It's the intangibles that count

I don't often write columns praising local sports teams. There are reasons for it.

I believe strongly in the importance of athletics for our youths, yet I don't believe they should be put on a pedestal vis a vis academics. Both have their place.

Also, if I were to single out an individual athlete, for example, that becomes a problem with his peer group. Jealousy could rear its ugly head. Also, it could create ego problems.

So there are reasons I usually back off going gung-ho over a local school team. But there are exceptions...

The Farwell Steers' basketball team this year is unusual. It has been having an extraordinarily good season despite the lack of the "big man" that most teams are built around.

With that kind of negative factor, you would think that the Steers would be capable of only an average type of year. Instead, they have garnered more than 20 wins opposed to 6 defeats. A remarkable record. And now they are state playoff-bound.

Why? Because of those intangibles that cannot be captured on a form chart: hustle, aggressiveness, quickness and, most of all, teamwork. The Steers are 10-deep when they start a game with those factors. And that makes up for the lack of the "big man" other teams can boast of.

Yes, a lot of credit must go to the coach, Larry Gregory. It's ironic to see his calm demeanor while sitting on the bench as his charges fling their bodies after loose balls. But we all realize that the factors creating fine-tuned teamwork don't occur by themselves; they need the leadership of a coach.

"Teamwork" is one of my favorite words. On paper, it sounds simple; in real life, it's often another story. When a group of folks work together, whether it be in an office or on the gym floor, teamwork doesn't just magically occur. It only happens if the participants wish it to be.

So I give a lot of credit to the individual Farwell players for their ability to work together as a team. They have been able to transform their individual talents into a cohesiveness that brings about victory.

I enjoy watching that. I enjoy seeing the intangibles I mentioned earlier resulting in a winning attitude. Those 10 players are very lucky.

As Americans, we have a tendency to root for the underdog. Let's face it, how many of you rooted for the New York Yankees over the years? Not many. With the lack of the "big man," the Steers qualify as the No. 1 underdog in the state playoffs.

Obviously, that means it will be difficult to go all the way. Yet, there's something about the mystique of this particular team that could prove a lot of pollsters wrong. Those intangibles, for instance.

Nazareth is one of the state's top-ranked teams this year, having won state titles in recent memory. Farwell has been playing Nazareth for several years and I believe that the Steer win over Nazareth last month was its first since they were placed in the same division.

And if they could do it once, they could do it again. To my way of thinking, that gives the Steers a good shot in the playoffs against any team.

But regardless of how far the Steers advance in the playoffs, more importantly it should be remembered the kind of thrills they provided during the regular season. Hard rebounding by Rubio, Perales, George and White; taking it to the basket by Atkinson; outside shooting by Woods, Ketcherside and Anzaldua, and strong backup from Lara and Nicolas.

This isn't the type of team where only five players play most of the game. This is a team where all 10 players are needed; that allows the aggressiveness that has been the hallmark of the Steers this season.

There's a good lesson to be learned by other youngsters from this success. When a coach talks of the importance of hustle, desire and

Exchange student

French teen attends Farwell High School

Jean Christopher Galland is the Texico/Farwell Rotary Club exchange student from Vierzon, France.

Chris is 16 and has been attending Farwell High School since his arrival here in August.

Chris said that his father, who is the president of the Rotary Club in their area, and his mother encouraged him to take part in this program. He came to Farwell because he thought he would like a small town and because the larger cities like Los Angeles do not host exchange students in this program. The city where Chris lives is located in the middle of France and is about 100 miles from Paris. The population is around 40,000 people. Chris says that it is mostly an industrial area.

Chris said that his family owns four different homes. The homes are located in the Alps, Britain, Vierzon and on the French Riviera. His home in Vierzon is in the country about a mile from town.

Chris' father is a women's fashion designer and runs a women's clothing factory that he inherited from his father. The factory runs on a fairly large scale and has offices in Paris.

About 60 to 80 people work to distribute his clothing.

Chris said that his father usually makes up about 100 to 200 fashion designs and sends them to other people who tell him if the quality of the clothing is bad or good. Chris' father exports his clothing to Canada and in Europe.

Chris' mother, is a private piano teacher. Chris has one sister, Caroline, 21, who is studying in her third year of medicine.

Chris has finished his high school education in France, but there the school system works different. After the age of 16, a student continues in study which prepares him to enter a university. "The first and second year of college is not the same education as the United States" said Chris.

Chris said that he attended a public school in Paris. "The school is about a two-hour drive from my home, depending on the traffic. I rode my motorcycle to school until I wrecked it."

Most students travel by bike to school.

Chris thought that French schools were stricter than schools here. "You can't sleep in class, that's for sure," said Chris. He thinks that most of the school courses in France are the same as those here.

