Car horns used as an insult

(Editor's note: Loretta Gonzales, the Texico girl spending a year in school in the Philippines as part of a Rotary exchange program, will be writing letters for publication every couple of weeks.)

Well, I'm starting on my fourth week here in the Philippines, and I'm enjoying it very much! Right now, it is July 18 here while it is July 17th there, and the time is 7:15 p.m. here in the Philippines while there it is 5:15 a.m.

First of all, I'll tell you about my school. It is very different because they skip grades 7 and 8, and when the students enter college they should be at the age of 16. They finish college at the age of 20 and already have a career.

Another difference is the way the school system is set up. For example, the grades 1-6, 9-12, and college are all in the same area and under the same name.

I am enrolled in a private Catholic school so as part of the rules, we have to wear uniforms and say a prayer before and after each class period.

Lunchtime is also different because we eat in what is called a canteen where there are a large variety of snacks, foods, and drinks.

The Filipino people eat a total of five times a day. Breakfast, of course, consists of rice and two different types of meat. Then around 10-11 a.m. there is a mid-morning snack. Then lunch is served, and again there is rice, and a variety of meats or fish.

Around 5-6 p.m. there is a mid-afternoon snack, which to us would be considered dinner, because a snack to the Filipinos is going to the Pizza Hut, Arby's, McDonald's, or Wendy's. Then dinner is served around 7-8 p.m.

Another thing that is done completely different is the driving. You

might say that the first person who can squeeze into a vacant parking spot wins! They don't follow the lanes like we do; u-turns are made wherever possible; and traffic lights are very rare!

The on-coming traffic is usually mixed in with the traffic going in the opposite direction. The Filipinos have what is called a Jeepney, which is an American jeep transformed into a Filipino style and decorated to the driver's taste.

The drivers are definitely what you would refer to as "Reckless drivers." I was in total cultural shock the first time I rode in a Jeepney. Another difference is the horn is used in the U.S.A. as a warning signal to another driver; here, it is used as an insult.

I miss everyone there, and again I would like to thank all the people who were kind enough to help me experience this.

Texico School will begin the 1986-87 school term on Aug. 25 at 8:30 a.m. with classes to dismiss at 3:04 p.m. (MDT).

The new students in first through fifth grades will register Aug. 11 through 13 from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. (MDT). All kindergarten students who were not preregistered in April will also register these dates. They will need birth certificates and immunization records.

On Aug. 11, the ninth through 12th grades will register from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. on Aug. 12, the 10th and 11th grades will register from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. on Aug. 13 and the sixth, seventh and eighth grades will register from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. at Texico High School.

An in-service day for faculty and staff will be Aug. 22 in the lecture hall of the new building at 8:30 a.m. (MDT), after which the teachers will go to their respective classrooms.

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Muleshoe man sought in shooting death

Parmer County Sheriff Bill Morgan said a Muleshoe man is a suspect in the shooting death early Sunday of a Muleshoe woman and the shooting of a second Muleshoe woman.

Sought by police is Rene Garcia, 22. Police said he allegedly took Ida Sotelo, 17, of Muleshoe, with him at gunpoint following the incident.

The shootings took place on FM Road 2290, six miles west of Bovina at 1:10 a.m.

Pronounced dead at the scene by Justice of the Peace Frances Euler was Christy Sotelo, 35. Shot in the back by a .38-caliber pistol was Tonya Parkinson, 23. She was taken to Clovis Hospital and is listed in good condition.

The shootings apparently were keyed by a domestic squabble.

The sheriff said that Ida Sotelo worked at Allsup's in Farwell and got off work at midnight Saturday. There to meet her were Christy Sotelo, Tonya Parkinson, Rosa Sotelo Vital and Hector Sotelo, all of Muleshoe. The foursome were in one car.

When Ida Sotelo left in her pickup,

she apparently was met by Garcia, said Morgan. He got in her pickup and they rode around the county until the pickup got stuck on FM 2290. Then all six got into the car, a blue 1985 Buick Regal. The shooting later occurred.

Morgan said Garcia has an outstanding Texas warrant for violation of parole; he was charged with aggravated assault.

It was the second shooting death being investigated by Parmer County in the past week.

Grand Jury indicts pair

Indictments of murder were returned by a Parmer County Grand Jury Tuesday against Frederick Albert Cantrell, 63, and his wife, Pearl, of Farwell.

The indictments concern the shooting death of Carl William Moore II July 27.

Moore, an Ohio native who had just moved with his wife and three children to 902 Ave. D, Farwell, was 26.

According to Parmer County Sheriff Bill Morgan, the problem

apparently started early the morning of July 27 when Moore and a son of Cantrell had an argument.

