## Texico basketeers defeated

When a local resident brought in four copies of State Line Tribunes from the 1940s, it sure made interesting reading.

The big thing during the war (World War II, for you young'uns) was the War Bond Drive.

I wonder if this poem helped collect subscribers:

### POOR MARY!

Mary had an allotment check, She spent it for clothes and such, And when her Johnny came marching home,

For a bankroll, she hadn't much. She ignored the anxious War Bond drives,

She spent in a lavish way, It never entered her frivolous head,

That by socking bonds away She's help buy bullets for Johnny to shoot

And bring him home to stay. There are thousands of Mary's, you will say,

There's dozens that I can see, But it might not be Mary - it might even be you,

Oh, golly, it's probably me!

That poem was printed in the Nov. 23, 1944 edition. And, yes, the main headline on Page 1 dealt with the bond schedule outlined by the Parmer County War Finance Committee, headed by G.D. Anderson.

Another Page 1 story dealt with the Armed Services' induction. It began with:

"Fulfilling a prediction made several months ago by the Parmer County local board that virtually every able-bodied man under 26 years of age would have to be inducted into the armed services to meet the county's quota, the local board reclassified a number of young men in that age group to meet future calls.

"Faced with the problem of meeting the induction call for December, which is considerably heavier than had been anticipated, the local board called up all its single men under 30 and then dipped into the married men and father groups to meet the demand."

The Mens Club had a most interesting meeting. They were working on getting caution lights installed along Highway 70 through Farwell. That worked out well.

Then there were the advertisements.

A farm sale bid for an 80-acre farm just northwest of Muleshoe offered sows, cows, yearlings, turkey hens, gobblers and leghorn hens. Also, you could get 65 sacks of Irish potatoes, 209 bales of Alfalfa hay, 2 good chicken coops, and a steel pig trough.

The farm sale had some goodies to offer: dinner was served at noon and free coffee was available - but you had to bring your own cup.

The Roberts Seed Co. of Texico wanted grain. So did the Lariat Grain & Seed Co., not to mention the Lariat Elevator Co.

The Farwell Cafe said they "have good sandwiches. No paper-thin fillings in our sandwiches. They are tasty, satisfying and with a glass of milk make almost a meal."

There also was a sports story, on the Texico-Ranchvale basketball games. Take a look at how sports stories were 40 years ago:

"Final score of the girls' game stood at 10 points in favor of the Ranchvale sextette, the tally being 15-25. Coach Viola Rodewald reported that the game was close during the last half, but the local guards had allowed the Ranchvale forwards to pile up a lead in the first half which the local basketeers could not overcome.

"The boy's game, so rough that it resembled football more than the cage game, was a walk-over for Texico, with Johnson going hot to lead the team to a 43-20 victory, pegging in 20 of the local points himself. White was the second in the county for Texico, making a generous score of 17."

## Mayor Gikas issues progress report

When Chris Gikas took the helm as Farwell's mayor last month, he opened with a flurry of activity. With a month under his belt, he issued this report on the items he had announced as priorities at the April City Council meeting.

**ANIMALS RUNNING LOOSE**  
We have reinitiated the city ordinances concerning animals. You cannot have a dog that is unlicensed, unvaccinated or running loose at any time.

We have begun issuing citations against people where there is a chronic problem. Last week, City Animal Warden Doug Landrum issued three warning tickets.

The first citation is a warning. The second can lead to a \$25 fine if found guilty by the county judge. The third can lead to a \$200 fine if found guilty.

We have a problem with animals running loose. Dogs are chasing people. One elderly man recently had to defend himself with a knife. We understand that dogs sometimes get loose, but if we get multiple complaints against an owner, we must take care of the situation.

Licensing is being enforced. You can get a license for \$2 at City Hall. First, you need to show that your dog has been vaccinated.

By the time school lets out, we want to see all dogs vaccinated. And we are in the process of arranging for a vet to conduct rabies shots here.

