We have received a considerate and thoughtful letter at the office this week from G. A. Jenkins, Lipscomb County judge at Lipscomb. He makes several inquiries regarding the care of the Farwell cemetery about two miles south of town.

After some brief investigation, we find that Judge Jenkins is a former Twin City resident, and lived here approximately 20 years ago. His mother and father are buried in the Texico cemetery and he has a sister living in Clovis. Consequently he is still considerably interested in our neighborhood. Following is his letter as it was received at this office.

Dear Sir:
The writer was in Texico-Farwell on Friday May 30th. We went to the Texico Cemetery and we were very much pleased to find such a well-kept cemetery. We cannot but feel that a cemetery should be one of the prettiest spots in any community. We owe it to the deceased to keep the city of the dead cleaned up. If we do not, it shows that we are more concerned for the dollar than we are for those who should mean so much to us.

After viewing the Texico cemetery we went to the Farwell Cemetery. Oh! what a shame, such a contrast. When we think of those who have been laid to rest in the Farwell cemetery, it makes us want to say "The Forgotten Man."

It appears to us in case that it was necessary to bury some one in Farwell that it would be impossible to get out of your car to go to the graveside. When there is no reason for a cemetery to get in such condition.

The first thing that I noticed that should be done, and done immediately, and that is for the county to furnish the State Highway dept. with a tin horn for installation at the entrance. The next thing that should be done would be to clean up the grounds.

The county can employ someone to do this work. If I were the county judge or commissioner of the Farwell precinct, I wouldn't rest until I referred to Vernon's A.C.S. Art. 2351. Counties-Public Cemeteries Chapter 271 House Bill No. 185.

It appears to me that no one would make any complaint what so ever in paying 5 or 10 cents on the \$100 valuation to clean up a cemetery and keep it clean.

Many things could be done to beautify the Farwell cemetery over a period of years. The way the land slopes and with the REA power lines now available, my what an opportunity. With all those beautiful residences that are already finished, and the ones under construction in the south part of Farwell indicate to me that people do not intend to let Farwell become a ghost town.

We are in hopes the next time we see the Farwell cemetery there will be a decided change.

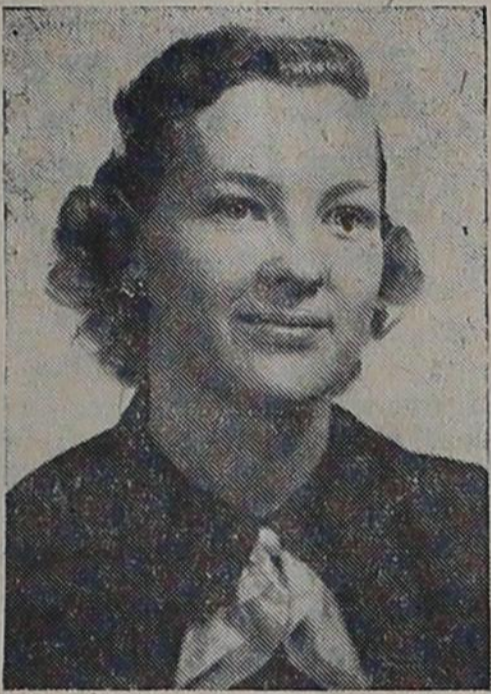

Though her residence in Farwell has been short, Mrs. Bill Cannon has been in a position to become an intricate part of the town; as she teaches Farwell home economics students. Mrs. Cannon arrived in the city at the beginning of the school term last year, and began her work as head of the home economics department.

At the time of her arrival, she was unmarried, the only single teacher on the staff. She taught all home ec courses, and helped in extra-curricular activities, including the job as sponsor of the freshman class.

The teacher, who wasn't a great deal older than some of her students, was reared in Hamlin. She lived in

the town all her life before going away to college in 1947. Her home was a farm, about 4 1/2 miles from the town. Miss Adams (her maiden name) was valedictorian of her senior class, and also recorded high grades in college.

She chose Texas Technological college in Lubbock as a school to further her education, and received her degree in home economics from there.

She was president of Las Vivarachas, women's social club, her senior year; and was also class favorite of the senior class during the year before her graduation. Other activities of which she was a part, were the Women's Inter-club council, and senior representative to the dormitory house senate.

It was also at Tech that Miss Adams met her husband, who was an engineering student.

The home economics instructor is now here to complete summer project work at the school. The summer course should end about June 27, when Mrs. Cannon plans to join her husband in Grand Prairie where he is employed. The Cannons were married April 5 in Clovis.

