## Smith to head Border Town Days

The Border Town Days Committee Monday night elected Curtis Smith to head this year's event. John and Joann Getz, longtime leaders of BTD, had announced they were resigning their posts last year. Also, Mike Pomper was elected BTD vice president and Ann Cooper was re-elected secretary. This year's Border Town Days will be held July 25-26. The theme will be "Happy 150th Anniversary, Texas" and the colors will be red, white and blue.

Several committee appointments were made: Othena Smith, helped by Gladys Hardage, will be asked to be in charge of the Merchants Giveaway. Janie Bowery will handle the arts and crafts exhibits. Mrs. Cooper said that the photo booth last year was well-received and recommended making sure it is brought here again. ESA and Beta Sigma Phi sororities will again be in charge of the park concessions.

Weldon Smith, last year's parade marshal, will again be asked to handle the lineup, along with the Texico-Farwell Lions Club. Martha Curtis, Frances Kube and John Getz will be asked to handle the float contest. Ann Cooper will again be in charge of the popular bicycle contest for youths. The problem of where to line up these youths was discussed and a vacant lot will be the site this year. Texico Mayor John R. Hadley said he will have it cleared of debris in time for the parade.

Orie Jones will be asked to handle the antique cars. The Texico Volunteer Fire Department will have the giveaway for a pickup truck this year. The pickup will be from Doc Stewart Chevrolet. Proceeds go to the building fund. Tickets cost \$20 and are available from fire department members. Gladys Hardage announced that her calliope has been fixed. It's a popular feature of past BTD parades but wasn't in last year's due to mechanical problems. The Farwell Study Club will be asked to again handle the registration table for reunion members. John Getz will seek the Cannon Air Force Base Color Guard for the parade. Hal Helton will be asked to get the West Texas State Buffalo.

## Houston sends out urgent call for volunteers

1836: WEDNESDAY, APRIL 13. In a communication "To the Citizens of Texas," issued from his camp on the Brazos River, General Sam Houston sent out an urgent call for volunteers. "You have suffered panic to seize you, and idle rumor to guide you," he charged. "You will now be told that the enemy have crossed the Brazos, and that Texas is conquered. Reflect, reason with yourselves, and you cannot believe a part of it."

The enemy "are treading the soil on which they are to be conquered," he said. He now estimates their strength at not more than 900, and notes that their army is divided. He pointed out that recently a Texian force of only 20 men had prevented the Mexicans from crossing the Brazos at Fort Bend. "Protect your wives, your children, and your homes, by repairing to the field, where alone, by discipline and concert of action you can be effective," he urged. "Come and free your country at once, and be men!" He ended with a threat: "Those who do not aid Texas in her present struggle, but flee and forfeit all the rights of citizens, will deserve their fate." He has previously stated that "those who refuse to join us will have their property confiscated, and be regarded as deserters from our cause."

1837: WEDNESDAY, APRIL 12. The government of the Republic of Texas, currently located in Columbia, on the Brazos River, today began its move to Houston City, designated as the temporary capital by an act of the First Texas Congress last November 30. Houston is located on the Buffalo

Revs. Virgil Fiske, Steve Stephens and Pat Riley will be asked to handle the shave permits again. It was decided to just register entrants for the beard contest at the afternoon in the park just before the contest starts.

It was noted that the Jaycees plan to have its rodeo again in conjunction with BTD. The Texico-Farwell Rotary Club will be asked to hold its popular barbeque again. Last year, 1,270 persons were served. The committee also approved having some official BTD stationery printed.

Normally, booths selling concessions are not allowed at the park. However, Elizabeth Phillips, chairman of the Farwell Sesquicentennial Committee, said that the official Texas mascot, R.T. Dillo has agreed to come to BTD if it is allowed to have a booth to sell Sesquicentennial items -- with 10 percent of the proceeds going to the BTD Committee.

