Talking economics

These developments in Eastern Europe are simply amazing.

Is there anyone reading this column who would have bet a thin dime six months ago that popular uprisings would topple the hard-line Communist leaders of Poland, East Germany and Czechoslovakia? Not me, for sure.

What a development. And what opportunity. Finally, we can safely cut our defense budget.

Do you realize how much of our budget goes to defense? And the fantastic savings that now can occur (read my lips - lower taxes!)?

Let's face it, we no longer need 225,000 American fighting men in Europe. The Warsaw Pact, as far as a military presence, is worthless. The Poles and Czechs are not going to attack the U.S.

And it's time the Japanese, instead of buying America, spend some of that yen to support its own defense forces.

The complex new weapons cost so much that it simply isn't worth it to churn out billion dollar aircraft that are obsolete by the time they are rolled out on the tarmac.

But I'm a realist. Sure, cutbacks will be made. Some money will be saved. But you can bet your bottom dollar that won't translate into lower taxes.

Instead, our bloated bureaucracy will find ample ways to spend the money any way it can. I read where of Henry Kissinger already has supported taking the money saved from defense cuts and giving it gratis to Eastern European countries to help build their economies.

Not a bad idea. I don't mind part of the savings going that route. I just hope there is something tiny left over for us taxpayers.

And don't underestimate the military - industrial complex. Defense contractors are not just going to roll over. They will spend millions of dollars to lobby their congressmen on keeping the defense budget where it is.

After all, in the final analysis, we are talking politics.

Who knows, maybe they will come up with another bogeyman. Perhaps, the Samoa Islands or Outer Mongolia will threaten to conquer the U.S. We can't have that, can we?

The fact is that the Soviet Union, our main enemy, has an economy that is collapsing. They are not in a position to maintain the arms race, due to lack of funds. They aren't cutting back because they like us any better; they are doing it in their own self-interest.

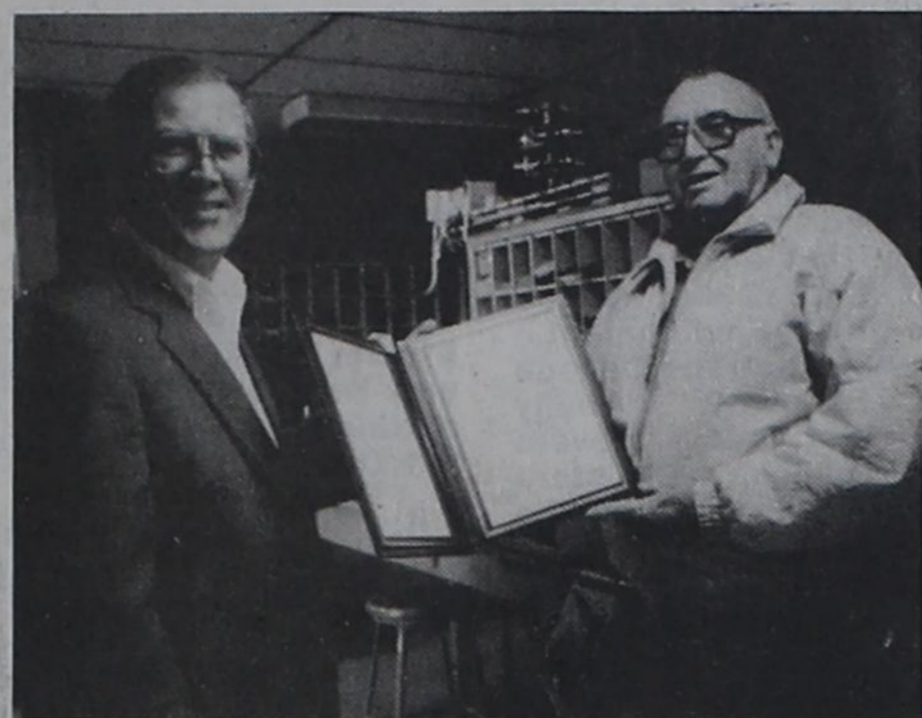
What the Soviet leadership has yet to discover is that it cannot turn around its economic problems until it adds some internal freedoms. That is going to be awfully hard to do after 70 years of straight-jacket economics. I think they have a problem they cannot solve - and I think it's great.

But before you start gloating about the Communist problems, the U.S. has its own, too.

About a year ago, I read a statistic where 48 percent of the folks working in the U.S. are now working for the government. Along with that, it was noted that history shows nations to go downhill rapidly when the total of government workers goes over the 50 percent mark.

Add to that the growth of the chains - which specialize in paying their employees minimum wages and as few benefits as they can legally get away with (you would be surprised to know the number of companies that only hire people to work part-

Farwell tournament under way

The Farwell Varsity Tournament gets under way on Dec. 7.

The tourney features action from most of the local teams: Farwell, Texico, Bovina, Lazbuddie, Friona, Olton, and Grady.