Mr. Cannon is working at Chance-Vaught Aircraft Company, and the young couple will reside at 1101 Small St. Mrs. Cannon plans to be "just a housewife."

In her short residence in Farwell, Mrs. Cannon has made many new friends and has become a part of the community. The young teacher is a member of the Church of Christ.

Registration Is Scheduled Friday Morning For Large Texico Summer Youth Program

If everything goes as scheduled, the summer recreation program for Texico young people should get under way next week, Curtis Miller, director of the program, announced this week. According to the report, a well-rounded recreation program for the Texico youth has been drawn up, and will be put into practice.

Registration has been set for Friday at the Texico gymnasium with two hours set aside for enrollees. Young people may sign up for the program between the hours of 10 and 11 o'clock in the morning or 2 until 3 o'clock in the afternoon. The program is sponsored by the newly organized Texico Chamber of Commerce and the Texico schools.

Texico young people between the ages of seven and 17 or 18 are eligible for participation in the program, which will feature all types of training in games, and group activities. Courses will include basketball, tennis, volleyball, croquet, tither ball, horseshoe pitching and softball, and maybe others. Directors are also planning to install a sandbox for younger children.

Softball will probably be on the agenda about an hour and one-half in the afternoons, Miller says. The director points out that citizens hope to construct volleyball, tennis and basketball courts, and equipment at the Texico park, to be used in the program. According to Miller, about 15 men were on hand Monday to clean the grounds and scrape the earth. The fire department sprinkled the grounds to settle the dust, and more work is planned on leveling later.

The dirt floor will probably be used this summer, Miller adds, for the various courts, but backers hope to asphalt the courts at a later date.

Miller urges all Texico youngsters interested in the program to register Friday. They will receive both group and individual instruction in activities listed on the agenda. A schedule with times for various programs, will be released later.

Students Attend Boys And Girls State Meets

Boy's and Girl's State meetings in both Texas and New Mexico have concluded with the exception of Texas Girl's State, which is now in session. Kayla Felts, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Chas. Felts, is at Girl's State in Austin this week and is to return home over the weekend. Bertha Owens of Bovina is also among delegates.

Texas Boy's State was attended by Buil Dollar, son of Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Dollar last week, and also by Jamie, son of Mr. and Mrs. H. L. Tidenberg of Bovina. Buil returned home Saturday.

Meetings were held at Texas School for the Deaf in Austin, with 461 boys in attendance. Dollar was chosen county commissioner of his precinct, athletic director of a city; and was appointed to the state parole board. The basketball team of which he was a member defeated 11 other cities to gain the championship for Boy's State. Other team members were from Borger, San Antonio and Dallas.

About 40 or 50 boys were listed to a city.

"We learned a lot about government," Dollar stated, and added "people should be more interested in the way our democracy is set up. He stated that they were shown the minority can rule if people do not go to the polls and vote. The right to vote was stressed again and again.

The local boy stated that the trip "was very educational. It would be better if every boy could attend Boy's State." Dollar was quite impressed with some of the speakers, particularly an FBI man who spoke to them. The agent had been an investigator for narcotics rings in Texas.

Boys set up governments for city, county and state, during the week-long meetings.

Jo Sondra, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Albert Magerus; and Doris, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Leavelle, were delegates to girl's sessions in New Mexico, which were held at the U. S. Indian School in Albuquerque. Doris competed in the state senatorial race; and Jo Sondra was named state representative. A feature story by Miss Magerus appears elsewhere in the paper.

James, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. E. King was Texico representative to Boy's State. Meetings were held at Northern New Mexico Normal School in El Rito, N. M. A Tribune reporter was unable to contact James at the first of the week to obtain a report on the sessions.

Winnie Medley was admitted to the Clovis hospital the first of the week and was to be returned home this weekend.

The Hottest Subject in Town:

Citizens Are in a Sweat As they Beat the Heat

It's the hottest subject in town; "how to keep cool," but local citizens are trying to keep their shirts on as they attempt to solve the problem of the terrific heat. The temperatures have been over 100 degrees several times in the past few days, and a large number of people have been devising their own methods of remaining vigorous and energetic in the sweltering afternoons.

In interviews the first of the week, several local citizens gave their versions of "how to keep cool," with housewives devising all sorts of methods to lower the temperature. Mrs. J. C. Robertson, however, was one doesn't mind the weather. "This climate agrees with me," she says, "I enjoy the hot days, they don't bother me at all." She also commented on the nice cool nights in this section of the country.

Mrs. W. H. McDaniel, on the other hand, finds that the best way to beat the heat is to "sit around in the kitchen and read, and when I get sleepy, take a nap." Her sentiments are duplicated by George Magness who also likes to read, and "I try not to do too much," he adds.

