Enough is enough

Well, another American has been taken hostage in Lebanon.

I guess I'm supposed to be angry. Irate. Mad.

But I'm not. In fact, I'm not going to run down to the store and buy a yellow ribbon to tie around the tree in front of my house.

What the heck are any Americans doing in that war-torn nation? And I use the word "nation" loosely.

All the hostages that the Arab revolutions are holding all were taken well after the U.S. government told all Americans in Lebanon to leave due to the lack of government control in that country.

Most did. Some didn't. They didn't because they felt they were part of the community, such as American University teachers in Beirut, and had little to fear.

That was their choice. At the time, I felt they were dumb to do it. I guess they would agree with my right now.

I feel badly about Lebanon, once called the Switzerland of the Middle East.

It had always been on shaky grounds, with an uneasy peace between Moslems and Christians. But they had a pretty good government formula worked out, based on population percentages.

Then two things happened. The percentages changed, and Lebanon received an influx of Palestinians who fled the new Israeli state in 1948.

The Palestinians were kept in camps and you can imagine what that caused. So it took 30 years, but finally the bubble burst. The Palestinians began seeking greater control; the native Moslems wanted more power, and government began to crumble.

Which brings us to the divided nation of today: divided between Druze, between Maronite Christians, between Palestinians, between Sunite Moslems, between Shiite Moslems and between pro-Syrians.

Syria has occupied a goodly portion of Lebanon. I believe Syria would like to annex the nation since history shows the Lebanon to be part of "Greater Syria" at certain times in the past. But I doubt Syria would like the Lebanese headache.

There's a third part to that question, though: Israel. If Syria were to annex Lebanon, it would give Syria a better advantage if war were to break out. Currently, Israel occupies the Golan Heights, formerly Syrian territory. That puts Syria at a tremendous military disadvantage.

But if Syria were to have the Lebanese border under its control, it would even out the Israeli advantage on the Golan.

Thus, I don't expect Syria to withdraw its forces from Lebanon for quite some time.

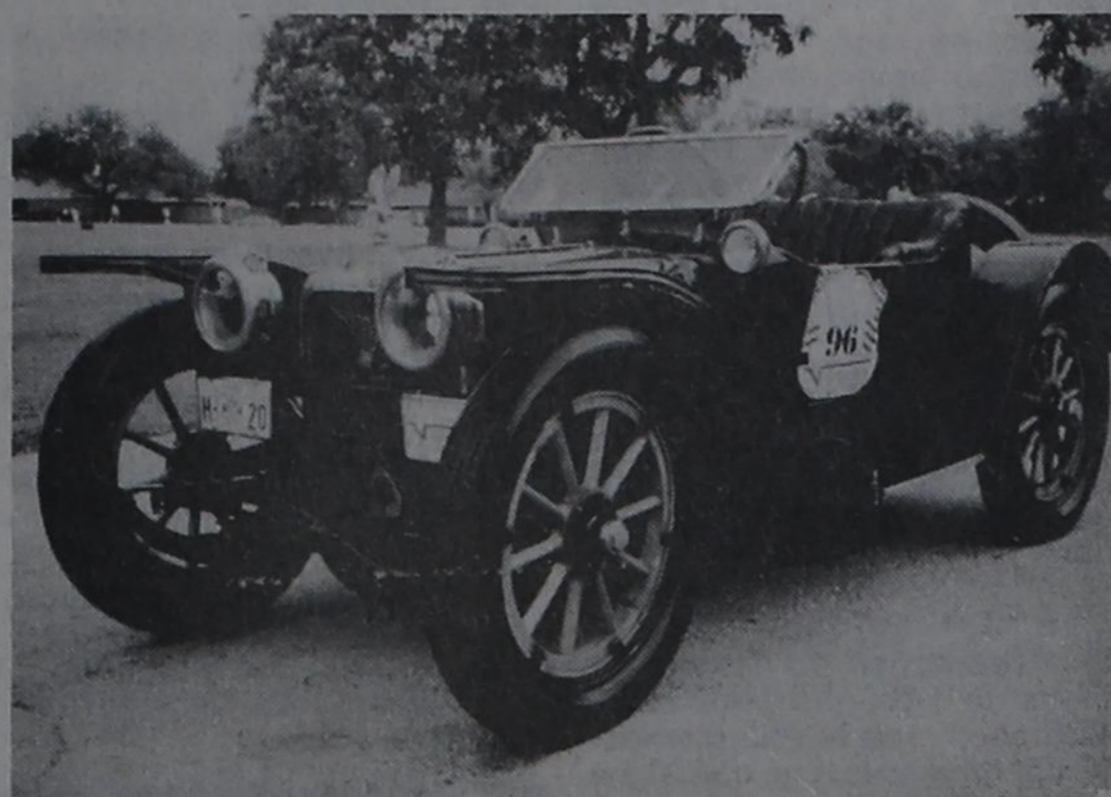
So, Lebanon, as a nation, is a mess. Yet, Americans continue to stay there, or visit there. Then there is shock and dismay over their kidnappings.