Due to the fact that this year's theme involves the Sesquicentennial, the committee voted to allow this exception. Present at the meeting were Gladys Hardage, Curtis Smith, Janie Bowery, Chris Gikas, Cynthia Thigpen, John Getz, Joann Getz, Elizabeth Phillips, Ann Cooper, Maurine Caywood, Altha Herington, Gwen Corn, John R. Hadley, Janette Pierce and Mike Pomper. The next BTD meeting will be May 5.

Bayou, a short distance from Galveston. It was named for General Sam Houston, president of Texas, with his permission. The site was purchased last August for \$5,000 by two brothers, August C. and John K. Allen, the latter a member of the Texas Congress. They engaged Moses Lapham to lay out the town, and advertised lots for sale. This is a common practice in Texas, where land speculators frequently purchase tracts in locations they consider suitable for establishing a town. They usually name it for a well-known Texian, and subdivide it into lots, which they offer for sale. In advertising the proposed town of Houston, the developers provided a map showing its location. "It will be seen that the trade of San Jacinto, Spring Creek, New Kentucky, and the Brazos above and below Fort Bend, must necessarily come to this place," they said, and predicted that Houston will become "the great commercial emporium of Texas." They noted that "nature seems to have designated this place for the future seat of government," since it is so well situated for both water and land transportation. In selecting a temporary capital, Congress considered some 15 locations. The advantages of Houston were eloquently presented by John Allen, who said: "It is a most beautiful site for a town, with most excellent spring water, and the most inexhaustible quantity of pine lumber for building." He pointed out that the bayou is navigable at all times for boats drawing six feet of water or less, and the town can thus be easily supplied by ship from the United States. Moreover, he said,

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## Gikas elected mayor

Chris Gikas was elected as the new Farwell mayor Saturday by a 154-34 vote over Cecil Rundell. Gikas is filling the unexpired term of Walter Kaltwasser, who resigned, effective April 5. Gikas' term is for one year, when the regular mayoral election will occur. Gikas moved to Farwell in 1984 when he married the former Peggy Snider. They are co-owners of Twin Oaks Psi Design, Farwell. Gikas retired as chairman of the Department of Art and Art Education at Eastern New Mexico University in 1984. He has a master of arts degree from the University of New Mexico.

Gikas was a member of the ENMU Faculty Senate for 18 years, serving as vice chairman and presiding officer for three of them, and on the Board of Directors for six. He received the New Mexico Arts Commission Award for "Outstanding Service" to the state of New Mexico in 1974. He has served as chairman of the Artists in the Schools Committee for five years. And he served in the Army Air Corps during World War II. Receiving write-in votes for

mayor were Martin Kube, 2, and Fred Chandler, Joe Jones and Jayme Berry, all with 1.

**FARWELL CITY COUNCIL**  
The three incumbents were unopposed. Martin Kube got 177 votes, Fred Chandler got 172 and Elizabeth Phillips got 161.

Receiving write-in votes were: Jerry Monk, 3; Joel White, 2, and Patsy Berry, Willie Roberts, Jim Curtis, James Craig, Walter Kaltwasser, James Williams and Jim

Mace, all with 1.  
**FARWELL SCHOOL BOARD**  
Both incumbents were re-elected -- Steve Pierson, with 125 votes, and Richard Haseloff, with 144 votes. Also on the ballot were Mark Williams, 85 votes, and Randy Kelley, 45 votes. Receiving write-in votes were John Lovelace and Woody Lovelace.  
**FARWELL HOSPITAL DISTRICT**  
The four incumbents were unopposed for re-election -- Troy Christian, 186 votes; Frances Kube, 181; Tom Nicols, 179, and Bert Williams, 178.

Receiving write-in votes were Jim Curtis, Joel White, Jack Williams, Jim Berry, Clay Roberts and Kevin Hardage.

**LAZBUDDIE SCHOOL BOARD**  
Jerry Engelking had no opponents in seeking an unexpired one-year term. He received 106 votes; and there were 26 write-in ballots. Elected to the two three-year terms were Harrol Redwine, an incumbent, with 85 votes, and John Jones, 81. Others receiving votes were Ken McGehee, 55; Doug Rice, 50, and Kent Winders, 29. Six write-in votes were cast.

