## Twin Cities FFA Chapters To Observe Nat'l Week

February 18-25 is National FFA Week, and the Twin Cities Future Farmers of America chapters are fairly buzzing with projects—some old, some new.

In special observance of the week, Texico FFA Advisor Eddie West said that his chapter has two extra activities planned to celebrate the occasion.

On Monday at 7 p.m. MST, Texico FFA will conduct a contest night in the Texico Ag shop. Parents and faculty members will be invited to participate in several contests such as welding, and several judging identification contests. The categories in the judging identification contests will include meats, tools, wildlife, and livestock. West said that no livestock will be on hand for the judging, but parents and faculty members will view the livestock on film.

On Tuesday, the Texico group

plans to wear their coats and ties to school, as a special observance of the week.

Although most activities have been planned for next week, Texico's FFA'ers have already been hard at work this year on several building projects. Some of these projects include building picnic tables, doghouses, cattle panels, and name plates, as well as refinishing old furniture.

Presently, Texico FFA members are busy getting ready to participate in the upcoming judging contests, the first of which will be held Saturday, Feb. 25, in Dora. Some of the judging contests they will be entering include dairy, livestock, crops, entomology, wool, and horses.

Also, West said that the members are beginning preparation for the buying of their livestock

which will begin in May, and are making preparations for, and looking forward to, their annual FFA Parent-Member banquet scheduled for April 27.

While Farwell's FFA chapter hasn't planned anything special for next week, Advisor Richard Montgomery said that his FFA'ers have been very busy with old projects and starting on new ones.

Currently, the members are involved in building a calf hoof trimming chute which should be completed soon. Montgomery

said that as soon as warm weather appears to be here to stay, the group will venture out to the Ag Farm in east Farwell to pour new cement and build new pens for the animals.

Farwell FFA'ers have also been busy with stock shows, as this is the season for those in this area. Some of the stock shows the FFA'ers have already participated in this year include Hereford, Farwell, and the Parmer County show in Friona. Montgomery also said that several members will be traveling.

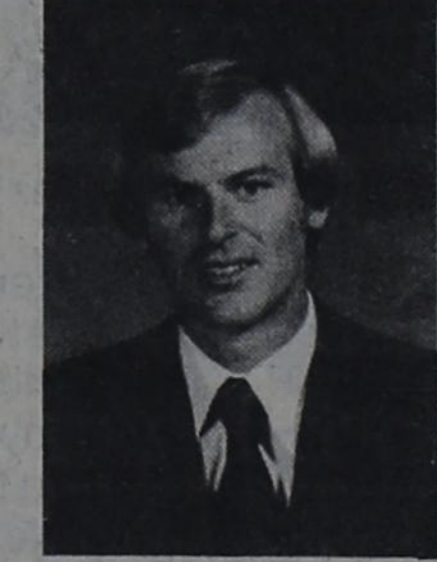

Methodist and Rotarian and a graduate of Texas Tech, Moseley is the present chairman of

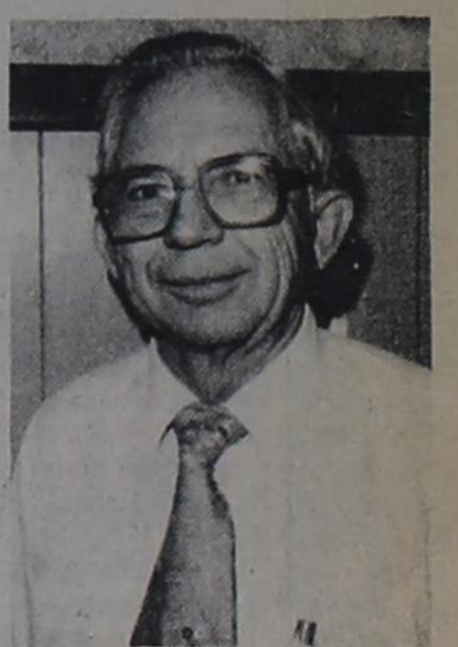
the Parmer County Historical Commission. He and his wife, Wilma, have one son, David.

When it comes to getting something done, a body just can't beat a small town. The record for the Twin Cities in the past six to eight months has been outstanding. Approximately \$50,000 has been raised and donated to the Civic Center and to the Convalescent Center.

