Parmer County stock show next on tap

The 1988 Parmer County Junior Livestock Show will begin Feb. 1 at the Friona Community Center. The weigh in starts at 3 p.m.

The Barrow show starts at 8 a.m. on Feb. 2. The Lamb show starts at 8 a.m. on Feb. 3. The Steer and Heifer show starts at 2 p.m. on Feb. 3. The Premium Sale takes place at 6:30 p.m. on Feb. 4.

The County Livestock Show is open to all 4-H, FFA or FHA boy or girl in grades 3-12 in Parmer County. Entry cards and fees must be turned in to the Friona Agricultural department, Box 97, Friona one week prior to the show. Details are available from the county agricultural agent's office in the courthouse.

Entrants can win ribbons, trophies, or belt buckles at the Parmer County Junior Livestock Show. No cash prizes are given at the county show itself. There is a Premium Sale following the show where prize winning animals are rewarded by the "buyers" who bid their support for an animal.

"We expect that about 280 4-H and FFA students will have entries in the Junior Livestock Show," said County Agent Gary Patterson. Animals can go on from here to participate in stock shows in El Paso, San Antonio, and Houston.

"It isn't always the winner of the county show that goes on to win at one of the big shows. Animals change a lot in a month's time; 30 days can mean the difference of 75-90 lbs. in the size of a hog, so we encourage the young people to go ahead and try to win at the big shows, too," said Patterson.

Last year Clint Hurst showed the grand champion of the Parmer County Barrow Show, but Susan Redwine of Lazbuddie showed a barrow that was not yet at its prime. Redwine's barrow later won the Grand Champion honors at Houston. Her barrow won \$35,000.

Sixteen barrows from Parmer County made the sale at the Houston Stock show last year. No other county or 4-H group in the state of Texas had more than 10 entries make the sale according to Patterson.

Fifteen barrows from Parmer County placed in the top 4 places at major shows last

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'Depot' group dealt setback

The Bordertown Heritage Foundation, a group begun last year to try and keep the old Texico depot from being demolished, received a major blow to their efforts at Tuesday's Texico City Council meeting.

Ann Cooper, BHF chairman, attended the session to explain that she needed to know whether the city can donate or sell the depot property to her group. Also, she found out that a grant can only be applied for by a civic entity such as a city or county agency and not by a private group such as the BHF. She needed answers now because the deadline for making a grant application to the state is Feb. 12.

The BHF hopes that if a grant can be applied for, the state would be amenable to providing more than \$200,000 needed to move the structure and renovate it as a library. Meanwhile, the Santa Fe Railroad has held off tearing down the structure pending BHF developments. Mrs. Cooper said that the grant is applied for, the railroad will not begin its demolition work until it finds out whether the grant is approved (about April 1).

But Texico City Attorney Duane Hamar explained the problem to the council and Mrs. Cooper.

Hamar said the law only allows the city, if it chose to seek the grant, to donate property to state or federal agencies, not to a private group. The only alternative, therefore, is for the city to sell the property.

Hamar said that if the property's value is more than \$2,500, state approval for the sale is needed and notices must be published (and this would go far beyond the Feb. 12 deadline). Then the property would be sold to the highest bidder, which would not necessarily be the BHF.

Hamar said the depot property currently is owned by the railroad and not the city. "You can't sell what you don't own," he said, in pointing out the lengthy process involved in trying to buy the property and its resale.

The mayor and have city council have made it clear during its discussions of the depot that they don't want the city saddled with the property. They were amenable to acting as a fiscal agent for the BHF (a legal conduit for the state funds) but they don't want any more involvement than that. Thus, in November, when the council voted to apply for a state grant, it was under the belief that it would merely channel any state funds to the BHF.

Mrs. Cooper has said the BHF is willing to take care of the depot after it would be moved through fund-raisers and donations. She said the railroad is willing to give the BHF the property if a grant is approved. The only way to save the depot is through the state grant, she said, due to time limitations.

Now, Hamar made it clear, the city would have to take several steps involving the depot before it would be clear of it. "It's going to be a city deal if we apply for the grant," said Hamar.

He suggested that if the city go ahead with that, it ought to make the BHF a branch of city government.