Mrs. Robert Morton states "there isn't too much to do about the heat. I don't notice it too much except on ironing days. I stay too busy to notice much of the time."

And Mrs. John Lockhart points out, "I haven't been keeping cool, I just take the heat as it comes." Also Curtis Miller, who is "just sweating

it out." The Graham Thorntons aren't combatting the heat, but they have a nice back yard where they spend their time in the evenings when it gets cooler.

Some citizens depend largely on air conditioners to give them relief from the weather. Mrs. Scott Levins says that she stays in the house by the air conditioner as much as possible, but her comfort is interrupted often as she dashes out to change the water sprinkler on the lawn. Mrs. Bob Anderson also "turns on the air conditioner and waits for the sun to go down, and for the weather to cool off."

Loyde Brewer, county clerk, states that the courthouse is cool at first, but after one gets used to it, the heat is more noticeable. The Brewers have an air condition in their home.

Expressing the methods of the younger generation, Betty Bridges says she wears shorts during the hot part of the day; and H. H. Henson who does quite a lot of work outside, quips "I just hope for another cloud to come by and block the sun."

One of the most original methods of staying cool, however, was explained by Mrs. Jack McManigal, who "pulls down the shades and closes up the house, with just enough windows open for ventilation. It certainly is a lot cooler," she says, "I hadn't believed it until I tried it, but it works."

Rattling combines rolled into the hot, wind-swept wheat fields of Parmer and adjoining counties last week to officially open the 1952 wheat harvest—one that probably holds more unanswered questions than any other on record in recent years.

From the time the crop was seeded last year, its outcome has been constantly in question. Prolonged drought for both germination and the period toward maturity were the heaviest handicaps. On top of that came exceptionally late frost and the usual fight with various strains of crop-eating bugs.

Yields are surprising—in two ways. Bert Williams (6 miles south of Farwell) reports 35-40-bushel yields on his small irrigated patch. Henry Ivy was figuring 7 to 8 bushels per acre on his first cutting, but predicted this low figure would improve as cutting advanced to better parts of the field.

Credit to Parmer's first load of wheat goes to Williams. He checked in to the Sherley elevators in Bovina last Wednesday. It was an oddity that his wheat should be the county's earliest when it was under irrigation. It was described as just a "trifle wet" by elevator officials, testing 15 per cent.

Joe Camp, secretary of the Parmer County PMA, estimated acreage in the county this year to be "just about the same as in 1951". That will place the figure somewhere around 60,000-70,000 acres, he estimates. Last year's wheat crop for the county amounted to between 600,000-700,000 bushels, or about 10 or 12 bushel-per-acre yield. Of course, no figures are available this year, and yields (as has already been shown) vary widely.

No labor shortage has been anticipated for harvesting the crop. Last week, "Lefty" Jordan from the Littlefield office of the Texas Employment Commission visited Farwell. He said that no requests for assistance in securing labor had been received from Parmer, and he anticipated the office to receive none. Most of the cutting can be done by the owners, grainmen believe.

Following is a breakdown of reports from Texico-Farwell and Parmer County elevators with respect to early loads of 1952 wheat. In addition to information concerning the first crops, some of the elevator managers have commented on the crop as a whole:

BOVINA

Sherley Grain Company
First wheat, Bert Williams, 6 miles s. Farwell. Arrived Wednesday, June 1. Yielding 35-40 bu., 62 lbs., 15.0 moisture. Wichita wheat, small acreage.

First dry-land wheat, Henry Ivy, 17 miles southeast Bovina in Lazbuddy community. Arrived Friday, June 13. Yielding 7-8 bushels, 60.5 lbs., 14.0 moisture. Wichita wheat, 1000 acres.

Penrod Anderson, Sherley manager, says this is a better run than last year to be so early. However, he fears the harvest may have an early ending.

MACON ELEVATOR

First wheat (dry-land), M. S. Weber, 10 miles north Bovina. Arrived Monday, 2 p.m. Yielding "little more than expected," but no figures available. Test: 60 lbs., 16.34 moisture. Weber will receive a \$10 premium.

J. P. Macon, elevator owner, estimates that the crop this year is going to run slightly above expectations. The first load at Macon last year was June 15.

BOVINA WHEAT GROWERS

First wheat (dry land), Bob Rule, seven miles east of Bovina arrived Saturday, 7:30. Received \$25 premium on 215 bushels wheat testing 61 pounds, 14.7 moisture. Second load tested 10.9. No. 1 wheat, 100 acres, cut by Buck Ellison.

Lee Thompson, manager, reports that the first load last year was not so early, arriving June 21.