For a small town, this is a yardstick that many other communities will find it impossible to be measured by. The overwhelming thing is that there is that much more money needed to be raised, and that programs are being developed to accomplish these goals. Aren't you glad that you live in a community of pride and generosity?

The political pot is fast coming to a boil, and in Texas one of those stoking the fires is our U.S. Representative Kent Hance. Hance is one of three major Democratic candidates running for the party nomination to capture the U.S. Senate seat long held by Republican John Tower.

The other two most likely nominees are Bob Krueger, who ran a nip and tuck race against Tower six years ago, and State Senator Lloyd Doggett, a power in state politics. Both of these men are formidable opponents for Hance. Both have a great deal more statewide name recognition than Hance. Both are closer to the very large centers of population in Texas than is West Texan Hance.

In order to overcome this name recognition deficiency Hance has become quite outspoken in his political comments and has also done his homework on his opponents' political philosophies and voting records.

We attended a meeting last weekend in which Hance and Krueger fielded questions, first from a selected panel of journalists and then from the floor. Their responses to the questions closely paralleled each other, but Hance quickly pointed out that he thought Krueger was tailoring his responses to a conservative West Texas audience, and that Krueger's remarks were different when he faced a more liberal audience, such as San Antonio. From then on out, they managed to work each other over in a rough and tumble political exchange. Frankly, we came away wondering just who had the last word.

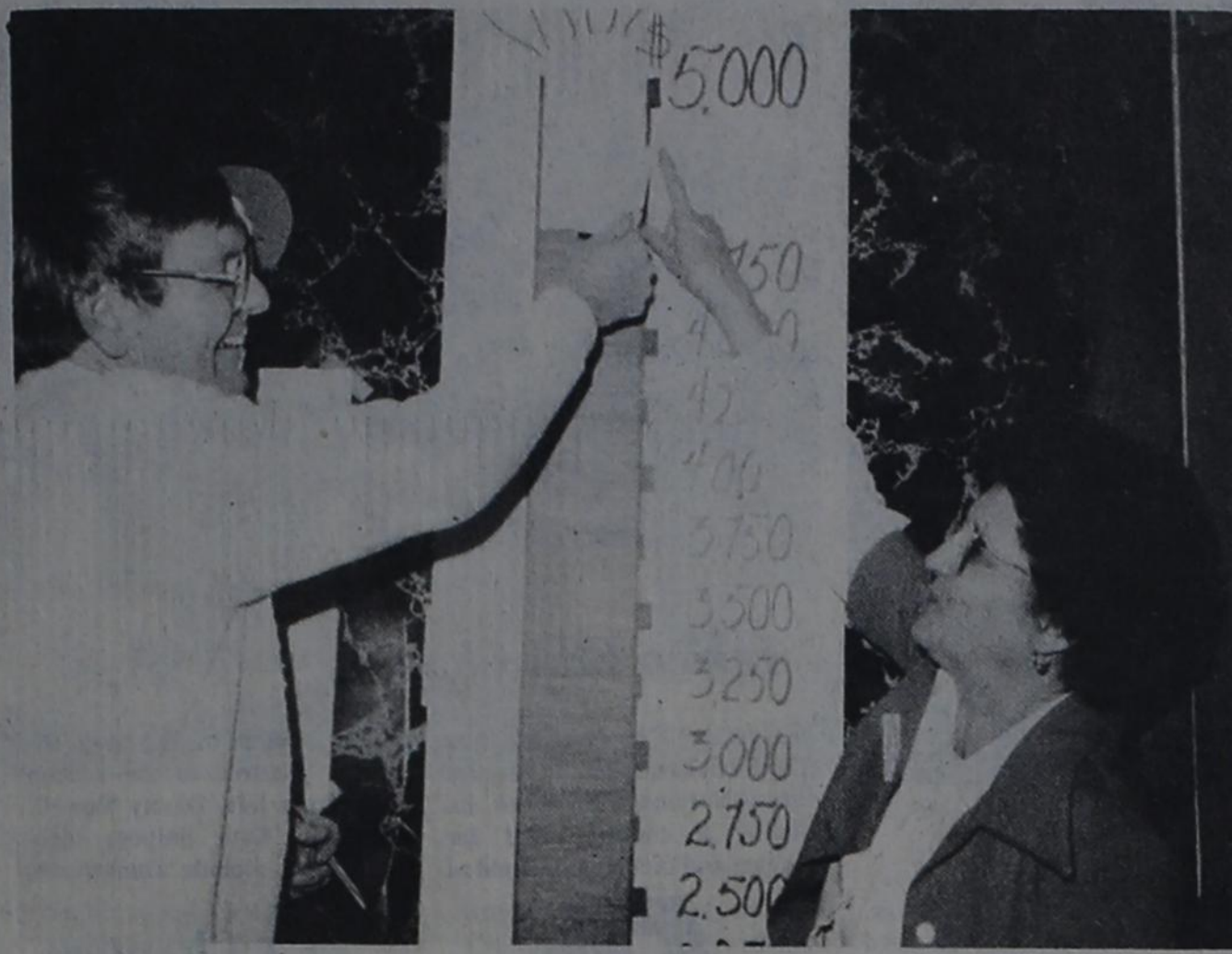
Hance's strategy seems to be working as all the major news media in the entire area were on hand for the event, and Hance did receive wide publicity for his efforts. There will be many more of these two- and three-way confrontations between these aspirants before the primary election designates the final party candidate. Kent Hance is a worthy man on the stump and is at least an even bet to be the Democratic nominee in the general election next fall.

