Trashy topic

I guess today's column could be termed the trashiest I've ever written. I hope it doesn't offend your sensibilities too much.

Trash and garbage are not subjects most of us discuss. You either take it out back to burn (Farwell) or you put it in a polycart for pickup (Texico). Since Texico has a pretty good thing going with its service, this column really is for Parmer County folks.

From what I've been hearing at the Farwell City Council meetings lately, it's only a matter of time, either months or years, when burning will be taboo. Currently, cities the size of Farwell are too small to fall under the "no burning" provisions. But that apparently will change and none of us - even if we live on farms - will be allowed to legally burn.

First off is the course I'd recommend, similar to what Texico has: hire a service to pick up the trash and cart it away. Waste Control hauls Texico's garbage to Clovis. But they aren't in a position to haul Texas trash to a New Mexico landfill.

(See related story in Parmer County Commissioners' report in today's paper.)

Possibilities: develop a landfill here and let Waste Control or another service use it. Or find a service with its own landfill, if that's possible.

I use the word landfill carefully because there's a world of difference between a landfill and a dump site.

Dump sites, such as the one the state ordered closed in Lazbuddie, are on their way out. Landfills, which are run according to strict sanitary guidelines, are what the order of the day will be.

Dump sites are cheap and easy to maintain. Landfills are expensive.

And, for example, if a service out of Amarillo or Lubbock will come down here and pick up the trash in big containers and then haul it back to where they came from, that would be ideal. That could happen.

But if it doesn't, and we need a landfill, then I hope that the Parmer County Commissioners call a meeting with officials of Bovina, Friona and Farwell to plot the course for a county landfill.

I think it would be a mistake for the three small cities to go their own way and try to handle the problem individually. Make that a costly mis-

If we can find a service to come here, take our trash. and cart it away, great. If not, and a landfill is needed, then let's work together.

It would benefit all our citizens.

We've been informed that the Calvary Missionary Baptist Church in Farwell is closing.

During the Vietnam War, he served as a battalion surgeon in the Marine Corps from 1967-69.

American Society of Hemaciety and the American Society for Clinical Pharmacology and Therapeutics.

What to do about measles

Here's a measles update:

Texico

School nurse Jeanne Kriegshauser reports that the Public Health Department recommends that persons born after 1956 be vaccinated or re- vaccinated with measles mumps rubella vaccine if:

1. They received their most recent dose of measles vaccine before 1989; or

2. They received their most recent dose of measles vaccine before 15 months of age.

Vaccinations will be given at the Public Health Department, 812 W. 12th Street (the old hospital in Clovis) on Monday- Thursday from 8-11 a.m. and from 1-3 p.m. and on Friday from 8-11 a.m. this week. If your child is under 18 years of age, he must have a parent with him.

The school will allow your child to leave school to obtain *his vaccination. Please bring the date received to the secretary in your school so that it can be recorded.

It has been requested that Texas residents get their shots in Texas because there is a limited amount of vaccine.

Farwell

Nurse Sarah Owen reports that the Texas State Health Department only recommends getting a measles shot if the person is under 30 years old and has either never been vaccinated against measles, or that the person received a measles shot before 15

months of age.

"They say the shots are about 90% effective for those people who got shots between 12- 15 months of age. The shots were 95% effective for those who got their shots after they were 15 months

"For a while they were saying that people vaccinated before 1980 should get a shot, but now the state health department has changed that advice," said Mrs. Owen.

Measles vaccine is available from Dr. Paul Spring at the Parmer County Health Department in the County Hospital in Friona from 9-11 a.m. and from 2-4 p.m. Children under 18 must be accompanied by their parents.

Vaccine is also available from the Texas Health Department in Muleshoe. It is located west of the courthouse. They give shots on Tuesdays. Children under 18 must be accompanied by a parent.

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


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Sheriff's Report

In the 100 m. dash, Curtis Chisom finished 3rd at 11.26, and Shawn Stewart finished 4th at 11.47.