Morgan said Frederick and Pearl Cantrell drove to Moore's residence about 6:30 p.m. July 27.

Witnesses told Morgan that Moore was in the front yard and Cantrell allegedly shot Moore at least twice, in the chest and back, with a .22 caliber rifle. Thirty minutes later, the Cantrells voluntarily appeared at the sheriff's office.

A singer and her dolls

What does a singer have in common with dolls?

Usually the query would elicit no immediate response, but when the singer in question is Ruthie Singer, the collection becomes clear, for the Farwellite's collection reveals her fascination with dolls, dolls, dolls!

When speaking of her collection, Ruthie admits that she never really intended to start collecting. However, she has always enjoyed almost any kind of doll; as a result, those seeing her appreciation and interest began giving them to her as presents early in her life. Now nearly all the members of both her own and husband Gary's families keep a sharp eye out for unusual specimens.

Ruthie Singer is also quick to explain that she does not favor one particular type or brand of doll over another. Rather, a doll catches her interest on its own merit, not because a book or magazine proclaims it a collector's item.

Her collection reflects Mrs. Singer's broad tastes, and there are several peculiarities about the collection. For one thing, Ruthie's preference for brown hair is evident in almost every instance, albeit there is a smattering of light tresses here and there.

Another oddity is the number of male dolls, which she favors because they are "unique." But probably the most unusual aspect of the collection is Ruthie's belief that dolls are to be touched. In fact, she describes herself as a grown woman "who likes to play with dolls."

The majority of the collection is housed within an antique glass cabinet to ensure that the dolls will stay as dust-free as possible in West Texas. However, since she does so strongly feel that dolls are not to be just looked at, she keeps six or eight big baby dolls available for young visitors to play with. Among them are three Cabbage Patch babies, each with its own name and several changes of clothes.

Simply because display requires so much space, Ruthie is forced to forego keeping some dolls out. Several porcelain creations, so called for their porcelain heads, hands and feet, are presently packed away, but Ruthie hopes soon to have a cradle in which they may