Thursday's games will be played in both the Texico and the Farwell gyms so that none of the students will miss any school to participate. There will be games starting at 4, 5:30, 7, and 8:30 p.m. on Thursday.

"We encourage everybody to come," said coach Larry Gregory. "There should be some very interesting games." The old rivals from neighboring towns will be paired off against one another," he said.

Gregory conceded that Farwell hopes to win its own tournament again this year. The Farwell Steers are favored to win their side of the bracket, and Friona is favored to win on the other side of the bracket.

Gregory does not rule out Texico which opened its season by steamrolling Amherst 119-23.

Gregory noted that the Texico girls are the favorites to win the girls' bracket, but Cloudcroft and the Friona girls may give them some stiff competition.

Cloudcroft, which competed in the New Mexico State Basketball championship last

Texico man killed in accident

Jerry Montano, 37, of Texico was killed Tuesday afternoon in an unusual accident when he and a friend lifted a 30 foot long aluminum irrigation pipe vertically and accidentally struck a 14,400 watt power line.

Montano was declared dead at the scene by medical investigator Joe Thomas at 12:49 p.m. MST. The death was ruled accidental.

Glenn Bass, 30, of Clovis was listed in serious but stable condition Tuesday night in Lubbock General Hospital's Burn Intensive Care Unit where he was being treated for third degree burns.

The Texico Fire Department

transported Bass to the Clovis High Plains Hospital after the accident. He was airlifted to Lubbock later in the afternoon.

Apparently, Montano and Bass were rabbit hunting and lifted the aluminum pipe to get the rabbit to come out of the 6" diameter pipe.

The accident occurred at 12:30 p.m. MST about two miles north of Texico on Highway 108.

Bass was able to make his way to the highway to flag down a passing motorist who assisted him and contacted the fire department and Texico Marshal Brent Byrum.

Farwell woman dies in auto accident

Maria De Luz Parra, 21, of Farwell, died Dec. 1 from injuries suffered in a one-vehicle accident Nov. 29 at 11:40 a.m., 1 1/2 miles east of Farwell.

Her son, Jose Parra Jr., 18 months, was treated and released from Clovis Hospital.

The vehicle driver was

taken to the University of New Mexico Hospital with injuries.

According to state police reports, the accident occurred when the driver apparently overcorrected the vehicle after it partially left the road. The car went into a ditch, then rolled over.

Roberts not running

Candidates announce

The flurry of candidates announcing for the March primary election in Parmer County is continuing.

Announcing for re-election this week are the following Democratic candidates: Anne Norton, county treasurer; Marjorie Watkins, district court clerk; Bonnie Warren, county clerk; and Jack Young, 287th Judicial District judge.

Also, Louise Hancock has announced for the Democratic nomination for the Pct. 1 Justice of the Peace post which will become vacant due to the resignation of Albert Smith.

And Eva Ancira of Farwell said she will seek the Democratic nomination for county judge.

Also, B.K. Buske of Friona is expected to announce for the county judge's post next week.

Others who have announced for the Democratic nominations are Leland Gustin, for county judge; Tom Ware, for re-election as county commissioner for Pct. 2 (Bovina); and Raymond McGehee, for re-election as county commissioner for Pct. 4 (Lazbuddie).

Porter Roberts, a Democrat who has served 10 years as county judge, said he plans to retire. The 66-year-old Friona resident said he plans to stay here but will leave public office.

Frances Euler, Justice of the Peace in Friona, said she plans to run for re-election in the Democratic primary.

But Bonnie Clayton, Justice of the Peace, is still considering her options, especially in light of a recent Parmer County Commissioners' meeting where the topic was whether to eliminate one of the three JP posts in Parmer County.

The commissioners looked at a proposal to cut the county into two JP districts with the dividing line running roughly through Bovina. Further study will occur before a decision is made.

The filing deadline is Jan. 2. To register for office, Democrats must file with Parmer County Democratic Chairman Wendol Christian. Republicans must file with GOP Chairman Phil Johnson.

The filing cost for seeking a JP post is \$300; for the other offices, \$600. To run for a statewide office, you must file with the state Democrat or Republican chairmen.

Mrs. Warren, of Farwell, has had no opposition in her last two elections. She is seeking her sixth term as county clerk. The lifelong resident of Parmer County began working in the clerk's office under Lloyd Brewer.

"If elected to another term, I shall continue to fulfill the duties of this office in a courteous, efficient and prompt manner as I have tried to do in the past," said Mrs. Warren. "I shall sincerely appreciate your support in the forthcoming Democrat primary by returning me to office. Your past favors have been sincerely and deeply appreciated."

