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## Burtons go through some rough times

Lynn Burton, Farwell High School Principal, has recently returned home from the Methodist Hospital in San Antonio after an extensive stay of 62 days and having undergone two surgeries.

Burton and music director Ron McWilliams had traveled to San Antonio to attend the annual music convention there. Burton had been attending this convention every year for the last 20 years and had thoroughly enjoyed it. But this trip turned out a little different.

Burton woke up Saturday morning, not feeling well. He felt a stinging sensation inside and was sick throughout the rest of the day. By the end of the day he had doubled over in pain.

Then, when Sunday morning came, he was still sick and he and McWilliams decided he should seek medical attention. Burton was taken to one hospital in San Antonio. They looked him over, took blood samples and let him go.

By Sunday afternoon, Burton felt so sick that his wife's aunt, Doris Mock, decided that Burton should go to another hospital. She and Cheryl took him to Methodist Hospital. This was on Feb. 15. Tests indicated that Burton could have gallstones. Surgery was scheduled and a gall bladder operation was performed Feb. 21.

Burton said, "When they opened me up to remove the stones, they found what the doctors thought to be one of the worst cases of pancreatitis they had ever seen. Fluid had built around the pancreas and a pseudocyst, or false cyst, had formed an obstruction to the release of pancreatic fluids. This form of cyst consists of enzymes and toxins that gather at a certain point and form a cyst."

A second surgery seemed inevitable if they were unable to get the fluid to drain from the pancreas. Burton said doctors decided that surgery would have to be performed, but they would wait until the cyst reached a mature state.

The second surgery was scheduled for March 21. Burton said, "They made an opening in the top of my stomach and connected the cyst to the stomach. The doctors were concerned after the surgery and were afraid that I might have a blockage. Doctors told me later that about 50 percent of patients with pancreatitis don't make it."

Cheryl Burton's uncle, Ben Mock, who is a chaplain at the Methodist Hospital, told Cheryl later that Burton almost didn't make it through the last surgery. Burton said, "I was never really concerned, because I knew that God was with me."

"After the surgery, tubes for the drainage were put into me and a pin roll bag was used to count the ounces of liquid I was obtaining," he said.

Burton then was fed Vionex through a tube into his intestines to keep his strength up until he could eat normally again. Burton said that Vionex is the food the astronauts eat while they are in flight.

Burton did not have to take any blood during either surgery and the doctors used a cauterized knife that would seal off the veins and stop the bleeding as he operated.

Before the doctors did surgery, Burton had to have preliminary testing. They had

had to get the infection down before they could operate. At one time Burton was taking 15 antibiotics and undergoing a catscan once a week.

Burton's doctors were Dr. Cohen, who was his surgeon through both surgeries, and Dr. Larry Hoberman, his gastro-internologist. Burton said that the doctors were great and that they came by to see him almost every day. Burton said he thought the hospital he had been in was probably one of the best he had ever been in. "The nurses treated me with kid gloves and the food was real good."

Burton said that he had an upper Gastro Intestinal x-ray the last Monday he was at the hospital and that the doctors told him that everything was working well.

Burton said that once the numbness had pretty well gone and the drainage had stopped from his incision, the healing began and that everything had healed from the inside.

In the hospital he had started out on a strict liquid diet, then had progressed to a full liquid diet and later to a soft food diet. Now, though he says he can't eat as much, he has already indulged in Mexican and Chinese food.

Burton said he had had a lot of cards from all over and that he and Cheryl had put them on the walls in his hospital room. They received one large card from Farwell High School with all the student, teacher, and administration names on it; a card from the junior high classes and their teachers; a large card from the elementary teachers and cards from many individuals.

He and Cheryl also received phone calls from friends.

"We received lots of prayers from Tucumcari, Roswell, Clovis and Farwell friends," said Burton, "and we couldn't have got by without everyone's prayers, concern and the Lord's presence."

Burton said that he really appreciated the faculty for the work they had done in his absence and he appreciated Toby Booth for coming in and taking over for him.

"I'm glad to be back and feeling better. When I first got back to Farwell, I said I sure am glad to be back in God's country. Being away as I was sure did make me appreciate my friends, and family more."

"One good thing did come out of our being in San Antonio," said Burton. "Cheryl got to know her aunt and uncle a lot better." [Cheryl stayed with her aunt and uncle while Burton was in the hospital.]

Burton says he could not have made it through the ordeal had it not been for Cheryl's encouragement.

The Burtons have made plans for the future starting with reworking the inside of their house. They plan to go back to San Antonio in June for Burton's checkup. "The doctors hope the swelling will be down from all the surgery and in the pancreas by that time."