The council again made it clear that they want to steer clear of having the depot as

city property. They suggested that Mrs. Cooper ask Curry County officials to help with the grant, but she said time would be a problem.

"I hate to see a part of history torn down," she said.

Hamar suggested to Mrs. Cooper that she find an expert in the area of seeking grants to help the BHF. She said she may.

Meanwhile, the council discussed its planned water and sewer rate hikes. No one from the community attended the meeting for the discussion.

Because it would be very costly to re-program the current billing machine for the new rates, the council decided to postpone the rate hikes until July 1. By then, it plans to have purchased a new computer program for the billing.

In December, it was reported that the year's water department expenses were \$62,319 while revenue was \$51,401.

Thus, the city plans to raise its monthly minimum water rate of \$6 (for the first 4,000 gallons) to \$8.50.

For each of the next 2,000 gallons of water actually used monthly by either city or non-city users, the charge would be 90 cents per 1,000 gallons.

For each 1,000 gallons used by either the city or non-city users monthly, in excess of 6,000 gallons, the charge

would be 50 cents per 1,000 gallons.

The monthly minimum fee of \$9 for users outside the city limits would go to \$12.80.

As for sewer rates, a minimum user fee of \$2.50 will be charged. For each outlet exceeding a minimum of four, an additional 15 cents per outlet shall be added to the minimum fee.

A vote on the rate hikes is expected at the next council meeting, Feb. 9.

In other business, the council:

- Noted that the city election is March 1. No one registered as write-in candidates on the appointed day, meaning that the current candidates - Bryan Kube and Steve Chancy and municipal judge Howard Billingsley - will automatically be re-elected.

- Tabled a decision on whether to give Billingsley a raise. One hasn't been given in many years. The post earns \$4,190 a year. If it is to be given, the council must act before the election.

- Set a deadline for Feb. 9 to receive applications for the city marshal's post. So far, only one certified applicant has applied. The council wants only police certified candidates to apply.

- Scheduled a study session on personnel matters for 6:30 p.m. Feb. 2 at City Hall.

- Received a detailed pre-

The Chamber voted to pay for the postcards which will be mailed to persons invited to the annual breakfast at the Farwell Community Center before the Parmer County Livestock Show. It's sponsored by supporters of the Farwell Livestock Show and is designed to raise funds to buy Farwell animals at the county show.

sentation on proposed City Hall remodeling plans from Chancy. It included items such as lowered ceilings, new doors, a new table, removal of some windows, walls painted and paneled, and partitions placed so Bill Hammit could have an office.

The council set March 22 to receive bids for the project. Specifications are available at City Hall. The council hopes to meet earlier, though, with contractors to get a more concrete idea of what can be done.

- Voted against buying a tranquilizer gun for the dog catcher, who has complained that he has been unable to catch several dogs running loose. The council prefers that the problem be handled by the city marshal after he is hired.

- Heard Chancy say that he has received complaints about Port of Entry personnel chasing truckers who don't stop at the Port at high speeds. Hamar said the personnel are considered police officers and all that can be done is note the problem to state officials and ask that due care be exercised.

- Heard that Steve Christian is working up a billing program for the city's water and sewer bills. The council hopes to meet with him in February so it can go ahead and buy the computer necessary when the rate conversions take place.

