She is also cheer leader of Pep Club, a candidate for "Wolverine Beauty" and was in the cast of the jr. play, "A Little Clodhopper".

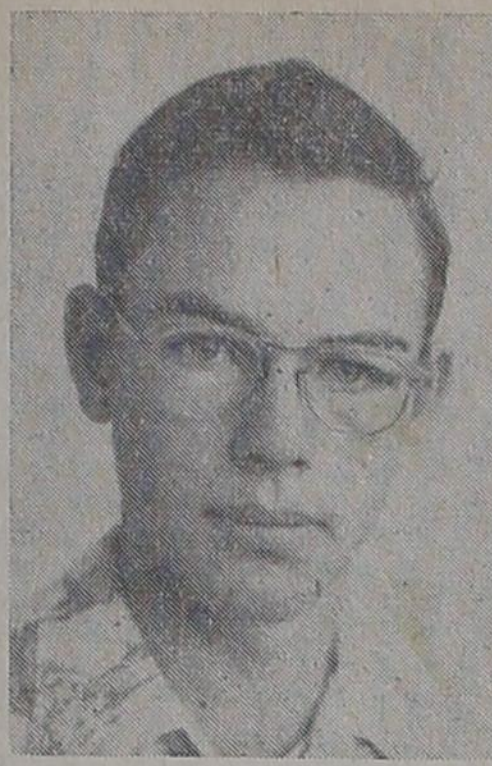

Running Water Dam Survey Probable "Within 30 Days"

Boosters for the proposed dam across Running Water Draw northwest of here are jubilant this week, as the Curry County Game Protective Association announces that it will employ the services of William C. Hayes, geologist, to inquire into the feasibility of such a project.

Hayes, who at present is associated with Cecil M. Hawk and Associates of Lubbock, made a trip to Clovis the first of the week, talked with the dam boosters, and made a trip to the site.

It will be his job to survey the project from several angles to determine whether a dam at that point will be practical. If his report is favorable when it is submitted several weeks from now, it is quite likely that the last obstacle for using \$175,000 in state appropriations will have been removed.

Aaron Ausherman, president of the GPA, announces that his group intends to contact Governor Meachem as soon as possible relative to the state funds. Ausherman says that in previous conversation with the offic-

ial, Gov. Meachem had said that he would release the money necessary to make the survey that the GPA is now planning.

"We want to renew this agreement in order that there will be no confusion," said Ausherman. "We have a previous verbal agreement, but we would like additional confirmation."

One survey of the area of the proposed lake was made several years ago, but the boosters are not satisfied with the manner in which this report was made, and have asked that this new, independent survey be taken.

Regardless of the position which Gov. Meachem takes on the matter, it appears that money will be available for the impending survey. At a meeting of the Running Water Draw Park Board Tuesday night, it was voted to make available funds from that group to further investigate the possibility of a dam.

Originally, it has been the intention of the Park Board to spend the money on recreational improvements

in the park area itself.

Now, however, they have agreed to help share the cost of another survey in the event that it becomes necessary.

No written agreement has been reached between the GPA and Hayes, but it is expected that by this weekend a definite commitment by both parties will have been fixed. Hayes says he can begin work "within thirty days."

Naturally, no set sum on how much the survey is to cost has been released, but the figure of "around \$1000" have been heard in booster conversation. This supposedly is an estimate from the state engineer who previously oversaw the job.

The Tribune is still extremely anxious to secure voluntary opinion from citizens who are interested in or might be affected by the draw dam project. Individual comment may be instrumental in deciding whether the dam will or will not be undertaken, as the matter is still in a rather fluid state.

Japanese Student To Speak At Church

Sunday, April 12, special services are planned at the Pleasant Hill Baptist Church. In charge of both worship services will be Hirochi Tomomachi from Japan. He will speak at 11 a. m., then show his slide films taken on a recent preaching mission to his homeland in the evening service, beginning at 7:30.

"Hiro", as he is known among students at Wayland College, in Plainview, where he is attending school, is a Japanese veteran of World War II. He was trained as pilot of a Japanese suicide submarine and was scheduled to go out in three days when war was halted. Later he came to the United States to study and became a Christian, and since has been called to preach the gospel.

He is an unusual speaker that everyone will want to hear, officials say. The public is invited.

