Farwell Schools Plan For New Gymnasium

Several representative patrons of the Farwell School District, invited to attend the Tuesday night session of the school board, heard F. E. Coan, auditor of the school, tell them that the district could now build a new gymnasium and band hall, at an estimated cost of \$100-110,000, "without any additional increase in valuations."

The visitors were explained the work of the board, which has for several weeks been working over the problem of facilities inadequate to fill the needs of the physical education and public school music program at the school.

The meeting Tuesday night was topped off by the repeated declaration by the auditor that using the most conservative figures at hand, the district could build the needed facilities without any increase in taxes.

Addressing the group, Clarence Christian, president of the board, said, "The reason we have asked you fellows to be here tonight is to show you what we are faced with, and ask you advice on how to solve the problem."

Webb Gober of the board reported on work that had been done in analyzing the problem of overcrowding in the two mentioned departments, and then Supt. Jack Williams was

called on for a more detailed explanation of the need for more facilities.

Supt. Williams told the group that at the present time it was impossible for the school to offer any PE classes below the 6th grade for the reason that the old gym now in use was in such heavy demand.

With the present facilities, it is necessary for 158 students to make use of three dressing rooms, and three showers, he said, and in addition to these, an additional 50 students are being sent downstairs in the old cafeteria building to use improvised dressing quarters, where no shower is available.

Local Group To Go To 4-H Encampment

Several Parmer County 4-H members and the county extension agents will attend the District I 4-H club camp next week. Beginning on Monday, May 31, the camp is being held at the Don Herington Boy Scout Camp 12 miles south of Amarillo. Safety and recreation leadership training will be the main features of the program this year. W. L. The first night will be guest night and will include a "sack" party. A "Buttons and Beau's" theme will feature the party the second night.

Also at the camp, one boy and one girl from District I to serve on the State 4-H Council will be elected. Rose Mary Detton, Carson County, and Jack Aker, Castro County, are now serving.

Construction Moves Ahead on Worley Site

Construction on the new elevator being erected by Worley Mills moved along steadily this week, the steel for the first tank getting its start by time The Tribune went to press.

There are to be 35 tanks in the elevator, and the structure's capacity has been boosted to a planned 800,000 bushels. A decision to add eight more tanks was made recently.

our having to have dressing room space," said Supt. Williams. "If we don't get it with a new auditorium, we will simply have to spend money for the construction of additional dressing room facilities in conjunction with our present gymnasium."

The plan that the board has been working on would call for construction of a brick-tile, "rigid-support" type building which would house a 50x90 court. The building would face the north, and be situated east of the present high school building.

The board has made allowance for the projected growth of the system, and the building would, if constructed, fit into a long-range plan that would make use of economies possible by tying buildings onto one another, thereby eliminating much wall construction.

The gymnasium itself would be 85x100, inside dimensions, and would seat about 1150 people on folding bleachers that, when not in use, could be collapsed against walls and permit the utilization of the entire floor area for PE classes.

Four dressing rooms are included in the present plan, and on the rear of the building would be a band hall. The gym is estimated to cost about \$75-85,000 and the band hall \$25-35,000. The band building would be 36x60, and would make available two classrooms in the old home economics building now being used for music purposes.

The gymnasium now in use is not of fireproof construction. Its

floor or "court space" is substandard for basketball and other indoor games. It will seat only about 400, and is severely taxed to house that number. Adequate capacity for tournaments is out of the question.

If a new gymnasium is constructed, it is the board's intention to leave the old gym "status quo." The possibility of converting it into an auditorium was considered, but estimates on remodeling ran around \$30,000, and so this is felt to be undesirable.

The gym is needed for the grades anyway, observed the board, and if a new gymnasium is constructed, the old building can be very profitably put to this use.

As for the financial condition of the district, valuations at the present time are about \$4,442,000, both personal and real. Bonded indebtedness is \$175,000.

