## Difference in cultures

Judy and I had a most enjoyable weekend last week -- we attended the 3rd annual national convention of the Native Americans Press Association in Albuquerque.

It was our first trip to Albuquerque and we enjoyed the usual sightseeing, the museums, cultural pueblo center, Ysleta Pueblo, Old Town, etc.

Actually, it was the first time I had headed west of Clovis further than Cannon Air Force Base, and the first time I was north of the ENMR building on Prince Street! And what helped make the trip enjoyable were the newly-posted 65 mph signs on Interstate 40.

At the convention, I put on a workshop, one of many given for the journalists. Except for meeting one or two Native Americans (aka Indians) over the years, it was the first time I had a chance to converse with many at one time.

It was interesting to see the difference in cultures and hear their perspective on events, both modern and past. Today's tribes are involved in a lot of litigation with federal and state governments over water, fishing and hunting rights, and land.

One man who also was a workshop leader was representative of the choices a young Native American has to make. This fellow is only 23 years old and is very talented as a graphic designer.

I asked him about his ambitions since it seemed to me he could have a fine future on large magazines or newspapers with a little bit more experience.

He told me he had no desire to do that. Instead, he prefers to stay on his tribal reservation near Edmonton, Canada, and work with his people.

I have a feeling that type of pull -- ambition in the "white" world vs. staying on the reservation -- is one faced by many Native Americans.

A lot of folks got a big chuckle each time I told them I was from Texico-Farwell, a place they had never heard of. The other workshop leaders were from places like Los Angeles, Boston, Washington, New York, etc. And then there was this fella from Texico-Farwell.

One lady, though, did know where we were. She was on a scheduled plane trip to Dallas once, but due to weather problems, the plane was diverted to Clovis and the passengers had to board a bus. Thus, she traveled through our fine community that day.

However, I was very kind to all those folks who hadn't heard of our metropolis. To each one I said, "Next time, you pass through Texico-Farwell, don't hesitate to stop and say hello."

That usually brought on some mumbling about "off the beaten path" or something.

The tribal newspapers, all of which are weekly or monthly, are normally run by tribal councils. That means the editor is responsible to a government board for what is, or isn't, printed in the newspaper. You can imagine the problem that emanates from government interference in culture. Tribal leaders often view the role of the newspapers to be one of championing Indian causes, since they see the white-controlled media as an antagonist.

Few Native Americans have positions on mainstream newspapers although efforts are being made to increase those numbers. Once those numbers increase, mainstream media will be more sensitive to Native American issues because of it.

That will be good.

## Future water situation is topic

Mayor Chris Gikas made a strong statement at Tuesday's Farwell City Council for working with the New Mexico-based Ute Lake Water Authority on future water needs.

He emphasized that the city must look way down the road and insure its vitality 20 and 30 years from now. That means the water availability must be ensured, too.

Gikas has been attending meetings of the Eastern Plains Council of Governments, a group of New Mexico governments. If the costs can be handled, Gikas advised the council that the city should be a member of the Water Authority.

"Then, when water lines are built down the road, Farwell can use them," he said.

No action was taken after the discussion except that the costs for participating will be checked into.

In other business, John Good, district manager for Waste Control, said he would like to offer trash removal service on an individual basis to Farwell residents and businesses but he would need to use the Farwell landfill to do so. He offered to pay a fee to cover that usage.

Gikas explained that the city is allowed to burn its trash, since it's too small to qualify for the non-burning provisions of the Clean Air Act. If trash were to be put in the landfill, it would have to be compacted and baled. "We can't use the landfill for just compacting solid waste material," he explained.

Thus, it appears Good will not be able to use the Farwell city landfill. Waste Control is not allowed to pick up Texas trash and haul it to the Clovis landfill.

The council also: --Approved a sewer use ordinance. Fees for residential customers will stay about the same.

--Decided to personally view the streets and alleys before meeting to decide which need repairs under this year's program.

--Discussed repairing or buying new street signs. The city has received one estimate of \$54 for new signs and \$47 for repainting. It was suggested that some signs be replaced this year and the rest later. City Clerk-Treasurer Janie Bowery will check into prices before a decision is made.

--Received a progress report on the sewer plant. A change order has been filed to allow the contractor more working days due to the changed shape of the pond near the old dump pit. The contractor is behind schedule but has indicated he will be back on schedule in three

## Reserve game habitat shelter belt begun

Carthon and Charles Phillips have collaborated together to put in a Conservation Reserve Game Habitat Shelter Belt of over 400 small trees on the Phillips place east of the Farwell Feed Yard.

