'Peace, peace,' they holler

"Peace, peace," yell the demonstrators angry at U.S. troops sent to Honduras.

Now, I ask you, who doesn't support peace? We're all for it.

Yet, I oppose this opposition. Because peace is an elusive goal, something that has to be worked for. Just shouting "peace" doesn't accomplish much, if anything.

History shows us again and again that the only way a major nation can gain true peace is through military preparedness. That's a fact of life, something many demonstrators aren't willing to accept.

Who can ever forget Neville Chamberlain's plane trip to Germany for "peace in our time"?

It was the fall of 1938. Hitler's Germany was on the move. First, they had gobbled up Austria in the name of "lebensraum." Now the mad Nazi dictator told the world that Germans living in Czechoslovakia, in an area called the Sudetenland, belonged in Germany. It was the Aryan right, Hitler claimed.

If the West, led by France and Great Britain, had stood up to Hitler at that time, World War II would have gone far differently.

Instead, Chamberlain, the arch bureaucrat, flew to the Eagle's Nest for a tete a tete with Hitler, Italy's Mussolini and France's Daladier. The result: a treaty where the West gave up Czechoslovakia in the name of "peace."

We've all seen the old newsreels showing Chamberlain returning to Heathrow Airport outside London, with umbrella on arm, waving that infamous piece of paper and saying "peace in our time."

All that diplomatic mission achieved was to strengthen Hitler's hand and allow Germany more time for their military buildup. And the German generals who opposed Hitler and who secretly hoped that the West would stand up to der Fuehrer's threats, were stunned into silence. Hitler had won again.

That 1938 chapter is one of history's greatest lessons. The West bought peace at a fantastic cost - allowing the demise of a democratic nation. And all it did was to embolden the fascists.

So, today, our demonstrators take to the streets, yelling "peace in our time." It makes no difference to them that today's peace quite likely will mean tomorrow's major conflict. The end of military aid to the Contras means that Nicaragua's Marxist government will succeed. Once that occurs, they will build up their military might (the defense minister already has said their goal is a 600,000-man military force) and use it to threaten and attack other Central American nations.

And when that happens, the United States will become a key player in those conflicts.

That scenario, which I think is rather obvious, doesn't necessarily have to occur. What needs to be done is for the Marxists to be overthrown, peacefully or otherwise. And if that means we can't have peace right now, that's fine. Better for us to engage in a small conflict that a larger conflagration later.

Has history taught us nothing?

There will be no school in Texico Friday. Students in Farwell have Friday and Monday off.

It's that time of year: time to spring forward.

That means on Saturday night you need to move your clocks ahead one hour.

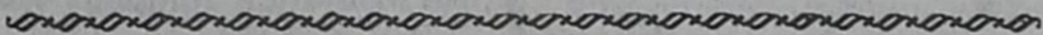

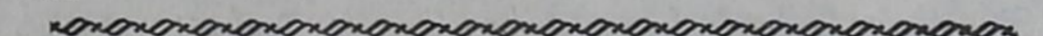

Dems, GOP pick state delegates

The Republican party held its Parmer County convention on March 19 at the Friona State Bank.

Five Lazbuddie residents were chosen to represent Parmer County at the Texas state GOP convention: Mr. and Mrs. J.W. Gammon, Mr. and Mrs. Carl Bodiford, and Rebecca Williams.

The delegates are charged with carrying eight resolutions to the state convention. The first is an anti-abortion resolution. The second favors a balanced budget and a presidential line item veto. The third promotes strict measures to control the spread of AIDS. The fourth proposes a tax credit for people who take their children to private day care centers, while it would deny federal funding of child care in public schools.

The fifth proposed by local Republicans is against calling a constitutional convention for the balanced budget amendment because it would open the entire constitution to possible amendment. The sixth calls for a relaxation and review of legislation concerning women who work in their homes. The seventh is against the INF treaty. The eighth proposes a speedup of the adoption process.

County GOP chairman Philip Johnson said the local election last month was a record setting event.

"Forty-nine percent of the local voters turned out for the election which is very unusual for a primary. We had a record Republican turnout, and it would have been greater if local races had not been contested. Lots of people wanted to vote for the Republican candidate for president, and for local candidates, too."

