applied to a healthy, well covered bermudagress awn applied to a healthy, well covered bermudagrass lawn. This
herbicide should last through the following summer,"he says If the bermuda grass has blank areas without grass runner cover, Abernathy says Surflan may inhibit runner growth.

Abernathy also reminds homeowners to exercise caution when using fertilizers that contain weed control materials granular material since overlapping application areas and high fertilizer application rates will result in severe injury to the bermudagrass," he explains.