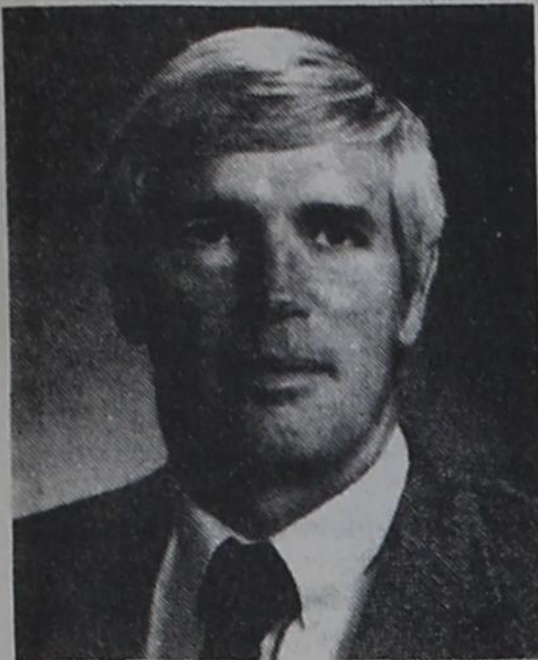

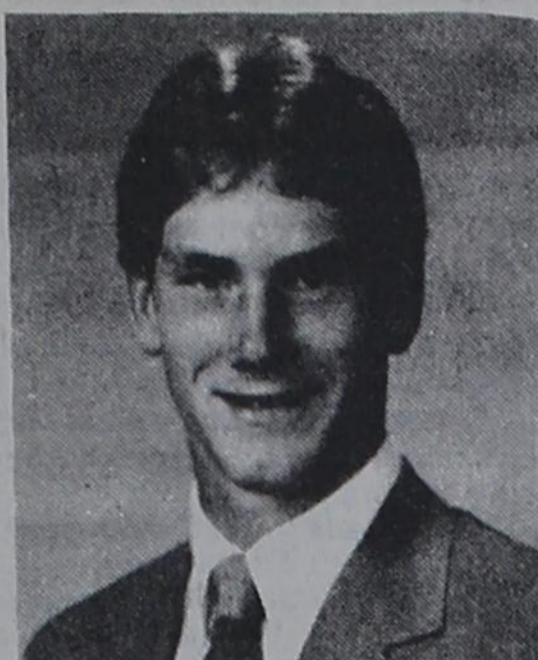

Paper honors Lust, Williams

Lazbuddie football players and coaches have gotten a prominent play from the Lubbock Avalanche Journal.

The newspaper has awarded Head Coach C.W. Williams with its prestigious Coach of the Year award. Quarterback Tim Lust was named Player of the Year and All-South Plains Quarterback of the Year. And Omar Sanchez made the All-South Plains squad as an offensive back.

The article praised Williams' ability to lead the Longhorns through the transition from an 11-man program to a six-man squad competing as an independent. The Longhorns went 9-0 and were considered by many to be the best 6-man team in Texas, although they weren't able to go into the state playoffs because of the transition from the 11-man program.

The Lubbock newspaper article said that in Lazbuddie's last season in 11-man football, Lust passed for 1,644 yards, 11 touchdowns and was the Class 1A All-South Plains quarterback. In 9 games in 6-man action, Lust totaled 31 TDs and 1,529 yards. Last year, Lust also completed 78 of 123 passes.

Sanchez, the team captain, caught 8 TD passes. He also rushed for 987 yards. Lazbuddie outscored its foes 501-99 with many games ending at halftime, and Lust and Sanchez often sitting down after a quarter or so. Nevertheless, Sanchez led the South Plains in scoring with 33 TDs and 260 total points.

Lazbuddie ended 8 of its 9 games at halftime because of 45-point leads.

Group studies emergency phone number for Parmer

Work has begun on offering a 911 emergency phone number for Parmer County residents.

June Rhodes, a Friona city commissioner, is on the 18-member advisory board of the Panhandle Emergency Communications District.

The board operates under a state law passed last year which calls for the establishment of emergency telephone service throughout Texas by 1995.

Calls will be answered at a public safety answering point, where the request for services will be routed to the nearest police, fire or ambulance dispatcher.

Access to the three-digit number keeps the caller from having to look up emergency numbers in a phone book.

Twenty-three counties in the region are involved in this program. The Potter - - Randall County system will be in operation by late May.

County and city commissioners will be able to join the system and allow the telephone companies serving them to add a monthly surcharge to phone bills. Surcharge revenues will be used to purchase equipment and operate the system. The state emergency communications law allows up to 50 cents for the surcharge.

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How Lazbuddie is doing

The Lazbuddie School District has issued its annual performance report (1986-87). Some of the highlights are:

- Long-term Goals**
1. Computers will be available in classrooms at each grade with adequate software.
 2. A satellite learning system will be acquired following a careful study of instructional needs and physical accommodations.
 3. Buildings and facilities will be maintained and expanded to meet student needs.
 4. School and community will continue, and expand, effective communication practices to gain parent involvement and community support.
 5. Future goals and planning for Lazbuddie Schools will involve parent - community input in order to represent patrons' interests.

Student performance
Lazbuddie Schools surpassed its previously set goals on both the TEAMS and California Achievement Tests (CAT). Improvements were significant.