In the April 12, runoff, 3 races will be decided: U.S. Senate race between Boulter and Gilbreath; Railroad Commission race between Ervin and Emmett; and Justice, Supreme Court, Place #2 between Hecht and Block.

Parmer County polling sites will be located at Farwell City Hall, Reeve Chevrolet in Friona, and Lazbuddie school auditorium.

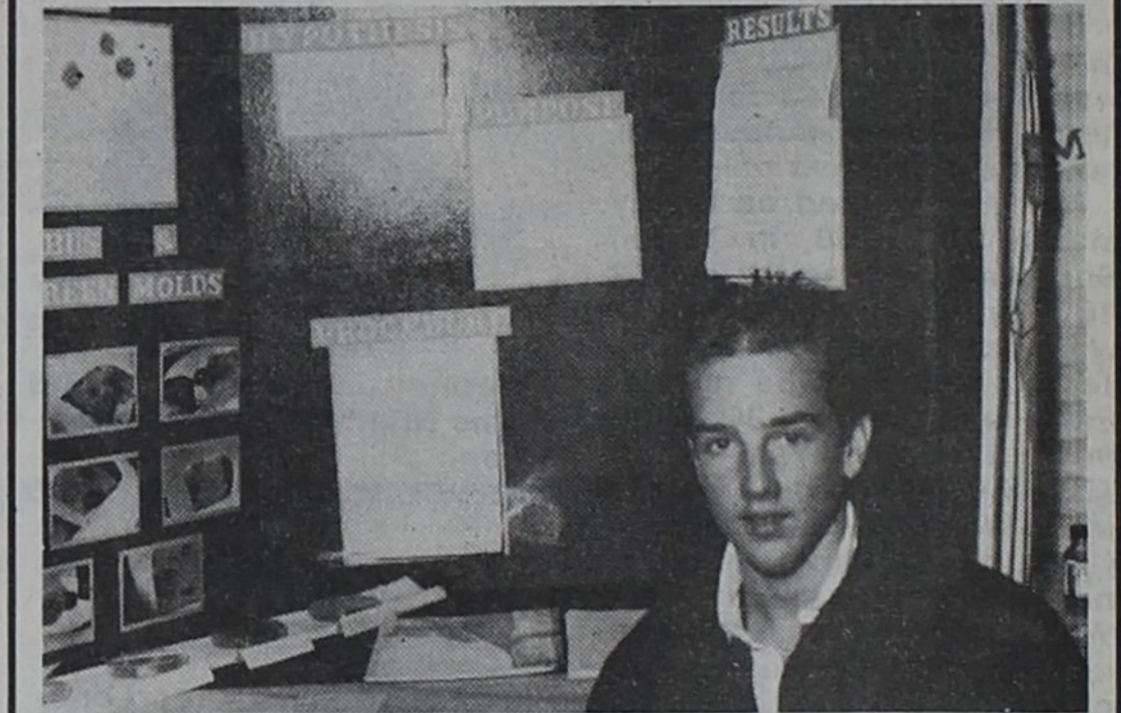
production. There will be four polling places for the April 12 runoff election:

- Friona, Calvary Baptist Church.

