Stats for 1979-80 showed the estimated population at 2,309, with an enrollment of 482; 1988-89 showed 2,486 folks and 519 enrollment.

The five principal taxpayers are: 1, Sherley Anderson Pitman; 2, Bravo Pipeline Co.; 3, Aztec Cattle Co.; 4, Southwestern Public Service Co., and 5, Santa Fe Railroad.

The district's outstanding debt is about \$25,000.

Arts and crafts fair, Lynne Mahaney; merchants' giveaway, Debra Looper and Kathy Dionne; concessions at the park, Cynthia Thigpen; queen's contest, Susan Franse; and button fund-raiser, Rick Sullivan.

Fred Chandler will be emcee at the park activities. The

Texico-Farwell Senior Citizens will staff the registration table.

Chris Roach, who has been in charge of the parade the past two years, will be moving to Kansas this spring, so a new person will be needed to head this event.

Also at the meeting, the committee:

- Voted to allow the Shriners, which include several local members, to sell candy at the park.

- Discussed buying more speakers so music can be heard at greater distances in the park.

- Voted to put a time limit of three years after graduation for a queen to receive her \$200 scholarship award (collectible if she attends an institution of higher learning within three years of high school graduation).

- Approved having a special BTD cancellation stamp

made, at the suggestion of Mrs. Mahaney. It would be used around Border Town Days. Mrs. Dionne will design it. And Mrs. Mahaney, Farwell postmaster, will talk with Weldon Smith, Texico postmaster, about using it, too.

The next meeting will be May 7 at 8 p.m. at the Spur Restaurant.

'DARE' supported in Parmer

Parmer County Sheriff Rex Williams invited representatives from all over the county to attend a meeting last week to discuss the DARE (Drug Abuse Resistance Education) program.

Williams hopes that it can be implemented in Parmer County. Roy Don Rector, DARE officer for Hereford, explained how it works.

The DARE officer presents drug education programs to students at all of the county's schools, and to interested adult groups. He would also help with drug enforcement.

"Everyone I've talked to likes the idea of this program. We will apply through the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission for a federal grant to help pay for this drug education program," said Williams.

Friana City Manager Beelee Goodwin is writing up a proposal for use of the federal funds.

According to Williams, the federal funding would pay a portion of the cost of the deputy. The sheriff's department has a vehicle that the deputy could use, and hopefully, each community would also help support the deputy.

"We can't advertise this job or get this program going until we find out what money we will get. Then we will take it back to the communities

for approval," said Williams.

The Farwell City Council already has endorsed DARE.

Parmer County is unlike many of its neighboring counties. In many of the neighboring communities, the county seat is the dominant community in the county, and it has the only school system in the county. In some counties, the county seat is the only sizeable community in the county. In Parmer County there are four public school systems, and one private school system for a drug information officer to serve.

"We've got to stop drugs here at the lower level. We've got to have the help and cooperation of the local people. I can't just go into court and say I heard a rumor that somebody has been dealing drugs. It's hard for me and my deputies to arrest somebody without probable cause," said Williams.

He emphasized the importance of having controlled and documented purchases of drugs from dealers if convictions are to be made.

Alcohol abuse is another problem that the DARE officer would work with.

"You wouldn't believe how often we call parents and tell them that we've arrested their children for driving under the influence, and when they come down the parents chew us out," said Williams. "We have got to get cooperation from everyone if we are going to do an effective job."

Williams likened drug problems and alcohol abuse problems to other fads. "When you get a bunch of kids in one town who start using drugs, then they put pressure on others to try it. It's like clothes and other fads - pretty soon you have a whole lot of kids doing the same thing."

The DARE officer learns to provide accurate information about tobacco, alcohol and drugs; teaches students decision-making skills; shows students how to resist peer pressure, and gives students alternatives to drug use.

The unique program uses uniformed officers to teach a formal curriculum in the classrooms.