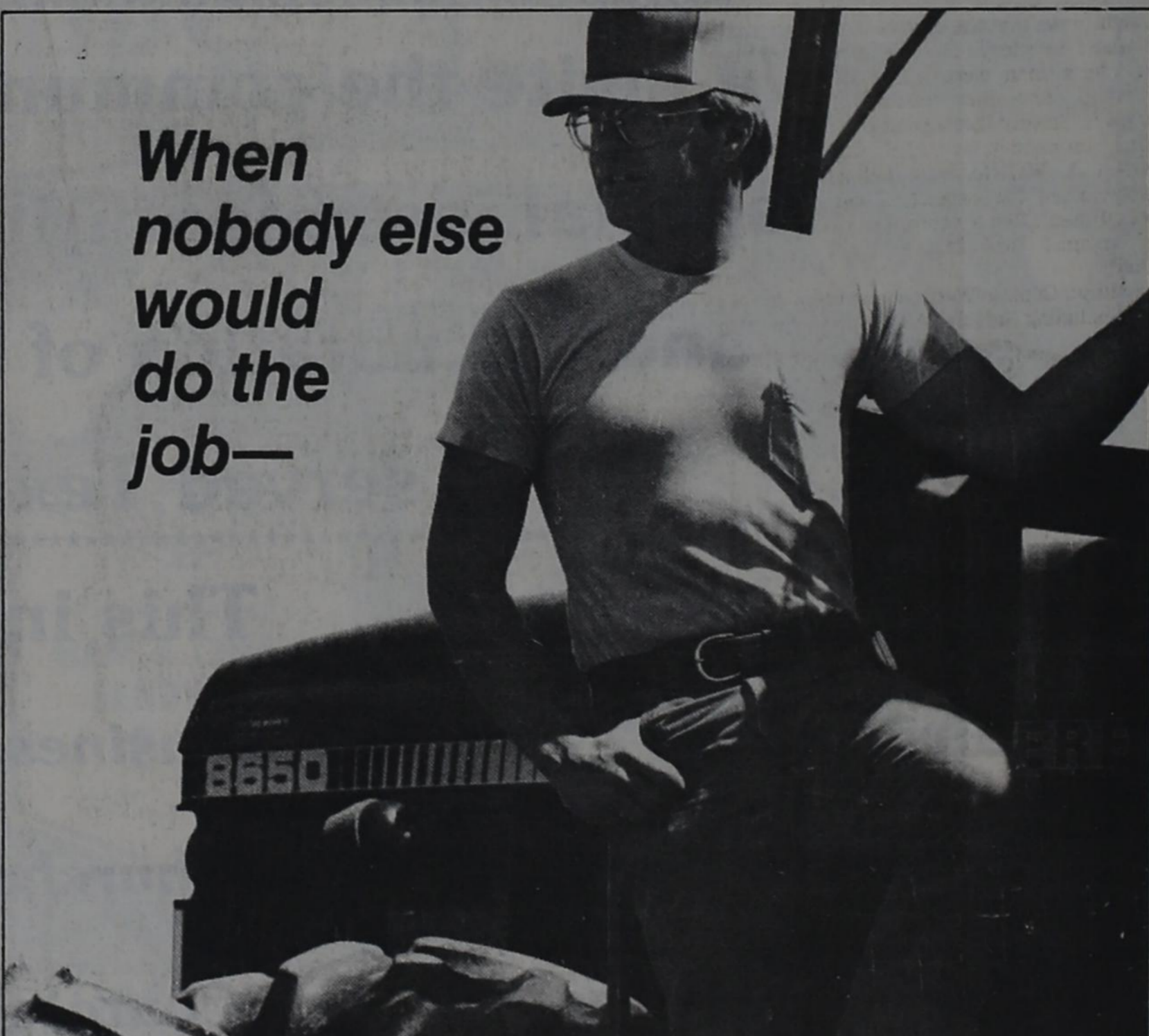

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Texian expedition under Col. Snively ends in failure

1837: FRIDAY, AUGUST 4. Memucan Hunt, special agent for Texas in support of Texas Minister to the United States William H. Wharton, today submitted to U.S. Secretary of State John Forsyth a lengthy proposition for the annexation of Texas.

Hunt pointed out that the annexation of Texas would add to the national power and wealth of the United States, would aid in the protection of the western frontier, and would assure U.S. control of the Gulf of Mexico. He noted that the citizens of Texas are of the same blood as those of the United States, possess the same liberties, and entertain the same devout reverence for the constitution. On the other hand, if Texas is not annexed, she might well become a formidable rival, with possible conflicts of interest with the United States, and with other possible difficulties.

Secretary Forsyth will submit the proposition to President Martin Van Buren's administration. However, there is little likelihood of any action at this time, because of existing treaties between the United States and Mexico, and because the anti-slavery Northern states strongly oppose annexation.

1843: SUNDAY, AUGUST 6. The expedition under command of Colonel Jacob Snively today reached Bird's Fort on the Trinity River and disbanded. Their project has ended in failure.


The expedition set out last April 25 with about 175 men, authorized by the Texas War Department to intercept a rich Mexican caravan expected to cross Texas territory on its return from a buying trip in the United States.

The caravan was never encountered, and by June 28 Captain Eli Chandler and 70 men left the group to return home. Two days later some 200 United States dragoon, escorting the caravan in U.S. territory, crossed the Arkansas River to Snively's camp, and forced the Texians to give up their arms. The Texas government is protesting this invasion of its territory. The next day the dragoons offered to conduct the disarmed men to Independence, Missouri, and 50 accepted.

Those remaining decided to continue their search for the caravan, once it crossed into Texas territory. They still had their arms - those taken by the dragoons were captured Mexican escopetas. Snively sent scouts to overtake Captain Chandler, and he and his men agreed to return, at least for a while.

On July 4 Indians stampeded their horses, and in a running battle, one Texian was killed and another wounded. Some 10 or 15 Indians were killed. On July 8 their scouts brought news that the caravan was in Texas territory. By this time, Chandler's men were again discouraged, and they refused to pursue it. Snively thereupon resigned his command in favor of Captain Charles A. Wafield, who had recently joined the expedition with several men after a venture of his own against New Mexico had failed.

On July 9 Captain Warfield and 82 men, including Snively, set out for

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the caravan. However, the next day, 14 changed their minds and left to join Captain Chandler. The others found the caravan's trail on July 13. It was exceptionally heavy, and they decided that the tracks were those of a large body of Mexican troops escorting the caravan, probably under New Mexico's governor, General Manuel Armijo, who had captured and so cruelly treated the Santa Fe Expedition in 1841. The Texians decided their numbers were not sufficient to attempt a capture, and started for home. The next day Captain Warfield resigned, and Colonel Snively was re-elected to the command.

The return trip took 24 days, with great privation and suffering. On July 20 there was another Indian skirmish, with the Comanches. Finally today, the remnants of the expedition arrived at Bird's Fort and disbanded. Thus has closed another unfortunate chapter in the relationship of Texas with New Mexico.

1845: MONDAY, AUGUST 4. The court-martial of Edwin Ward Moore, former Commodore of the Texas Navy, adjourned this week after a 72-day session. Its verdict has not been made public, but there is little doubt that Moore has been acquitted of all charges against him, with the possible exception of a few minor specifications. However, Moore will not be reinstated to his former position as long as the verdict is not announced. In any event, the Texas Navy will be incorporated into that of the United States as soon as the annexation procedures now in process are completed.

