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Steers Score First, But Lose, 41-12, To Petersburg

The Farwell Steers, tackling their third conference opponent of the current season at Petersburg, Friday night, scored in the initial quarter of the game, but failed to hold out against the strong Buffalo attack and went down in final defeat, 41-12.

The Buffaloes, apparently smarting from the sound spanking administered them a week ago by the Friona Chieftains, made gains in all directions as they starred Pete Blassingame and Gerald Bright in the ball-toting division.

The Farwell youngsters got their gears meshing early in the match, with Dennis Raney electrifying the crowd with his 60-yard gallop. Lynn Carpenter also set the crowd on its ears in the third quarter, when he gathered the ball after Petersburg had been forced to kick and went down the field for the second Steer counter.

First Quarter

The Steers received the kickoff, with Dial returning to the 30. Raney gained six in two tries, but a 5-yard penalty was assessed against Farwell. Cassidy toted for six, Barber gained two, Norton went for a first down, then the locals turned the ball to Raney, offered him a hole to get through, and the youngster was long-gone on a 60-yard touchdown gallop. Dial's try for the conversion failed to pierce the uprights. With Petersburg receiving, the

Buff returned to their 40, then sent Bright for a total of 9, with Blassingame turning in a first down on the Steer 37. Bright added 6, Blassingame went for a first again on the Steer 19, and Bright plunged on down to the 6-yard marker. Bright hit again to the 2, but the Buffs lost 5 on a penalty. Bright repeated for two yards, and Blassingame carried over for a touchdown. The conversion try was nil, and the count stood tied at 6-all.

Dial returned the kickoff to the Farwell 32, from where Raney got two, Norton added six, Cassidy made one, Norton gained for a first but a penalty set the locals back and Cassidy kicked out, with the ball dying a natural death on the Petersburg 35.

Bright took over for four yards, Blassingame was through to the 45, Fullingim got 8 on a reverse, Bright reached the Steer 40 for a first down. The Buffs were fined 5, but a pass clicked for a first down. Pipkin nailed Bright for no gain, but Bright's next two tries totaled 10, with a 5-yard penalty rubbing out one gain. A completed pass put the Buffs on the 1-yard line, and a line plunge carried over for a score with the conversion also clicking, and Petersburg led, 13-6.

Dial returned the Buff kick to his own 22 as the quarter ended.

Second Quarter

Back into action, Cassidy was nailed for a minus two. Jordan gained seven in two stabs, and Cassidy kicked out to the 50, with the receiving team gaining the Farwell 45.

Meadows was through for three; Blassingame made six around end; Bright got to the Farwell 28; Blassingame added one more, Bright went for two, and the Steers got an injury to Pipkin on the play. Jesko recovered a Petersburg fumble on the 25, giving the ball to the Steers.

Barber made a short gain, but the Steers got a 15-yard fine; Coburn was through and gone for 20, Raney

made a first on his own 21, Jordan's pass try to Coburn was incomplete; Raney gained four after getting a bad pass over center from Jordan; Jordan's pass to Coburn was no good, and Cassidy kicked out on the Petersburg 7-yard marker. Bright got to his own 23; Blassingame gained one, Bright made six; but Dial got through the defense to nail Meadows for a 10-yard loss, and the Buffs kicked out to Norton on their own 48-yard marker.

Jordan's aerial to Coburn failed to connect, Raney plunged down to the Petersburg 37; Norton went on for five, Raney added two, and then set up the Steers for a first down on the Buff 27. Petersburg was fined five; Jordan made enough for another first, Barber got 4 on a reverse, and Jordan hit the one-yard line, where the next try got nothing and the half stopped play.

Third Quarter

Petersburg received and regained their 42, but were penalized back to the 28. Bright made five, another try got nothing, and Blassingame gained 10, but was forced to kick.

Lynn Carpenter measured his chances, took the ball deep in his own territory, and was off and away for the second Steer touchdown of the game. The try for point was no good, and the count stood 13 for the Buffs, 12 for the Steers.