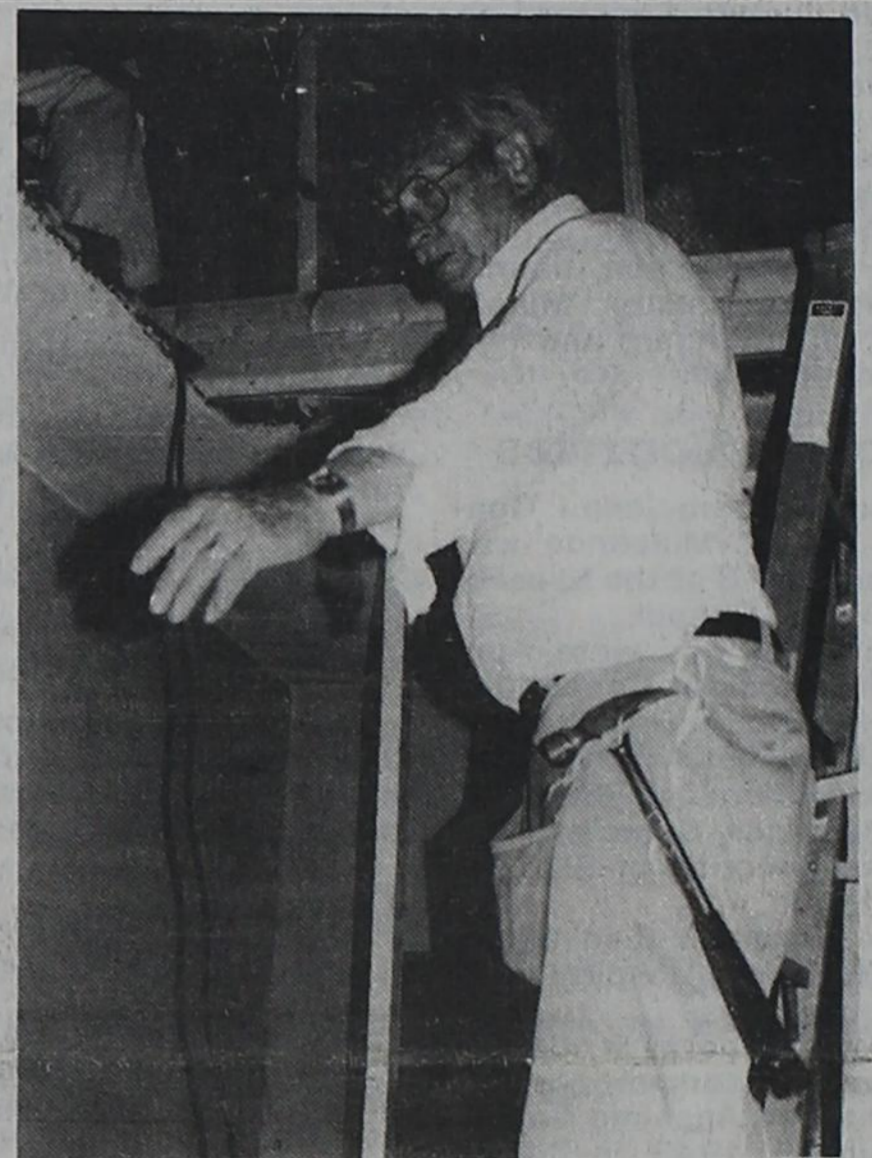

SPS customers to get lower rates

Southwestern Public Service Company's (SPS) Texas retail customers will receive lower rates beginning in April due to an interim reduction in the "fuel-cost recovery factor" on electric bills.

The decrease will lower overall electric rates 9.6%, or \$43.8 million, for residential, commercial, industrial and other retail customers.

The reduction, which was requested by SPS in November 1989, was approved this week on an interim basis by a hearing examiner with the Public Utility Commission of Texas. The fuel cost collected by the interim factor will be subject to final review by the commission.

The amount of the decrease will vary according to usage and rates applicable to different types of customers. Texas residential customers using 1,000 kilowatt hours a month on SPS's standard rate will see their monthly electric bills decline by \$5.07, from \$69.67 to \$64.60.

Latchkey project available here

An opportunity to help latchkey children in Parmer County is now available. A new project aimed at helping these children after school is being implemented by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and the American Home Economics Association (AHEA).

Project Home Safe is designed to help parents of latchkey children find alternative solutions to self-care, said Rochelle White, Parmer County Extension Agent-Home Economics.

In Project Home Safe, volunteers are trained to work with coalitions of community leaders to assess local needs, identify available resources, and develop a plan to solve community problems of children in self care at local levels.

The training in our area will be held in Lubbock on May 22-23. Anyone interested in participating can contact White at 481-3619.

Positive results have been reported from areas that received training last year.

Randall County, for example, has established an after school program licensed by the Texas Department of Human Services. The program has a staff that consists of a director, teachers and aides. Parents pay \$15 per week for the first child and \$10 per week for each additional child. Scholarships have been established to aid parents who are unable to afford the full amount. Gray and Dallam counties have similar programs.

In other counties, Extension agents and volunteers have conducted programs on aspects of home safety for youth and adult audiences and have developed lesson plans and educational materials for kids and parents.

- Other programs include these innovative projects:
- A hot line that allows children to talk out their fears with a grandparent surrogate;
 - Check - in services provided by family day home care providers that require children to call and let them know they have arrived home safely;
 - Supervised after school adventures, craft or hobby clubs organized by parents; and
 - After school child care programs initiated by County Extension home economist, 4-H Clubs, local school districts or concerned community members.

In communities that offer no alternative to latchkey arrangements, training for children in self-care will be provided by Project Home Safe volunteers. In addition, Project Home Safe volunteers will work to create awareness of the needs and problems of young children who care for themselves.

More people . . . more money

A letter from Congressman Larry Combest notes that 87 percent of all federal grants are granted based upon formulae that includes population figures from the U.S. Census.

The 1990 census is slated for April 1. How we answer the census taker's questions will help determine the number of tax dollars we get back from the federal government. The information each of us gives the census taker is of great importance to the people of this area.