## Farwell Farm Supply opens

Floyd and Wynona Coates have opened Farwell Farm Supply. The new business is located at 1017 Ave. A in Farwell, across from the Sherley-Anderson-Pitman grain elevator at the east side of the city. The building formerly housed Circle D Feed Supply. Coates had used the building years ago for Farwell Farm Supply, but then closed it to concentrate on his business of the past 25 years -- Oklahoma Lane Farm Supply. The new business will be open from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. weekdays and from 8 a.m. to noon Saturdays. During "the season," the store will be open all day Saturdays. The phone number is 481-3295.

The stock will include: A full line of Wylie sprayers, a full line of Hamby parts -- especially rodweeder, Tye drill parts, Gates hoses, AcraPlant tillage, Nichols sweeps, Wix filters, Caldwell shredders, Ace pumps, Roller chain and Glencoe minimum tillage plows. Also, Coates said he has a complete line of bearings and bolts, pipe fittings, fence supplies and a Gates Digital Hydraulic Hose Crimper.

The back of the shop will be used for repairing equipment such as rodweeder, sprayer pumps and U-joints. And in front of the store is large farm equipment made by firms such as Hamby, Glencoe and Caldwell.

### Parmer declared natural disaster area

Congressman Larry Combest (R-Texas) announced that 8 counties in the 19th Congressional District of Texas have been designated natural disaster areas due to crop damage brought on by severe weather conditions in 1985. The U.S. Department of Agriculture has declared Lamb, Bailey, Cochran, Castro, Hale, Hockley, Lubbock and Parmer counties natural disaster areas as a result of severe crop damages and losses due to hail, high winds and drought occurring May 19, 1985 through Dec. 12, 1985, Combest said. Eligible farmers may qualify for Farmers Home Administration emergency loan assistance if they have suffered a 30 percent crop loss resulting from hail, wind or drought during this time.

## 'Watch' organizational meeting planned for Texico residents

The response of Texico residents to a questionnaire asking about a proposed Neighborhood Watch program for the community has been excellent, said Ann Cooper, Watch coordinator for the city. A meeting has been called for 7 p.m. MST April 15 at the Texico Community Center to help organize a Neighborhood Watch program for Texico.

All residents are invited. It is especially hoped that persons who responded affirmatively to the questionnaire and who volunteered to be block captains attend, said Mrs. Cooper.

Last month, a questionnaire was sent out to all Texico residents asking if they thought a Watch program was needed for the city and if they were willing to serve as block captains.

At a Watch program for the Twin Cities March 4, Mrs. Cooper had volunteered to serve as Texico coordinator. Frances Kube and Peggy Sudderth are Farwell Watch coordinators.

Mrs. Cooper, who is secretary to the Texico Chamber of Commerce, brought up the Watch topic at the Chamber's March meeting and it was decided to put together a questionnaire. Then the City Council allowed the questionnaire to be sent

out with the city's utility bills. So far, Mrs. Cooper said more than 30 questionnaires have been returned to her, with every one favoring a Watch program except one. In addition, 10 persons have volunteered to serve as block captains.

After that meeting, she will work with the Farwell coordinators on a block-captain system so that both cities work in conjunction with each other. Meanwhile, Mrs. Kube is continuing to work on setting up block captains for Farwell.

## TEAMS test results given

Statistics for Farwell 11th graders who took the TEAMS test, which they need to pass before graduation, have been released.

One hundred percent of the Farwell students passed the math test and 91 percent passed the language arts section (three students need remediation).

On a national scale, the Farwell statistics showed a 72 percent ranking in math, 57 percent ranking in reading and 50 percent ranking in writing (with 50 percent being the national average).

The Farwell students will now go on to regional at South Plains College April 24-25.