The charges against Moore consisted of six counts of willful neglect of duty, six counts of disobedience of orders, five counts of contempt of country, three counts of embezzlement, one of treason, and one of murder. They arise from a longstanding dispute between Moore and President Sam Houston, who has never been a strong supporter of the Navy.

The court-martial was convened in Washington-on-the-Brazos, the current temporary capital of the

Republic, on May 20, after almost a year of constant demand for it by Moore and his supporters. President Houston had dismissed Moore from office and in effect had labelled him a pirate in a proclamation issued May 6, 1843. Upon his return to Galveston on July 14, Moore insisted that his dismissal was illegal, since an act of Congress approved February 4, 1841, provides that an officer can be deprived of his commission only by court-martial. However, President Houston and Secretary of War and Marine George W. Hill refused to order a court-martial.

On September 27, 1843, Moore published a defense of his conduct of the Navy in a 201-page booklet entitled "To the People of Texas--An Appeal: In Vindication of His Conduct of the Navy." On the following January 11 he formally petitioned Congress to order a court-martial, and after investigation, it complied.

The court-martial brought out the details of Moore's expedition into Mexican waters last year, which the administration claims was unauthorized. They are as follows: At the beginning of 1843 the Texas navy was in bad shape. The Zavala and San Bernard were beached at Galveston, and the Archer was badly in need of repairs. The San Jacinto had been wrecked, and the San Antonio lost at sea. The two remaining ships, the Austin and Wharton, had been in New Orleans for months undergoing repairs, hampered by lack of funds. Moore was supervising this work.

On January 16, 1843, Congress passed a secret act authorizing the sale of the Navy. Two commissioners arrived in New Orleans on February 25 to implement this. They were surprised at the progress Moore had made in refitting his ships. He had obtained funds from the Yucatan government and from New Orleans businessmen.

One of the commissioners, William Bryan, departed for Texas on March 10 to obtain further instructions. The other, Colonel James Morgan, became so convinced of the value of another foray against the Mexican Navy that he took it upon himself to authorize Moore to sail

for Galveston "by way of Yucatan." He later explained: "I felt justified in taking the coast of Yucatan on our way. The fact was, I found our vessels in such apple pie order--the officers so anxious to proceed on the cruise--such bully crews; and knowing if the vessels did go into Galveston Harbor they would never come out again as Texas vessels--if at all," that he believed they could "accomplish every object we had in view in 20 or 30 days at farthest."

They sailed on April 19, 1843 with crews totalling 232 men. Also on board were the San Antonio mutiners of February 11, 1842, held for more than a year in New Orleans jails, and turned over to Moore by a previous request of President Houston to New Orleans authorities. During the first week at sea, a court-martial was conducted and the sentences carried out. Several received lashes, and the four considered responsible for killing a

ship's officer were sentenced to death. On April 26, after a solemn ceremony, they were hoisted with a rush, all at the same time, and were left hanging for an hour before being lowered and buried at sea. It was intended, in part, as an object lesson to the ships' crews.

Off Campeche on April 30, the two ships engaged a major part of the Mexican fleet, including two new steamships built in England, the Montezuma and the Guadalupe, and four sailing vessels. No one aboard the Austin was hurt, but the Wharton suffered two killed and three wounded, with both ships slightly damaged. It was later learned that the Montezuma lost 13 killed and the Guadalupe lost seven. On May 16 there was another battle with the two steamships, in which the Austin lost three killed and 22 wounded, and two were accidentally killed on the Wharton when a cannon fired while being loaded.

Both ships were considerably damaged, but later repaired. The Montezuma lost about 40 killed and wounded, including its captain, and the Guadalupe 47 killed and 64 wounded. Reported enthusiastic Commissioner Morgan: "The way we knocked Hell into them and out of them was a caution. We thrashed them soundly, and the whole fleet ran off."

Since last year, the Austin and Wharton have been laid up in Galveston. The Texas Navy can be said no longer to exist.

