The revival is to be community-wide for the young people. Special music is planned, and Rev. John Watts, student at Baylor, will lead the services.

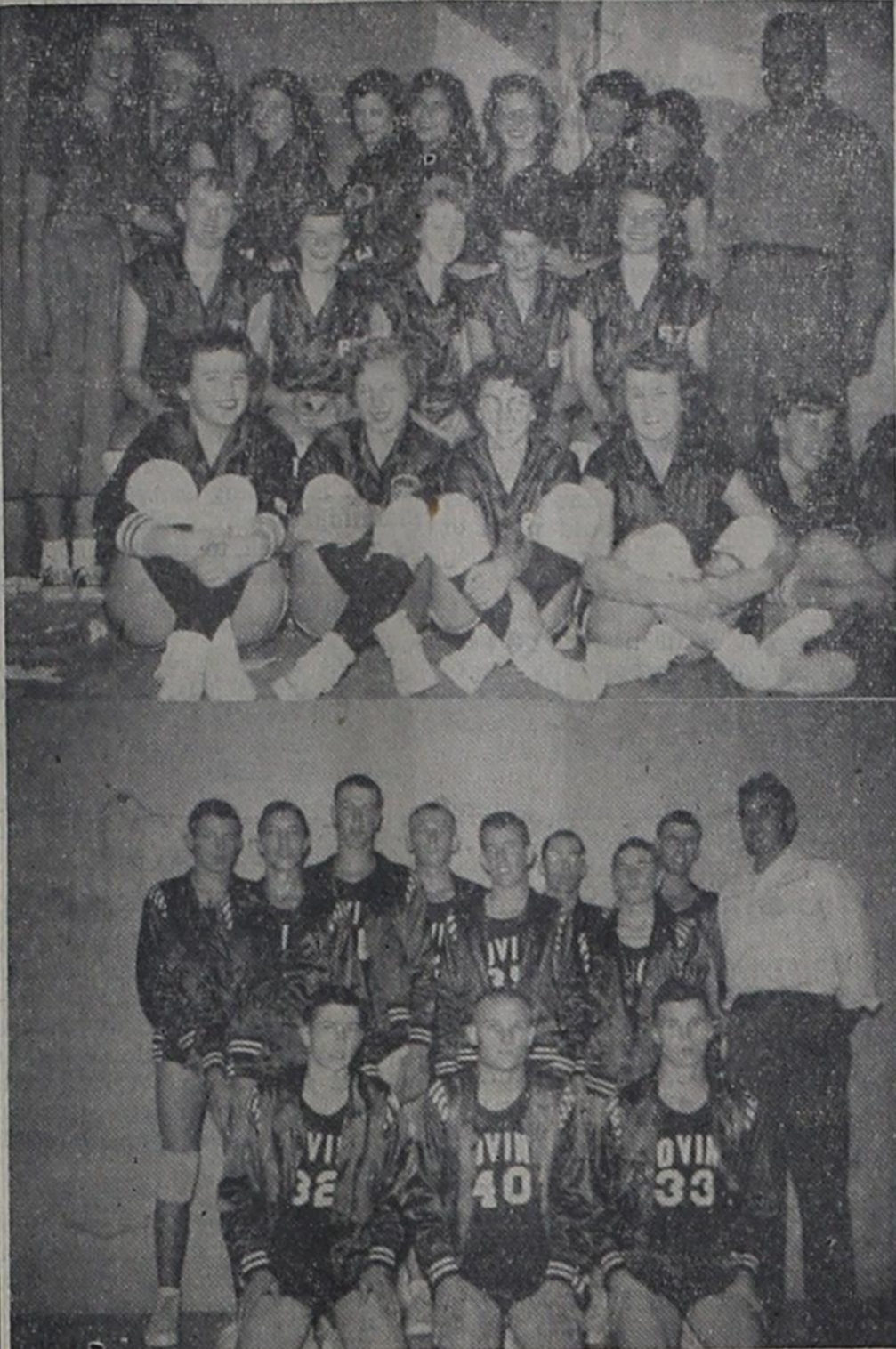
Pvt. Warlick Thomas Takes Basic Training

Girls Nip Friona, Boys Stomp Vega As Bovina Teams Win Own Tournament

The Bovina Mustangs piled up a total of 85 points against 56 for Vega Longhorns Saturday in the tournament here. The Bovina girls were also victorious in their bracket winning in the finals against the Squaws from Friona by a 44-39 score.