**ENMR directors picked**

Eastern New Mexico Rural Telephone Company held its annual meeting Saturday at Clovis High School. Two petitions were introduced from the floor to nominate directors. Last year, there were too few members present to have a quorum to elect directors; the board ruled that it had the power to fill vacancies under the article 4 section 7 of its by-laws. Some members present at the April 5 meeting did not all agree that proper procedures had been followed. After a lengthy discussion, the chair ruled that the nominations would not be accepted, and that the positions had been filled by the methods the board had traditionally followed. Four new directors were elected from districts which were due to have elections this year. Elected were Gilbert Ortiz, Bill Freeman, Gilbert Guitierrez, and Shafie Hindi.

Two amendments were passed — one concerning the location of special meetings, and one concerning the nominating committee. Annual meetings may now be held at locations other than Clovis. Andy Chitwood, former chairman of the ENMR board, burned the first note that ENMR had ever signed. The note for \$5,500,000 was signed in 1950 with the Farmer's Electric Cooperative. It helped provide party line service to homes which never had service before. Today ENMR has assets totaling \$64,000,000, and they provide private lines to their customers. It is working on paying off other notes. The current trend in the Rural Electrification Administration is to have subscribers pay all the costs of operation even though the rural phone companies cover large areas. ENMR has not raised its local rate in 10 years, and does not anticipate a rate increase for local service in 1986.

"Fish, oysters and fowl can be had there in abundance; and the country around is capable of supplying the town with all the substantial necessities of life."

He offered to give to the government whatever lots it needs, and to build a State House and offices for the various government departments, which he will rent on credit until the government is able to pay.

A recent traveller reports that Houston City is not quite as accessible by water as the Allens have indicated. He was aboard the Laura, a small steamship attempting to reach Houston for the first time. They made port at Galveston Bay and proceeded to Harrisburg without difficulty. Although the distance from there to Houston is only 12 miles by water—it is only half that by land—the bayou was so obstructed with fallen trees and snags that the trip took three days. To clear these away so that the steamer could pass, it was often necessary for the passengers to go ashore and construct a windlass by felling a small tree to use as a capstan. However, the trip was not all arduous labor, our informant said. "It being necessary to lie by at night, in the evenings we had a good time dancing and frolicking with the settlers on shore, who were delighted to see 'newcomers from the States'."

1840: FRIDAY, APRIL 10. During the first quarter of this year, 92 vessels arrived at the port of Galveston, a great increase over previous years. Other ports such as Velasco and Matagorda also show great increases. Many of these vessels are from Europe, bringing merchandise in exchange for cot-

ton. Trade is also increasing inland, especially on the Trinity, Brazos and Colorado Rivers. Houston City, accessible to Galveston by means of the Buffalo Bayou, which is navigable at all times, has become a major center for trade with the interior. The cost of freight going from Houston to Austin is \$18 to \$20 per hundredweight, payable in promissory notes worth 15 to 18 cents to the dollar. The Red River is also a major trade route.

Importation of food is rapidly decreasing as the Republic become more self-sufficient. For example, in 1838, 35,000 bushels of corn were imported, and 56,000 pounds of butter. The importation of corn has dropped to a negligible amount, and the importation of butter has been reduced almost by half, despite the rapidly growing population of the Republic.

Burrows is planning a subdivision on his 17 acres, currently grassland and used for horse grazing. The site is directly south of City Hall (to the south of the railroad tracks).

In other business, the council voted to adopt an ordinance to create a planning and zoning commission. Named to it were Vane Doshier, Bob Spears, Lewis Cooper, Oran Jay Autrey, Robert Lydick, Charlotte Pierce and Jim Burrows. They will have staggered two-year terms.

Persons would submit requests for variances in writing to this new group. A hearing notice would be published and neighboring property owners checked with. Then a recommendation would be made to the city council, which has final say.

The new unit also would deal with requirements for items such as sewer line extensions and mobile home authorizations.

The council also approved a change order for Max Carter to place additional fencing around the landfill.

