Yes, I know that the county commissioners are exploring the use of containers, with the trash hauled back to Amarillo. And Farwell Mayor Chris Gikas said he is talking with other mayors about the problem.

I still insist we need an overall plan. And the sooner all our governmental officials sit down together, the better.

The Texas Employment Commission reports that the unemployment rate in Parmer County is 2.5 percent, considerably less than the 4.8 percent rate in Texas and the 5.1 percent rate in the U.S.

All school winners have the potential to win the national championship and its first prize, a \$25,000 college scholarship, at the finals May 23 and 24 in Washington, D.C.