In the boys' finals, the Bovina Mustangs broke loose during the first period for 24 points against Vega's 14 for a ten point lead. They continued to lead all the way and built their lead to a 29 point advantage by the time the final whistle sounded. The Bovina boys played a fast game with a pressing defense all over the court. They played all eleven of their men using all of them extensively. Phil Price of Vega who had made 40 points Thursday night during the Kress-Vega game was only able to account for 14 points with ten of these coming from the charity line.

In the girls finals, the girls played their best game of the season to beat the favored Friona team five points. Bovina led most of the way after the first few minutes of the game but it was never a very large margin and the outcome was doubtful until the final whistle. They led 15-12 at the end of the first period and 21-19 at the half. They had about their largest lead at the end of the third quarter when they led 33-26. Lillian Young was top scorer with 28 points for the winners while Denise Magness paced the Friona scoring with 23 points.

In the first round of play Thursday night the Lazbuddie girls opened the tournament defeating Farwell 41-19. Lazbuddie led all the way with half time score reading 16-12. Farwell could't find the bucket during the third quarter and only six points during the last period. Barbara Hinkson of Lazbuddie led the scoring with 19 points while Clara Jesko also of Lazbuddie scored 16. Gloria Dial scored 11 points for the losing Farwell team.

In the second game the Lazbuddie boys defeated the Bovina "B" team to the tune of 36-20. Lazbuddie didn't have any trouble keeping the lead throughout the game with the half time score 16-7. A lot of the boys on both teams aided the scoring with Jerry Gleason pacing the winners with 9 points while Robert Ivy scored 8. Ted Walling was top for Bovina with 7.

In the second girls game the Friona girls defeated the Grady girls by a score of 54-46. Wanda Redus of the Grady team was top scorer with 27 points while Magness of Friona scored 24.

In the last game on Thursday evening the Vega boys defeated the Kress team 56-43 paced by Phil Price who scored 40 points. Bobby Driver led Kress with 17.

Friday night they had the other four first round games with Vega and Texico girls opening play. Vega won this game 35-23. It was close during the first half with the first quarter score 8-7 in favor of Vega and the half time score 16-14. (Continued on last page this sect.)

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Everybody's Ready For Christmas Season

Christmas season is here, and evidence of the Yule observance is everywhere: in the gaily bedecked stores, the beautifully decorated homes in the area, the round of socials, special church observances, and all the other activities that happen at this time of year.

The Christmas lights over Texico-Farwell and Parmer County have been turned on, and greet the motorists who drive through the towns during the evening.

Both religious and secular groups are planning colorful series of programs to continue through the season.

The annual community Christmas tree at Texico will be an event Monday night, in the Texico gymnasium. Fred Danforth, head of the school's music department, is in charge of the program. Santa Claus will be present to distribute treats to all the children. Agrie Jones, superintendent of schools, says. Time of the tree is 8 o'clock. The huge Christmas tree is to be decorated Monday.

Grade school classes will have individual parties, as will organizations of the schools. School will be dismissed Tuesday afternoon for the holidays, after semester exams Monday and Tuesday. Students then return to classes Jan. 4. Official dates for the Christmas holidays at Farwell have been set by the school board. Classes will be dismissed about 2:30 Dec. 23, after all parties have concluded. Students will return to school on Monday, Jan. 4. The annual high school tree is scheduled for 1 p. m. on the day of dismissal. A program has been arranged by the seniors.

Invocation will be given by Jo Ann Cochran, and the chorus will be featured in three numbers. Speaker is Mrs. Carrol Cates, home economics instructor. After a number by a quartet, Miss Beatrice Mayhon will give the benediction. The program will be in the school cafeteria. Gifts will be exchanged, and refreshments are to be served.

Santa Claus, sponsored by ESA, was in Texico-Farwell Saturday to distribute treats to all youngsters of the area. The bearded gentleman rode into town on the fire truck and stayed two hours to talk with children and take their Christmas requests.

Bags containing oranges, candies, balloons, bubble gum and peanuts were given away.