Auditor Coan said he had based his report on the assumption that \$115,000 worth of bonds would be voted and sold at a maximum rate of 3.35 percent. There is every reason to believe, he said, that the state would purchase the paper for 2.5 percent, but for purposes of figuring, he was using outside estimations.

The bonds would be paid in 26 years. The district's only unbonded indebtedness is \$8,500 owed on notes taken to finance paying around the school three years ago. Coan recommends that this amount be included in the election, if called.

The district tax rate is \$1.50, the maximum permitted, but actual

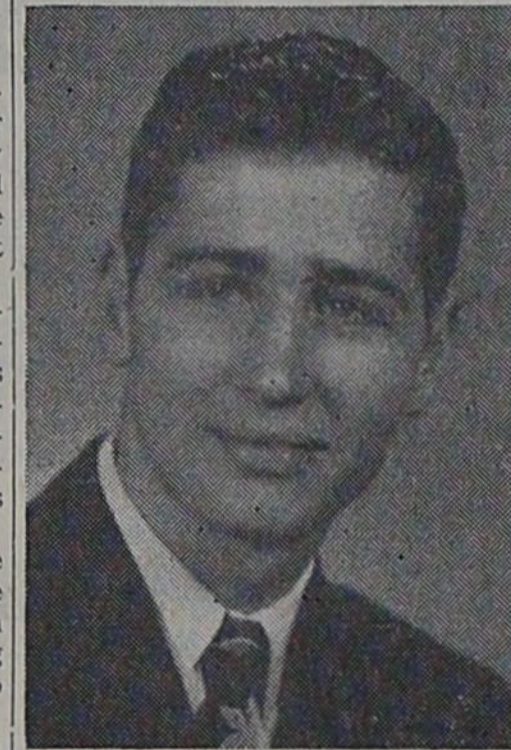

THE TRIBUNE'S EDITORIAL COMMENT

\$115,000 Bond Election Without Tax Raise Is No Myth

The manner in which the Farwell school board has chosen to show the need for a new gymnasium for the system, and to unveil the plan that in its estimation is the best way to obtain this gymnasium, is commendable from several vantage points.

Initially, the board has chosen to go the "public," or "all cards on the table" route in its plan for expansion of the system, and the fact that it will now take the public into its confidence with a comprehensive explanation of the problems facing the school will preserve good will.

About 15 "outsiders" who were not members of the board were on hand Tuesday night at the school, when the members took pains to explain to the visitors the situation with which the school is faced.

Visitors were brought in or invited to come by the members of the board, and although not a large group was on hand, it nevertheless represented every area of the school district. The Farwell Chamber of Commerce members were invited because they had a regular meeting scheduled at the same time, and it was felt that what is important to the schools is also important to the Chamber.

One might at first wonder why a district-wide "mass meeting" to talk the matter over was not held, but it soon became evident that because a lot of financial explaining was in order to show why the district could build a new gymnasium and band hall without raising taxes, it would have been exceedingly difficult, if not impossible, to make these explanations to a large group, where questions were dealt with individually.

The board spent two hours educating the visitors with the facts surrounding the proposed building, taking care to enter completely into all phases relating to the matter. The need was first shown, then ways were outlined that could be used to overcome the need, and then the financial aspect of the program was discussed.

The men present Tuesday night were asked to

discuss the matter with their neighbors. As soon as material can be prepared, it will be printed and circulated among patrons of the district. This material will be a factual presentation of with what the board is confronted.

Some people no doubt will look with skepticism upon the suggestion that a \$115,000-bond issue can be voted without raising taxes for the district, but such is more than a distinct possibility—it is an assurity.

Such a situation sounds unusual, and it is—but it is not "unheard of." The normal growth of the district, which has been steady over the past five years (and the tempo of growth is mounting), is resulting in an increased valuation of the district. In addition, the county stands to gain about \$10,000 more from the state next year as a direct result of legislation on the teacher pay raise.

The need is present—and wonder of wonders, so is the money! This election should be gotten underway as soon as possible.

Editor's note: Raymond Euler is vacationing in the northwest part of the country with his friend, Charles Allen.