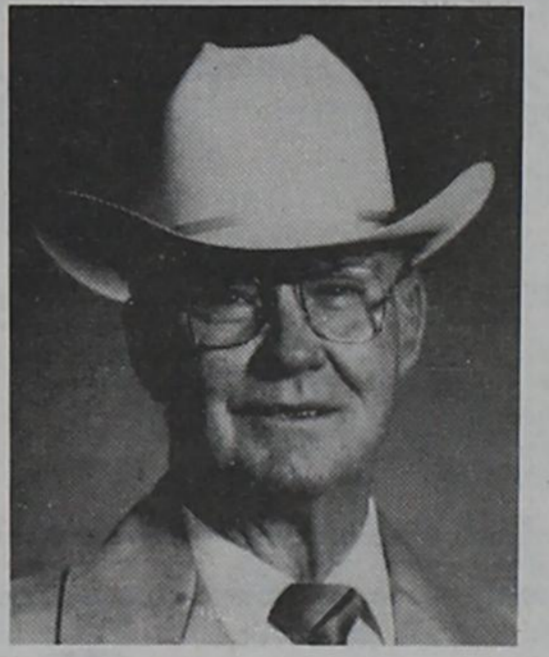

The Citizenship in Action program at Farwell Junior High was started to promote citizenship, to improve overall school climate, and to reward students for improvement, excellence, and responsibility. It teaches students that good citizenship demands attention to responsibilities as well as rights.

"This has been a very productive program," said principal Jerry Dee Owen. "A lot of good things have come out of it."

Each time a staff member sees a student doing something especially good, they give the student a ticket. During the first few weeks the program was in session, 402 tickets were issued. For instance, a student may earn a ticket by qualifying for the honor roll, or for returning required forms to the school at the appropriate time. They might receive a ticket for having a clean locker, or for making up homework in a timely manner. Teachers may even give tickets to students

who do something kind or polite.

"Every teacher in the building has to work on citizenship," said Owen.

'It's not the worst'

"This crop shows that we are doing a better job doing the things we can control, but we haven't learned how to control the weather," said Donald Johnson, executive vice president of Plains Cotton Growers Inc.

The weather has probably been, yet again, the major factor in the size of the crop. "Almost ideal conditions gave us two bumper years back to back, and this season's cotton crop looks disappointingly small by comparison," he said.

Drought conditions through May over most of PCG's 25-county area meant that much of the 2.8 million planted acres never got out of the ground. Then hail storms and washing rains in July took their toll, especially in Hale County, reducing total harvestable acres to maybe less than 2 million.

The early October freeze drastically reduced yields on what remained of the crop, especially the large percentage of late-planted June cotton.

"But this is not the worst year in 10 years," he said. "In 1982, 1983 and 1986 we had less bales ginned and lower yields per harvested acre than it looks like we'll have from this crop."

This tell Johnson that many growers are effectively and efficiently using the technology and techniques available to them for optimum production.

The size of the crop has been guessed at many times during the year. Final figures still are not available but, working on classing office estimates based on bales classed to date, a spread from 1.3 to 1.4 million bales seems realistic.

FERC order supports SPS

An order from the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission supports a court decision upholding Southwestern Public Service Company's treatment of investment tax credits for its wholesale customers, including rural electric cooperatives, according to SPS.

"This order finally brings to a conclusion a case filed back in 1980 by SPS to adjust rates charged to some of its wholesale customers."

said Gary Gibson, SPS vice president of marketing. "This decision will not change rates currently being billed. It acknowledges SPS's past proper treatment of these tax credits and will be reflected in two pending wholesale cases before the FERC."