**RAILROAD TRACKS**  
I want to stress that I will not stand on the tracks nor obstruct the tracks in any way. But we want the tracks over the highway between Texico and Farwell repaired.

Some minor repairs have been done by the New Mexico and Texas highway departments in the past week. And John Getz is helping me contact Santa Fe division officials.

**ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT**  
I plan to use Farwell Development Corp. as the spearhead in this area.

Toward that end, I have called a meeting for 7:30 p.m. CDT May 15 at City Hall. I invite all members of Farwell Development to it, along with other persons interested in serving in this area. Particularly, I hope to see the chairmen of each of Farwell Development's committees.

One committee, under the direction of Frances Kube, is in charge of beautification. Cleanup Week has been set for May 5-10. If any person wants a heavy object removed from their property, they should call City Hall.

Also, the Planning and Zoning Committee has been reactivated under Ricky Stewart. They gave a report last week on a zoning variance request and have acted on two building permits.

**HONORING RESIDENTS AND ORGANIZATIONS**

We're having certificates printed by Chick Taylor in Clovis right now. Once we get them, we will begin this program. We would like residents' recommendations on which persons and groups should be honored. Just drop off your suggestions at City Hall.

**CITY EMPLOYEES**

I had said I would spend time working with the city employees and I have tried to do so. I meet each Monday with the employees. Doug Landrum and I have spent a lot of time planning out the new city landfill.

**CITY LANDFILL**

Some people are illegally dumping at the old and new landfills and they are creating a problem for us with the federal government. We stand a chance of losing our landfill if this continues. If we catch anyone illegally dumping, we will push for a maximum fine since they are jeopardizing our license.

If you want to dump some thing at the landfill, just call City Hall first. It's not expensive and it will be explained where to properly dump. The fee ranges from \$2 on up. We need to charge a fee to cover the cost of our maintenance.

We plan to do a lot of landscaping, especially around the lake there. We envision this area as a future city park.

Also, I have met with the engineer on the proposed city sewer plant project. Approval is expected from the state this month.

## Norton, Roberts, Smith are primary winners

Parmer County's primary elections were held Saturday and the Republican turnout was especially strong.

Apparently, the GOP had a larger-than-normal turnout due to the fact that Kent Hance, former 19th District Representative, was seeking the gubernatorial nomination. Although Hance did well in Parmer, he was swamped statewide by former Gov. Bill Clements.

When the Texico High School awards program is conducted May 15, students will receive plaques instead of certificates.

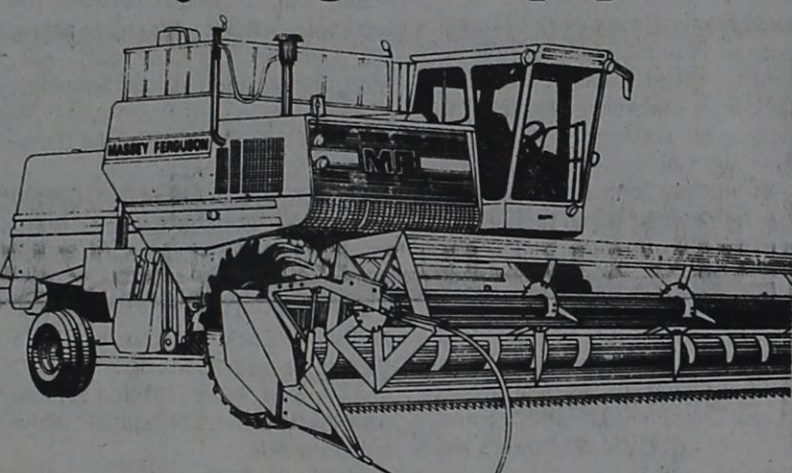
The engraved plaques will carry photos of the students, along with a recital of their academic honors.

