

With approval of the city commission to make the following streets one way between 8 a.m. and 4 p.m.:

School Board asks for 1-way streets

The Farwell School Board Tuesday voted to present a proposal to the City Council to change several streets near the Farwell school campus to 1-way streets between 8 a.m. and 4 p.m.

If the city accepts the proposal, parents would be able to load or unload children more safely, school officials

In other business, the board: Heard a report from maintenance director Randy Grady on the asbestos situations. Grady said an independent study showed Farwell Schools are not in serious danger becaus of asbestos. "They rate the schools on a scale from 0 to 5. We had mostly 2's," said Grady.

If the asbestos plan is accepted by the state, Farwell will not need to remove the asbestos present in its buildings.

The board will plan a timetable for roof repairs, air conditioning units, and windows. It will also consider plans for the construction of additional classroom space, storage rooms, etc. Specific plans were tabled until there is more input on these projects.

- Approved the substitute teacher list. There will be a permanent file of substitutes, and two training sessions will be held for substitutes.

- Adopted the proposed changes presented by Gwen Corn in Student Council officer guidelines, and changes presented for the student handbook.

- Approved the Red Ribbon Campaign, organized by the alcohol and drug education abuse committee. Red ribbons will be provided for all students and personnel to wear Oct. 24. Everyone involved in school will be asked to wear red Oct. 26 to show support of the campaign.

The campaign's theme is "The Choice for Me . . . Drug Free!" Also, poster contests will be conducted and videos gotten on alcohol and drug education.

1,400 trees, shrubs sold

The Parmer County Soil and Water conservation District No. 140 reports that two watershed structures on the Running Water Draw are located in Parmer County.

These structures are two of a series built for flood control along the draw. On Memorial Day this past year, these structures worked as they were designed to. The heavy runoff from thunderstorms was successfully contained, preventing possible damage and loss of life.

The district also reports this year it sold over 1400 trees and shrubs. These included Colorado Blue Spruce, Eastern Red Cedar, Ponderosa Pine, Rocky Mountain Juniper, Arizona Cypress, Ash, Cottonwood, Oak, Willow, Hackberry, Russian Olive, Poplar, Walnut, and Pecan.

This year they also offered packets for wildlife - quail and pheasant, deer, turkey, and squirrel. Each included 100 trees. These were broken up into four different species adapted to the kind of wildlife in the area.







Here's how to control unwanted weeds

If you are among the numerous people who had a nice crop of winter weeds in your lawn last year, now is the time to begin preparations for control of these unwanted weeds.

Unwanted grasses are the most common winter weed problems occurring in area bermudagrass lawns, according to Dr. John Abernathy, weed and herbicide scientist and Resident Director of Research at the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station in Lubbock.

Several pre- emergence herbicides are available to help control the weed problems. Abernathy says herbicides such as Surflan, Balan, and Dachal should be applied during the late fall or early spring before the weed seed can germinate. He reminds homeowners that these herbicides should be uniformly applied to the lawn and thoroughly watered into

Surflan provides the best winter week control when it is applied to a healthy, well covered bermudagrass lawn. This herbicide should last through the following summer,"he says. If the bermuda grass has blank areas without grass runner cover, Abernathy says Surflan may inhibit runner growth.

Roundup is another herbicide which may be used to control

winter weeds, Roundup should be applied postemergence to the weeds in late winter or early spring before the bermudagrass begins to turn green. If the bermudagrass has any green runners, Roundup can cause injury to them.

Other pre- emergence chemicals such as Atrazine and Simazine are labeled for use on bermudagrass in East and Central Texas. However, Abernathy advises against their use on the Texas High Plains. "Because of sandy soils with low organic matter and high pH values in this area, atrazine and simazine can cause serious injury to bermudagrass lawns,"he notes.

