell him that.

I went to see a man some time ago who had fallen into unspeakable immorality and it had caught up with him. For years his sanctimonious life had been a sham; now the mask was torn off and he was in trouble - real deep trouble.

I had been telling him that now his best course was to make a clean confession - to the courts and to God. But someone else had gotten to him first. While he listened, this man had told his wife: "You must get Jim to see that he's sick and needs help. I'm not condoning what he has done, but I'm hopeful that if he gets the proper help he can be cured."

What a way to evade the sin question! Of course the man was sick - I imagine you and I would be sick too if we lived as he had. But let's get this straight! His sickness came from his sin, not his sin from some sickness. He would have been far better off to sob out his heart in contrition before God and for his sin than to excuse his conduct on the grounds of illness. Rom. 5:12 says: "By one man sin entered into the world and death by sin," and Rom. 6:23 says: "The wages of sin is death."

The sobering fact is that while there may be differences in the kinds of sins we commit, or in the degrees of our sin, Rom. 3:23 declares that there is no difference in this, that "all have sinned and come short of the glory of God."

That's why we are so pleased and proud to proclaim "the gospel of the grace of God," how Christ paid the penalty for our sins that we might have a perfect standing before a holy God, "being justified freely by His grace, through the redemption that is in Christ Jesus" (Rom. 3:24). "Thanks be unto God for His unspeakable gift!" (11 Cor. 9:15).

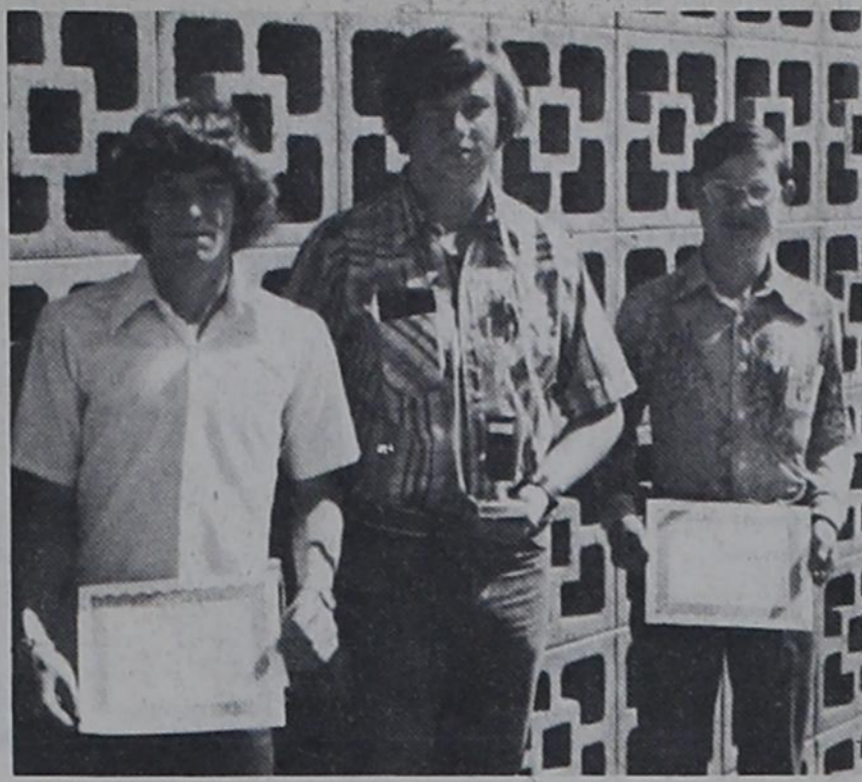
In the Panhandle contest,

Handicapped Sought Through Child Fund

A local drive has been instituted to locate handicapped children who are not enrolled in school, who may be eligible for assistance from the state.

When the Sixty-First Legislature unanimously passed Senate Bill 230, this provided public special education for all handicapped children in Texas. On the basis of pilot projects in the state it is estimated there are roughly 10,000 or more handicapped children not in school.

It is the goal of Texas Education Agency, in line with directives from the legislature, to be serving the needs of all handicapped children in the state by 1980.