Churches in Texico-Farwell are planning special observances. At First Baptist, Farwell, caroling will be at the church Sunday evening. The choir will have an old-fashioned sing-song along with the primary departments. The morning service will have a Christmas theme, also, Mrs. Dewey Horton, pastor's wife, says.

Eugene Sofford, minister of the Church of Christ, says the Sunday services will be centered around Christmas at his church, but no special program is planned. Various classes in the church have had or are planning parties commemorating the season.

No special program is planned at Texico Baptist church, but each individual class of the church will have a Christmas program for its members, Rev. C. C. Morgan, pastor, says.

Hamlin Memorial Methodist announces Christmas Sunday will be observed with three special services. At 9:50 a. m. the children, junior-intermediate, and young people's divisions of the Sunday school will present a program in the sanctuary.

11 a. m. is the time for the traditional Christmas worship service. Special music will include an anthem, "Silent Night, Holy Night," by the choir. Earl Roberts will bring the solo, "Holy City," by Weatherly. The pastor, Rev. Miller H. Stroup, will bring the Christmas message, "If He Had Not Come."

A two-fold Christmas program composed of music and pictures will be presented at 7:30 p. m. The first part of the program, presented by the choir, directed by Earl Roberts, will include the following music:

Taxpayers Ask Wind Dist. Vote

Numerous Parmer County farmers, mindful of the dry condition of much of the area's cultivated acreage and the likelihood that strong spring winds may materially damage topsoil, petitioned the county commissioners Monday morning, calling for an election to decide whether Parmer County will vote itself into a wind erosion conservation district.

Paul Koeltzow, Rhea farmer, led the petitioners, who numbered about one hundred. The instrument was given the county governmental body, and the commissioners set Jan. 30 as the date for the special election to decide the matter.

If Parmer County votes itself into such a district, it would mean that a farmer can be instructed by the commissioners to plow and care for his land if it appears to them to be blowing.

If he does not abide by their instructions, they are empowered to contract the necessary plowing, and bill the land owner in the form of increased taxes. Title to his land will not be clear until these debts are retired.

However, the overall aim of the program is not to "force" landowners to care for their land, although that could happen in some cases. It is to point out

and underscore for them the necessity of properly caring for it, and to remind them that legal consequences can be the result if they don't.

This is for the protection of negligent farmers' neighbors, as well as for themselves. Some Parmer County farmers who have followed recommended practices have had their work turn out pointless by a thoughtful neighbor who permitted his land to blow onto theirs.

The district, if voted, will go a long way toward correcting this abuse, believe the petitioners.

Around 60 Percent Cotton Harvested

Approximately 60 to 65 percent of the cotton crop in the Friona area has been removed from the fields, in the opinion of Wright Williams, manager of North Plains Gin Company, who added in the same breath that another two weeks of good weather should see the wind-up of harvest.

At present, practically all fields are being invaded by mechanical stripping machines, and very little hand labor is being used in the section.

Asked if the last spell of damp weather, some ten days ago, did much damage to grade, Williams replied that he had not received grading cards on cotton picked after the wet spell. He went on to say, however, that the receipts were "ginning out about the same as before the moisture," and indicated that little down-grading would be noticed.

Up to around 11 o'clock Monday morning, the gin had turned out some 4500 bales of this year's cotton, with total receipts hitting the 5000-bale mark.

"In fact," Wright said, "if business was any better I'd think it was a frame-up."