The Farwell Feed Yard is cooperating in this effort by furnishing a

water tap of over 7,000 feet of plastic drip line to nourish the trees during the first two or three years.

Carthon Phillips said that to his knowledge this was one of the first conservation reserves to be put in this area. Others are putting in

weeks. If the work is completed after the schedule is done, the city would be liable for certain fees. --Discussed reviewing and updating ordinances on keeping and bearing arms, and disturbing the peace, to bring them in line with state and federal laws.

--Heard Gikas say that a house at Ave. B and Sixth Street is to be put up for sale by the sheriff. The city has told the sheriff that the city wishes to buy it, demolish it and fill in the basement, and then put it up for sale, said the mayor.

The council then discussed another old building at Fifth Street and Ave. G that they would like to demolish. But the city doesn't have a condemnation ordinance.

--Heard councilman Elizabeth Phillips say that she has had complaints of dust blowing in from a nearby feed lot. Gikas suggested she contact County Commissioner Robert White since the city has no jurisdiction over the feed yard.

--Heard Gikas say that he told the EPCOG representatives how the city was using ash to upgrade its alleys, and several plan to come to Farwell to see them. They are planning to use the same idea.

--Approved purchasing 15 pairs of fire-resistant bunker pants for the fire department.

--Heard Gikas say that the city might need to support financially sending city firemen to an Emergency Medical Technician school.

Under a new law, two EMTs must man the ambulance when used. Currently Farwell only has one qualified EMT, with 10 attending school.

Gikas noted that Farwell doesn't charge for ambulance service. He said he needs to find out if the new state law applies to small communities like Farwell.

--Heard Gikas compliment councilman Curtis Smith for suggesting the idea last year of buying the WEPS fire unit. The one Farwell purchased was the last one available from the Forest Service, although plans are available whereby communities can build their own units.

The vehicle uses a foamy soap to put out small fires. A half-gallon of water would be all that was needed to put out a kitchen fire, for example.

--Agreed to send letters to operators of large trucks telling them not to park their vehicles continually on city streets. Gikas said the city might need a parking lot for them.

## Texico approves license ordinance

The Texico City Council Tuesday approved a licensing ordinance.

Examples of the fee schedule are: Carnivals and circuses, \$300 per day; fortune tellers, palm readers, mediums, etc., \$150 per month; fruit and vegetable peddlers doing business at a temporary location, \$25 per year; pawnshops, \$250 per year.

Distress sales, \$50 per sale; prize-fights and wrestling, \$100 per day; and special sales, \$100 per sale.

The ordinance also includes the usual \$25 registration fees for city businesses.

In other business, the council had a lengthy discussion on the need to repair city streets, curbs and gutters. The council would like an in-depth program instead of the patch-work done in recent years but lacks the funds.

Various bond issues were discussed. The idea of some cities paying half the cost for curb and

gutter work if the resident agrees to pay the rest was broached.

"We need more money for streets," said councilman Butch Tharp. "We are going to lose parts of some of our streets unless we do something."

City Clerk - Treasurer Marie Christian said state funds are very tight for such projects.

City Attorney Duane Hamar suggested that meetings be held to get the community involved and a long-term approach taken, which would include fixing one section of the city at a time.

The council decided to drive the city streets, then meet again to decide which streets need repairs. Also, they will ask Clovis contractor Johnny Eastwood to give them estimates on how much it would cost for a long-term program of paving streets and building curbs and gutters.

The council also:

--Discussed a curb cutting ordinance. The language will be changed to include having a city representative supervise such jobs done by residents.

--Approved the fire department budget.

--Discussed with Mr. and Mrs. Larry Bryant, of Anderson Street, a cleanup of some items on their property. The councilmen will check on the cleanup and discuss it again at the next meeting April 28.

--Heard Drew Nolan, of Clovis, apply for the city marshal's job. He was a policeman for nine years, he said. The city currently has a temporary marshal since the resignation of Dave Wheeler.

--Heard Mrs. Christian say she will attend the New Mexico Municipal League district meeting April 23 in Santa Rosa.

## Johnson to head Farwell School Board

Doyle Johnson was elected Tuesday as president of the Farwell School Board.

Richard Haseloff was elected vice president and Ed Corn, secretary. New board member Roberta Johnson has been sworn in.

The board discussed the problem of drug abuse in today's society. They haven't seen visible signs in the Farwell Schools.

The board instructed Supt. John Grigsby to begin a study that includes checking into the possibility of using dogs that can sniff out drugs. Such dogs are used in the Friona Schools four times a month and in the Bovina Schools twice a month.

The idea is not to catch and punish kids, said Grigsby, but it's a signal to keep drugs out of school.