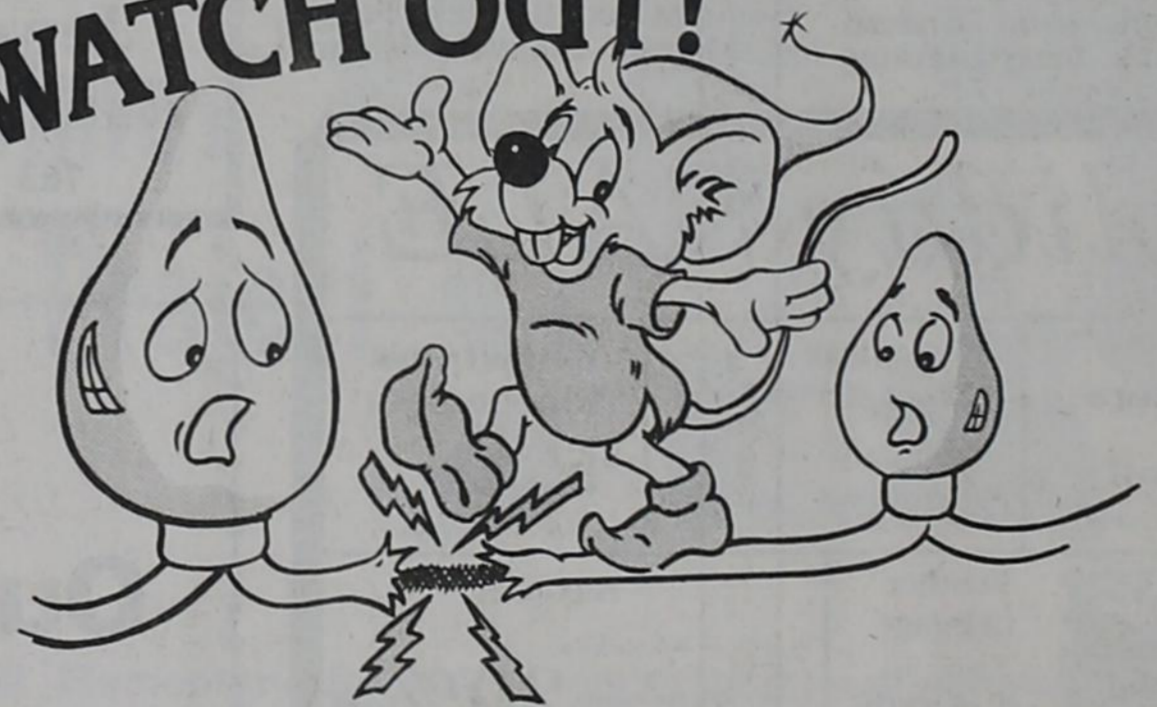

LEARN WHAT CHRISTMAS SAFETY'S ABOUT!

A CHRISTMAS SAFETY CHECK

- Before hanging strings of lights, spread them on the floor and check for frayed or bare wires, cracked insulation, loose connections, and damaged plugs or light sockets.
- Check extension cords for wear or damage and don't run them across walking areas.
- Test lights before putting them on the tree. Unplug them before making repairs or replacing bulbs.
- Overloading circuits with too many lights can cause fire. Follow manufacturer's instructions about the number of lights allowed on one circuit.
- Never string lights on a metallic tree.
- Choose a fresh, green tree, trim its base and keep it in plenty of water. If the needles are brown and break off easily, it could be a fire risk.
- If you buy an artificial tree, make sure it has been tested for flammability by Underwriters Laboratories (UL).
- Always turn off lights before leaving home or going to bed. You'll save money and be safer, too.
- Do not use inside lights on the outside. All outside lighting equipment, including lights, cords and plugs, should be waterproof and made for outdoor use. Also, hang sockets downward and don't leave a socket empty.
- When hanging lights on the rooftop or in tall trees outdoors, stay clear of electrical lines.

Is your farm in compliance?

The following note came in from the Soil Conservation Service:

Have you developed your conservation compliance plan yet?

To stay eligible for USDA programs all cropland has to have a conservation compliance plan on all highly erodible fields by the end of the 1989 year.

This time frame may be deceptive. Some people think that all they have to do is come by during the last part of December and sign up, but it is more involved than that.

When these plans are developed with the landowner or operator, decisions are made and recorded. Then the paperwork starts. Technical decisions are checked to see if erosion control is within limits. Next technical descriptions are inserted and all work is duplicated for the landowner's or operator's copy. All this is sent to a checker.

If everything is in order then it is time to get the necessary

signatures. The Parmer County Soil and water Conservation District meets the first Tuesday of each month, and they approve or disapprove the plans at this time. If it is approved and signed, it is assembled, recorded and mailed. It is not until this time the plan is considered complete.

Looking at this time schedule, if the plan is not ready for review and signatures by the end of November - it will not be until January 1990 that the plan will be complete.

The law is, if it is not complete by Dec. 31, 1989 - that farm is out of compliance.

People that have not yet accomplished this may be upset because they will be put out of compliance. Remember, you have had more than three years to accomplish this.

Recipe of Week

Pumpkin Bread

- 3 c. sugar
- 1 c. salad oil
- 4 eggs, beaten
- 1 16 oz. can Del Monte Pumpkin
- 3 1/2 c. sifted flour
- 2 tsp. baking soda
- 2 tsp. salt
- 1 tsp. baking powder
- 1 tsp. each of nutmeg, all-spice, and cinnamon
- 1/2 tsp. ground cloves
- 2/3 c. water

Cream sugar and oil. Add eggs and pumpkin; mix well. Sift together flour, soda, salt, baking powder, and spices. Add pumpkin mixture alternately with water. Mix well after each addition. Pour into 2 well - greased and floured 9 x 5 inch loaf pans. Bake at 350 degrees F. for 1 1/2 hours, until loaves test done. Let stand for 10 minutes. Remove from pans to cool. Makes 2 loaves.

On Nov. 29, both departments were called two miles east of Farwell on Highway 84 at 11:50 a.m. Patients were transported to Clovis Hospital.