Baker, Oregon—"Farming, mostly", is the answer we receive when we ask a waitress what the income vocation is around smaller and middle sized towns from Texas to this point. So many miles of the highway are lined by apparently useless land, but they always say the farming country is "down the river" somewhere. Anyway, we're glad tourists passing through Parmer County can see the productive farming lands right up to the highway.

It rained on us nearly all day today (Friday). That was from Salt Lake to the vicinity of Portland; and the farmers were as glad to see it as our own farmers at home.

We asked about the capacity of irrigation wells we had seen along the road and were told they were around "one hundred inch size." We asked the size of the discharge pipe on the average well, or the gallons per minute capacity and wound up by hearing, "Well, I don't know how they compare, but it's right smart of water". Maybe we'll find out tomorrow how much they pump. We sure don't know yet.

Charles suggested we take some pictures of the miniature thistles they raise out here. The quantity is good, but the size, or quality is pretty small, about 12 to 18 inches in diameter. They tumble as good as Texas tumble weeds though.

One thing that impresses us is that there is no evidence of irrigation water in the bar pits anywhere; and there is apparently plenty of water all along the Snake river.

Seems that the committee on Social Security is determined to make the farmer "secure" whether he wants to be or not, by placing him in the list of contributors to that fund. We don't recall hearing any farmer or farm organization requesting such "protection", is what we mean.

Austin—Texas' fast-flying governor returned from a vacation in Alabama, spent a few days in the state, and planned off to Korea, where he and other state executives will make an inspection tour at the invitation of President Eisenhower.

While in the capital, Governor Shivers was very busy doing these things:

Answering charges of disloyalty to the Democratic Party by saying that when he supported Mr. Eisenhower for president in 1952 he was really fighting to preserve the principles of the party of Jefferson and Jackson because he wants the Texas party and the national party to return to those principals in unity.

Announcing that the campaign manager in his race for re-election will be State Senator Otis Lock of Lufkin, and that campaign headquarters in Austin will be opened right away.

Answering Stephen A. Mitchell, Democratic National chairman, who said that he would deal with the Texas Democratic Advisory council, rather than the state democratic executive committee.

Shivers told Mitchell: "I strongly suspect that your statement is an announcement of your entry into the Texas governor's race. I welcome that challenge."

Saying that Texas and other states would need years to work out compliance with the non-segregation rule.

Promising that as long as he is governor, there will be no state sales tax or income tax.

Naming Weldon Hart, chairman of the Texas Employment Commission, as chairman of the newly-created Governor's Economic Advisory Commission.

Announcing that John VanCronkhite, his former aide under attack in an insurance court case, is not in his present re-election campaign.

Lloyd's Closed

After a nine day hearing in 98th District Court here, Judge Charles O. Betts granted a temporary injunction, asked by the attorney general's department, forbidding the Lloyd's of North America Insurance Co. from doing business in Texas.

At one time, VanCronkhite was employed as public relations

counsel for the company, he testified during the hearing.

Insurance Muddle
There was comment from several sources on the insurance situation.

Garland A. Smith, chairman of the state insurance commission, pledged the greatest possible protection to holders of policies issued by companies doing business in Texas.

Smith emphasized that state insurance laws are sound, fundamentally, but that same changes are necessary. He said some new laws will have to be passed, and that they probably will be, at the next session of the Legislature.

Attorney General John Ben Shepperd said he would appear before an El Paso County grand jury June 4 with evidence of possible criminal violations of Texas insurance laws.

At El Paso and other Texas cities, Shepperd has filed suits against insurance companies, forcing them into receivership. Charges have been that the companies were created through fraud and were insolvent.

Financial Reports
Attorney General Shepperd advocates a law requiring publication of all financial reports on all government levels.

Shepperd also opposed secret session of governmental bodies, saying, "There is no place on an open door for a sign saying closed meeting or executive session."

What has happened in Duval County, Shepperd declared, "can happen anywhere, and will, unless the lesson is told and retold."