Burton will undergo another catscan then and the Burtons will be off to Dallas for a meeting and a short vacation.

Burton is now down to 200 pounds and plans to keep the weight off. He does not advise this kind of diet, though. He said that he has been exercising daily and while he was in the hospital he and Cheryl took long walks.

Burton is not on any medication and will not have to take insulin. The doctors said that in this type of illness some patients develop a diabetes, but Burton said that his blood sugar level has stayed the same throughout his illness. Burton is taking some nutritional supplements.

Cheryl's philosophy is that, "Hardships just tend to build your faith." She and her husband also noted that they or the doctors never gave any doubt that he would make it fine.

Burton plans to go back to work at the school following his doctors okay and will start out working half-days.

These games ended the season.

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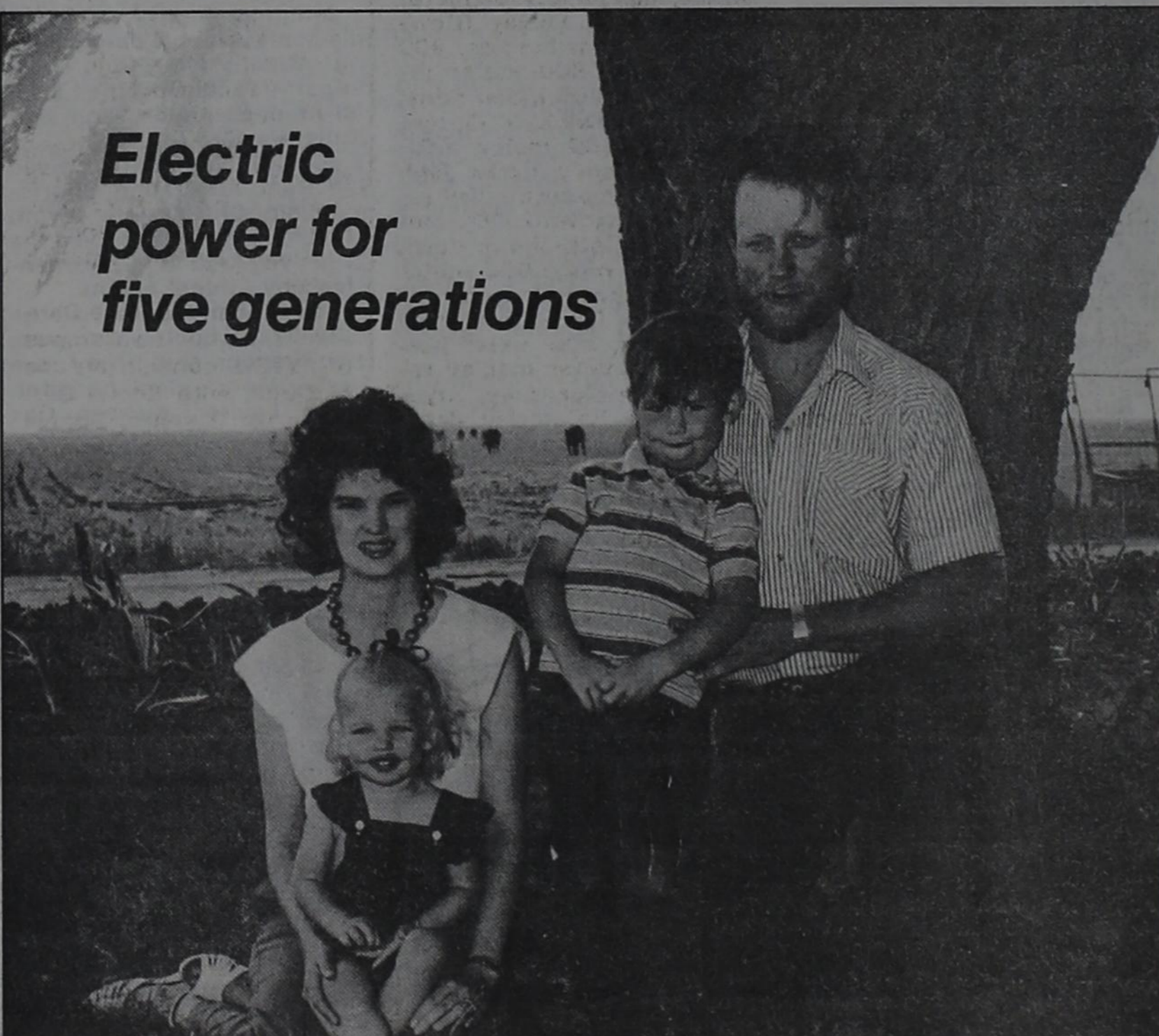