There is a great debate underway in Texas on the recommendations of the governor's select committee on education. At first brush, these recommendations seem to be a tad out of touch with reality. These recommendations were from a group largely composed of non-educators and is currently being criticized for its meddling in the education field without enough basic input from educators.

We do not know enough about the committee, its recommendations or the detractors, but we do feel that there is an overriding necessity to define how much of an "education" will be necessary in the decades of the tomorrows, and to take the necessary steps to provide that basic knowledge to the generation now under instruction.

Technology has made a new ballgame of the kind, types, and methods of "education" as being disseminated today. While we deplore the lack of representation of the current educational school of thought from the committee, we feel that the most significant omission was that of not having at least one pure philosopher in the group. Sometimes, general abstract thought will allow the group to see the trees instead of the forest.

The Meals-On-Wheels program will begin Monday, Feb. 20, and will serve the Farwell and Texico areas. Those eligible to receive the meals are those persons who are 60 years of age or older, handicapped, chronically ill, or temporarily ill, who can not prepare their own noon meals. The noon meals will be prepared by the Farwell Convalescent Center's dietary staff and will be nutritionally balanced and sound meals, says Ron Fechner, Center administrator. The meals will be delivered between 11:45 and 12 noon and the cost will be \$2.00 per meal. Five commitments for the noon meals have been received to date.

## County Jail Receives 5th Year Certification

Wednesday, Feb. 8, when Inspection Supervisor Eddie Slater made his yearly inspection of Parmer County Jail for the Texas Commission on Jail Standards, instead of the regular green certificate, the jail received a special red certificate which stated that the county jail had been certified for its fifth consecutive year.

When the law was passed five years ago that each jail throughout the state of Texas must be inspected annually, and must pass inspection to be certified, Parmer County Jail became the first jail in this area to become certified, and one of only three or four in the Panhandle to be certified.

That was five years ago, and the county jail has been certified each year since. According to Inspection Supervisor Slater, "You'd have to drive a lot of miles to see this again." This is the only jail meriting this red certificate in the entire area.

Receiving certification for the jail is not easy and, according to Sheriff Bill Morgan, they check you out right down to the smallest detail.

When the inspection supervisor comes to call, he must be satisfied that the jail meets the requirements of the Texas Commission on Jail Standards in every way. He sees that the jails are not overcrowded, that the jailers are all certified, that emergency equipment is in order, and that the jail records have been kept properly. In addition to all this, he checks the kitchen facilities, along with the inmates' menus.

He also checks for fire hazards and sees that fire equipment such as smoke alarms and smoke removal fans, emergency lighting, and airpicks are all in satisfactory working order.