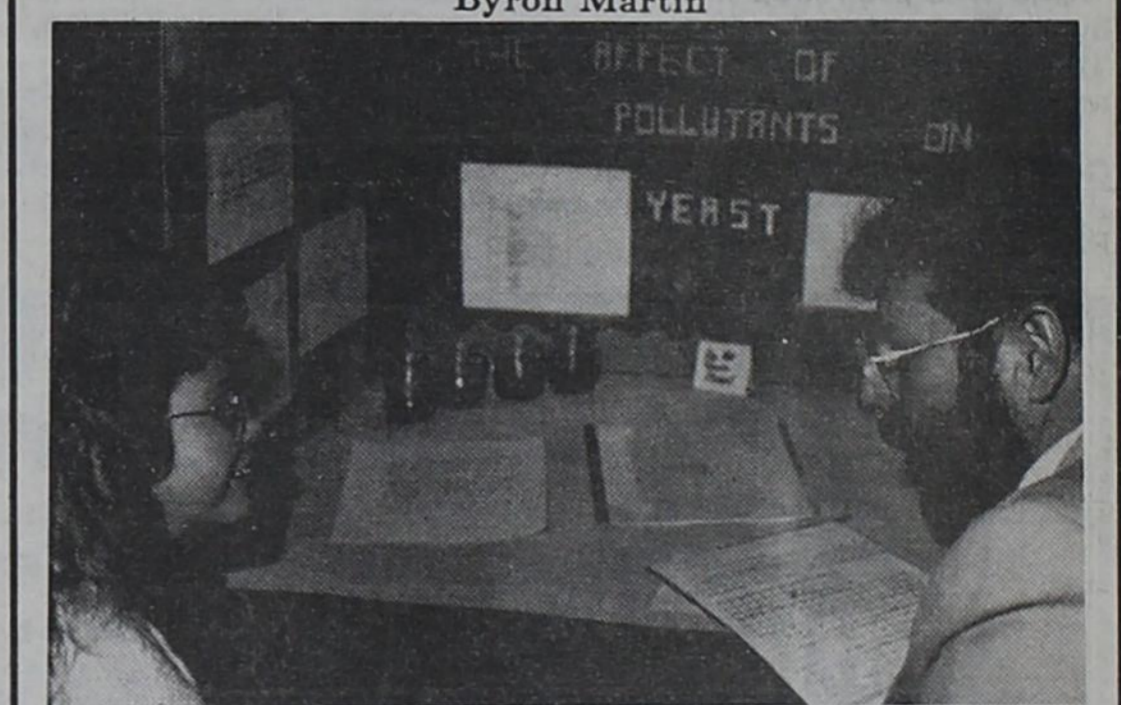

Beauty Box begun 23 years ago

The Beauty Box has been at its present location at the corner of State Line Road and Avenue I since 1966.

Owner Frances Kube started the business a year before that, but moved it to its present location 22 years ago.

Mrs. Kube went to beauty school at the Amarillo College of Hairdressing when her sons, Bryan and David, were pre-schoolers.

"I wouldn't have been able to do it without my mother-in-law," says Mrs. Kube. "I drove over 60 miles a day to get to school and back from where we were living then."

After beauty college, Mrs. Kube worked for other beauty shops before she opened one in her own home after she moved to Farwell.

Ten years ago she was joined by Mardee Grissom, who can roll hair and tell jokes at the same time.

Mardee Grissom took her training at Harris Beauty College in Clovis. "Lucille Duty who is now in Farwell Convalescent Center was my instructor in beauty school," says Mrs. Grissom.

"In the past 20 years I have seen styles change from teased and fixed hair styles like 'the bee hive' to more natural looking hair styles.

"More people used hair color and frosting then. Now they want a more natural look. They don't seem to worry about showing a little gray.

"Permanents are better now than they used to be. They leave hair in better condition than the old ones did. They are easier on the hair. Maybe that is why we do so many more permanents now than we used to do.

In the late sixties hairpieces and wigs were very fashionable. Mrs. Kube sold them from her salon and also cleaned and styled them.

"Every woman must have owned at least two, I remember having so many hairpieces to style that I got up at 4:30 one morning to get as many done as possible before my appointments began coming in," Mrs. Kube remembered.

"I have had many of the same ladies as customers all these years. We've kind of grown up together over the years, but of course we do the younger ones, too. Now even gentlemen come in for haircuts and perms - something that wouldn't have happened 20 years ago."

Periodically the Beauty Box staff goes to seminars to keep up with new ideas, but "they always seem to have those seminars on Sundays, and I hate to miss church to drive all that way on a Sunday," says Mrs. Kube.

