We arrived at the hard-hit town early Thursday morning, when most of the dead and injured had been removed, but before anybody had gotten around to doing anything in the way of cleaning up.

Contrary to what might be supposed, the town of Silverton was not blown flat. Only a corner was in the path of the tornado. Had the twister been a quarter mile farther north, probably half of the town would have been levelled. As it was, only the sparsely settled part of the community was torn up.

For one thing, few Amarillo houses were completely obliterated. They were crumpled, all right, but not simply swept into a million splinters and out of sight as a few were in Silverton that happened to be right in the middle of the funnel.

The Silverton storm is about history now, and probably everyone who is reading this feels that enough has been said already. However, we'd like to contribute a few minor things we noticed that so far haven't shown up in the news stories we've run across.



The tornado which whipped through the town of Silverton last week, emphasizes the need for an organized alert system in Texico-Farwell. While the Twin Cities are on the outer-edge of the tornado belt, there is always that possibility that one could come our way.

Silverton, too, is on the edge of the real tornado belt, but that didn't seem to make any difference last Wednesday night. They can strike anywhere, and if there were some way to be on the alert for such destructive force as that, it might help to save several lives.

The Ground Observers Corps performs that function, but getting people to participate in its program has been a problem. A full-scale alert could never be enacted, weather-wise, or aircraft-wise, with its present

A few of the members of the Texico-Farwell corps are diligent workers, and at times have manned the local post by themselves throughout the duration of an alert. If there were more active members, the load which a few have been carrying would be lightened and it would better enable the Texico-Farwell corps to carry out a full-scale alert if one is ever required.

While the main function of the GOC is to train personnel to track aircraft in case of an severe weather conditions.

That is what we are presently concerned with and more interest in the GOC could make the tornado alert system one which will work. Tornadoes are hard to spot at night and a of nature will head this way.



1. Orange Breakfast Flower: Stand the orange on end and cut downward into eighths, leaving just enough at the bottom to hold the pieces together. Spread these petal-sections apart and garnish the center with parsley.

2. Orange Cartwheels: Cut a generous slice from end of orange Fort Worth. with a sharp knife, and peel with a saw motion, round and round; slice crosswise. Arrange cartwheels for an attractive serving.

1. Nature's own orange package: California orange in half served as you would a grapefruit, garnished with a cherry.

1. Unpeeled wedges: These wedges look attractive too and are easily eaten with the fingers. To prepare wedges cut as for breakfast flower, cutting through bottom.

5. Quickie half slices: Stand orange on its side and slice downwards into cartwheels, leaving peel on. Cut cartwheels in half.

5. Orange chunks: Cut cartwheels as above and then cut each cartwheel into quarters or sixths. The versatile orange is good however you serve it.





As the warm air rushes upward in a spiral motion, other warm air is sucked upward from lower levels, until the ground is reached. The funnel is made visible by condensing moist air, dirt and debris. 



- 1 cup of drained pineapple
- 1 cup diced maraschino cher-
- 1 package strawberry flavored gelatine
- 1 cup hot water ½ cup combined peach and pineapple juice
- 1 tablespoon maraschino cher-
- ry juice 1 3 oz. package cream cheese 1 tablespoon lemon juice
- 1/2 teaspoon salt 2 tablespoons mayonnaise
- ½ cup whipped cream 1 cup miniature marshmallows

Drain fruits and chill. Reserve juice. Dissolve gelatine in hot water. Add fruit juices and chill until partially congealed. Blend cream cheese with lemon juice, salt, mayonnaise. Fold in whipped cream. Beat chilled gelatine until light and fluffy. Fold in cream cheese mixture and fruits. Pour into chilled, buttered 9 inch pie pan. Freeze until firm. Serve on crisp lettuce and garnish with whipped cream, coconut snowballs, or additional maraschino cherries.

Coconut Snowballs Blend two 3-ounce packages cream cheese with enough sour cream to barely soften. Shape into balls the size of walnuts

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



For daylight protection, we think there's nothing that can beat the personal sentry effect of the locally-manned GOC unit -a pitifully supported local institution if there ever was one. Visibility is so poor at night

that we don't think there's much chance of warning without elaborate and expensive electronic tracking devices, which we don't-and may never-have. Just cross your fingers in such a case as that.



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
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