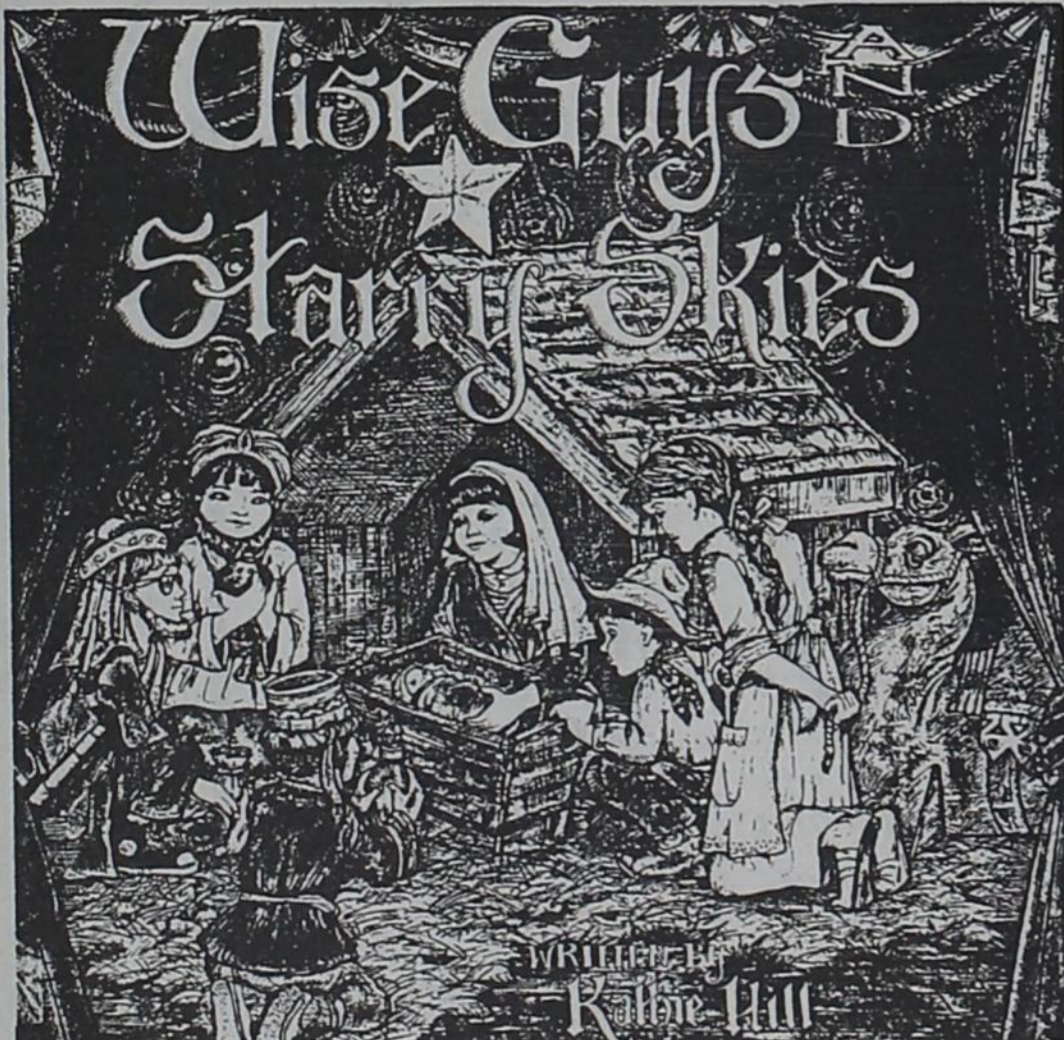

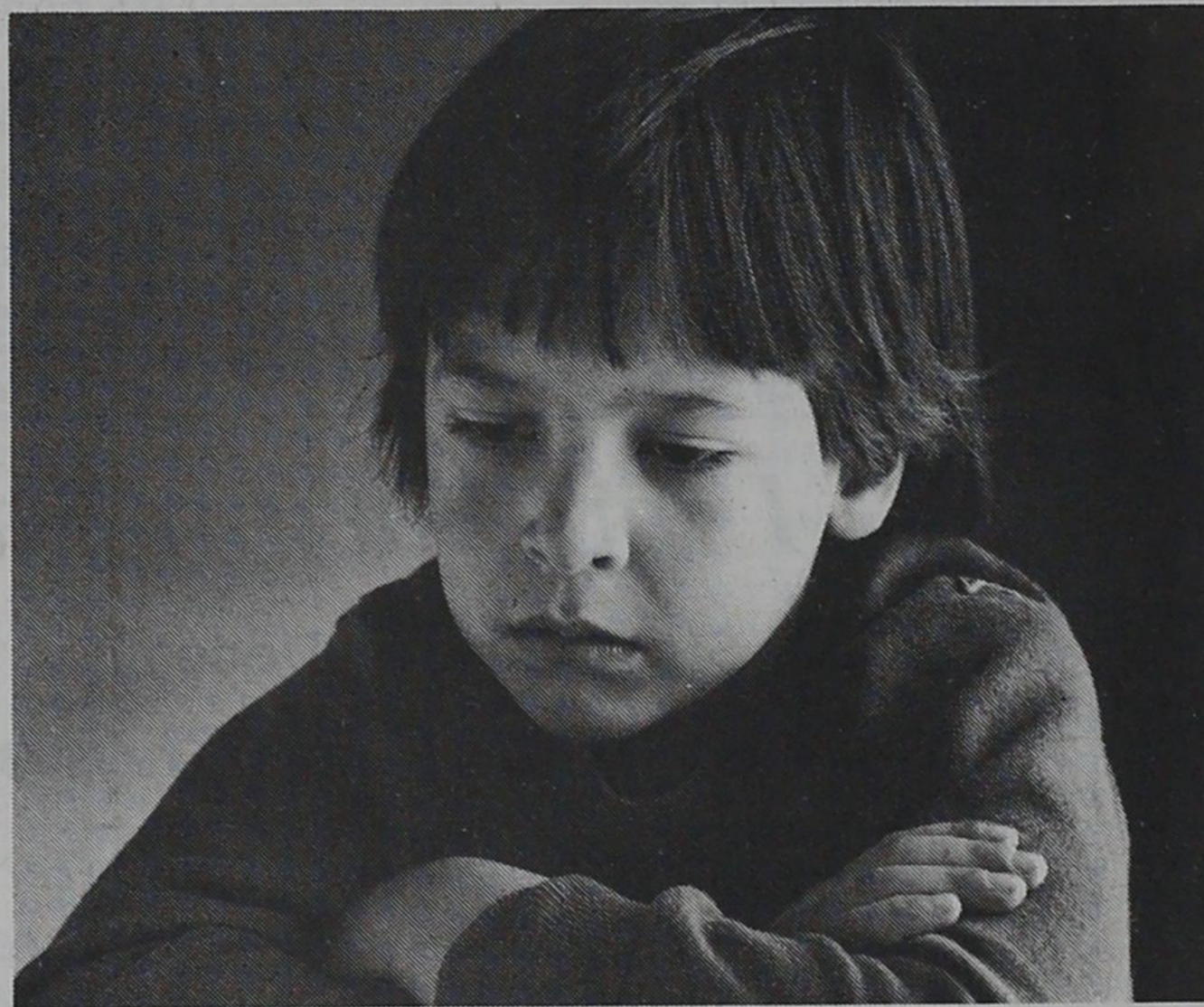

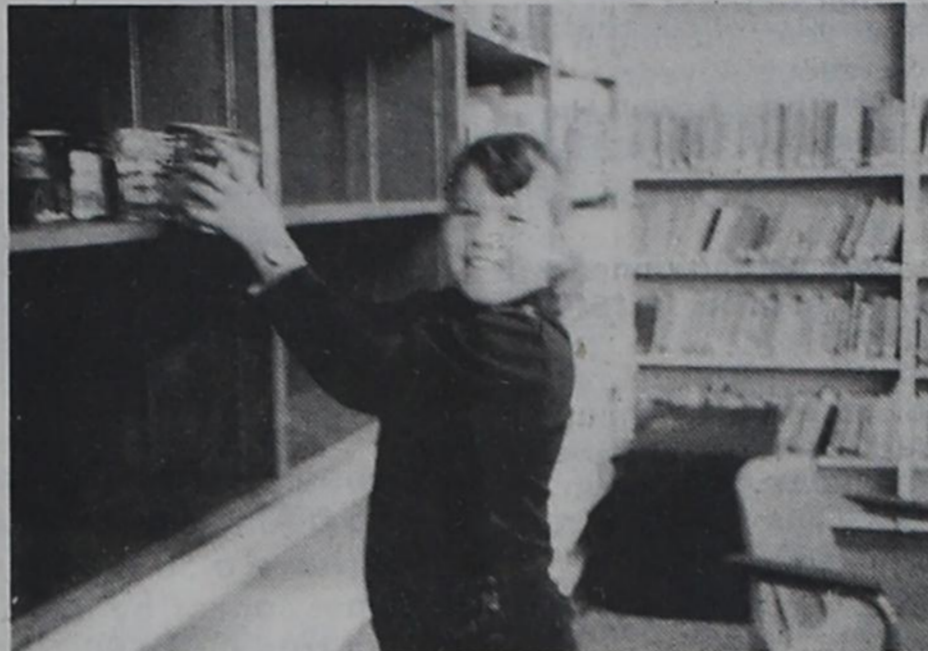

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Theta Rho chapter of Epsilon Sigma Alpha is sponsoring its 8th annual pheasant hunt this year.

The hunting sites will be located in Parmer and Bailey Counties in Texas, and will be reserved for pheasant and duck hunting through the pheasant season dates, Dec. 9-24.

The annual event is a fund-raiser for the group's philanthropic projects. In the past this has included \$15,000 (over three years) to the Community Center; money and equipment for the New Mexico Girls Ranch; the establishment of the Rosa Roberts Educational Fund with Opportunity Plan, Inc.; playground equipment for the Farwell City Park, along with donations to such worthy causes as the Texico-Farwell Rotary Club polo project, Hodges Cancer Center, St. Jukes Children's Hospital and the Parmer County Child Welfare Board.