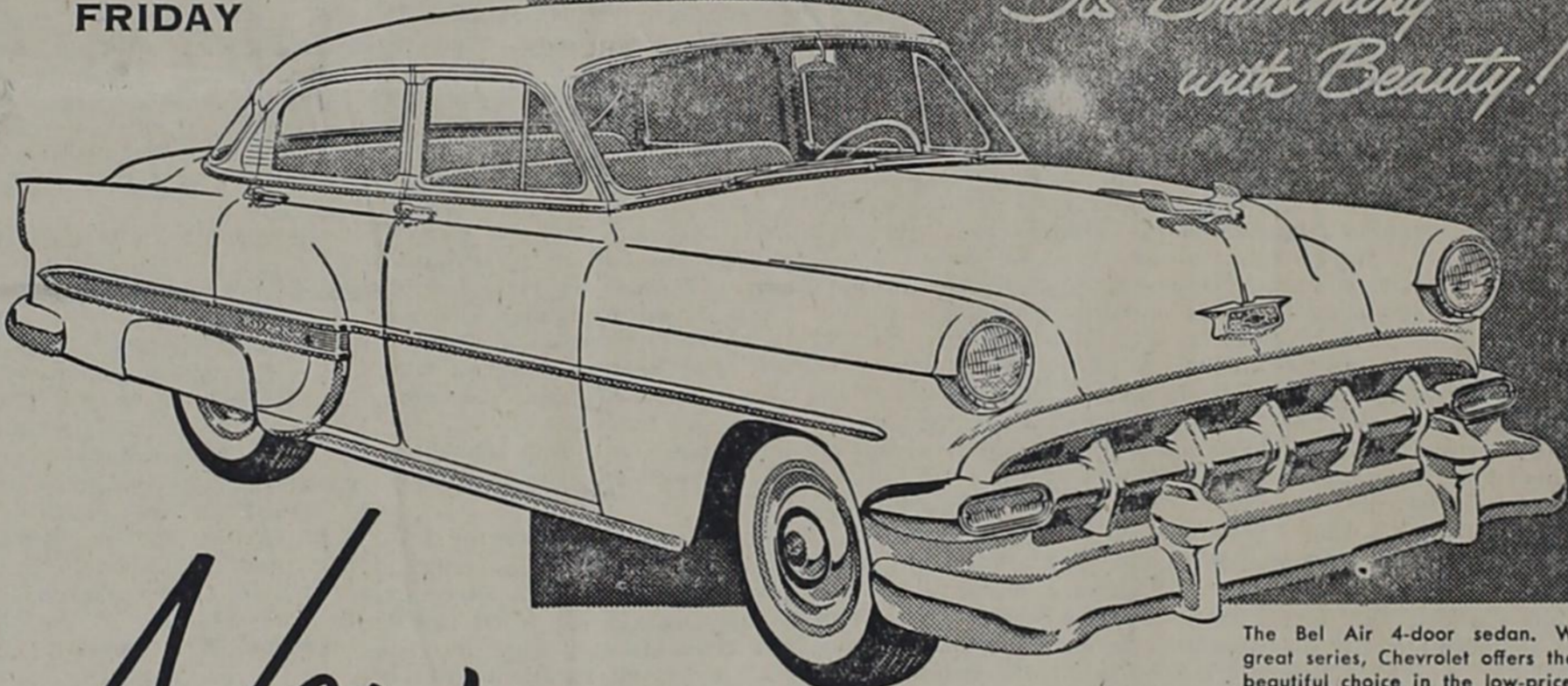

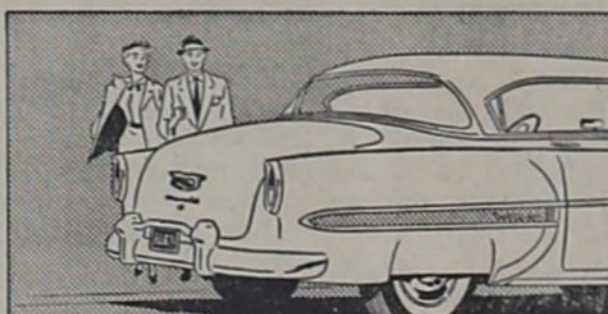

"The conservation and proper care and development of our soils is basic to the economic well-being of families now farming and ranching and those who are to follow. It is essential to the future of the nation's food supply and to the continued expansion of efficient food and fiber production to meet our ever-growing population needs."

The reorganization of the Soil Conservation Service is designed to carry forward a more effective national program and to strengthen the work in each state. It does not change in any way the functions of the SCS in carrying out a national program of soil and water conservation primarily through soil conservation districts.

The Soil Conservation Service and the Extension Service continue to have the responsibility for effective cooperation at county, state and national levels, administrators say.