Not only does the census determine who gets the federal dollars, it also determines where the congressional boundaries lines are drawn. In a sense, the population figures determine who goes to Congress to spend our tax dollars.

Texas now ranks next to last in total federal grants awarded, according to Combest. He notes that: "for every \$1.61 Texans send to Washington, Texas gets back only \$1. An accurate count in the 1990 census could help bring more money to our part of the country."

Recipe of Week

Peanut Butter Fudge Cake

- Cake
2 eggs
1 c. butter or margarine
1 c. water
1/2 c. buttermilk
1/4 c. unsweetened cocoa
1 tsp. vanilla
2 c. sugar
2 c. all purpose flour
1 tsp. baking soda
Topping:
1 (12 oz.) jar creamy peanut butter
1 tsp. peanut oil
Frosting:
1/4 c. butter or margarine
3 T. buttermilk
2 T. unsweetened cocoa
1 1/2 c. sifted powdered sugar
1/2 tsp. vanilla
Grease and flour a 13-inch baking pan; set aside. Preheat oven to 350 degrees F.

Cake:
Lightly beat eggs in a small saucepan. Add butter, milk, buttermilk, cocoa and vanilla. Cook over medium heat stirring occasionally, just until mixture begins to boil. Meanwhile, combine sugar, flour and baking soda in a medium bowl. Pour hot mixture over the sugar mixture; stir until well mixed. Pour into prepared pan, spreading evenly. Bake 25 minutes or until wooden toothpick inserted in center of cake comes out clean. Cool in pan on wire rack 15 minutes.

Topping:
To make topping, stir peanut butter with oil in small bowl. Spread evenly over top of cooled cake.

Frosting:
To make frosting, combine butter, buttermilk and cocoa in a small saucepan. Bring to boil over medium heat. Remove from heat, stir in powdered sugar and vanilla until smooth. With a teaspoon, drop frosting on peanut butter topping in 3 crosswise and 5 lengthwise rows. Working quickly before frosting sets, draw edge of a metal spatula through frosting crosswise, then lengthwise to make a decorative design.

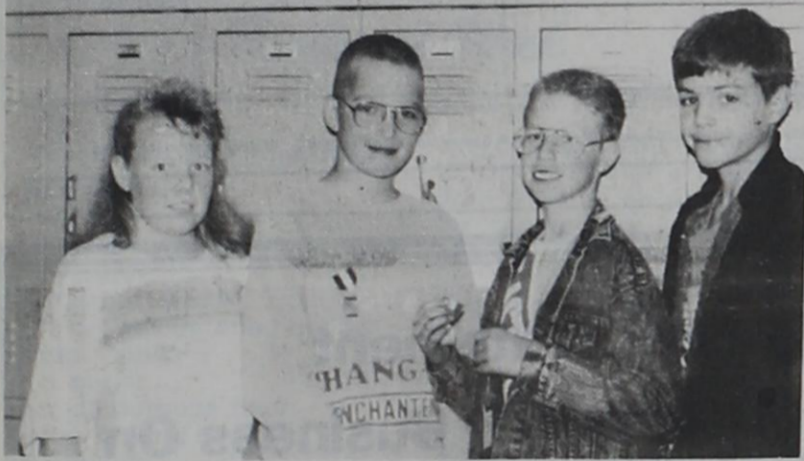

Everett named to state council

A Lazbuddie mother of five has been named to the State Parent Advisory Council for Migrant Children (PAC). Fidelia Everett is one of only 15 members chosen from throughout the state to sit on a committee of parents in an advisory capacity to the state's migrant program.

Mrs. Everett explained, "As a member of the Parent Advisory Committee, I shall be one of 15 responsible for advising the Texas Education Agency in planning, implementing, and evaluating the state program designed to meet the educational needs of our migrant children."

She added, "I am very honored to be chosen as a member of this great committee."

Mrs. Everett said the committee will meet three times during the school year in Austin. At the meeting, the committee members, which include a superintendent, a counselor, a teacher, and parents, will discuss a variety of subjects concerning the plans for the future of migrant children.

She praised the Lazbuddie School migrant program and said she enjoys working with the school. She works closely with teachers who head up the migrant program, Debra Hall, and para-professional Darla McBroom.

Two issues that are being addressed by the state migrant program that are of particular interest to Mrs. Everett are efforts to curb the drop-out rate among migrant students and the possibility of reaching out to 3-year-old migrant children at home. She said that, in the near future, a program may be developed to send people into the homes of 3-year-old migrant children to help prepare them for school before they are ever placed in a school atmosphere.

Mrs. Everett stated that a migrant family is any family that moves from one school district to another for the purpose of farm related employment. She said that migrants can be any nationality or race, and the migrant program was established to help these students, who may move several times during a year, to adjust to a new school environment and to "catch up" with other students.

Lazbuddie School presented Mrs. Everett with an Appreciation Award "for outstanding service to the State PAC and TPCC."

Eva Alcalá of Lazbuddie also received an award for parent involvement. Lazbuddie School administrators stated that they are very proud to be represented at the state level by Mrs. Everett.