Bright returned the kickoff to the 20; then made a first down; Blassingame failed to gain; Bright fired an aerial to Roden for another first; Roden carried for two; Bright got a like number, and Blassingame reached the Steer 42. Meadows got through for only a scant yard, then lost four on his next try; Blassingame's pass try was incomplete, but his second aerial hit May on the 1-yard line, and a plunge sent Bright over for the score. The conversion try was good, and Petersburg pushed ahead, 20-12.

Coburn gathered in the ball and returned to his own 40, Raney got 10, Jordan made 1, Jordan's pass was

incomplete, but Barber hit a first on a reverse run; Jordan got two, Raney added one; but a bad pass lost a total of 15 yards, and Farwell failed to accumulate yardage for a first as the quarter ran out.

Fourth Quarter

With the Buffs in possession on their own 48, Brunson got one; Blassingame got nothing, Roden made five by a penalty sent the Buffs back to their 44. Meadows went for two, and the Buffs punted into the end zone, with Farwell taking over on their own 20.

Jordan gained to the 35, but the Steers were fined five; Norton gained four, Raney added one; Jordan gained 5 but drew a 15-yard fine;

and Cassidy kicked out of bounds on the 30.

Roden went for short yardage, but then broke loose for another Buff counter, with the kick making it 27-12 in their favor.

Dial returned the kickoff to the 30, Jordan's pass to Coburn was incomplete, Raney gained nine; and Norton gained 10, where a penalty cost 5. Cassidy's pass to Barber connected for a first down on the 45; then Jordan fired one to Norton for only four; Raney made two; Norton reached the Petersburg 40 for a first, but Jordan's pass was intercepted and returned to the Buff 44.

Roden gained 10, Farwell was penalized 15, Blassingame reached out for yardage to the Steer 24, Roden was out for 7; Blassingame got to the Steer 8, Bright's try got nowhere, but Roden came through to score and the extra made the count 34-12. Dial returned the ball to his own 17, Carpenter found a hole for six

yards, Cassidy's pass was intercepted and returned to the Farwell 10, from where Blassingame gained 7 and Meadows scored the touchdown. The extra was again good and the count was 41-12.

Carpenter returned the kickoff to his own 40 as time ran out for the game.

Cars Are Derailed Near Black Siding

Three cars loaded with potash, included on the string of an extra east-bound Santa Fe freight train, hurtled off the main tracks just west of the Black siding, near Friona, about 7:30 the past Friday morning, with officials listing the wreck damage as negligible and no injuries occasioned by the derailment.

The three steel cars were thrown off when the journal gave way on one. One boxcar tipped on its side, a second landed upside-down, and the third jumped the tracks and wound up its flight along the right-of-way, standing upright.

Some 30 feet of rail on the main track was torn up, with around 300 feet of the siding rail ripped loose from the ties. A Santa Fe wrecking crew from Amarillo had the main track cleared in an hour, with no traffic tie-up resulting. The crew was busy until late Friday night completing clean-up of the wreckage.