S. E. CONE GRAIN & SEED CO.

First wheat (dry land), Roy Hawkins, four miles west Bovina. Tuesday, 4 p.m., yielding approximately 25 bu. Test: 61 lbs., 11.52 moisture. Received \$10 premium for No. 1 wheat.

R. S. Johnson, manager, believes this wheat is earlier than the first load last year. He also fears that yields will not continue to be as good as expected, even though Hawkins' wheat is excellent.

First wheat (dry land), Ebb Randall, old Boss place north of Gary Blair.

Otis Huggins, Southwestern Public Service Co. representative, stated that he did not know exactly what caused the situation.

Soil Conservation District Directors Meet Here Monday

Board of supervisors of the Farmer County Soil Conservation district met Monday at the courthouse. Attendees included Miles Kelley, district conservationist of Dimmitt; Steve Messenger, district secretary of Friona; A. L. Black, Buddy Jones, Henry Reynolds, Louis Dawkins of Plainview, representative of Hancock Equipment Co. of Lubbock; and County Agent Joe Jones.

Two inter-row seeders, like the one which was purchased last year for seeding legumes between rows of grain sorghum, were bought. They have the attachments for fertilizing legumes that are seeded. The equipment is to be delivered next week, and will be available for use of farmers next fall.

Three seeders, now owned by the district, will be located: on the Buddy Jones farm 1 1/2 miles south of Oklahoma Lane; Ronald Berggren place, across the road from Shirley Grain in Bovina; and the A. L. Black farm four miles east of the Hub.

Report Given on New Mexico Girls' State

Doris Leavell and I, along with nine other Curry County Girls' State Delegates left Clovis on Friday morning at 9:00 a.m. We arrived at the Albuquerque Indian School at about 2:30. We barely had time to change before we had to go to our activity meetings. Doris was interested in athletics, and I in newspaper work. At our meeting I was elected reporter and proof-reader of the daily newspaper, "The Stater."

Later, we had our first general assembly where we were welcomed by the directors and the principal of the Indian School. After dinner, we all "thought" we were going to watch television, but we only saw it for about fifteen minutes before we had to tour the campus. After the tour was another assembly. There we heard a report on the 1951 Girls' Nation by Miss Jeannine Adams, and an address on the Importance of State Legislature by Miss Ruth

Streeter, a law student. After the snack bar and bobby pin hour, we all tumbled gratefully into bed. Everyone in the dorms joined in the singing of "The Lord's Prayer" before going to sleep.

Saturday morning everyone was awake at 5 o'clock although we weren't supposed to get up until 6:30. After the presentation of colors we had calisthenics. (We did this every day, so I won't mention it again. It's hard to keep from it though, since I'm still sore from doing them.) That morning we were addressed by Miss Florenceruth Jones. She spoke on the Organization and Function of Political Parties. Then Mr. James A. Maloney discussed City Government. Then we divided up into our cities and selected our candidates and elected our officials. I was in Yucca City, and was elected reporter for that city. For our mayor we elected Jana Haley, a Los Alamos girl who later was voted governor. After lunch Sgt. Dennis of the State Police told us about police work, and that night he came back and helped us organize our city police forces. Also, that night, I got my first taste of politics at our party caucus. I learned what a help our political parties are in the function of our government.

Sunday morning we had our County Party Conventions, elected a party chairman and set up our platform. Then we attended the church of our choice. After lunch, Miss Streeter was back to tell us about "State Government." That night, Rev. Parr of the Congregational Church conducted an our-door vesper service with us. His talk was very inspirational. After vespers we had another assembly with Miss Jones conducting a mock business meeting of the ABC Club to show us about Parliamentary Procedure.

Monday was the day of the primary elections. Doris was running for State Senator and I for State Representative. We both won in the primary which got our names on the General Election Ballot. Everybody was really busy making campaign posters and they were so thick that you couldn't even see the walls. Mr. M. H. McCabe of the FBI spoke to us in assembly. Then we had our picnic and swim at the University of New Mexico. The Albuquerque Chamber of Commerce were our hosts for these activities. When we returned to the campus we had a talk on marriage and careers by Doctor Anne Newhall. Then we had campaign speeches, for the general elections the next day.

Tuesday, after everyone had voted, we heard an address on Americanism by Dr. Kerchville of the Univer-

sity of NM. Then, we got the election returns. Doris was defeated for her office, but I was one of the lucky ones, I was the "Representative Magerus" from Washington County. After lunch the county officers were sworn in; then we were addressed on County Government by Mrs. Eleanor DeCola, a lawyer for 27 years. Then Mr. John Murphy told us about District Courts. Tuesday night was the big night. We had our formal dinner and the inauguration of the governor, Jana Haley. Governor Mechem was unable to attend so General Patrick J. Hurley took his place. A reception was held for us at the Staff Club across the street after the ceremonies. We also received our Girls' State pins that night, and weren't we proud of them!