The Child Find Project is financed by a grant to the Texas Education Agency by the U.S. Office of Education, Bureau of Education for the Handicapped. The funds are disbursed to the twenty Regional Service Centers to

implement locating these children. Region 16 Service Center in Amarillo serves Parmer County.

If a child is located that needs additional services that the local school or Texas Education Agency cannot provide - then Child Find serves as a coordinator, matching available services and resources to the individual child's needs.

Texas is presently serving more than 300,000 students through special education programs. By 1980 this number is expected to be near 450,000 special education students.

"Won't you please help? If you know a child that is handicapped and is not presently in school please notify 'Child Find'," urge agency officials.

Steers Take Fourth

The Varsity Steers of Farwell traveled to Springlake-Earth Friday, April 2, where they competed with 17 other track teams and grabbed fourth place in meet competition behind Springlake-Earth, Littlefield and Friona.

Farwell took six places in running events with Travis Bibbs grabbing second in the 40-yard dash with a time of 43.9. Taking third in the 40-yard relay with a time of 46.5 was the team of Bibbs, Chip Craft, Russ Jones, Billy White and Mike Goettsch. Coach Jim Yakubovsky explained that Russ Jones ran in the finals in place of injured Craft.

In field events, Farwell grabbed a first and third place

in the high jump. White took first with a leap of 5'10" and Jones captured third place title 5'8".

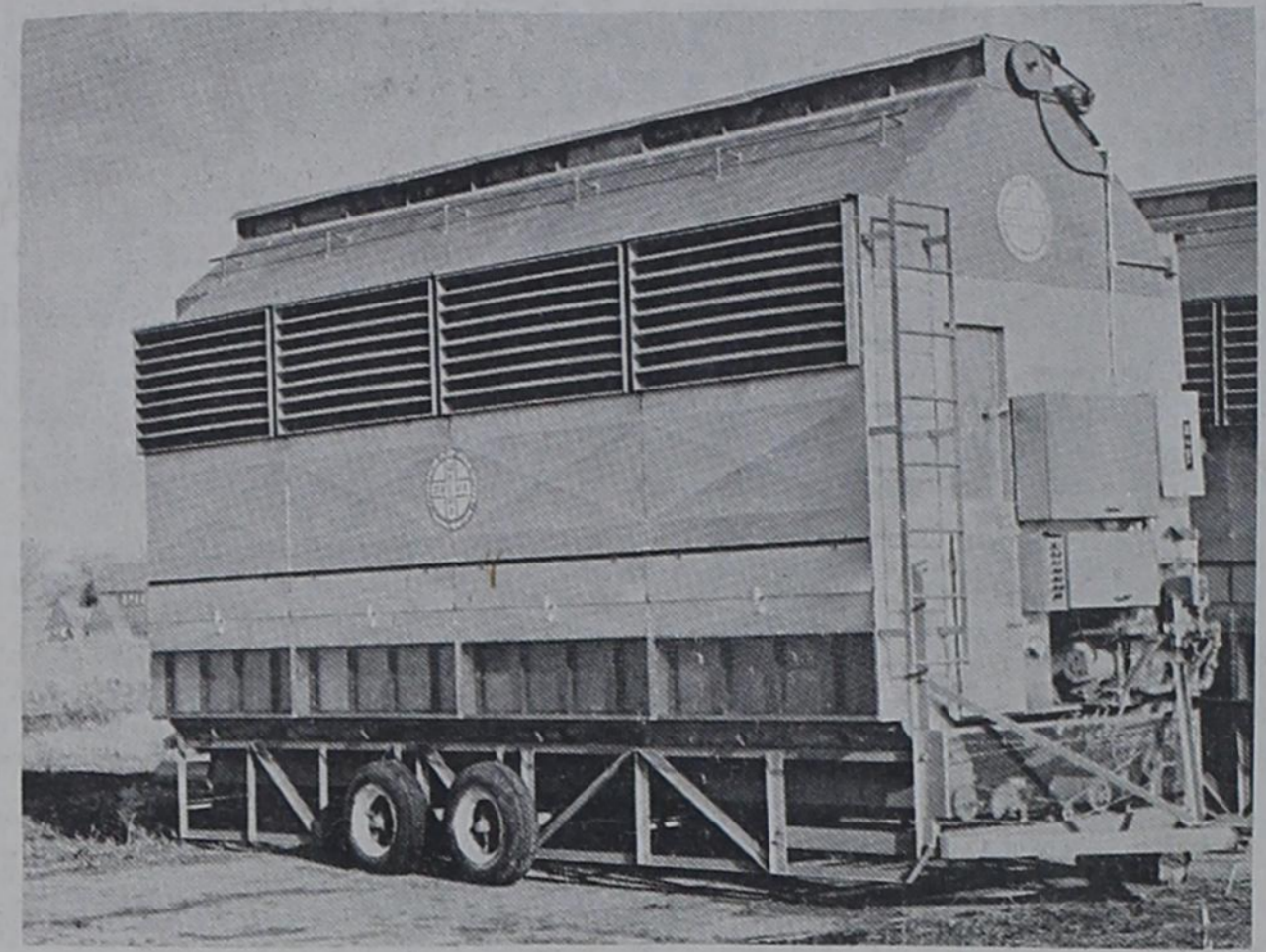
In reference to the meet Coach Yakubovsky commented, "This was our best outing of the year. We scored 58 points, coming in fourth behind Springlake-Earth, Littlefield and Friona, and outscoring 14 other teams. We have improved a lot over our performance at Plains.