On the CAT reading, the average number of percentile points rose per grade level 5.8 points. The greatest gain appeared at the fourth grade level with 23 points, while the least gain was 2 points at the sixth grade level.

In CAT language, the average number of percentile points gained per grade level

(1-12) was 3.36. The most significant improvements appeared at 3rd and 11th grades where each mean rose 25 percentile points. The least gain in language was seen at the sixth grade level with 1 point gain.

On the CAT math, the average number of percentile points gained per grade level (1-12) was 7.27. The greatest gains were seen in grade 5 (21 points) and grade 10 (20 points). Least gain was at the 7th grade level (3 points).

In examining the TEAMS scores at grades 1, 3, 5, 7, 9 and 11, for two successive years, scores have improved significantly in all subject areas.

The percent of students mastering the math section of the TEAMS improved, overall, to 88.6 percent, a gain of 3.6 percent from the previous year.

On the TEAMS reading section, 87 percent of students, schoolwide, showed mastery, a 4.4 percent gain from the previous year.

In TEAMS writing, 74 percent of the students tested mastered writing - language arts, a gain of 3.5 percent from the previous year.

No pass, no play rule had a negligible effect upon the high school; however, the greatest impact was seen at the junior high level.

Almost no students at the high school level were ineligible to participate in extra-curricular activities due to grades while about 10 percent of the junior high participants in extra-curricular activities were ineligible due to grades during a six weeks grading period.

Pass-fail
The pass-fail rate at Lazbuddie was examined. Retention rate was greater at the elementary level where 10 students were retained. At the high school level, one student lacked sufficient credits to be classified at the next grade level.

There was a significant reduction in the number of dropouts from the previous year. The rate decreased from 8.2 percent to 2.2 percent.

Lazbuddie for the first time had on staff a fulltime certified guidance counselor who was instrumental in providing assistance in post secondary plans of students.

As a result, 93 percent of the graduates planned to further their education, and 85 percent received some

form of financial aid.

Curriculum
Several changes were implemented at the high school level. They included:

- Addition of 10 state approved honors classes.
- Nine additional courses were added to the curriculum.
- Athletics for boys and girls were consolidated into one class period, thus allowing more course offerings.
- Duplication of courses was eliminated by a restructuring of the class schedule.

The gifted - talented program was successfully implemented at the elementary level. The elementary curriculum exceeds the state time requirements in every subject area and each grade level.

Scrutiny of the 1986-87 curriculum revealed the need to extend the high school course offerings to include a work-study program. There is a need to offer a program whereby students can simultaneously attend school and work in order to provide incentive for remaining in school.

There exists a need for expanded honors course offerings in the future. A review of the present vocational program reveals a need to revise the curriculum to include state proposals for vocational agriculture. Studies must be made and plans proposed to expand the gifted - talented program to include the junior high.

As a result of the visit by the TEA Accreditation Division, Lazbuddie studied the need to offer keyboarding as a pre-requisite to computer literacy in the 7th grade.

At the School Board's direction, the administration and selected staffers explored the possibility of adding a satellite education program. The TI-IN Satellite Network was reviewed and results reported to the School Board.

The mandated curricular requirements for graduation have resulted in student taking fewer electives and more state required courses. There appears to be lowered enrollment in advanced academic classes, such as trigonometry and elementary analysis.

Computer education was expanded to offer Computer Science I and II. A new Apple IIE computer was bought in order to continue updating and replacing computer equipment. A word processor was added for business education. New electronic type-

writers were purchased for typing classes.

Computers are available for use at every grade level. Computer assisted instruction is offered to each student in grades 1 through 5. A Computer Assisted Design system was used in the industrial arts department for the first time.

Work - study
Due to the rural nature of the community, there is a limited number of businesses. However, local farmers work closely with the school's vocational agriculture and industrial arts departments to provide students related experiences and to provide input to the content of the curriculum.

The possibility of enhancing program offerings by providing cooperative work arrangements through a state-approved work program will be examined and implemented for the 1987-88 school year.

Teachers
Almost all the Lazbuddie teachers possess double majors allowing the district to offer a broad selection of courses to students. The teachers are evenly divided on experience with an adequate mixture of experienced

teachers while several teachers have from 2 to 5 years experience. Seven teachers have masters' degrees; 19 have bachelors'.