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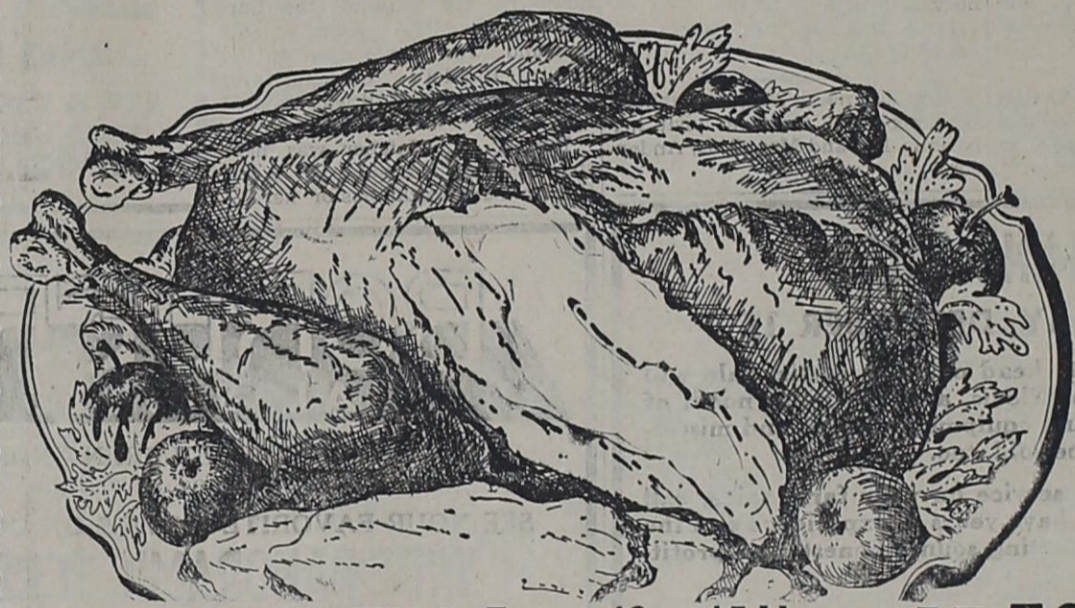

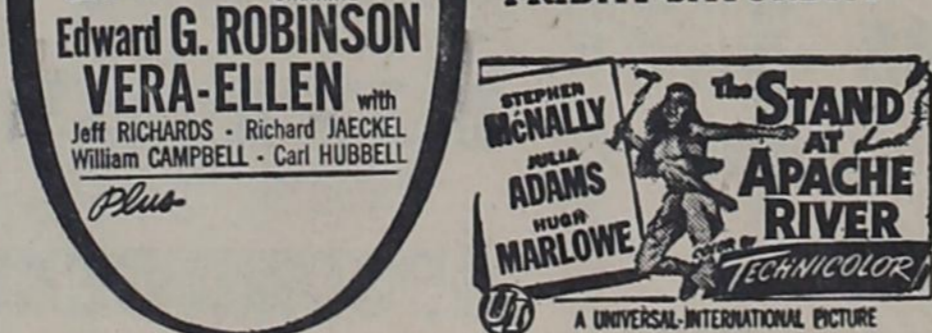

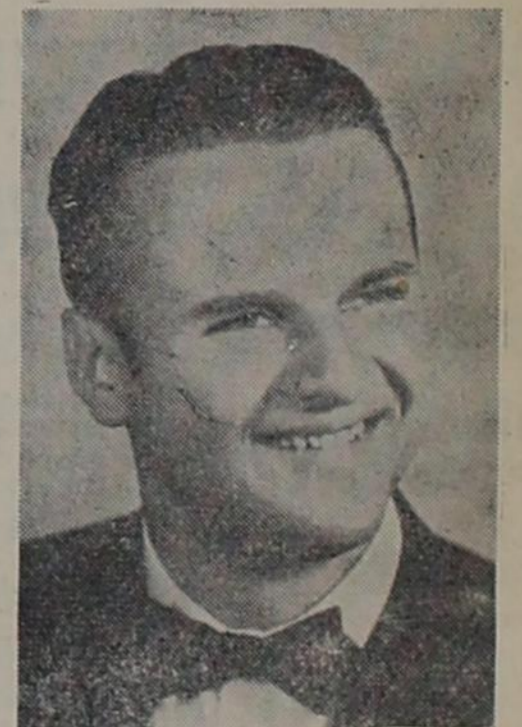

Sad is the heart that cannot rejoice at Christmas time.