TV in Education
J. W. Edgar, state commissioner

of education, has appointed a 56-member group, authorized by the Legislature, to study the role of television in education. S. Mortimer Brown, El Paso school superintendent, is chairman of the body.

Allowables Up
Texas oil allowables for June will be 3,010,515 barrels, the Railroad Commission decided. That is an increase from the May figure.

Resort Lodges
Progress was being made in plans to construct four resort lodges, each to cost about \$1 million, at Inks Lake near Burnet, Eisenhower Park on Texoma, Lake Whitney, and Texarkana-Reservoir in Cass County.

This is a project of the State Parks Board. The money for building the lodges would come from revenue bonds. Private operators would lease the lodges and run them.

Wets and Dries
Texas Rangers are investigating trouble between the wets and dries at Bandera.

Rev. Joe R. Townsend, Baptist minister in that West Texas resort and ranch town, moved for a dry election saying that he had been thrown through a plate glass window.

Refunds Coming
Employers of Texas are going to get refunds amounting to several million dollars from the Texas Employment Commission.

A decision of the Supreme Court in a case concerning Todd Shipyard Corporation is responsible for the refunds. Todd maintained that its unemployment tax rate was too high and would have been lower if the corporation had been

notified by TEC of all claims made by former Todd workers.

I hear that James Mabry is having troubles. Mel Swartz was out at James' place last Wednesday taking some pictures and making some clippings. Mel found that Mr. Mabry had about 12 tons of green manure per acre. Now that is quite a bit of vetch and rye to be turning under. However Mr. Mabry had already come to that conclusion. He is having trouble getting his plow to handle the rank growth.

James decided that the moldboard was probably his best bet. He is going to add a nitrogen fertilizer to help speed the decomposition of the vetch and rye. As soon as most of the plants that are turned under are decayed, James is going to plant the area to grain sorghums. I am anxious to watch the sorghum crop to see the effects of the green manure. This particular plot of ground is next to the highway just south of Hub. Keep an eye on the grain sorghum and see for yourself the effects of the vetch and rye.

County Agent Joe Jones and I have been working on some Soil Conservation District tours for the last of June. If you have anything that you think would be of interest for a tour be sure to let one of us know. We are particularly interested in legumes, waterways, cowpeas in grain sorghums, drops in ditches, and methods of land preparation following legumes.

Farm Bureau Plans Three Area Sessions

WACO—The Texas Farm Bureau has called three area-wide mass meetings this month to discuss pending farm legislation, TFB President J. Walter Hammond has announced.

Sessions were held May 26 at Baker Hotel, Dallas; today at the Lubbock Hotel, Lubbock; and May 28 at the Plaza Hotel, San Antonio. John C. Lynn, legislative director for the American Farm Bureau Federation in Washington, will be main speaker for all three meetings.

Lynn's talks will touch on agricultural legislation being considered in Washington. This includes all phases of farm programs that have been or will be introduced in Congress during this session.

In addition, he will explain in detail the major provisions of the Agricultural Act of 1949. This is the basic law under which agriculture will operate beginning next year unless present temporary amendments are extended or new amendments are tacked on. Lynn is an authority on the 1949 Act.

The sessions are not intended to rally support for or against any proposed farm legislation. They were called at the request of Farm Bureau members who expressed a desire for unbiased, factual information in order to get a better understanding of past, present and possible future farm laws.

Each of the meetings will get

underway at 10 a. m. and will be concluded by 3 p. m. The sites and program schedule were arranged so that a maximum number of county Farm Bureau leaders could attend.

Lynn, a native of North Carolina, has made scores of appearances before House and Senate committees in behalf of Farm Bureau. His duties enable him to keep close contact with political currents in Washington.

He joined the staff of the AFBB in 1948 after representing the US on the Allied Control Commission for Germany as assistant director of the Anglo-American Food, Agriculture and Forestry Division.

