Farwell school lunch prices raised

The Farwell School Board Monday night raised lunch prices for the 1985-86 year.

For employees, prices will rise 15 cents, from \$1.50 to \$1.65. For visitors, the cost went from \$2 to \$2.50. For students the cost went up 10 cents - grades kindergarten through fifth, 90 cents to \$1; grades sixth through eighth, from 95 cents to \$1.05, and grades 9 through 12, from \$1 to \$1.10.

In other business, due to a lack of quorum, no action was taken on the budget hearing. It has been reset for 8 p.m. Aug. 16 at the superintendent's office.

Steers picked to take District 2-A crown

The Farwell High School football team is the pre-season choice for capturing its district championship, according to the "Top O Texas" annual guide to high school football in Texas.

The guide picked the district results in this order: Farwell, first; Nazareth, second; Vega, third; Happy, fourth; Kress, fifth, and Lazbuddie, sixth.

Last year, Farwell finished the regular season with a 6-3 record. Nazareth was district champs.

On the guide's Class A Honor Roll were listed the following players from Farwell and Lazbuddie:

Offense - Tackles, Jesse Anzaldua, Farwell, and Scott Holt, Lazbuddie; quarterbacks, Blake Kelley, Farwell, and Tim Lust, Lazbuddie; and running backs, David Schacher, Lazbuddie.

At Tuesday's first meeting of the season for the Farwell Booster Club, Head Coach Monte Barnes

expressed optimism at the coming season.

"We have as good an offensive line as anyone in 2-A," said Barnes. He said more finesse will be used on offense, with his team running the option play and utilizing two split ends.

Barnes said Owen has been moved on offense from fullback (where he was all-district) to offensive guard; he will continue to play middle linebacker on defense.

Also, Bobby Ford has been moved from halfback to fullback, and David Rubio from tight end to guard. Joe Jaime and David Woods will be the starting halfbacks, with Kelley as quarterback.

Barnes expects that a year's experience for Kelley at quarterback will be very helpful to the offense.

Meanwhile, the "Top O Texas" guide notes that Lazbuddie will have 20 returning lettermen from last year's team, which finished 1-9. The Longhorns will use a "Power I" offense. Schacher was an all-district second team selection last year.

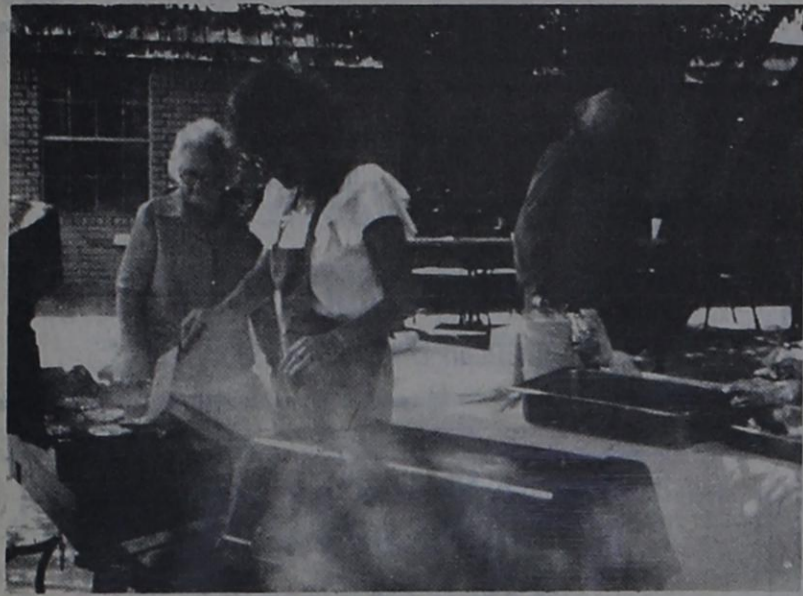

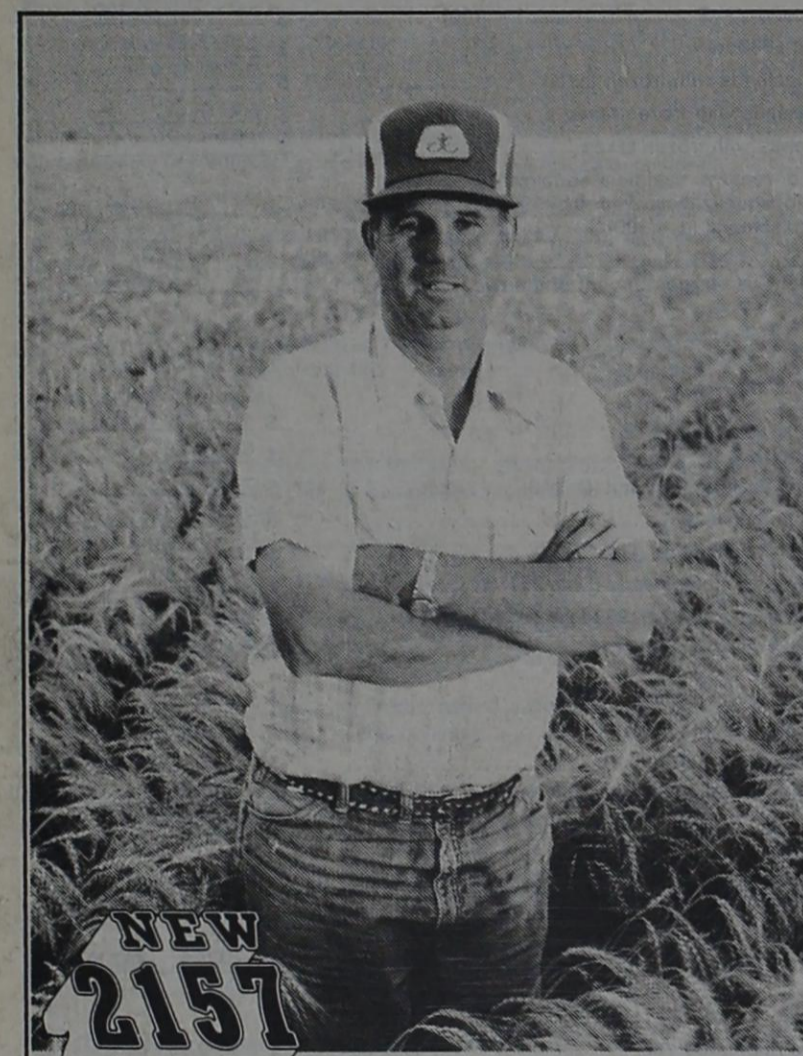
Class of 1970 meets

SPS to see 'minimal-change' rate adjustment

Southwestern Public Service Company (SPS) today filed informational packets giving advance notice of a request to restructure rates for retail electric service in the Texas communities the utility serves.

The company emphasized the restructuring will barely change prices customers pay for electricity.

"Prices to our customers will hardly increase or decrease under our rate proposal," said SPS president and chief executive officer Bert Ballengee.

"We have had some costs to the company go up, and some costs come down," Ballengee said. "Now we must restructure our rates to reflect those changes. But the prices customers pay for Texas retail electric service will continue to be stable."

SPS last sought, and was granted an increase in base rates for retail electric service in Texas in mid-1982, Ballengee noted.

The proposal to restructure rates in rural areas of Texas served by SPS will be filed with the Public Utility Commission of Texas, probably in early September.

The proposed restructuring, Ballengee said, "On the one hand, would increase the base-rate portion of the electric bill, and, on the other hand, would generally offset that increase by lowering the boiler fuel-cost portion of the bill. The net

effect would be only slight changes in prices."