The inspector times Sheriff

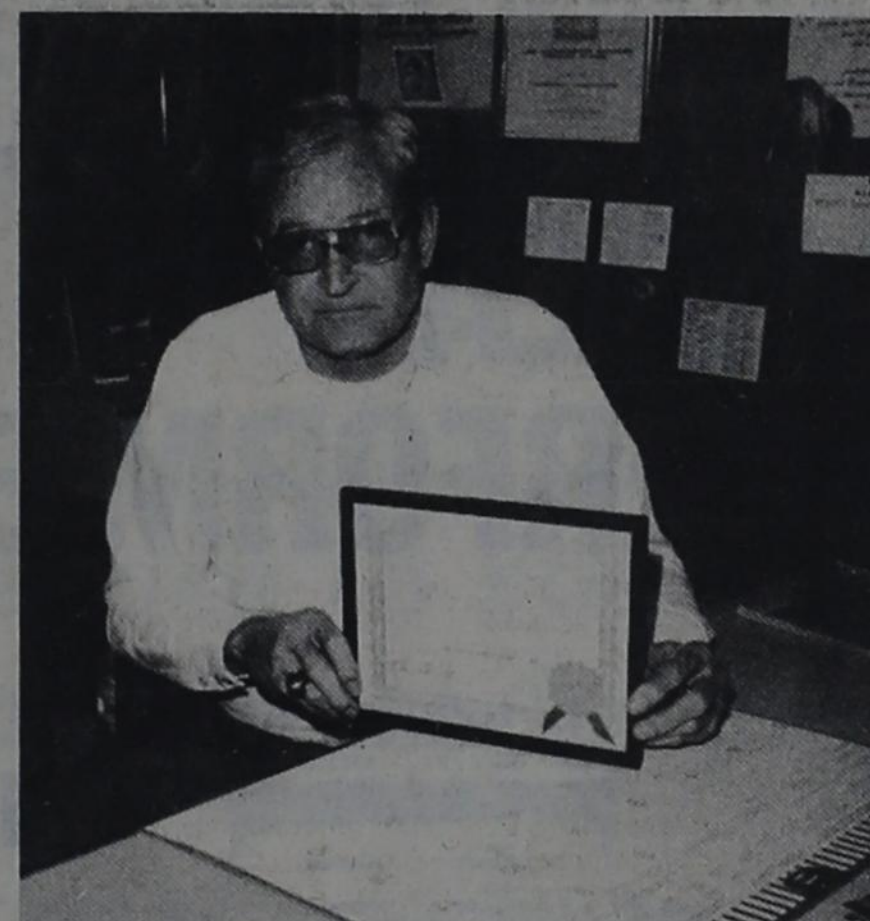
Morgan on how long it takes him to get from the inner office through all of the locked doors and into the jail, should the need arise for emergency evacuation.

He checks the jail's book of plans, which contains the jail's written procedures on how to handle everything that goes on, from the booking and releasing of prisoners to the classifying of prisoners. The book contains procedure plans and handling medical records, grievances

made by the prisoners, religious services, telephone usage, and discipline problems, to name a few. He even checks to make sure that the jail has an emergency set of keys, in case the official ones get lost.

And if, after all that, the inspector is satisfied that every requirement set by the commission has been met satisfactorily, he will certify a jail.

So, receiving certification for one year isn't easy, much less five years in a row.

Thank goodness he's gone! could be the thoughts of Sheriff Bill Morgan following the annual visit of the inspection supervisor for the Texas Commission on Jail Standards last Wednesday, making sure that everything was up to par. Sheriff Morgan was glad to see the

inspector come and go, as the Parmer County Jail was certified for the fifth consecutive year, a record in the area. This is the only jail in the area to receive the special red certificate, displayed by Sheriff Morgan, designating the fifth consecutive year for certification.