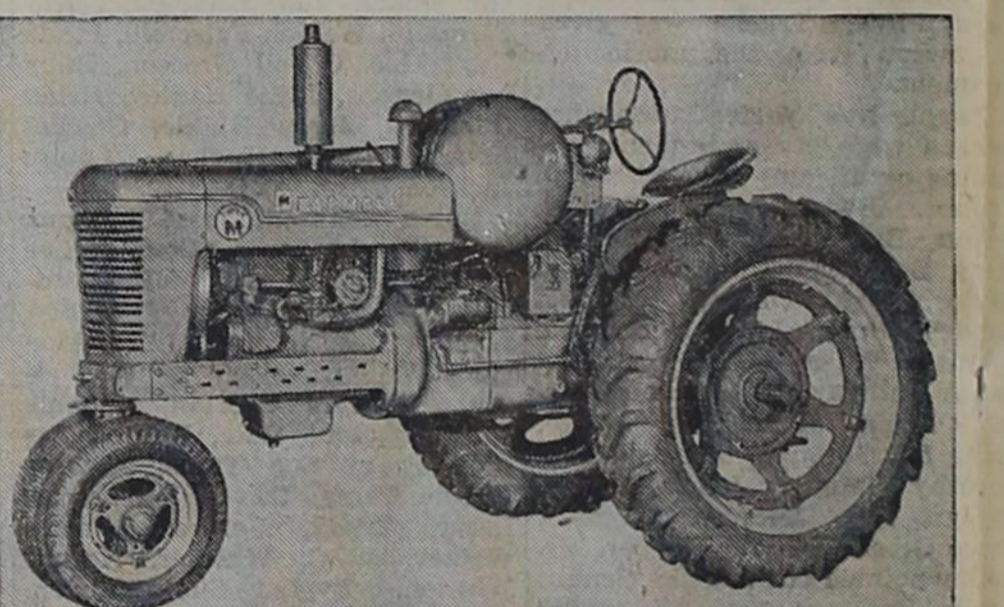

A Time to Remember

I bowed my head reverently with the rest of my classmates during the "moment of silence" in tribute to our soldier-dead, then seeing Old Glory waving from the flag pole on the lawn of our Alma Mater, I stood tiptoe upon a dream and thought, "What a lucky girl you are to be born under that flag, for you can be what you will to be! You are an American."

Then a strange thing happened. The flag seemed to be a living thing with a soul. I heard the silent singing of its stars on its blue of truth, and listening, my soul caught this refrain:

"I am the symbol of America, and America is more than its hills and prairies with their herds and fields of grain; more than its pulsing cities, its mines and its mills . . . America is you and you and you . . . and God.

"I am the symbol of the homes, the churches, schools, enterprises, and the kingly commoners of America.

"I represent your heritage from the past. Look at me and hear the tramping of soldier-feet in the immortal march for freedom; feel within your hearts the 'Spirit of 76'; see the footprints in the snow at Valley Forge; the great, gaunt commoner on his knees in prayer, and the crimson stain, spreading, that meant life was ebbing from his great heart; see the crosses above our youth, martyrs to freedom in recent wars. Look again and behold lilies blooming where men gave life for man; listen and hear the joyous dancing footsteps of those yet unborn.

"Behold the Open Gate, before which stand weary pilgrims: children with eyes empty of laughter; youth burdened with the weight of dead dreams; the elder ones their eyes but burned out embers, their bone-lean hands caressing gaunt throats that too long have felt the choking leash of fear. See their eyes relight with hope as they view the green acres of democracy and reverently enter the gate of America."

Suddenly I knew: The flag is an emblem of freedom, protection, justice, honor, sacrifice, opportunity to all and love for country, fellowman and God. It is the symbol, not only of our heritage from the past but of the future. I knew that it is up to me to help America continue to mean to coming generations what it means to me today; that every right has its concomitant duty, that I must train myself to be able to choose leaders wisely and judge their performance with honesty and understanding. I must fight oppression, intolerance, injustice and keep the land free of the footprints of communism. I must guard the rights of others as jealously as I do my own, and recognize in every man a brother.