"In our schools, one may choose the language he wishes to learn," said Chris. "If you're good in math or trigonometry or any other course you may be good in, you can study their basic education course."

Chris attended school in France, Monday, Tuesday, Thursday, Friday and sometimes Saturday morning. They do not have school on Wednesday. They could finish with their class work at different times during the day. "We might finish at 2 or 6 p.m.," said Chris, "just according to what studies you have for the day." Chris said that if a teacher was ill, they had no teacher substitutes and would not have to stay for that course.

Chris said that he believes that France has higher education standards and that he had more homework to do in France than here. Chris also noted that they did

not have the same kind of desk that we do. "We sit at large tables built for two students," said Chris.

Chris can speak five different languages. He has had four years of Latin, 2 years of Spanish and a little bit of German. He can also speak fluent French and English. Chris said German was the hardest language to learn.

His school does not have computers in their school program, but that computers were in another building that was open to the public.

They play many of the same sports there that we do here, but they play rugby instead of football.

They also play soccer and tennis. "Tennis is real big in France," said Chris, "and gymnastics are important too. We compete with other schools in those sports."

In France, one has to be 17 or 18 to get a drivers license and he has to take driving lessons before getting a license.

In France not many people own cars because they are very expensive. Some kids have their own car by the time they are 18 or 19.

Chris said that there was not a drinking age limit and that he had seen children as young as 10 buying liquor at the supermarket.

"There are no special shops that

sell liquor or wine in France," said Chris, "One merely goes to the supermarket and buys it. It is normal for a family to have whiskey or wine in their homes, but France does not make a beer."

France, like the United States, has its share of trouble with "drinking and driving" as well as drug problems, said Chris.

Chris said that France did not have a problem with teenage pregnancies.

Chris enjoys rock music, but that there was not much of the hard rock music there. "Country music is not very recommended," said Chris.

Chris said that they had many of the same television programs that we do. "We watch programs, such as "Magnum," but I don't care much for your "Dynasty" or "Dallas" programs."

Many of the foods that we enjoy here are the same kinds of food that they have in France. "We even have a 'McDonalds' there."

Chris said that he had never tasted Mexican food until he came to Farwell and that he liked it a lot. He said that while staying with the John Grigsby's, every Sunday after church they would go to Juanito's in Clovis and eat Mexican food. Chris said that he really enjoyed that.

Chris has traveled to many places but that he likes the United States the best.

"The United States is bigger and the people are more pleasant and

exciting here, than they are in other countries," said Chris. "People are also not socialistic here and are more free."

Chris said that he was happy to come to the United States. "I have not found anything that I do not like here," said Chris. "My parents travel to the United States two or three times a year, but I have only been here once and that was when I was about six years old. Everyone in France has heard about the United States and would like to come here."

While in Farwell, Chris has stayed with the Delbert Black family, the Grigsby family and is now staying with the Joe Smallwood family.

While staying with the Blacks, they traveled to Alpine and Dallas. Chris enjoyed going to "Six Flags."

Chris noted that cities like Dallas are different than the big cities in France.

"France has a lot of small shops, unlike the big malls and tall buildings that Dallas has. Our streets are also wider, than the ones in Dallas."

Chris went with the Grigsby's to Taos, N.M. and stayed in a cabin there. They also went snowskiing in "Angel Fire."

Chris plans to travel to Carlsbad to see the caverns sometime during his stay here.

Chris has also made plans to go to California to visit some family friends after he leaves Farwell.