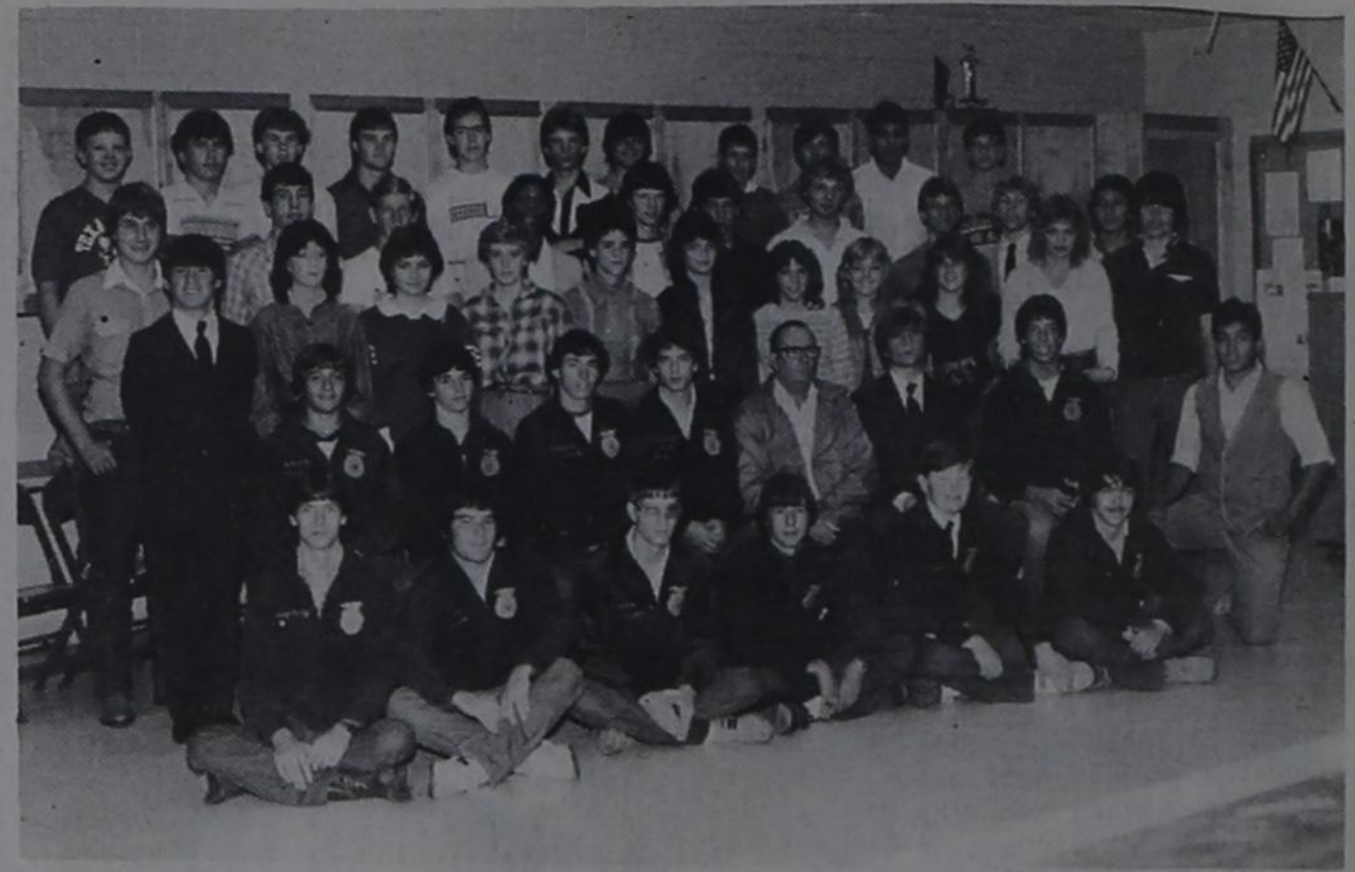

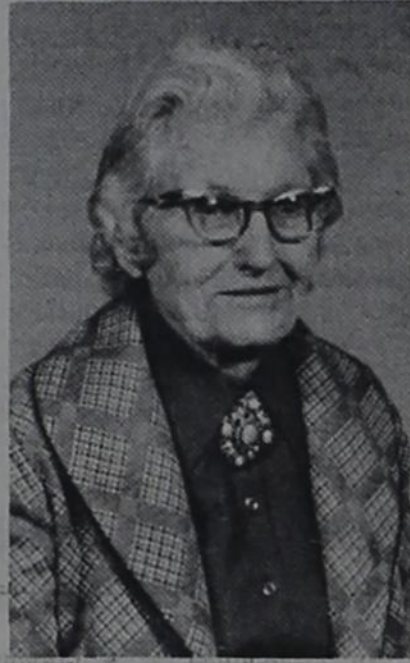
## Funeral Services Held For Maude V. Wilson

On Sunday, Feb. 12, Parmer County Sheriff's office received a report that a young male was throwing rocks at vehicles about three miles east of Farwell on U.S. Highway 84.