Work Continues On Rural Phones

Construction work on the rural telephone extension program in Parmer County is going forward at a rapid clip and should be completed by mid-May, Leo Forrest, of the Hereford REA office (which is handling the Rural Telephone Program) in this, Deaf Smith and Bailey counties, said the past weekend.

Poles to carry the service to some 700 rural families have been going up in the area, and in most instances, phones have already been installed in the homes of patrons, Forrest added.

He went on to point out that indications were that the Oklahoma Lane exchange, closest to Farwell, would likely be the first to be put in operation, as arrangements with The Mountain States Telephone Co. out of Clovis, are satisfactory.

On the other hand, negotiations are moving slowly with General Telephone of the Southwest, from which three Parmer exchanges, one out of Bovina and two out of Friona, will be serviced.

"If we can get contracts with the company ironed out, service should be expected in the not too far distant future," the manager said.

Forrest then said that the original 700 subscribers would be the first served. He pointed out that Congress recently failed to appropriate additional money for the RTP, and this may mean that families along the lines who were not in on the first sign-up, and now seek phones, will be by-passed until later.

Two City Elections Are Held Tuesday

Two city elections held Tuesday in Bovina and Farwell resulted in the re-election of Mayor Johnnie Williams at Farwell and the naming of S. A. Calhoun as mayor at Bovina, to succeed J. T. Hammonds.

Only 28 votes were cast at Farwell. Walter Hardage and Ray Sudderth were named as commissioners. Robert Anderson and M. A. Snider, outgoing commissioners, were not candidates. Two writers were included in the tabulation for the commissioner posts, with Paul Wurster and Aubrey Sprawls receiving three each.

The count at Bovina gave Calhoun 62 and his opponent, T. W. Fuller, 23. For commissioner, A. M. Wilson and Aubrey Brock led the field of four for two vacancies, Wilson getting 41 and Brock 59 ballots. G. D. Anderson Jr. received 37; Frank Truitt, 26 votes.

Light Vote Recorded In Trustee Election

A rather light vote was recorded over Parmer County in the school trustee elections conducted the past Saturday, although complete tabulations were not available here.

In Farwell, where Dick Gerics and C. C. Christian had no opposition for re-election, only 19 ballots were cast, the candidates getting unanimous approval.

Bovina faces a peculiar situation. With three to be elected, eight men were in the running. Wendell Christian received 51 votes and is in, Troy Fuller was second high with 46 for a place on the board, but the voters cast 41 votes each for Harry J. Charles and Walter Verner, giving a tie for the third vacancy. Information from Bovina the first of the week was that the decision would be made either by a run-off election or a contract in writing between the men, presented to the commissioners court.

Other Bovina tabulations: Elmo Dean, 40; C. M. Huggins, 39; J. D. Stevens, 30; and Bill Bradshaw, 23.

Seven candidates were on the Friona ballot, with Clyde Hayes re-elected and Paul Fortenberry named to succeed G. Cranfill.

Efforts here the first of the week failed to turn up a report on the Lazbuddy box, where Clarence Mason, Claude Watkins, J. B. Young Jr. and Conrad Nelson were candidates, with two vacancies.

Unopposed county school trustees included: J. L. Shaffer of Pct. 1, Joe Wilson of Pct. 2 and H. Y. Overstreet of Pct. 3.

Successful Birthday Sales Are Reported

Very successful birthday sales were reported by C. G. Davis of Piggly-Wiggly in Farwell and Ruby Stone, of Stone's Variety in Texico, this week following celebrations over the weekend.

Davis featured a huge birthday cake on display, with the public being served cake by Mrs. Ebb Randal of Muleshoe, while Randal registered the guests. To Ysleta Brown of Farwell went an electric waffle iron for making the nearest guess as to the weight of the cake. She estimated 197 lbs.; the cake weighed 195.7.

C. M. Henderson Loses Appeal in Grain Case

The U. S. Circuit Court of Appeals affirmed Friday the conviction of C. M. Henderson, Farwell grain dealer, on charges of converting government-owned grain to his own use.

The government charged the grain belonged to the Commodity Credit Corporation and was valued at \$1,056,199.

Henderson was convicted July 14, 1952, by a U. S. District Court jury at Amarillo and sentenced to four years in jail.

In addition, he was fined \$10,000 and placed on probation for four years.

Ed Finley is new operator of the Phillips 66 station east of Jim's Cafe in Texico, according to announcement. Finley is recently of Albuquerque.

A wide area of Plains country was sprinkled or roundly drenched during the past weekend when some rather severe thunderstorms dumped from light to generous amounts of moisture on Saturday evening and Sunday.