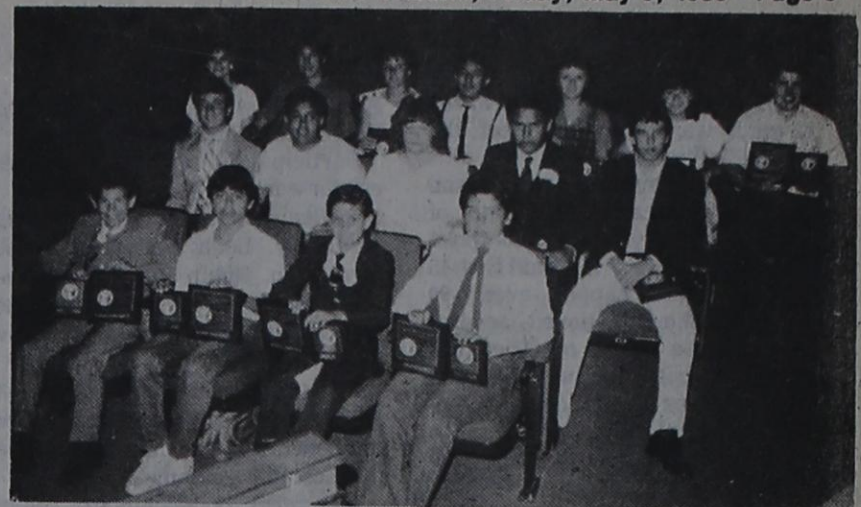

# Houston departs to New Orleans for medical treatment

1836: FRIDAY, MAY 6. General Sam Houston yesterday turned over command of the Texas Army to Secretary of War Thomas J. Rusk, now promoted to the rank of Brigadier General. It is understood that General Houston will depart for New Orleans to seek medical attention for his wounded leg. In his farewell order to the army announcing Rusk's appointment, he noted that "circumstances connected with the battle of the 21st render our separation for the present unavoidable." Of Rusk he said: "I confide in his valor, his patriotism, and his wisdom. His conduct in the Battle of San Jacinto was sufficient to insure your confidence and regard."

General Houston warned the army: "The enemy, though retreating, are still within the limits of Texas. Their situation being known to you, you cannot be taken by surprise."

1836: MONDAY, MAY 9. Today after considerable delay, the Mexican armies succeeded in crossing to the right bank of the swollen Colorado River at Atasco Sito. Because of high water and mud, they have been unable to reach Cayce's Ferry. It is expected to be at least five days more before they reach Victoria.

The movements of the Mexicans, now under the command of General Vincente Filisola since the capture of their former commander, General Antonio Lopez de Santa Anna, are being carefully monitored by Texian scouts. The reports of Colonel Juan N. Seguin have been especially useful. General Filisola, on April 23, received news from fugitives fleeing the battlefield of their overwhelming defeat. He assumed that General Santa Anna had been killed, and immediately decided to fall back. On April 25, he was at Mrs. Powell's, on the road to Victoria some 15 miles from Fort Bend. There he was joined by the divisions

under General Goana, Urrea and Sesma, bringing the total to 4078 men.

The generals held a council of war and decided to fall back to Victoria. Their men are in dire need of food and clothing. They have had no bread for many days, and a large number of soldiers are barefoot. They have no blankets for the cold nights. They have been unable to find any support in a hostile country during the weeks of delay forced on them by General Sam Houston's policy of retreat.

The move to Victoria was begun on April 27. They had still not received the Santa Anna order to retreat, written on April 22. It was delivered on April 28 by the Texian scout, Colonel Erastus "Deaf" Smith, who was informed by Filisola that the order would be respected. General Adrian Woll was dispatched to report this to Santa Anna. Woll is currently being detained by the Texans until the Mexican retreat is complete.

Because of heavy rains, flooding and deep mud, the Mexicans have found it necessary to abandon many wagons, artillery, and much of their baggage. The large number of women accompanying the Mexican has also slowed its movement.