The next meeting date was moved to April 21 because April 22 is the time for the Texico Chamber of Commerce banquet. The meeting will be at 6:30 p.m. MST at City Hall.

## Russian wheat aphid appears on Texas South Plains

An aphid which for almost a century has plagued small grain producers halfway around the world has made its first U.S. appearance in wheat field on the South Plains of Texas.

Entomologists with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service said the Russian wheat aphid has been identified in fields from Gaines to Hall counties and from Parmer to Scurry counties, and in Curry County, N.M.

"This is no joke to our wheat farmers," said Dr. William P. Morrison, Extension entomologist, at a press conference at the Texas

A&M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center here. The infested area annually produces some 17 percent of the state's wheat, with a yield of about 26.4 million bushels on 1.3 million planted acres. Yield reductions can result from infestations by this aphid, Morrison said.

"The aphids are found mainly on the newest growth of the wheat plant, generally at the base of the tightly curled last leaf," Morrison said. In later growth stages, the aphids infest the flag leaf. Emerging wheat heads may become bent and white.

The recommended control measures, at present, are treatment with a combination of a contact

insecticide, such as parathion, plus a systemic insecticide, Morrison said. He said this would cost farmers approximately \$5 an acre applied aerially.

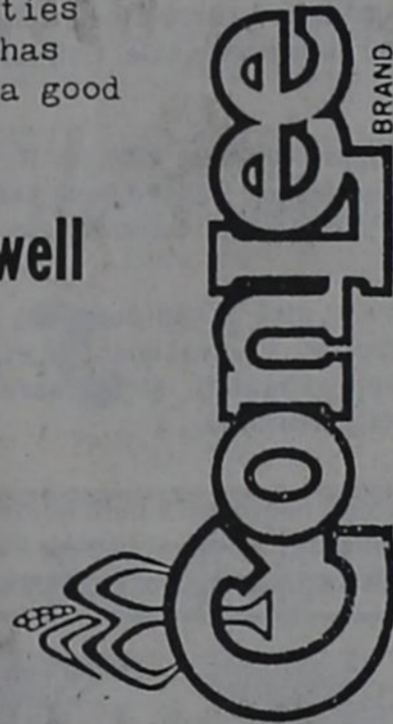

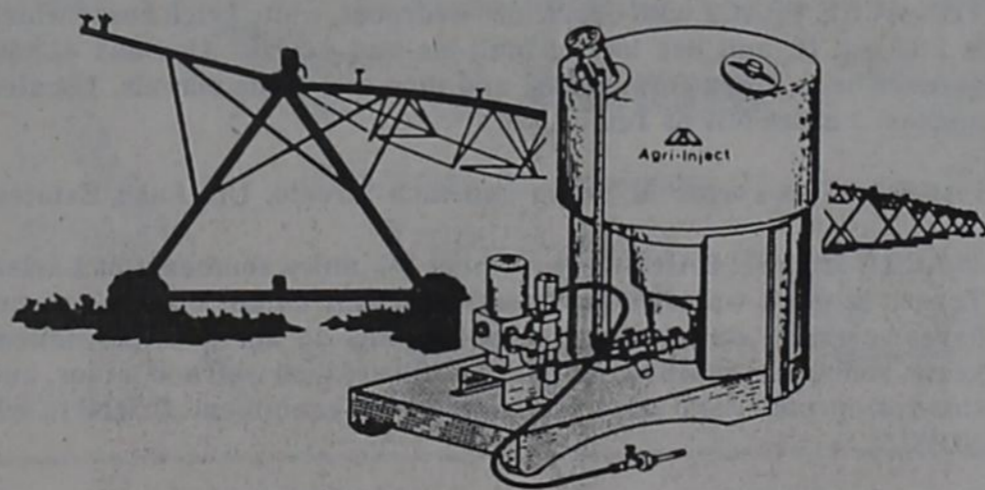

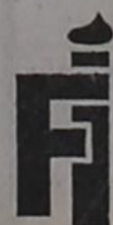