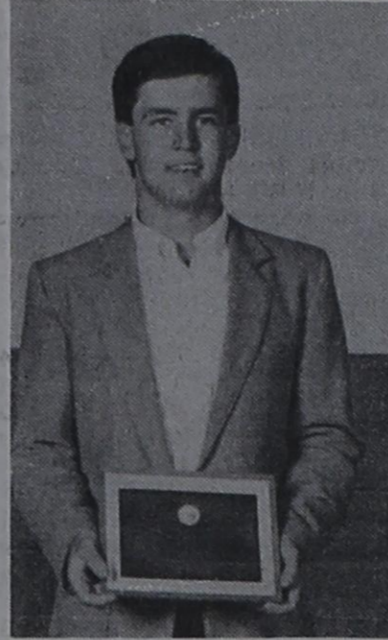

The State Survey Team were with us Monday and Tuesday on a two day inspection of all services provided by the Nursing Home.

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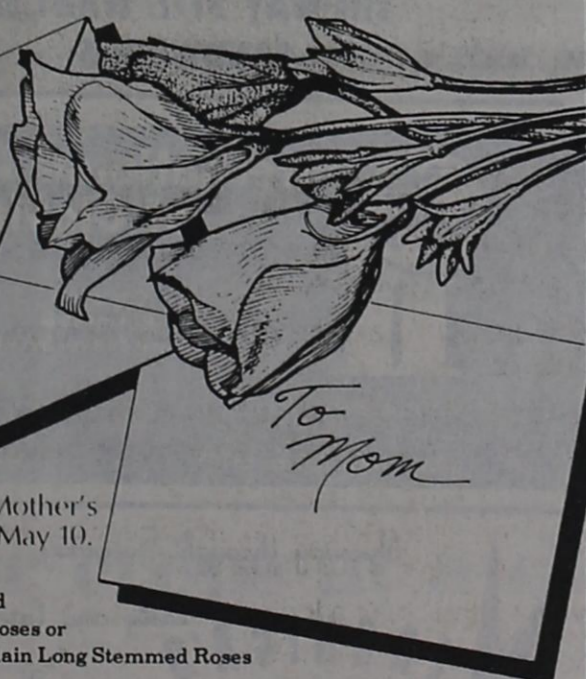
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# Texico band awards presented

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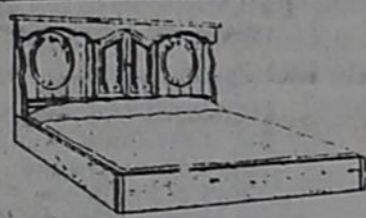

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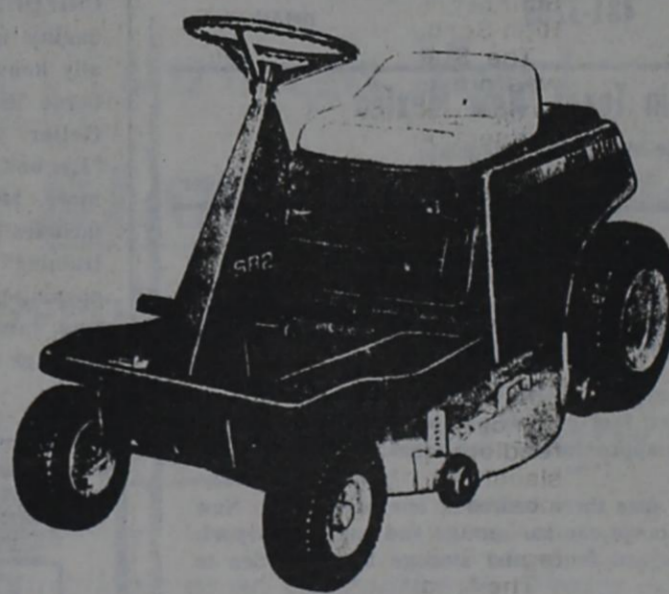

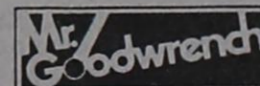

## Recipe of Week

A great idea for leftover ham. Try this recipe when you want a gourmet delight with little preparation time.

1 slice ham, 1 1/2 pounds—cut 2 inches thick 1/4 c firmly packed brown sugar whole cloves 1 16 oz. can whole peeled apricots

Remove any fat around the slice of ham. Place in a shallow baking pan. Sprinkle with sugar and stud the sides with cloves.

Drain the apricot juice. Pour 1/3 cup of juice over the ham. Bake at 325 degrees for one hour, basting often with the juice in the pan. Arrange the drained apricots on top of the ham and bake 15 minutes longer, or until richly glazed.