In other business, the board: --Tentatively okayed the elementary and junior high budgets.

--Applied to the state for a class size waiver. The first grade class maximum is 24 and Farwell now has 25 first graders. Tina Sides has been hired as an aide.

--Agreed to use the interest from

the county school fund, which is received each year, for dedication to the capital improvement fund.

--Heard a report from Charles Turner, county special education director, on new school laws involving dyslexia. Schools are man-

The Texico School Board Tuesday sold its \$410,000 school improvement bonds to the First National Bank of Clovis, which bid 6.29 percent interest. It was the low bidder.

Other bidders were Eppler, Gueron and Turner, of Albuquerque; Citizens Bank of Clovis, and Dean Witter and Reynolds, of Dallas. The paying agent will be Sunwest Bank of Albuquerque.

The interest total places the tax increase within the percentage indicated before the bond election, said School Supt. James Pierce.

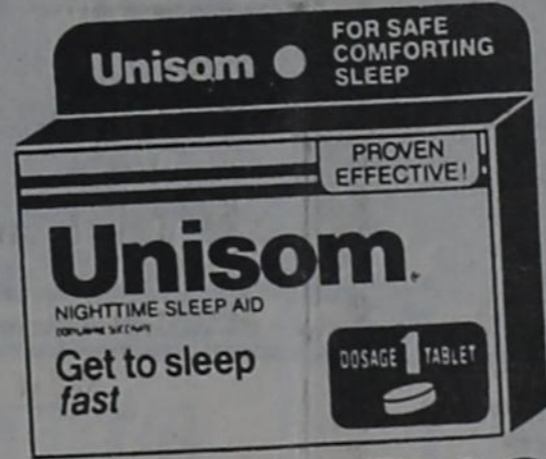

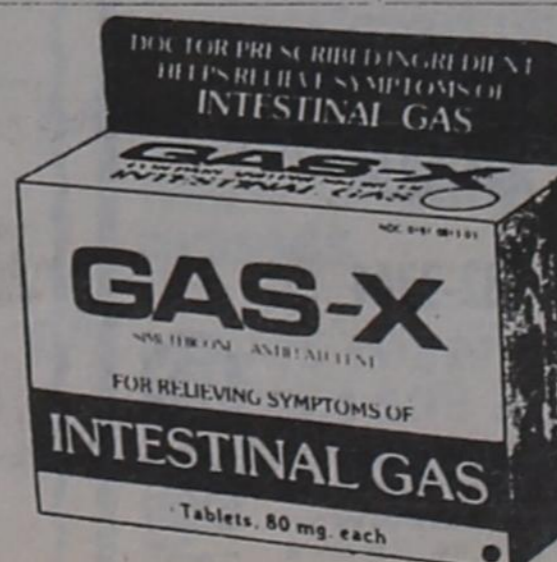

## Poisons, AIDS discussed

He said the most important thing to do is to call the Poison Control Center to get expert advice on treatment of poison victims. In Texas the number is 1-800-392-8548. In New Mexico the number is 1-800-432-6866.

The experts often tell callers to administer syrup of ipecac to induce vomiting or activated charcoal to absorb the poison or epsom salts to induce a laxative effect. All of these are available at your local pharmacy. He stressed the fact that only an expert at the poison control center would know what to do with the multitude of potential poisons.

Breckenridge spent a few minutes discussing the symptoms and dangers of the spread of AIDS. The AIDS hotline number is 1-800-443-0366. This number will give the most up-to-date information concerning AIDS and the proper place to turn for medical assistance.