Personally, I expect every American in Lebanon to end up as a hostage. Anarchy prevails there and will continue to do so. So I can't get all excited when another kidnapping occurs. And I think the U.S. government should stay completely out of the situation.

The hostages will be released when their captors wish to do so. Pure and simple. If the U.S. shows a hands-off attitude, the captors might be able to see that holding the hostages achieves nothing.

Texico hires new city marshal

The Texico City Council Tuesday night hired a new city marshal.

Hired was Alvin Pittman, who had served as police chief at Earth, Texas, for 21 years. Pittman, 55, took over his new post Wednesday.

Pittman and his wife, Noel, have five children: Sherry Kelly, of Roswell; Becky Vinard, of Pleasanton, Texas; Debbie Overman, of Lubbock; Christy Embrey, of Earth, and Mike, at home.

Pittman will move to Texico but his wife and 16-year-old son will stay in Earth. Mike will be a senior in September and is on the varsity football and basketball teams.

His salary will be \$15,400. Mrs. Pittman is city clerk in Earth.

Mayor John R. Hadley said eight applications had been received for the job.

In other business, the council okayed rules and regulations for the Planning and Zoning Commission.

The commission was re-instituted last month after earlier attempts to get it going failed. Charlotte Pierce is chairman.

The commission will hear variance requests and give recommendations to the city council, which makes the final decision.

The commission also will inspect properties, formulate a master plan for the city, and recommend policies consistent with it.

It will meet the first Tuesday of each month at 6:30 p.m. NMDT in the community center (next to City Hall).

The council also: - Approved a contract with Curry County for the Senior Citizens group.

- Asked councilman Steve Chancy to oversee the project of moving the communications equipment from the old police car to the new one.

- Denied a claim of Dean Henninger involving cleaning the culvert along State Line Road (see other story in this newspaper).

Walling, Cox, Bass win bonuses

Mitz Walling won the \$50 bonus for bringing in the first load of wheat to Sherley Anderson Pitman in Farwell on June 15.

Fred Chandler reports that test samples have been measuring 11 1/2 - 12 % moisture content, which is good. The samples have weighed 58-61 lbs. per bushel.

"We are having a little lull right now between the early dryland samples and the irrigated land," said Chandler.

Lonnie McFarland reported that the \$50 first load bonus went to E. A. Bass. Samples have been running 10 % moisture content which is dry, and it has averaged 58 lbs. per bushel.

"Yields are down a bit this year," reported McFarland.

Scott Brown of Sherley Anderson Lazbuddie reported that Lynn Cox brought in the first load to the Lazbuddie elevator on June 13 to win their bonus.

Samples have been running 8 - 12 % moisture content, and weighing 57 1/2 - 60 lbs. per bushel.

"The samples are not real heavy this year, but they are not bad either," said Brown.

- Discussed trying to get some Santa Fe land next to Jim Burrows' property for a future water well site.

- Will check into repair of the east wall of the Community Center.

- Gave the old police car to the city fire department.

- Agreed on a mosquito spraying program.

- Heard Councilman Butch Sharp urge city residents to attend council meetings so they get interested in city government. An election for new councilmen will be next March.