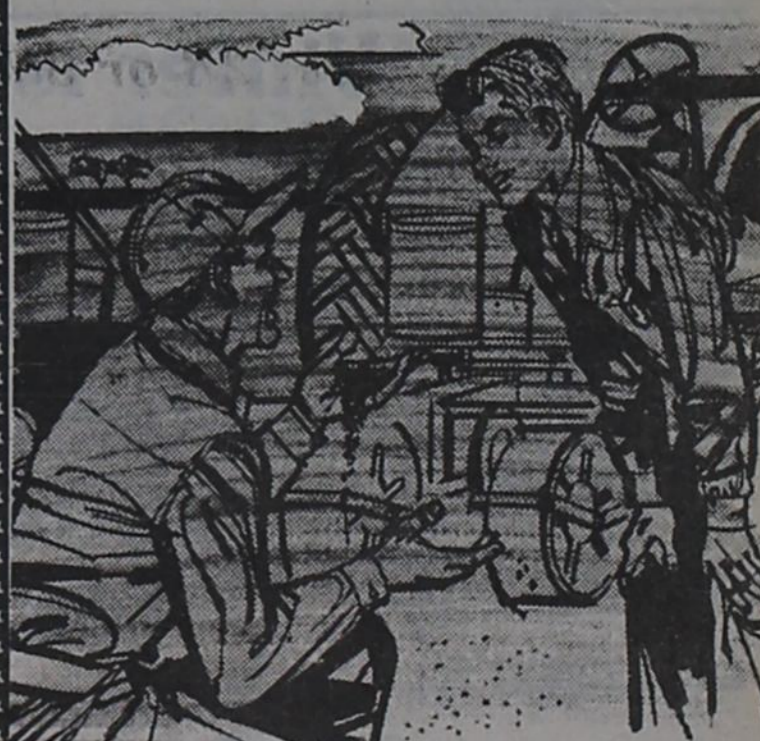


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Texico 7-8 boys drop Clovis squad

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

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Cotton's share up

Cotton's market share of apparel and home fabrics surged to 45 percent at the retail counter for the first nine months of 1986.

The figures, compiled from consumer purchases monitored by the Market Research Corporation of American (MRCA), represent a gain of two percentage points over the same period during 1985 (43 percent).

Cotton's performance in the home fabrics market (excluding carpets) was particularly impressive with a 51 percent market share - up from 48 percent during the first nine months of 1985. In the apparel market, cotton's share was 44 percent - up one percentage point.

"These are dramatic, across-the-board increases for cotton's market share in nearly every category," points out Marvin Grant, senior director of market development for Cotton Incorporated. "What's particularly significant about this nine-month period is that there was a substantial volume gain in consumer purchases. In other words, retail stores sold more textile products by weight. So a market share increase for cotton means that consumers are buying substantially more cotton products."

In the home fabrics category (excluding carpets), Grant says the 51 percent market share represents a significant breakthrough for cotton.

In the apparel category, cotton registered impressive gains in men's slacks with a market share of 32 percent during the first nine months of 1986.

Sarah Owen, school nurse, will be available to review immunization records during registration.