Wednesday our government began to function. Mr. Calvin Horn, speaker of the House in New Mexico helped us organize our legislatures. Then we had a joint session with the governor addressing us. Since I was in

the House, I'll report on what we did. We had the pleasure of killing more bills than we passed, but we did pass one that I consider very good. It was that there be a three-day waiting period between the application for and the sale of marriage licenses and that a six-month waiting period be required before a divorce comes final. As someone put it, "that gives you a chance to back out, at either time." In the afternoon Mr. Murphy helped in the organization of State Courts. That night a girl was tried for attempted murder. The trial was concluded on Thursday, when she was found guilty and sentenced to 15 years in the State Penitentiary. The case was appealed to the Supreme Court who handed down the same verdict. When the governor made her last speech to us she gave the "convicts" a complete pardon, so everything turned out fine. That afternoon we had our final assembly. They presented us with certificates for framing, and cards for our bill-folds showing that we were citizens (or officers) of the 1952 New Mexico Girls' State. Stunt night was a big success. Almost everyone did something. I said a reading, but felt very amateurish about it. Since that was the last night we all cried when we sang our Girls' State Song for the last time, and hardly anyone slept that night. A lot of girls took early buses so we got up at 5 o'clock Friday morning. We were among the last to leave, and had to say goodbye to everyone when they left. There were so many teas falling that I'm sure the lawn didn't need watering for days after we left. We got back to Clovis at about 3:30, tired but happy, and wishing that everyone could have attended and made the wonderful friends that we made! I wish to thank my sponsors, "The Furniture Mart" and "Roberts' Seed Co." for making it possible for me to attend this, the greatest experience of a lifetime!

Texas Students View Industrial Pictures

More Texas students viewed films from the Texas Manufacturers Association library during the past four months than in the library's entire first year of operation. This was announced today by TMA President Frank Stevens as he reviewed the project's first year and a half.

Stevens said the library would be expanded during the summer months to meet the increased demands expected when the 1952-53 school year starts. Since January 14, 45,647 students saw one or more of the industrial films, compared to 35,523 who viewed them through October, 1951, Stevens said. To date, 114,366 students from schools in almost every Texas county have seen the more than 100 films available.

TMA furnishes the films to schools and other non-profit institutions without charge except for transportation costs.

"Through the library, built with the cooperation of Texas industrial and commercial firms, TMA believes it is assisting in bringing about a clearer picture of Texas' overall industrial scene and the American way of life," Stevens said.

TMA, a 30-year-old business organization, has 2800 members in 21 chapter areas covering Texas. It works in the fields of legislation, public relations, and industrial relations to improve the state's business climate.

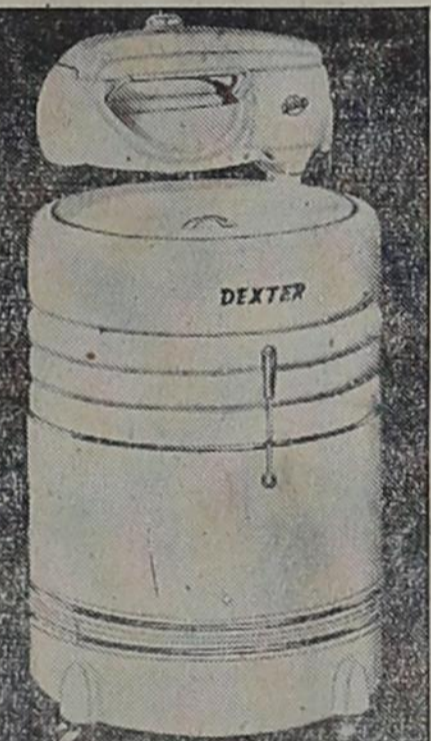

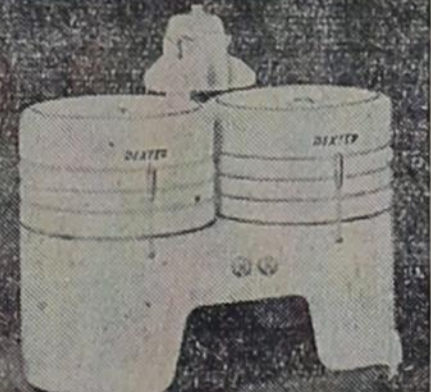