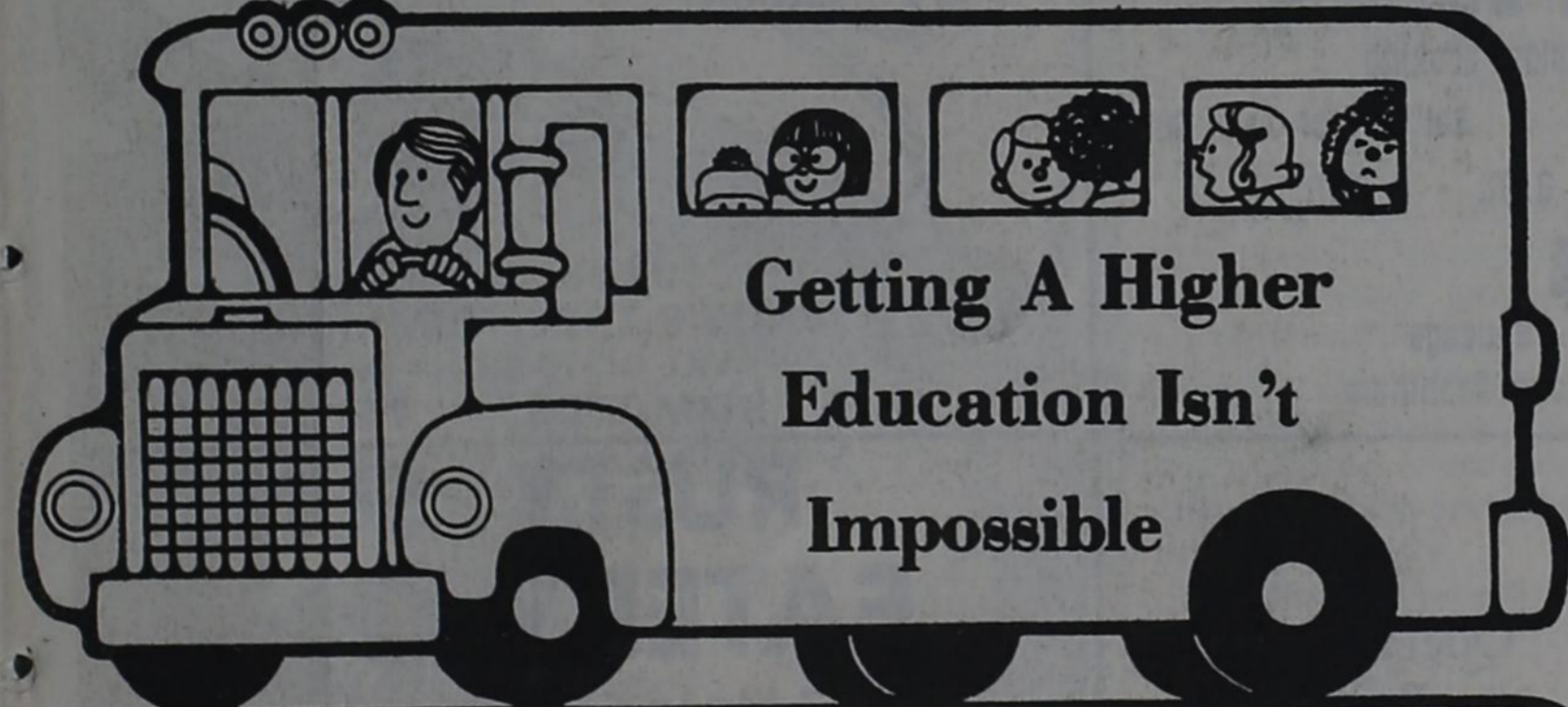

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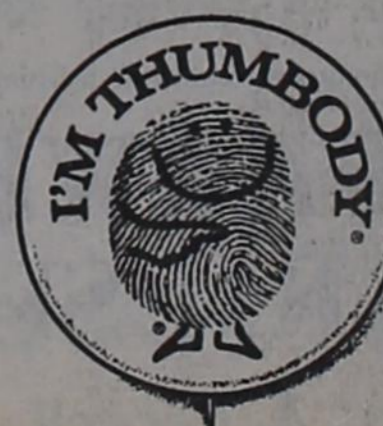

Recipe of Week

WESTERNER CAKE

3 sticks margarine or butter
1 1-lb. box powdered sugar
6 eggs
1 powdered sugar box full of sifted flour
1 t. lemon juice
1 T. vanilla
Have eggs and margarine at room temperature. Cream margarine.

Add powdered sugar, beat until fluffy. Add eggs, one at a time, beating well after each addition. Sift flour three times; add gradually to batter. Add flavorings and mix well. Bake in 10 inch tube pan which has been greased and floured. Bake 1 1/2 hours at 325 degrees. Cool 4 minutes, then invert pan. (Wonderful served plain, with whipped cream, fruit or ice cream, or use your favorite frosting.)

Historic Recipe of the Week

SWEDISH MEAT BALLS

To make 6 to 8 servings: Select a good 2 pound chuck or rump roast and have it ground through the sausage plate for a slightly coarser grind than is generally used. Season with salt and pepper to taste. Add 2 tablespoons Worcestershire sauce, 2 eggs, 1/2 cup uncooked rice, and 1/2 cup toasted chopped almonds. Blend well and form into small balls about 1 inch in diameter. In a deep roasting pan with a tight-fitting lid,

pour two 10-ounce cans of cream of chicken soup and 3 cups water. Mix well. Into this soup drop the meat balls carefully. Cover the roaster and bake in a moderate oven, 325°, for about 1 hour, or until the meat is slightly pink and increased in size. Life the meatballs out of the soup and serve over hot rice or noodles or toast. Delicious any time of year.