The immediate Farwell area, according to reports received, came nearest to getting missed completely, with only .10 recorded here. On the other hand, Bovina came in for .80; Friona reported a generous 2 1/4 inches in town with more in the outlying districts; Clovis got .75, and Oklahoma Lane received amounts varying from .75 to 1 1/4 inches.

The northern and eastern area of Parmer county appeared to have received the heaviest rainfall, with some reports to the effect that five to six inches were dumped in scattered areas north of Friona.

Whatever the amount, it was gratefully received, particularly by wheat farmers, who had been looking over their dry-land crop with fairly optimistic eyes and are now even more hopeful of a good yield this summer.

Funeral services were held Friday afternoon at the Texico-Farwell Baptist Church, with Reverend C.M. Fields officiating. Assisting Rev. Fields, was Richard Payne, husband of Nicewarner's granddaughter, Peggy. Payne is a Methodist preacher attending Southern Methodist University in Dallas.

Nicewarner was born February 12, 1864, and on January 15, 1893 married Sallie Lee Hammonds. To the union was born seven children, three of whom preceded him in death. He was converted and joined the Baptist Church at Jean, Texas, in 1911, moving his membership to the Texico-Farwell church in 1922 upon establishing residence here.

Survivors include the widow; two sons, Ray E. of Abilene and Tom R. of Graham; two daughters, Mrs. Olen Schlueter, Texico, Mrs. Horace Schloss, Hereford; three granddaughters; three great grandsons, and one brother, H. B. Nicewarner of Morton.

A Nice Rain Still Makes Page One

Here in Parmer and adjoining counties in 1953, where the starting and ending word of every conversation relative to agriculture is "irrigation," a nice occasional shower still is able to be page one news, as any farmer will verify.

To be sure, the wonders of deep-well irrigation are, and will increasingly continue to be, a boon to the economy of this High Plains region, and it may be that within ten years we will be boasting our part of the county as a veritable agricultural paradise.

Nevertheless, we are destined to be tied to Mother Nature's apron strings for several years yet, whether we like it or not, because it is still her whim that determines what we shall and shall not be able to produce in our fields, no matter how fertile they may be.

It costs a lot of money to irrigate a quarter-section of land, as any farmer who has tried it will agree. The investment required to enable a man to set his farm up for irrigation is staggering.

And of course, rainfall has always been free. There's quite a little difference between the cost of water placed in a field by the ingenuity of man and a soaking rain by the grace of God.

So, although we would not wish to diminish the benefits of irrigation to this great region of ours, it is still our observation that weather will still make conversation—and news—for several years to come.

And the sage advice of amateur prognosticators such as W. W. Williams and J. W. Crim on what the weather has in store for us is still going to be quite popular for some time. As one fellow so concisely phrased it, "There's nothing wrong with this country that an average rainfall of thirty inches a year wouldn't cure."

Now, when we have a chance of getting a dam built right on our doorstep for no outlay whatsoever, it disgusts us to note the way Texans are letting things slip by.

If you really are interested in helping to get a dam on Running Water Draw, or if you're dead set against it, take a minute to sit down and drop us a line. Better still, stop by the office and talk the situation over with us. We need all the opinions we can have on this program, be they pro or con.

Yes, it was Bill, but it wasn't Broadhurst. That makes us one-half correct in predicting last week that the GPA would hire an engineer named Bill Broadhurst to make a survey on the draw dam site.

It turns out that Tom McFarland, through whom we were working to get an independent engineer, sent down a youngish Ph. D. named Bill Hayes. As things look right now, it'll be Hayes who will make the survey instead of Broadhurst. But we got the "Bill" part of the name right.

To the people who did let us know their sentiments on the Running Water project, we are deeply appreciative. Following is an

account of their reactions.

W. Zoch, Farwell
"I am in favor of the Running Water Dam project. I believe that in that way water will be returned back underground for both home and irrigation use."

Unsigned, Friona
"I am in favor of the Running Water dam project, if built further east, somewhere in the Friona vicinity. It should have been built twenty years ago."

Roger Grissom, Texico
"I am in favor of the Running Water dam project. It will build up a surface supply of water

to help replace what is being pumped out for irrigation. Also, it would be a fine place to fish, boat ride, etc."

Buck Ellison, Bovina
"I am in favor of this project. I feel that it will help preserve what rainfall we get."