## Texico City Council Selects Election Officials

Texico City Council met in regular session Tuesday night at the city hall and selected the election judge and clerks who will preside over the March 6 Municipal elections. They are Mae Stone, judge, and Bernice Thigpen and Mrs. Merced Rojas, clerks. Alternates selected were Ophelia Billington and Mary Jones.

and the council voted to invite proposals for the 1983-84 fiscal year.

The council then held a discussion on the city's condemned buildings, and discussed the remodeling and repairs to be made on the community center and the meeting and storage rooms in the city office complex. Also a discussion was held on the matter of trucks tearing up the city streets. The council decided to table this issue until a further study could be made.

Bills were approved and the judge's report was accepted. Next meeting is set for February 28 at 6:30 p.m.

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

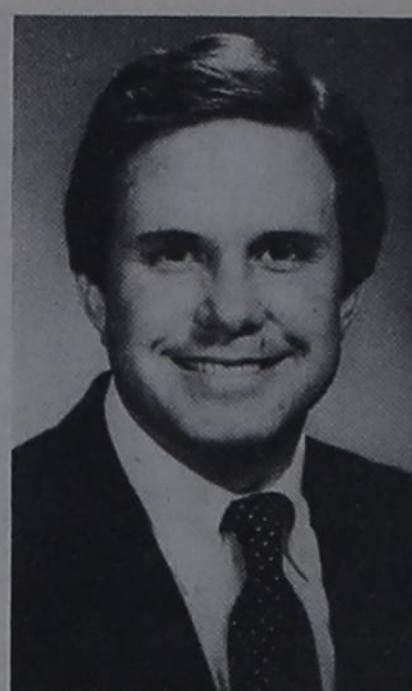
Fourteen Texico Band students were in Portales Saturday to compete in the Eastern New Mexico University Solo and Ensemble Festival.

## Farwell School Personnel Oppose 'Longer Day' Issue

Last week in the State Line Tribune, Texas State Senator Bill Sarpalius asked parents, students, and others interested in the state's education system to provide him input on a proposal to lengthen the school day throughout Texas.

If passed, this proposal recommended by the subcommittee of the Select Committee on Public Education would require all students in Texas, grades kindergarten through 12, to spend nine hours a day from 8:30 to 5:30 in school, five days a week.

Curious to know how Farwell school officials feel about this issue, we questioned many of them. Although each teacher or administrator worded their response differently, their opinions were still the same—don't do it!

When speaking with school personnel, several reasons for opposing the longer school day came to light, but first and foremost on all of their minds was concern for the students, the younger ones in particular.

"My main concern is the children," said Nelle Craig, third grade teacher at Farwell. "They simply cannot last that long. Families don't spend enough time together as it is, and I feel that this would only contribute to pulling them farther apart."

"Little children are tired now," added Billie Worley, fourth grade teacher. "It's difficult to teach them now as it is, and anyone who has ever worked with kids knows that there is a saturation point. A child can only learn so much."

Karolene Inman, fifth grade teacher, said, "Children, as it is, do not get a proper amount of rest during Daylight Savings Time, and would get even less if

this passes."

Howard Carlyle, high school guidance counselor, said, "I think elementary students go to school too long as it is, and I feel like the time spent needs to be quality time not longer time." This opinion was also expressed by Flo Davis, elementary teacher.

For a higher grade level opinion, JoLynda Robbs, math teacher at the junior high, said, "As far as grades go, I believe we would see a decline in achievement. No matter how long you have the body, the attention span doesn't get any longer. I don't think it will benefit the students one bit, and that's what counts."

And as to the effect the longer school day would have on high school students, Lucille Franse, English teacher, let the students speak for themselves. Her high school students have filled out the forms in last week's Tribune, and are mailing them to Senator Sarpalius. Some of the reasons they gave for being opposed to the longer school day were that many of them work and would not have time to do so, and many have responsibilities at home and outside school that they would no longer have time for.

Elizabeth Phillips, history teacher at the junior high, who has been encouraging her students to write to their congressmen and senators on important issues, has assured us that they would be sending Senator Sarpalius their opinion on this too.

Kay Ray, English teacher at the junior high, said, "I don't see one good thing about lengthening the school day. My kids have responsibilities at home and church, and this wouldn't leave any time for them." Mrs. Ray's classes will also be writing Senator Sarpalius.