During the May 1987 ac-

creditation visit, teachers were commended in numerous areas for their outstanding work. The most outstanding commendation was received in the area of curriculum development. Teachers developed and wrote curriculum documents in all subject areas. They showed evidence of its use in daily planning and classroom instruction.

Lazbuddie offers its teachers housing and utilities plus \$300 above base salary, of \$1,200 above base if housing is not required. Insurance, personal leave and other incentives are available to the entire staff. These incentives are helpful in obtaining and

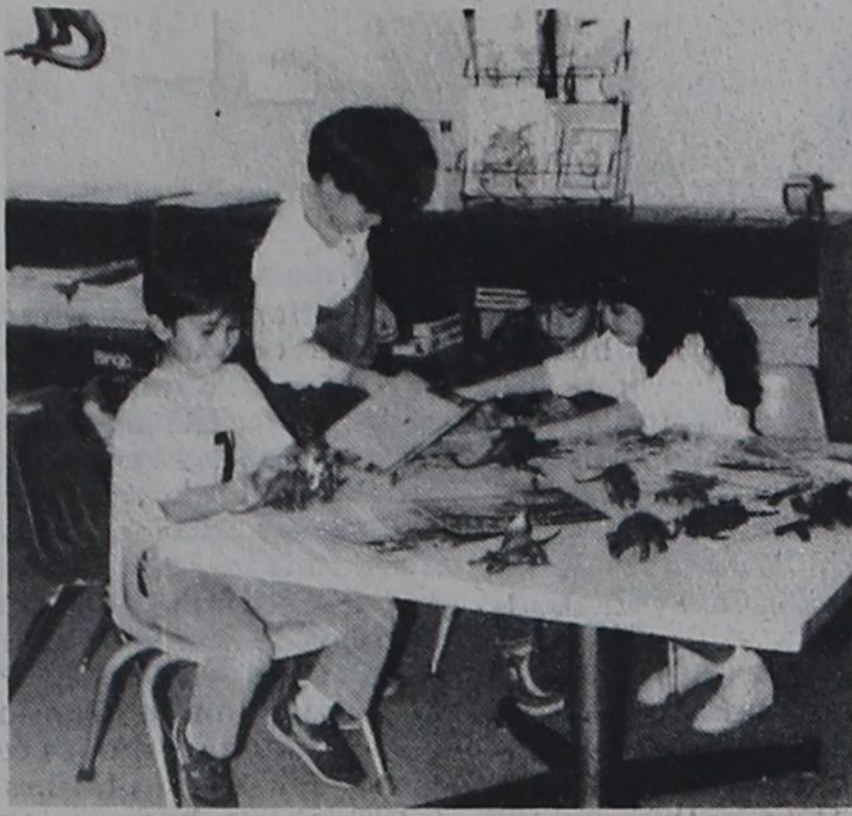

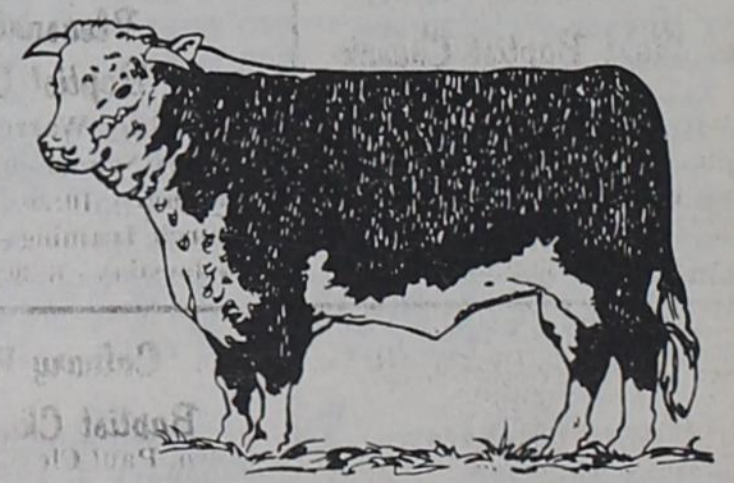
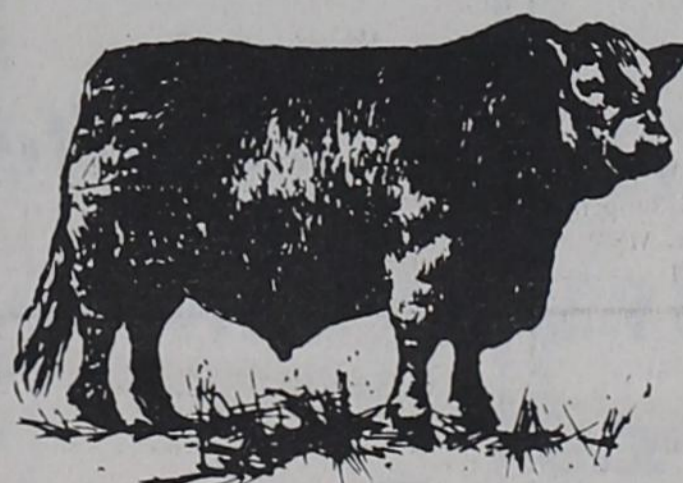