Again I looked at the flag waving serenely beneath our peaceful country sky and reverently I breathed, "How much you stand for!" Was I dreaming or did I hear, "The earth a great DEMOCRACY OF LOVE!"

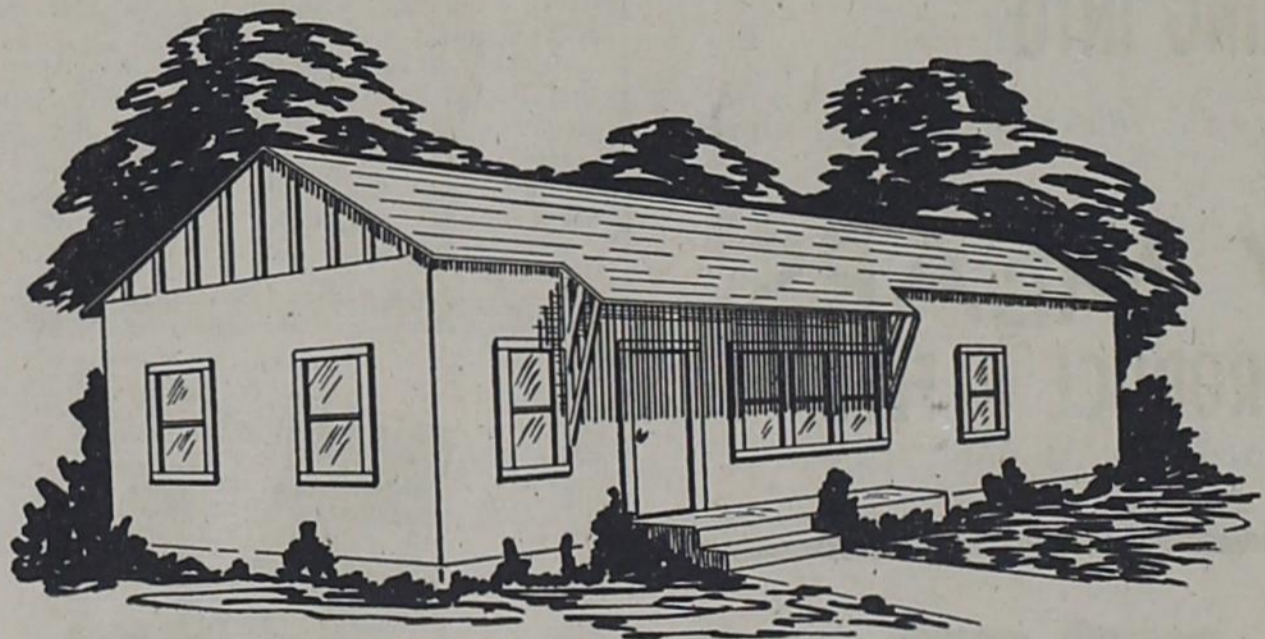

school taxes, based on valuation, are among the lowest in the county it was pointed out.

On June 2 of 1951, the district voted to build the present high

school, and voted bonds in the amount of \$165,000 for that purpose.

The previous March 17 voters rejected a proposal to build a high school and gymnasium combined, the election having been for \$225,000. The measure lost by one vote, 129-130.

Virtually everyone present Tuesday night openly expressed themselves in favor of the proposed building program, the remark being heard on occasion "We don't see how we can pass this up—a new gymnasium and band hall and no raise in taxes."

Discussions of the circulation of a petition to call an election were going on when the group was dismissed, and it is likely that such an instrument is being worked on at this time.

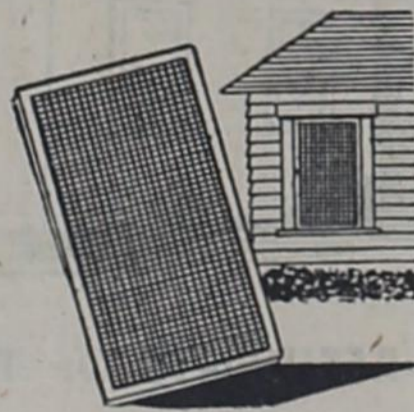