Mrs. W. O. Barber of Farwell says she just doesn't cook like she used to. She explains that she is the mother of nine children, all of whom are gone from home now, and it is quite a change "just cooking for me and dad."

"My children have all my best recipes now that I don't cook much," Mrs. Barber explains. She says she has been wanting a good, yet simple, recipe for cake icing, and was discussing this with her daughter-in-law, Mrs. Dora Barber of Muleshoe last weekend. The daughter-in-law suggested she try a powdered sugar mocha icing.

She takes about 1/2 box of powdered sugar, and makes a good paste with cold coffee, then spreads it on a cake. A small amount of butter and cream helps the consistency of the mixture.

"I'm going to try it," says Mrs. Barber. We thought some of you other people might like to try it, too.

We wrote Mrs. Mayme Adams of Friona for her favorite recipe to pass on to our readers, and received an answer from Truth or Consequences, N. M., where Mrs. Adams and a friend, Mrs. Johnston of Verden, Okla., were having a short stay.

But the Friona woman took time out to answer our letter, and the recipes she sent certainly look worth the trouble. We know that we plan to try both of them.

In keeping with the season, Mrs. Adams sent a recipe for cranberry salad, which she likes to serve with chicken or meats.

To make the salad, take one lb. or a package of cranberries and grind fine, mix with one cup of sugar and let stand for 20 minutes. Then take one package of cherry jello dissolved in only one cup of boiling water, let cool.

Other ingredients are one cup of crushed pineapple and one cup of nut meats. Mix it all together and chill. Doesn't that sound delectable?

Then the other recipe is one for carrot relish. Some of you more experienced cooks may not think it's unusual, but it is something new to us.

Carrot Relish

8 large carrots
 8 large green peppers
 1/2 cup salt
 5 large onions.
 Grind peppers, onions and carrots, add salt and let stand for two hours. Drain, then add: 4 teaspoons white mustard seed, 2 teaspoons celery seed, 4 cups sugar, 5 cups vinegar. Mix well and seal, but DO NOT heat.

Wind Hinders Fire Fighters

A fire in a cotton burr pile caused considerable damage on Thursday afternoon at the Triplett Feeding Company. The fire broke out about 2:00 o'clock on a big pile of cotton burrs, where they were being ground for cattle feed. It was first discovered by James Williams, one of those grinding feed. He ran to the office to notify Jay Triplett, manager of the feeding company, who notified the Bovina fire department. By the time the fire truck arrived, the highly inflammable cotton burrs had blazed over almost the entire stack.

The flames were whipped by a strong west wind and it was spreading so the one fire truck couldn't handle it. The fire departments of both Texico and Friona were called and each sent a truck to battle the blaze.

The flames soon spread to an adjoining pile of baled hay. This hay was a complete loss. It also burned in old tractor that belonged to Jedis White and was parked near the hay. They had another tractor blowing out a fire lane between the burning pile and another pile of the cotton burrs close by.

The strong west wind continued to fan the flames and they were soon coming from the office building just east of the burning hay. Jay Triplett had been carrying out his office records through the thick smoke before it was discovered that the building was on fire. The fire in the office building was first noticed by Joe Wilson, who notified the fire boys and they turned their attention on it. They were able to get the rest of the records out and the office furniture.

They were able to stop the flames in the office building, but not until after considerable damage. They had to knock several large holes in the roof to get to the fire in the attic. It also received water damage.

It seemed that the wind died down a little about this time and they brought the flames under control. About two hours after the flames had started, they were under control and the fire departments of Friona and Texico were able to leave.

Jay Triplett, manager of the feeding company, said he couldn't give any estimate as to the damage. He estimated there were around 200 tons of cotton burrs in the pile, but couldn't say how many were lost. The hay that burned was worth around \$150. The feeding company is owned by Jay's father, J. S. Triplett of Amarillo.

About 3:00 o'clock, the fire broke out in the cotton burrs and the wind had then changed to the north and was really blowing again. It again required the fire fighters from Texico and Friona to bring them under control, but this time they didn't spread from the cotton burrs. They were still spraying water into the stack around 8 o'clock the next morning from one truck.



Baptist Men Have Fellowship Monday