- Heard Councilman Doyal LaRue say that the city 30 mph speed limits are too high and he will talk with Pittman

about this.

- Heard Councilman Bryan Kube say that the fire department is planning a bicycle safety program. Complaints were voiced of small children riding bikes in the streets.

- Heard City Attorney Duane Hamar say that he will have a revised city code ready for perusal next month. A work session was scheduled for 5:30 p.m. MDT July 20 at City Hall. It is open to the public.

- Noted that a hearing on three variance requests is set for June 26 at 6:30 p.m. MDT at City Hall. It is open to the public. In the future, such requests will be heard by the planning commission.

Quilting: Just like the old days

The Farwell Study Club is working on a quilt to be given away at the annual Bordertown Days celebration. This year's quilt was pieced together by Mrs. Pieman.

Members gather at the Study Club Rummage Sale to work on the quilt when they can find the time. The discussions which arise while the women work must be like those that their grandmothers had when they gathered to work at a quilting bee long ago.

Here are some snatches of the conversations that went on recently:

"Quilting was one of the enjoyable things they did back in the good old days. I'm old enough to remember that they weren't all that good," said Carrie Christian.

"I agree," said Julia Symcox. "Do you remember what it was like to get up on a Sunday morning? You had to get up, get breakfast, do the dishes, wring a chicken's neck, butcher and dress the bird, put it on to cook, get cleaned and dressed, and get to church."

"Right," said Gladys Hardage. "We didn't have refrigeration in those days. We had to kill the chickens the day we needed them. They wouldn't last in the heat."

"When we were first married we had about 30 chickens to care for; one night a pack of dogs got in and chased them all till they died. I never wanted to raise chickens again." Said Mrs. Symcox.

"Nowdays there are even housewives who don't know where eggs come from," quipped Mrs. Christian.

"Why, they come from a carton, of course." Mrs. Hardage rejoined.

"I'm so glad we raised the quilt stand. My back just about killed me yesterday," said Mrs. Christian.

"Well, you know we have

one member who has to sit on a cushion to reach it now. I'm sure we'll work out something," said Mrs. Hardage.

"When we get farther along, we can work on it from both sides, that will make it go faster," said Mrs. Symcox.

On the next day Eunice Crume was working in Carrie Christian's place. They had moved far enough along on the project that sewers could work from both sides at once. The topic of discussion was fund raising:

"We hope this quilt will be as successful as the one we did a few years ago," said Mrs. Crume. "It helped us raise between \$2,500-\$3,000 which we used for our projects. It was one of our best fundraisers."

"We do just about anything to raise money," said one member.

Everyone laughed, so she added, "I mean we do anything RESPECTABLE to raise money."

Mrs. Hardage remembered the box suppers and meals they had prepared at auctions, and their rummage sales which had raised money for community projects.

Quilting was the topic of discussion at another day's gathering.

"Mrs. Pieman pieced this design. You'd have to ask her what it is called," said Mrs. Symcox.

"I believe it could be called The Star of Bethlehem," said Gertrude Foster. "I had a Star of Bethlehem quilt once. It was something like this, only the pattern pieces were bigger."

"It might also be a Blazing Star," said Mrs. Atchley. "You'd have to ask Mrs. Pieman or Mildred Haseloff-they would know," said Mrs. Symcox.

"Did you know that Mrs. Pieman is over 90 years old?"

Recipe of Week

Sausage Skillet Supper

- 1 lb. bulk sausage.
- 1 can -16 oz.- whole tomatoes, chopped and undrained.
- 1 large bell pepper cut into strips.
- 1 large onion, chopped.
- 1 tsp. salt.
- 1/4 tsp. pepper.
- 1/2 tsp. chili powder.
- 3 c. cooked macaroni.
- 1 1/2 c. sour cream.

Cook sausage in a large skillet until browned, stirring to crumble; drain off pan drippings and remove from heat. Stir in tomatoes, green pepper, onion, and seasonings; cover and cook over medium heat 10 minutes; stirring occasionally. Add the macaroni and sour cream; cook stirring frequently, until mixture is thoroughly heated. Do not boil. Makes 6-8 servings.