Several teachers go to college in the evenings to work on degrees and keep updated on their own work, and the longer school day would pose a problem for them in that area also.

"I go to college at night," said Sandra Turner, elementary teacher. "I am presently trying to get my degree, and if the school days were longer, there is no way I could do it."

Counselor Carlyle also expressed his concern on this problem. "Many teachers go to school at night to further their own education and work on degrees. This would put an end to that altogether."

Many teachers were also concerned that by adding two more hours to their work day, they would have two less hours to prepare for their classes, and the students might suffer.

"Having the kids longer will limit the time I have for thought and preparation that goes into teaching," said Mrs. Craig, "and I think that could only hurt rather than help the kids."

Verona Traynor, third grade teacher, agreed with Mrs. Craig's statement by saying, "We certainly need time to rest and prepare."

Gretchen Montgomery, fourth grade teacher, added, "We only have so much time during the day for planning and preparation now, we would have very little at all if this passes."

Another main concern expressed by school personnel was what effect the longer school day could have on the family, the student's, and their own.

Sara Owens, school nurse, voiced her concern, "A longer school day would take the kids away from home more, and that would take away from what a family should be. I feel there is

a definite need to get back to people staying home at night and just being a family."

Marcia Cole, reading teacher at the junior high, also voiced her concern on this issue. "I feel very strongly that the family is what made this country what it is," she said, "and I feel that a longer school day could lead to the deterioration of the family."

Mrs. Worley added, "Children would be spending too much time away from home, and I feel that this would increase discipline problems by the score, at home and at school."

When questioned about the longer school day's effect on their own lives, several teachers responded with concern there also.

"Teaching is too emotional a job to go on any longer than regular hours," said Cathie Lanahm, elementary P.E. teacher. "Two more hours a day here, allows me two less hours to spend with my family."

"I love teaching," added Mrs. Craig, "but I spend a lot more hours at school than just regular hours, and I would not have any time left for my family if this passes."


The final issue which teachers and school officials considered important in the lengthening of the school day was the extra number of hours that the bus students would be away from home. Although, in actual hours they would be on the bus the same amount of time, they would be much later in coming home, and in the winter it would be after dark.

W.M. Roberts, school superintendent, said, "We have some students who board the bus at 7:15 in the morning and don't get home until after 4:30. The two extra hours that the students would be in school, would

put the bus students two hours later in getting home." Another issue that he feels would arise might be the necessity of hiring additional teachers because of more study halls.




So for whatever the reasons, whether it's because it would be too hard on the children, the teachers, the family, or the bus students, Farwell school personnel at every level seem to be very opposed to the state of Texas imposing two more hours of school upon all of us.

"God forbid that I should glory, save in the cross of our Lord Jesus Christ..." (Gal. 6:14)

St. Paul was once a proud Pharisee, smug in his self-righteousness. In Philippians 3:5,6, he lists some of the things in which he took great pride:

"Circumcised the eighth day, of the stock of Israel, of the tribe of Benjamin, an Hebrew of the Hebrews; as touching the law, a Pharisee; 'concerning zeal,' persecuting the church; touching the righteousness which is in the law, blameless."

But everything was changed since that day when the Lord appeared to him on the road to Damascus. 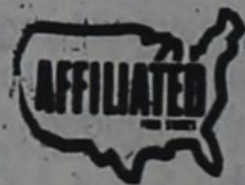

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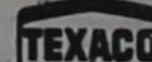

## Texico Wolverines End Season With Perfect District 10-0 Record

Texico Wolverines completed their final two district games this weekend, when they traveled out of town to face Dora and Melrose, and brought home a perfect 10-0 district record.