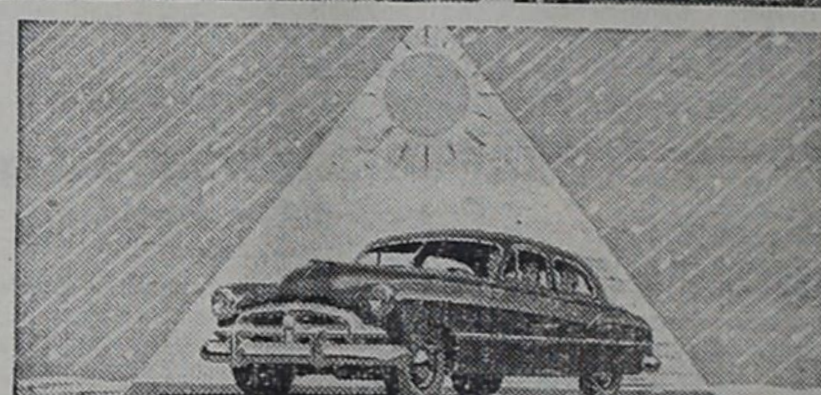

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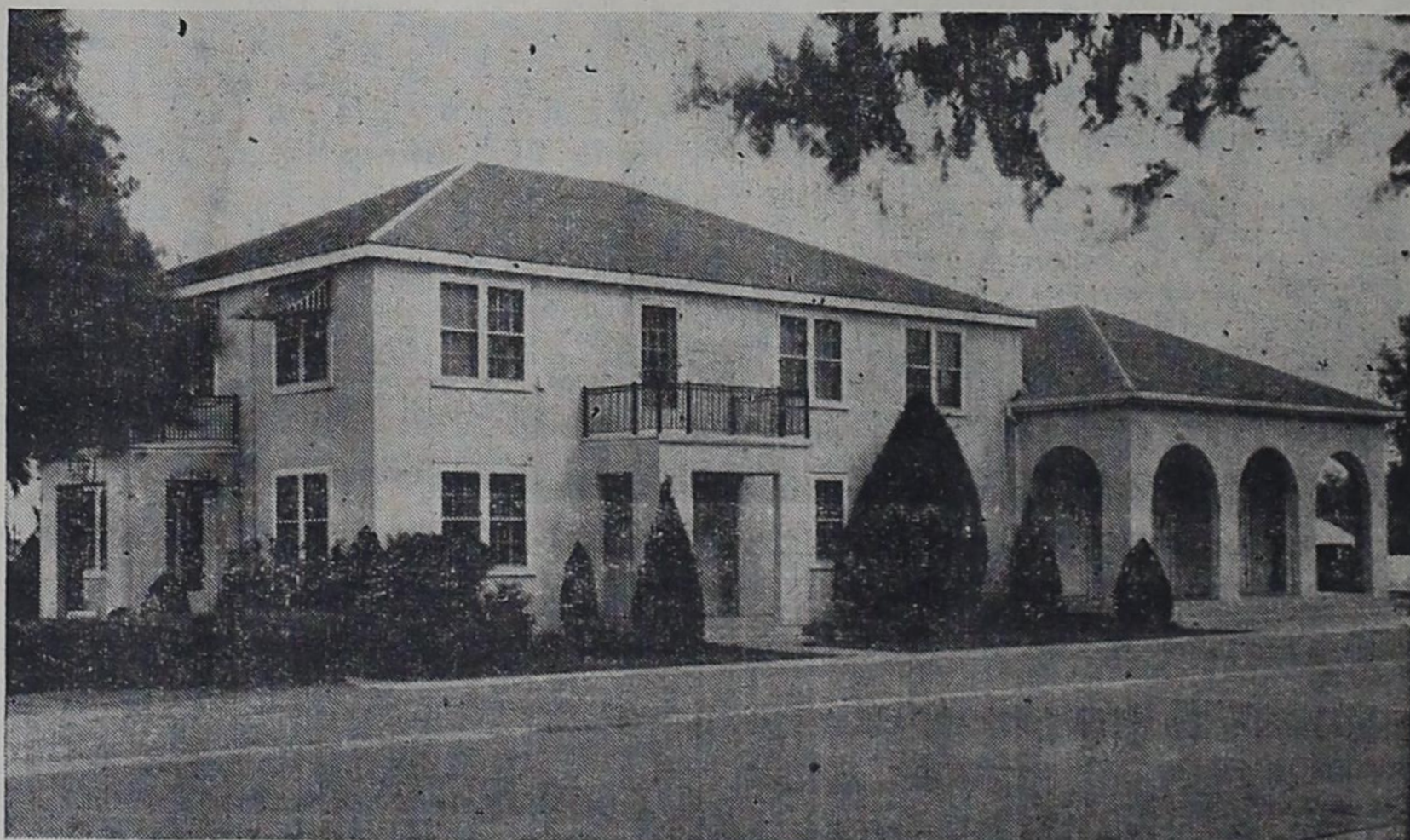
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