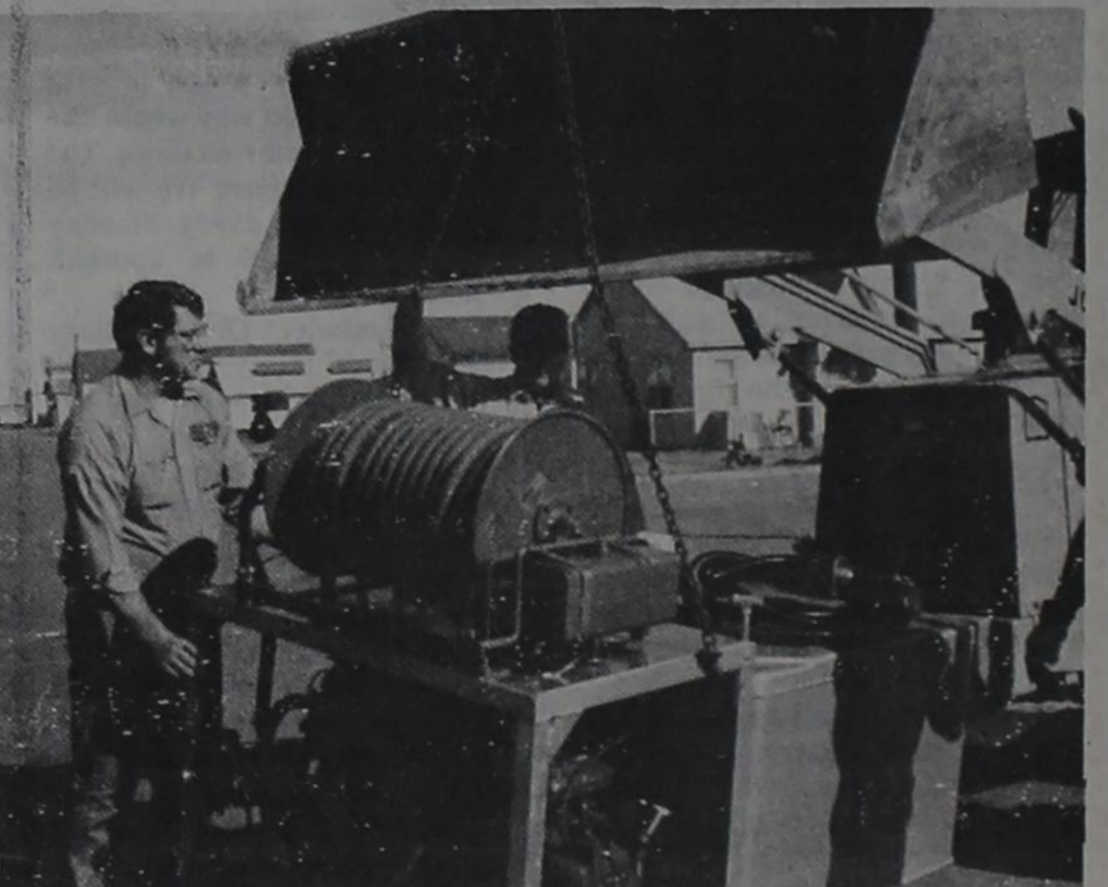

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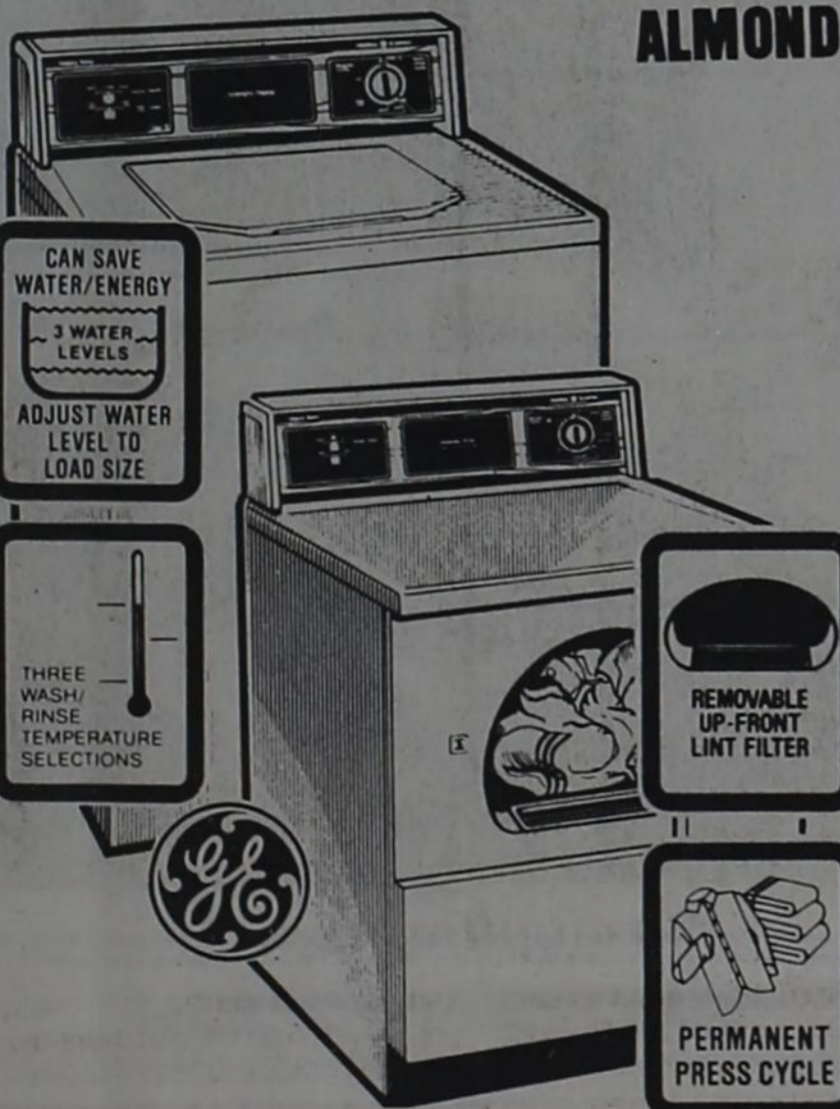
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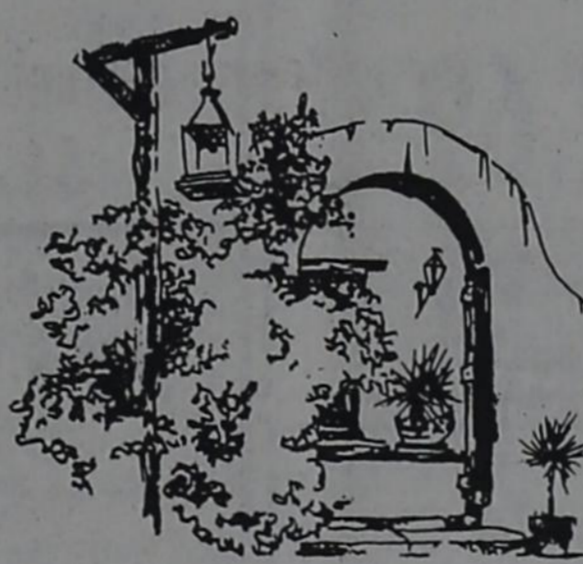