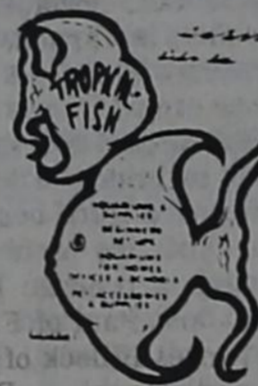
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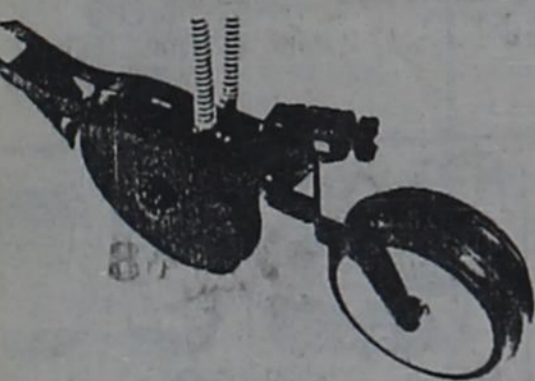
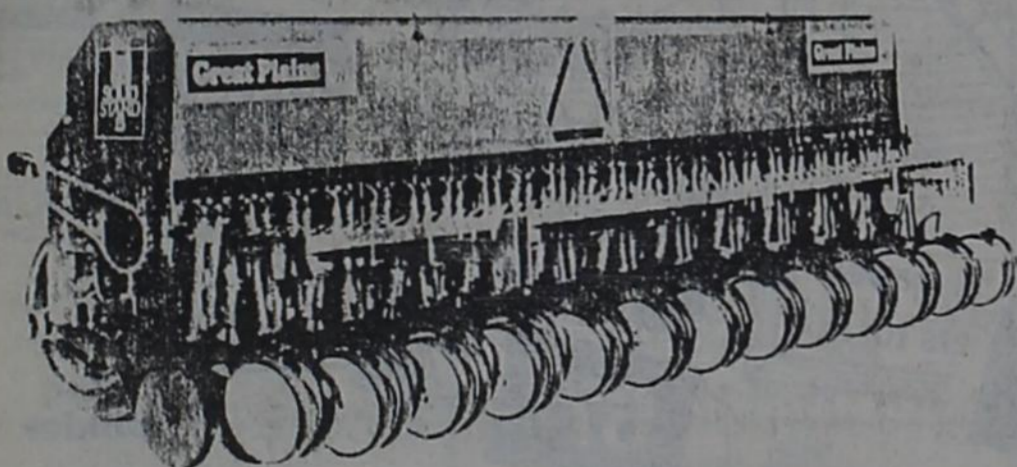
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Sheriff's Report