Unsigned, Farwell
"In favor of the Running Water Dam project. There is need for a recreational area as well as for a water trap. Prefer a dam project in Parmer County, but if not possible here, then one in New Mexico."

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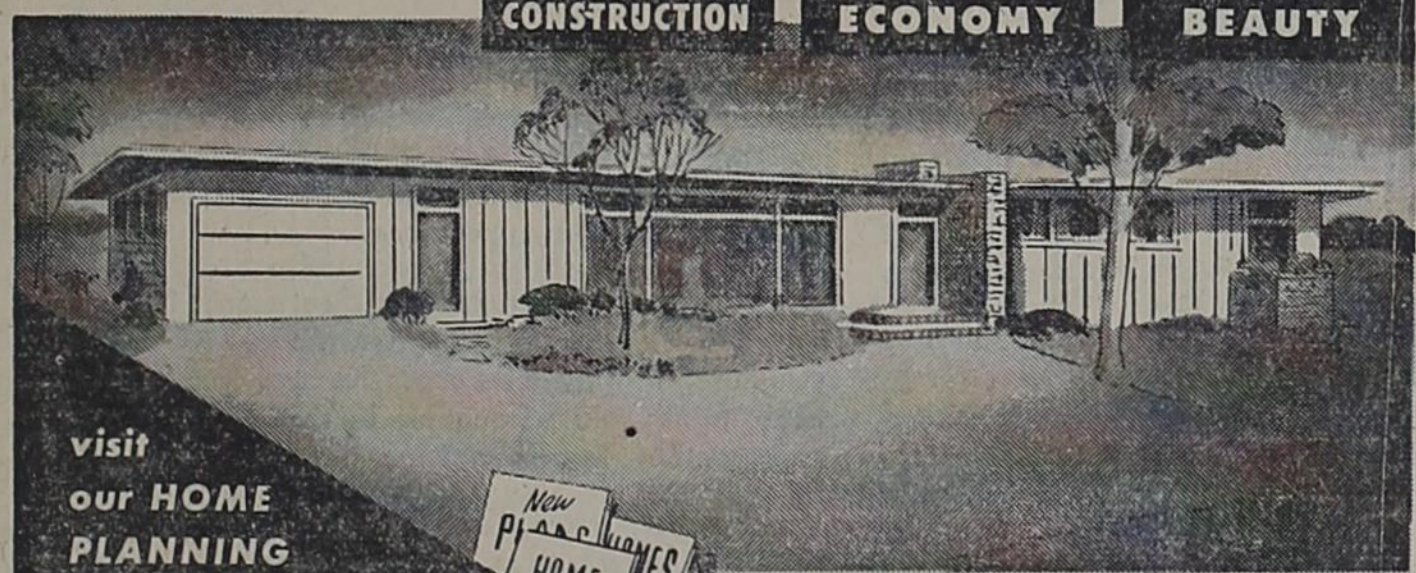