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Office of Ombudsman created at FERC

Members of Bailey County Electric Cooperative can call or write directly to Martin Allday at the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC) to express their concerns about the cost of electricity, according to Duane Lloyd, manager of the cooperative.

Chairman Martha O. Hesse recently announced the creation of the Office of the Ombudsman at the Commission to receive, investigate, and respond to complaints and questions from the public associated with the processing of applications and cases before the FERC.

"The Ombudsman will receive and personally look into citizen complaints, effectively serving as an advocate for those involved with the regulatory process," Hesse declared.

"Telephone calls and letters may help encourage the FERC to expedite its decisions in two pending rate cases that affect Bailey County's cost of pur-

chasing wholesale electricity," according to Lloyd. "Two administrative law judges at the FERC have already ruled that wholesale rates charged to Bailey County are excessive. A final decision by the Commission is needed before the wholesale power supplier will reduce the rates it is now collecting and refund overcharges."

Lloyd noted that lower wholesale power costs for Bailey County will mean lower retail rates for its members. "The cost of purchasing wholesale electricity is more than 70 percent of our total operating costs," Lloyd said.

Bailey County Electric Cooperative, along with the 15 other electric cooperatives which are wholesale customers of SPS, have combined their efforts through Amarillo based Golden Spread Electric Cooperative, Inc. to bring about lower wholesale rates.

Golden Spread estimates, based on the decisions already issued by two administrative law judges, that more than \$10 million in refunds will be due the 16 electric cooperatives when the

FERC makes its final decision on the rates that can be charged to the cooperatives for wholesale electricity.

Lloyd had high praise for Chairman Hesse's move to create the Office of Ombudsman. "The Ombudsman provides a means for grass roots communication with the Commission," Lloyd said. "We have asked the Commission to expedite its decisions in pending cases, but I believe that calls and letters from our members will make a difference and will encourage the Commission to lower the electric costs. We urge our members to call or write Mr. Allday and ask his help in reducing their excessive wholesale rates charged to Bailey County."

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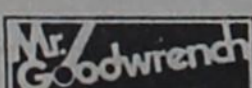