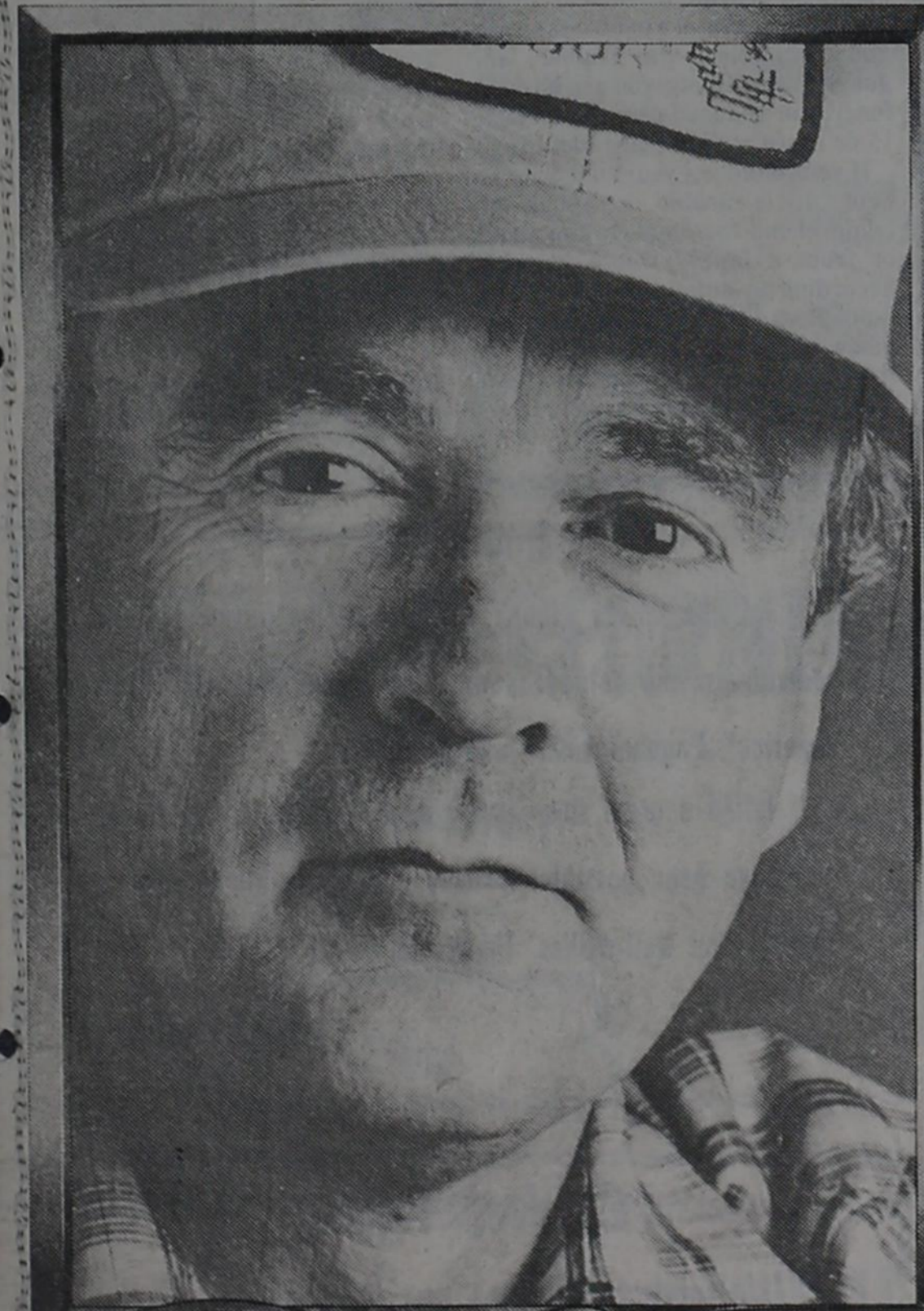

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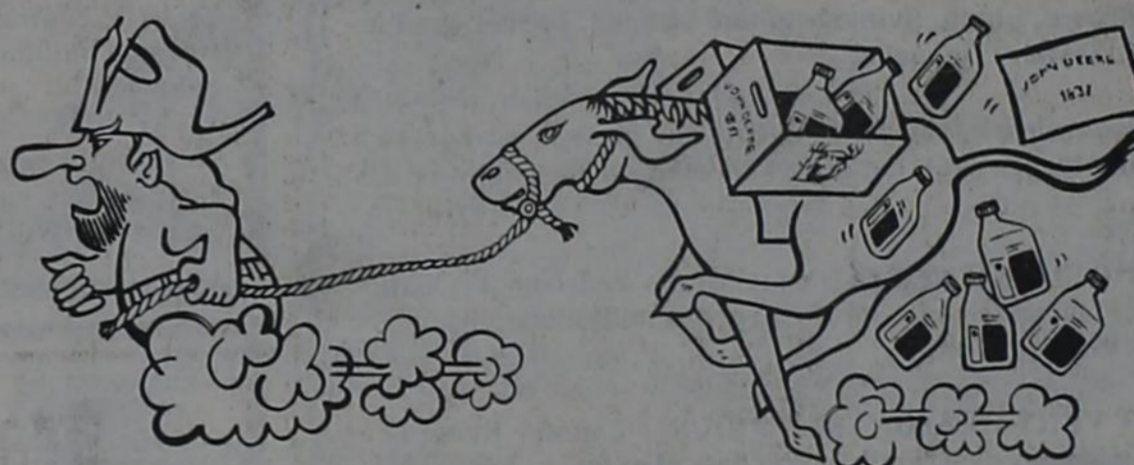

Dolls give a history lesson

lie. Looking at some of the older dolls becomes a kind of history lesson.