Sorority members make sure that there is plenty of cover for birds to hide in so that the birds can grow and multiply safely. They talk to landowners to get permission for the use of their land and pay a fee to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department to establish a shooting reserve. Then the land is posted as such.

After the land is set up, the sorority estimates the number of hunters who can safely hunt in each area. They patrol the preserves to make sure there are not unauthorized hunters.

To hunt on the ESA preserves, one must be a licensed hunter and purchase a permit for the preserve. All permits are good from the date they are issued through the closing day of the season. Permits are good for any or all land secured by the sorority. Each participating landowner is given one or more complimentary permits.

Each hunter must have a Texas hunting license. Those hunting ducks must have a duck stamp. Texas hunting

licenses may be purchased locally at Hughes True Value and at the Parmer County Clerk's office. This is located on the first floor of the Parmer County Courthouse.

The preserve land will be posted and open only to hunters buying permits from ESA. Each hunter will be given a map of the posted land and will be free to hunt on any of the preserve land. The preserve will be patrolled so that only those having permits will be allowed to hunt.

Permits sold will be good from the date issued through the remainder of the season. Permit prices for the 1989 hunting season will be: Dec. 9-10, \$75; Dec. 11-17, \$50; Dec. 18-24, \$25. Permits sold for hunters ages 12 and under \$25.

Reservations may be made by mail by contacting Altha Herrington, Box 542, Farwell, Texas 79325, (806) 481-9351. A \$25 non-refundable deposit is required to hold reservations this year for the ESA hunt because reservations have been limited.

Tail feather contest to begin

The annual Pheasant Hunt Tail Feather Contest will continue this year, making it the 24th consecutive year.

Sponsors are Farwell Hardware, Security State Bank, and Sherley - Anderson - Pitman.

The first place winner will get \$30; second, \$15 and third, \$10.

Those wishing to enter should take their pheasant tail feathers to Farwell Hardware no later than noon on Dec. 24. The season runs from Dec. 9-24 in Texas.

Gary Patterson, County Extension Agent, has been the official pheasant tail feather measurer in the past.

When making reservations, hunters should indicate whether they will hunt with dogs. The preserve land will be posted and open only to hunters buying ESA permits.

Due to reports from landowners of reduced pheasant population, the number of permits sold for opening day will be decreased in order to assure all hunters a fair chance of obtaining their limits. This year only 100 permits will be issued.

All reservations will be made on a first come, first served basis.

The reserved permits and maps may be picked up Dec. 8 from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. (CST) at Hughes True Value, or Dec. 9 from 5 a.m. - 8 a.m. at the Farwell Community Center.