It is understood that General Filisola will dispatch General Urrea with 800 troops to Matamoros in

case there is an uprising there by Federalist opponents of the Centralist government when news of Santa Anna's capture arrives. It has also been learned that the Mexican Colonel Alcercica and his battalion at Matagorda retreated by sea to Matamoros without waiting for orders, as soon as news arrived of Santa Anna's defeat.

1837: FRIDAY, MAY 5. The second session of the First Texas Congress, unable to form a quorum on May 1, met again today under temporary cover in the still unfinished capitol building in Houston City. The arrival of Congressmen from Nacogdoches provided the necessary quorum.

In his message to the Congress, President Sam Houston stated: "We now occupy the proud attitude of a sovereign and independent Republic, which will impose upon us the obligation of evincing to the world that we are worthy to be free." Much of his address dealt with the problem of finances. An auditor's report last September showed a debt of more than \$250,000, plus bills for supplies amounting to \$500,000, a similar amount due to the army and navy, and \$100,000 due government employees, totalling more than \$1,350,000. With the United States in the throes of a major money panic, and many banks failing, Texas has been unable to procure loans. The sale of land scrip has been suspended because of widespread frauds. In short, the Republic is virtually bankrupt. The major problem facing Congress this ses-

sion is how to obtain revenue.

1840: SATURDAY, MAY 9. Today in Marion, Perry County, Alabama, General Sam Houston of the Republic of Texas was joined in marriage with Margaret Lea, daughter of Mrs. Nancy Lea. The ceremony took place at the estate of the bride's brother, Henry Lea. General Houston is 47 and his wife is 20.

General Houston, former president of the Republic, has had a remarkable career. Born in Virginia, his family moved to a farm on the Tennessee frontier when he was 14. While there, he lived for three years with the Cherokee Indians of East Tennessee. He became the adopted son of the well-known Cherokee Chief Oo-loo-te-ka, and was given the Indian name "Black Raven." He served in the United States regular army during the War of 1812, and was wounded twice in the Battle of Horseshoe Bend.

He originally planned to make the army a career, but disappointed in promotion, he resigned his first lieutenant's commission in 1817 and studied law. He was admitted to the Tennessee bar, and came to the attention of General Andrew Jackson, with whose help he was elected to the United States Congress in 1823. He was also appointed Adjutant General of the Tennessee Militia, with the rank of Colonel. He was elected Governor of Tennessee in

1827. In January, 1829, he married Eliza Allen of a prominent Tennessee family. In April of that year they separated, for reasons that have never been made public, and his wife returned to her family. Houston has never commented on this separation. His wife apparently never sued for divorce, and eventually, on November 30, 1833, Houston, then a resident of San Augustine, applied for a divorce to the "Free State of Coahuila and Texas, District of Ayish." A divorce was

finally granted in April, 1837, by Judge Shelby Corzine of the District Court of East Texas in San Augustine.

Immediately after the departure of his first wife, Houston resigned his office, and lived for 3 years with his adopted Cherokee tribe.

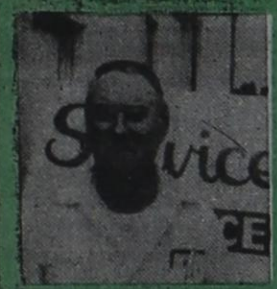

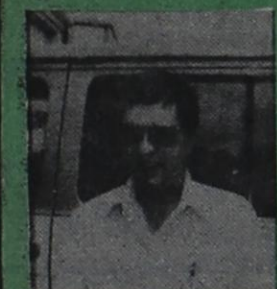

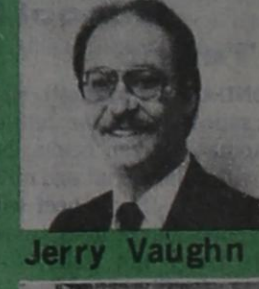