Abernathy also reminds homeowners to exercise caution when using fertilizers that contain weed control materials. "It is very important to make accurate applications of the granular material since overlapping application areas and high fertilizer application rates will result in severe injury to the bermudagrass," he explains.

Additional information may be obtained from the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, local nurseries or other lawn and garden stores. Commercial lawn care services in the Lubbock and Amarillo areas can help homeowners with their winter weed problems as well.



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
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Producers await harvest results

Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) offices are now accepting applications for payments under the new drought relief law and will continue to do so through March 1989.

Interest in the program on the High Plains is developing slowly as most producers await harvest results. But producers with crops that won't pay to harvest, notes Donald Johnson, Executive Vice President of Lubbock-based Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., would do well to apply for payment now. With an appraisal from the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation (FCIC) or ASCS, Johnson points out, the producer is allowed to destroy their food supply.

In that regard, ASCS has recently announced that crops vielding eight percent or less of the farm's program payment vield can be appraised for disaster program payment purposes at zero production. Yields above the eight percent level, whether assessed or harvested, will be deducted from

the pounds eligible for disaster payment.

The only losses covered by the program are those caused in 1988 by drought, hail, excessive moisture or "related conditions as determined by the Secretary." Loss claims resulting from sand, wind, heat, a freeze, or other factor not directly related to drought, hail or excessive moisture will be disallowed, ASCS officials state.

PGC, High Plains legislators and others mounted an all-out push to get relief for 1987 crop hail losses, but the effort failed when Senate conferees refused to accept a House-

passed proposal to that effect.

The program offers assistance to qualifying producers at three levels only tow of which are meaningful to cotton producers. The first level, covering losses below 35 percent of program yield, guarantees that producers will not be required to repay any advance deficiency payments that market prices may render unearned when final calculations are made after December 31. There's no doubt about the 6.4cent cotton advance being earned, but advance payments on wheat and corn are said to be at risk.

A second level of losses, from 35-75 percent of expected yield, will qualify for payment at 65 percent of the crop's target price- 49.34 cents per pound on cotton, \$1.90 and \$2.75 per bushel, respectively, on corn and wheat.

Eligible losses above 75 percent will be compensated for by payments at 90 percent of target, which comes to 68. 31 cents per pound for cotton, \$2.64 per bushel on corn and \$3.81 per bushel on wheat.

A cotton example prepared by PCG uses a 500- pound yield and assumes actual production, whether harvested or not, a 40 pounds per acre. PCG's calculations show no compensation for the first 35 percent of loss (175 pounds); a payment of 49.34 cents per pound times 40 percent of the loss (200 pounds x .4934 = \$98.68); and, since the 40 pounds or 8 percent actual production permits the field to be "zeroed out," a payment of 68.31 cents per pound times the remaining 25 percent (125 pounds x .6831 = \$85.39). Total disaster payment thus comes to \$184.07 per acre.

There is a "no double- dipping" clause under which a deficiency payment won't be made on any pound earning a disaster payment. But the producer in this instance still would be due a deficiency payment on the 35 percent of loss for which he receives no disaster payment. Using PCG's most recent guess of 20 cents for the total 1988 deficiency payment, this would give the producer additional income of \$35 per acre (175 pounds x .20). The total, \$219.07, represents a gain of \$119.07 over the \$100 deficiency payment the producer would have collected without the

disaster program. A producer with FCIC insurance will collect earned benefits in addition to disaster and deficiency payments, except that total receipts can't exceed what he would have made had he

grown a normal crop.

One side effect will make the disaster program less attractive to some producers. Any producer collecting a disaster payment for 1988 losses above 35 percent will be required to purchase FCIC insurance on his crop for 1989 unless his 1989 premium is (1) 125 percent or more of the average premium for the county or (2) 25 percent or more of his 1988 disaster payment.

Many students agreed that it was interesting and exciting. One student even stated, "It was a blast!"



Bodiford added, "It encourages you as a teacher to be more willing to work and do your job efficiently if the people in the



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