keeping quality staff members.

Paperwork reduction was accomplished by giving teachers release time (one day minimum) to work on curriculum documents. A typist was hired to coordinate materials and type curriculum documents for teachers. The secretarial time on both campuses was increased 25 percent to assist teachers in preparing and duplicating materials for instruction.

Improvements over the past four years Administration and School Board adopted district and facility adequacy goals in 1983. The goals are now 100 percent complete. Improvements over the past four years include:

- Two classrooms were converted into a modern library, equipped to serve all grades.
- Classrooms were painted.
- In the high school building, all the ceilings were dropped and false ceilings installed, which improved acoustics.
- New fluorescent lighting was installed throughout the school, which improved energy efficiency.
- New heating units were installed throughout school.
- The old gym was remodeled and converted into an outstanding physical facility for all grades.
- Several playground equipment items were added and improved.
- The 16 teacher housing

units owned by the school system were remodeled; carpet and other improvements were added.

- The houses were restuccoed, re-painted and re-roofed.

- One pre-fabricated classroom was built to house Chapter I and Migrant students.

- Fences were built around the playground and athletic facilities.

Taxes

The district tax rate has been 95 cents every year since 1982 except one year which was 93 cents. The tax rate for 1987-88 remains at 95 cents.

The school system will be free of bond indebtedness in the 1988-89 school year. This will drop 11 cents from the current tax rate.

The carryover fund balance has not changed by more than \$10,000 in the past three years. The district has been able to operate very close to its proposed budget every year.

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Help you protect your rights as a taxpayer

A RENDITION is a report to the appraisal district that lists all the taxable property you own or control on January 1, 1988. You may also give your opinion of the property's value, if you wish.

YOU MUST FILE a rendition if you own tangible personal property used to produce income-such as the machinery and equipment used by a business.

The appraisal district may require any taxpayer to file a rendition by sending the taxpayer a written notice and a rendition form.

YOU MAY WANT to file a rendition, even if you aren't required to file, to preserve some of your rights as a taxpayer: You put your correct mailing address on record so your tax bills will go to the right address. Even if your bill goes to the wrong address, the law still holds you responsible for paying your taxes on time or else paying extra charges for late payments.

You can put your own opinion of your property's value on record. If the appraisal district then places a higher value on your property, it must notify you in writing of the higher value and explain how you can protest that value on the appraisal review board.

By filing a special type of rendition called a report of decreased value, you can notify the appraisal district of significant damage to your property that occurred in 1987. The district will send someone to verify the damage and take it into account when assigning a 1988 value to your property.

FILE RENDITIONS with your local appraisal district at the address shown below. Forms are available at this office.

THE NEW DEADLINE for 1988 renditions is March 31. You can get an extra 30 days if you ask for it in writing before the March 31 deadline.

For more information, get a free copy of the pamphlet, Taxpayers' Rights, Remedies, Responsibilities, at your appraisal district office or from the State Property Tax Board in Austin.

Thursday, turkey and dressing, mashed potatoes, green beans, cranberry sauce, hot rolls, butter, honey, and milk.

Friday, beefy nachos, lettuce and tomato salad, pinto beans, fruit, and milk.