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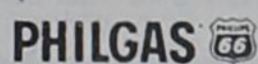
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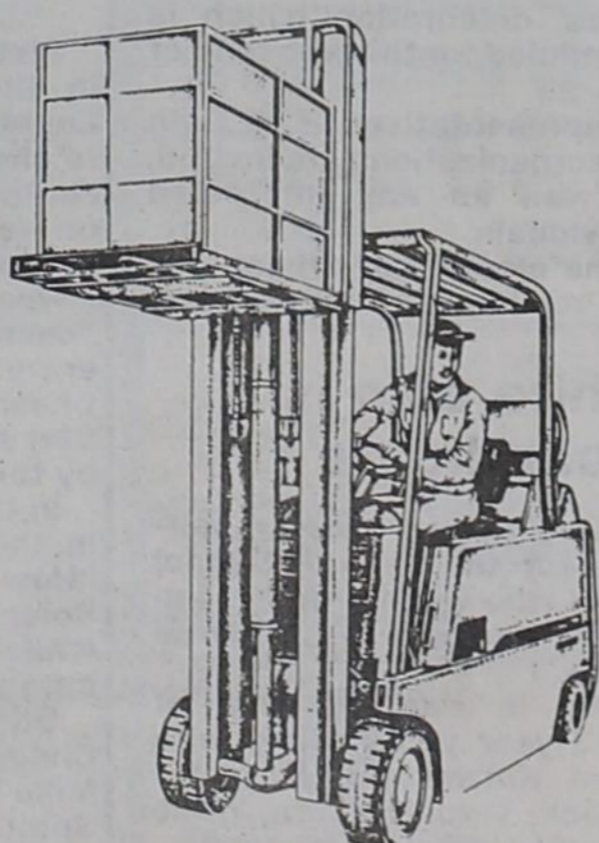
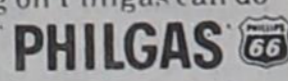
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Byrum issuing warning stickers

Texico City Marshal Brent Byrum reports that he has been issuing warning stickers telling the owners of cars that have been parked on the street or in front yards to get the license plates up to date, or move the vehicle before April 9.

If the vehicles are not moved, they will be towed away. The owners will receive citations.

"We want to work with people and we want to give them enough time to get everything taken care of, but we also want to make Texico a nice looking community. If people want to move their old junk cars into their fenced back yards, that's their business. We just don't want all these junk cars sitting out on the street. We want to encourage people to fix things up around here," Byrum said.

Byrum also noted that Texico has ordered a tranquilizer gun to use in dog control cases.

"I don't want people to think that I am shooting their pets with a high powered rifle, but starting in a couple of weeks, we will be tranquilize and impound animals that are

running loose," Byrum said.

The marshal's office has also started to report serious crimes that come before the legal authority. The marshal will not be reporting a list of names of people who leave litter in their yards or those make too much noise at a party, or many of the other minor crimes he is asked to handle on a daily basis. More major crimes, like DWI's and felonies, will be reported after they have come to trial.

"I have probably issued about 30 minor citations since I took office, but there have only been two crimes of a serious nature so far, and only one of those has come to trial," Byrum said.

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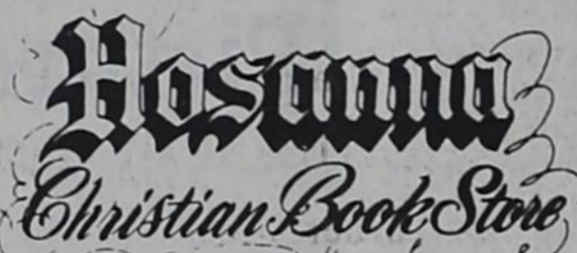

notice is to inform you of the potential adverse health effects of lead. This is being done even though your water may not be in violation of the current standard.
EPA and others are concerned about lead in drinking water. Too much lead in the human body can cause serious damage to the brain, kidneys, nervous system and red blood cells. The greatest risk, even with short-term exposure, is to young children and pregnant women.
Lead levels in your drinking water are likely to be highest:
1. If your home or water system has lead pipes, or
2. If your home has copper pipes with lead solder, and
- If the home is less than five years old, or
- If you have soft or acidic water, or
- If water sits in the pipes for several hours.
Ways to avoid potential lead exposure are to "flush" faucets before use and to use cold water for drinking and cooking. You may wish to have your home tap water tested for lead content by a competent laboratory. You may also wish to check to see if lead pipes, solder, or flux were used in your home plumbing.

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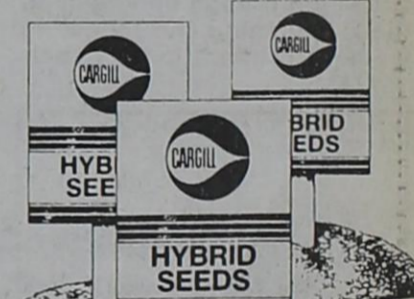