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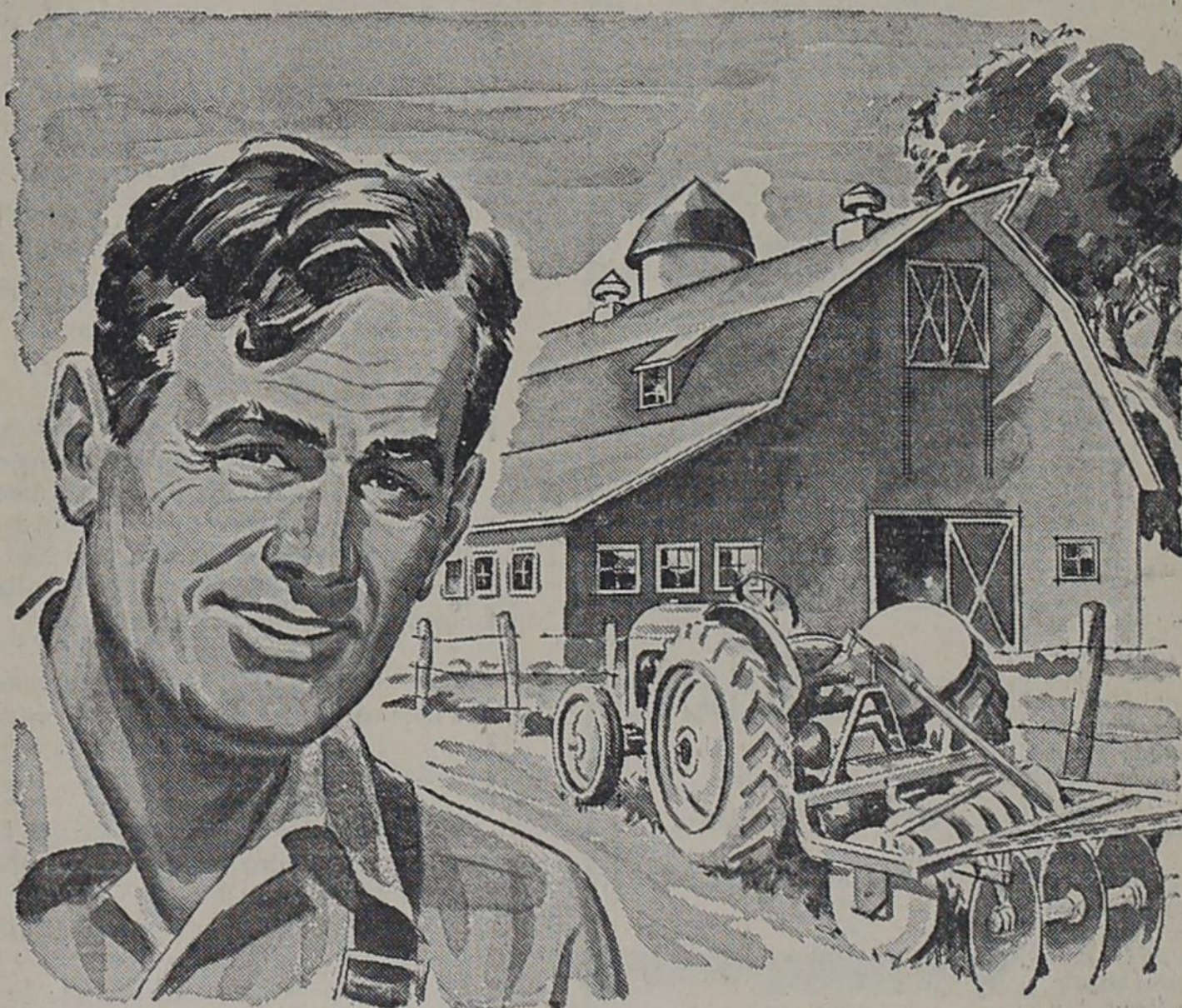

Stone Wedding Recounted

Fifty years ago, in Johnson County, Texas, a very romantic marriage ceremony took place. Margaret Harrison, 14, and J.H. Stone, 23 were married. Mr. Stone recalls that he met Margaret at a still about a half a mile from her school, and they eloped. "Because of this" she laughs, "my dress was a red calico one! And in those days you could buy good calico for 3 cents a yard." The couple was married by W.P. Richardson, a minister of the Church of Christ.

When asked when he met his wife for the first time, Stone replies "I had known her since she was two or three years old, and remember telling my mother that I was 'going to wait for her to grow up before I got married.'"

The young couple started out with more than the average newlyweds, for they had their own horse and buggy and about \$65, which would go a long way then.

Mrs. Stone says, "We even had all new furniture for our house which we built in August after we were married, and that was very unusual." Before their house was completed, they lived with his folks in Greenbriar Community, near Cleburn, Texas.

The first child born to the couple, about a year later, died in infancy. The next child was a girl, now Mrs. Johnnie Williams of Farwell.

Tragedy was due to befall the next child, also, for Clarence lived only 11 months.

Then the couple moved to the Oklahoma Territory, and there Judge, their fourth child was born in the same year Oklahoma became a state. Judge is now the owner and operator of Stone's Variety Store in Texico.

Moving back to Texas, another daughter was born to the pair. She was named Zelpa Eulalia, now Mrs. Glen Fowler, who lives in Oklahoma.

And Harley Harrison, their last child, was born in 1913. Harley is now a minister of the Church of Christ and principal of elementary education in Hansel, Alabama.

But the Stones weren't through raising their family, for upon the

death of Mrs. Stone's sister they took her five-day old son, Halcut, and raised him as their own son. Hal now lives in Clovis, and is employed by Max Meadors Co.

The Stones have twelve grandchildren and five great-grandchildren, of whom they are justly proud.

They moved to the West Camp community in 1933 and continued to farm until Mr. Stone's health failed, after which they moved to town.