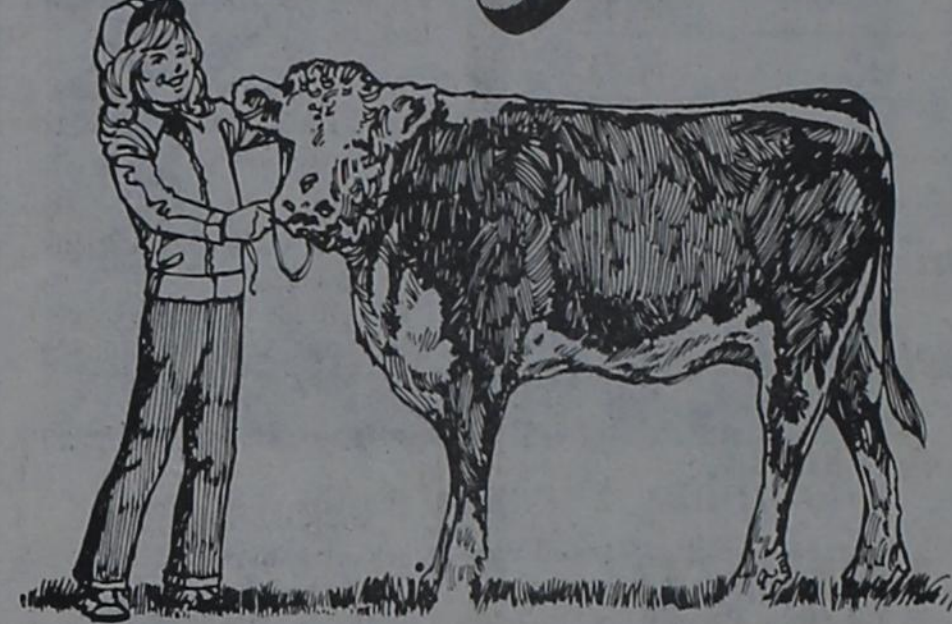

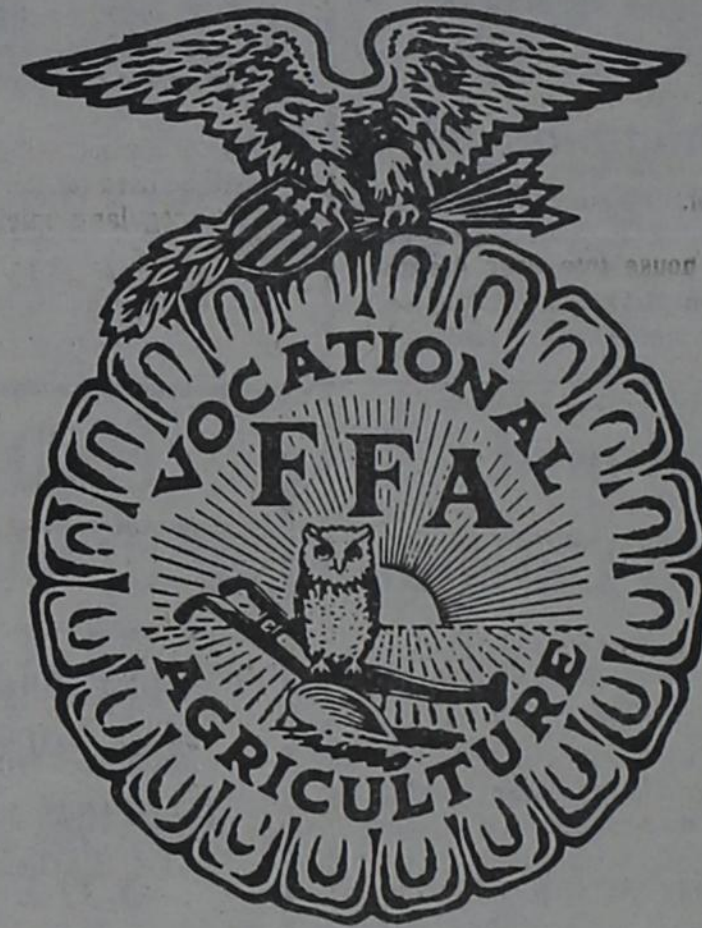

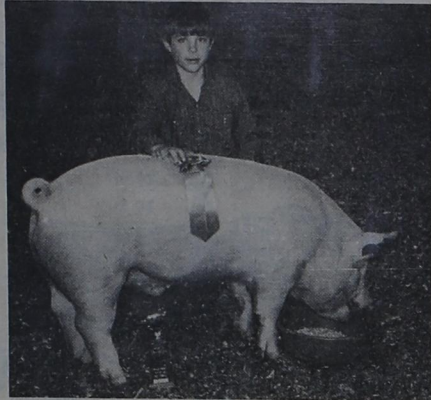