"Travis Bibbs had the slowest qualifying time in the 40-yard dash but he came within two yards of winning the event when he placed second. Billy White came in first in the high jump.

"Another top performance for us was by Carlos Lucio in the mile run. Carlos has been one of the top performers in the 880-yard dash but we changed him to the mile and he came in third behind two Littlefield runners.

"Mike Goettsch improved his 220-yard dash time six-tenths of a second, bringing 23.9 down to 23.3. Jones in the 120 high hurdles improved eight-tenths of a second from 16.9 to 16.1."

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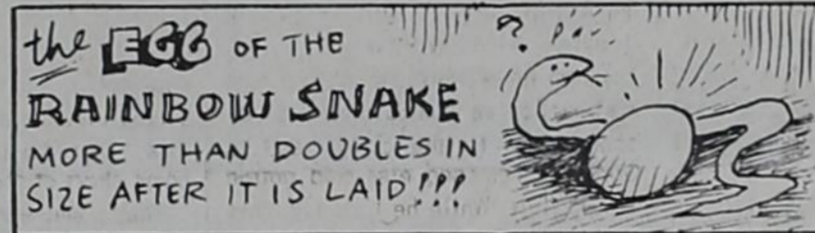


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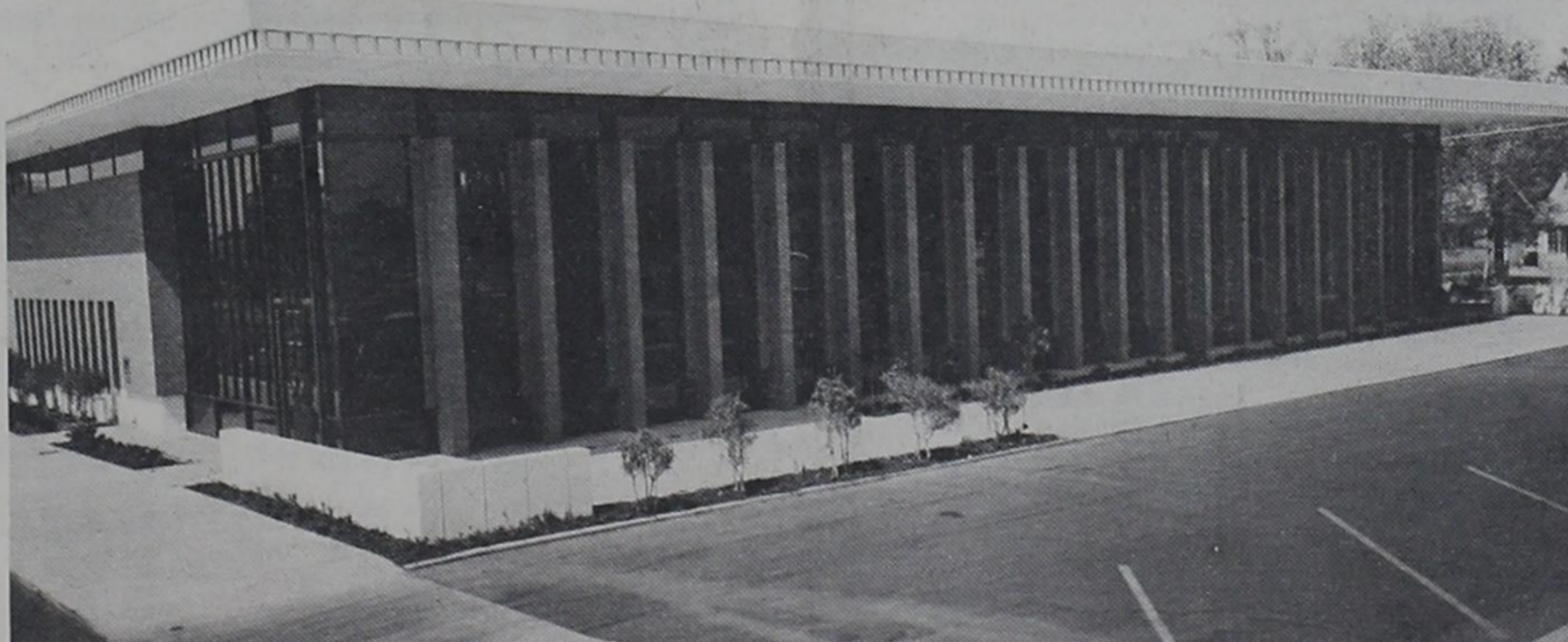
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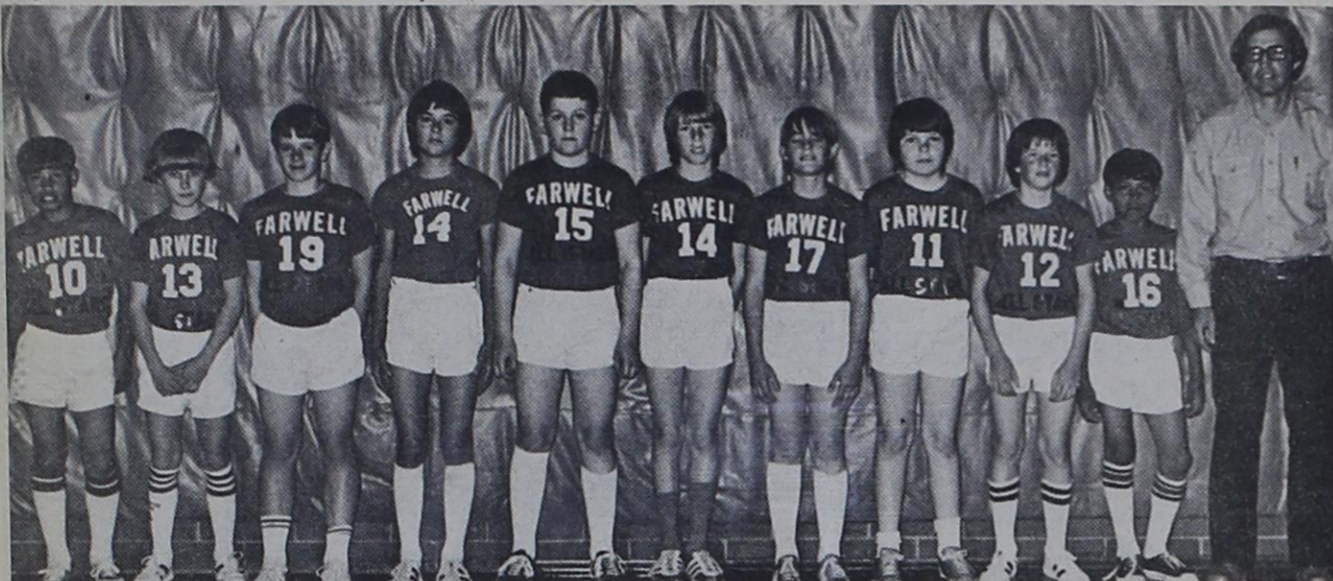