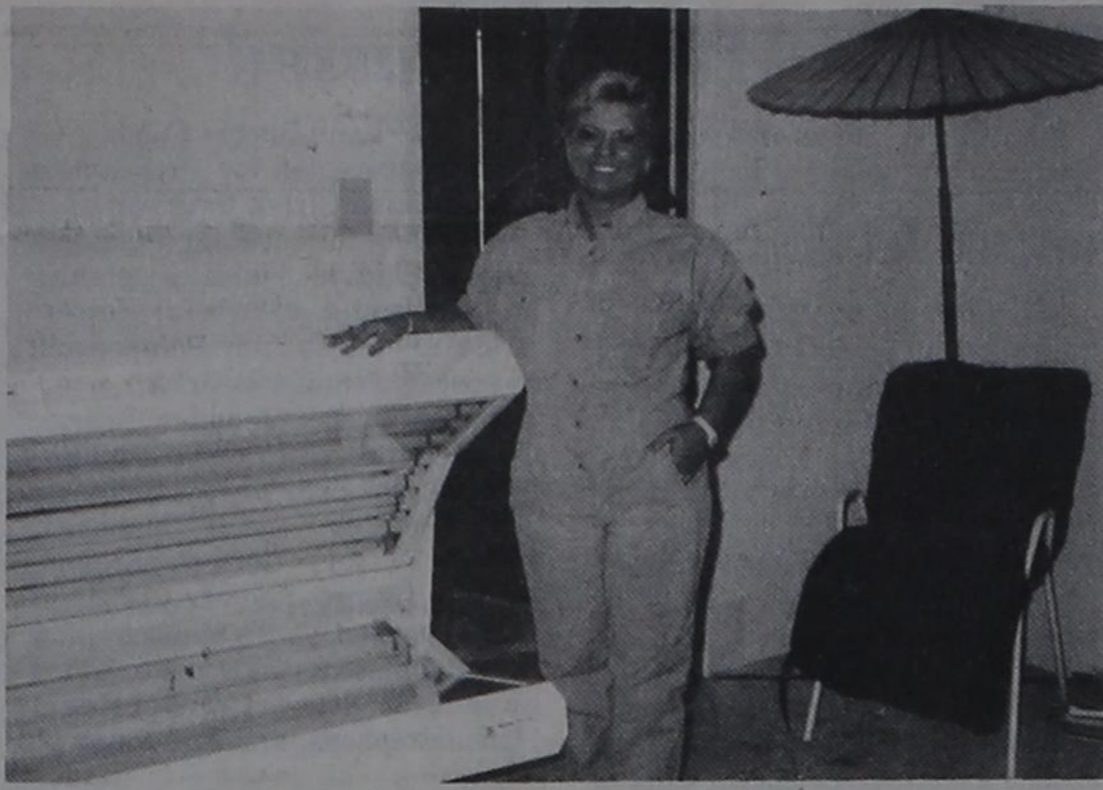

The athletes' parents will furnish homemade ice cream, pies, cakes and other baked goods along with coffee, tea or Coke to sell at the lift-a-thon.

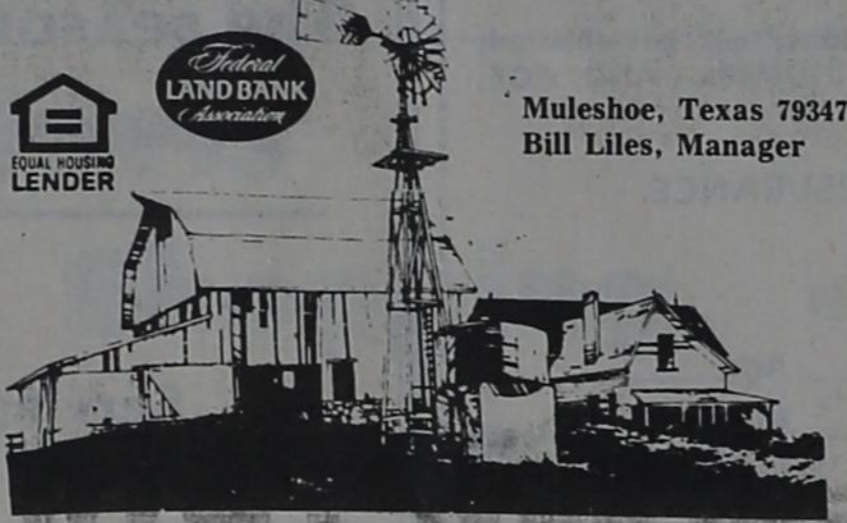

**Railroad signals okayed**

The Parmer County Commissioners Monday voted to install railroad signals near the grain elevator in Lariat.

Lonnie McFarland recommended the installation, after pointing out safety problems at the crossing.

This means the county will spend \$5,000 toward the project. The state will also spend a matching total. The other 90 percent is federal funds.

The commissioners also discussed whether signals were needed east of Black (near Cattle town) but held off on a decision.

In other business, three bids were awarded:

--Reeve Chevrolet was low bidder for a sheriff's car, with a trade-in figure of \$11,283. Friona Ford also

bid.

--Yellowhouse Machinery was low bidder for a backhoe tractor for Pct. 2, with a trade-in figure of \$36,158. West Texas Equipment also bid.

--Yellowhouse was low bidder for a 6-wheel drive grader for Pct. 4, with a trade-in figure of \$52,050. West Texas Equipment and Waukesha-Pearce also bid.

The commissioners approved the list of Parmer County Child Welfare Board members.

A \$75 utility bill was paid for an indigent Farwell woman.

The commissioners received a communication from Texico about drainage ditch problems along State Line Road. Commissioner Robert White will check into it.