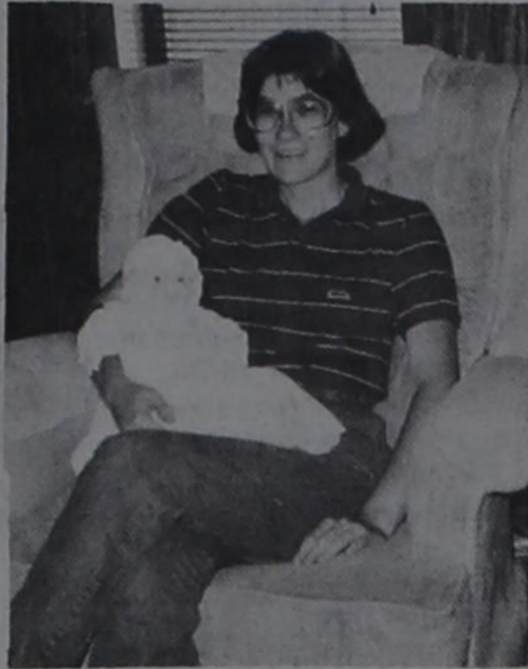
For example, there is one baby doll, dating approximately the turn of the century, which Ruthie's mother, Mrs. Betty Cranford of Plainview, happened upon at a flea market. The doll's head is of tin, while the hands and feet are of celluloid and the body, cloth.

Such a doll was usually outfitted with a fragile bisque head, which, after being broke, was replaced with a head of tin. The baby features blue eyes that open and close and an open mouth with teeth showing. In addition, its sandy hair is sculpted as a part of the head itself and, like the eye lashes, is painted on. The baby's christening outfit is a recent acquisition made by Shirley Wolff of Farwell.

Another of the older dolls is a Patsyette in her original clothing, made by the Effenbee Company. From the 1930's or 1940's, the doll displays a blond, glued-on wig, and is also of celluloid. Since the manufacturer is well known in collectors' circles, the doll is commonly referred to simply as "an Effenbee."

Among the several other older items is an eight-inch baby doll wearing its original baby cap and dress, a gift presented to Ruthie on her last birthday.

Some other dolls in Ruthie's collection represent various nations of the world. One wonderful source of these dolls was an uncle, a career naval man as Ruthie was growing up, who with his wife lived all over the globe. Knowing their niece's keen interest, the couple kept her

supplied with lovely creations! One unusual pair of foreign dolls sent by the relatives is a dancing Greek couple who appear almost abstract rather than realistic with their elongated, yarn-wrapped bodies. They are not fashioned to stand, but to hang. Another male doll sent while they lived in Greece features the short, white-skirted

traditional costume. Of plastic with a felt-covered head, he is truly interesting.

Other foreign dolls provided by the uncle and aunt include examples from Italy and India, a Philippine groom whose bride has somehow become lost through the years, and an Irish lad and his lassie.

Equally fascinating is the trio of Haitians acquired by Ruthie's mother while on a Caribbean cruise. In native dress, the group consists of a standing male, his mate who balances a bundle atop her head, and seated, the grandmother who calmly watches all.

However, one of Ruthie's favorite dolls of another land is the one she purchased as a youngster on a visit to Santa Fe. With his enormous eyes, the Mexican doll is almost a serape-draped caricature. Of cloth varnished to make it hard, the smiling fellow sports peasant garb, complete to the huaraches on his feet and the bucket dangling from his hand.

The remainder of Ruthie Singer's dolls representing other countries are not from the countries themselves, but were manufactured by a company specializing in collector's item dolls, Madam Alexander.

Madam Alexander dolls comprise

the majority of Ruthie's collection. She has bought few of these herself, with family and friends again providing almost all.

One fact concerning Madam Alexander dolls, though well known to collectors but somewhat surprising to the average person, is that the shop or store has no voice in what dolls it will receive. Therefore, there is no way to special order a particular doll. Often the doll enthusiast must simply wait and look, hoping to find her choice.

Ruthie's Madam Alexander foreign dolls include a discontinued model depicting Spain and others portraying young ladies from Turkey, Russia, and Holland.

Many Madam Alexanders are termed "portrait dolls," for each is

designed to represent a real or fictional person. Sleeping Beauty, Cinderella, and Alice in Wonderland symbolize the realm of fairy tales; and Scarlett O'Hara, Rebecca of Sunnybrook Farm, and the Degas Girl represent other types of fiction.

However, perhaps the most unique and most difficult to acquire are those portrait dolls in pairs. Ruthie is extremely proud of her four sets: Rhett Butler and Scarlett O'Hara, Anthony and Cleopatra, Napoleon and Josephine, and Romeo and Juliet.

In addition to the dolls already mentioned, Ruthie has many more: big dolls, little dolls, faciful dolls, pretty dolls, and some that can only be described as ugly dolls.

And, of all the dolls she owns,

what does Ruthie proclaim her favorite?

Well, she admits to being "really fond" of a big baby doll, a gift from her mother some years ago. The doll, which cries when turned face downward, used to be kept on Ruthie and Gary's bed, but constant handling soiled her dainty clothing.

Now she resides with her counterpart inside the glass cabinet; that is, until the grown woman who likes to play with dolls decides to take her out!