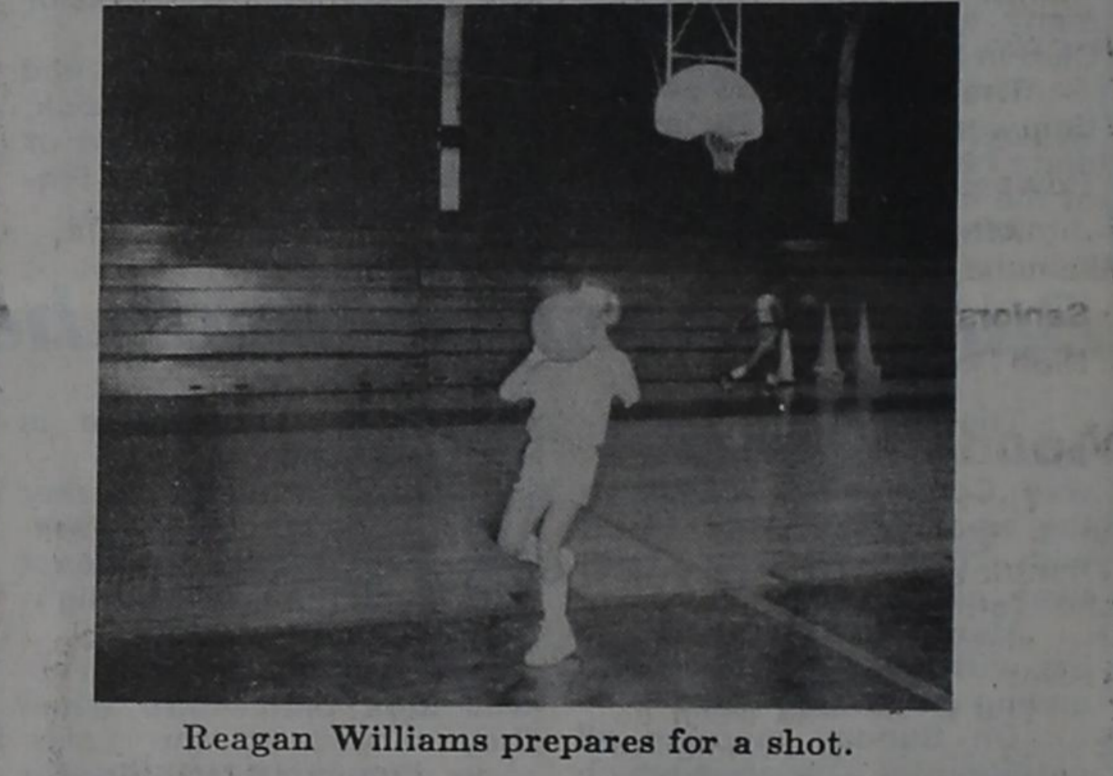

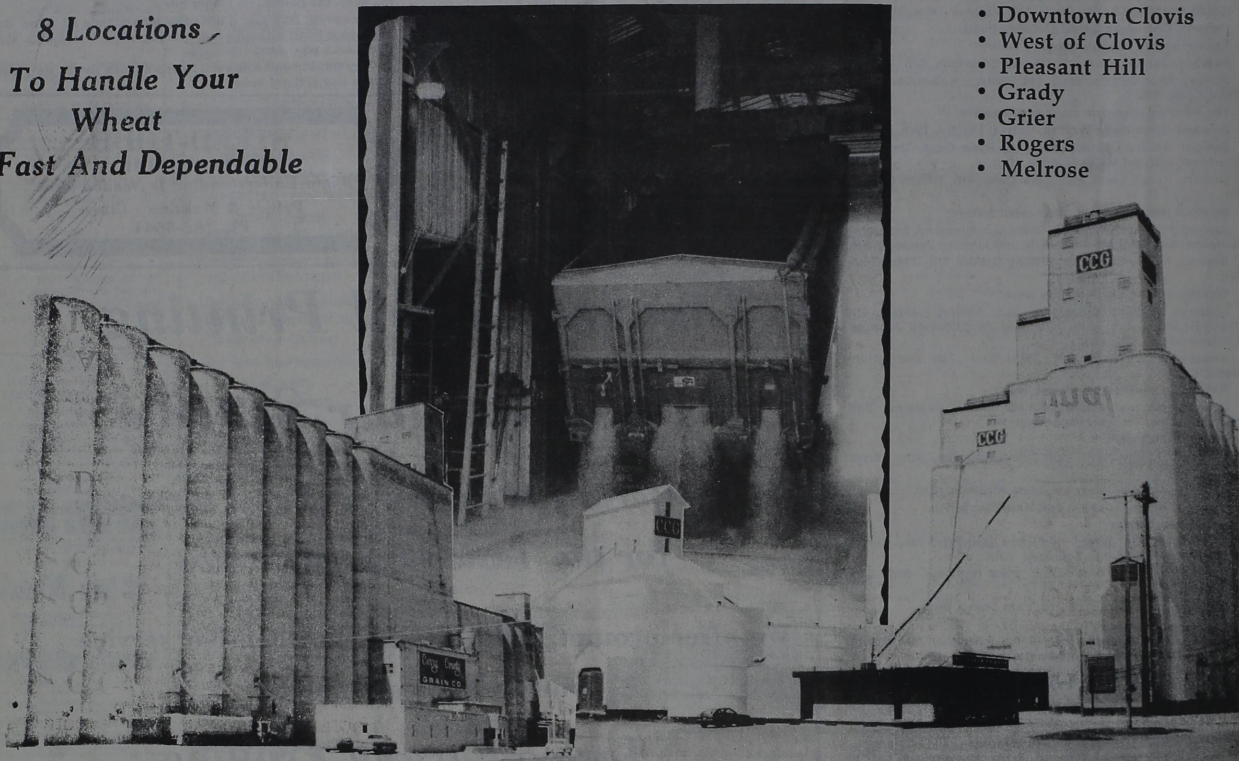