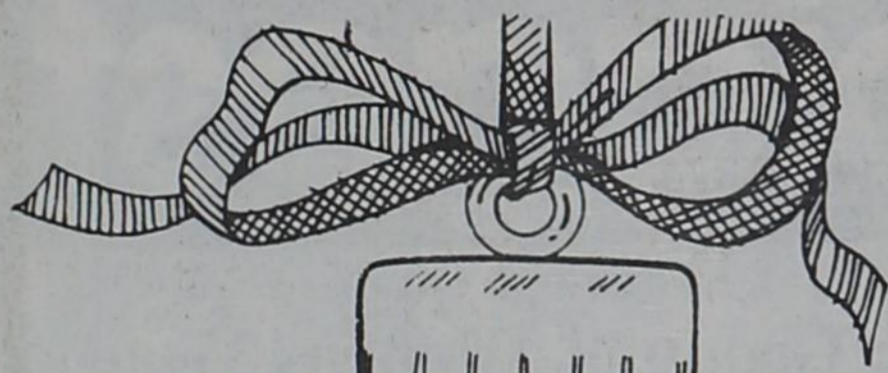

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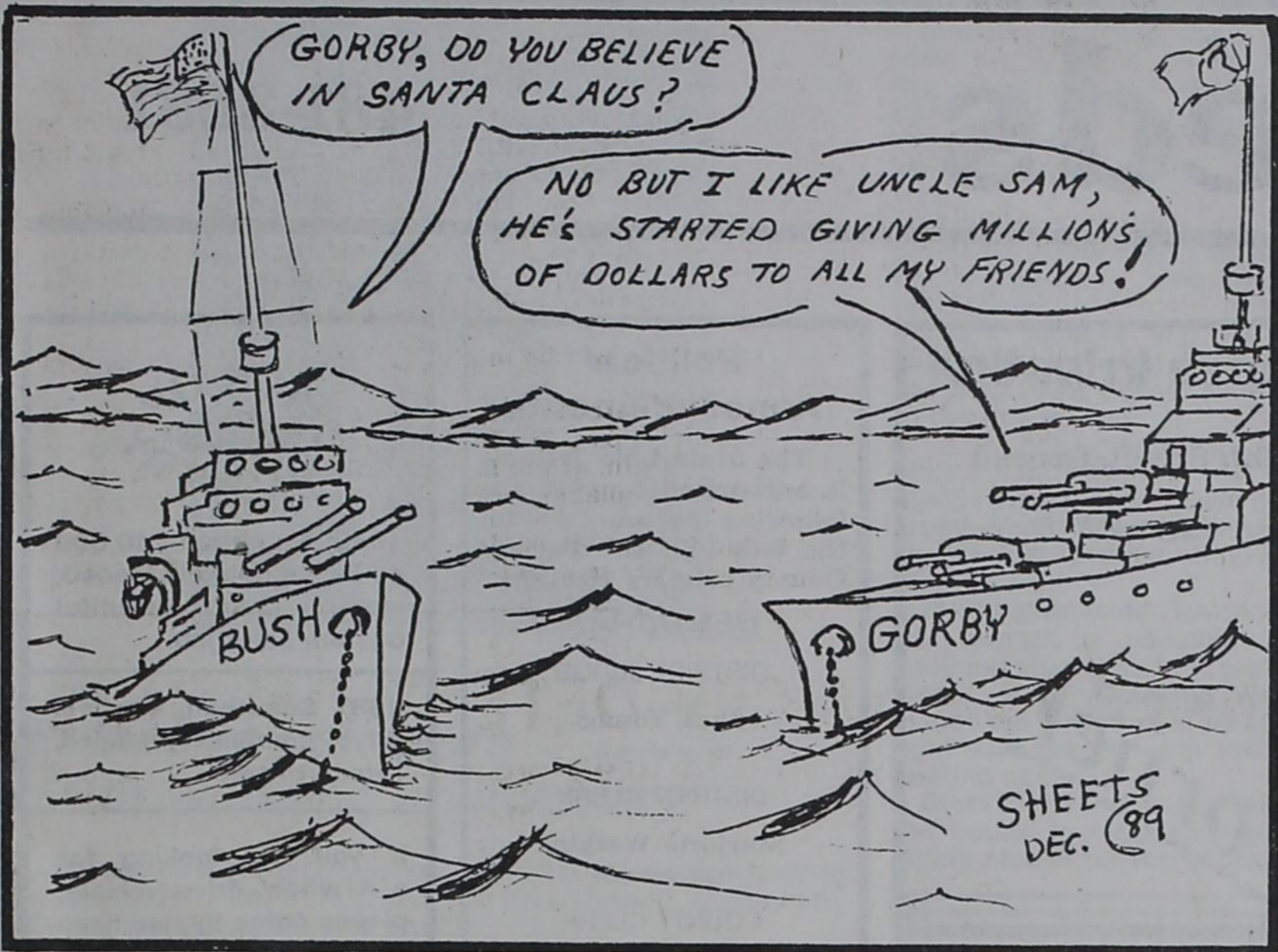

Insects a nuisance

Insects are beginning to look for a place to spend the winter, said Mike Blanton, Farmer and Bailey County entomologist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Most just looking for a place to overwinter and are not establishing permanent residences.

These insects will be a nuisance and most of them do not present a great danger to the homeowner.

"It is not uncommon for insects to enter attics or garages through cracks in the foundation, open windows or spaces around doors," Blanton said.

The agent said mechanical control is possible by caulking all cracks to prevent insect entry. Caulking also makes the structure more airtight and should help lower heating costs.

Store firewood away from the house to help eliminate hiding places for the pests.

Homeowners should store firewood as far from the house as possible and take only the amount needed for immediate use into the house.

"Firewood stacked beside the house may be handy but as the wood warms, spiders, scorpions and other pests may leave the wood and escape to other areas of the house," Blanton said.

Workshop set

The annual Mrs. Santa's Workshop will be held Saturday, Dec. 9 from 10 a.m. - 4 p.m. MST in the Memorial Building, 7th and Abilene, in Portales. This workshop is free to the public and sponsored by the Roosevelt County Extension Homemakers and Roosevelt County Chamber of Commerce.

Santa and his photographer will be there from 11 a.m. to 3 p.m. MST for the kids to turn in their Santa list and have their pictures made.

Accident involved hazardous material

The Texico Fire Department responded to an unusual call Tuesday afternoon. There was a vehicle accident with injuries at Wheeler and Highway 60 at about 5:23 p.m. MST which involved a hazardous material.

John Schmidt, 25, of Texico was transported to Clovis High Plains Hospital after his vehicle collided with a 1,000 gallon tankful of alcohol mash that was being pulled behind a pickup truck driven by Morris Hoyt. A valve on the tank ruptured, allowing the alcohol mash to spill out on the highway.

"It was good practice for us," said Texico Marshal Brent Byrum. The alcohol mash is classified as hazardous material, but it is not as dangerous as many other substances that could have spilled.

The accident tied up traf-

fic on the highway for nearly 5 hours before the hazardous material was completely cleared away according to EPA guidelines. The New Mexico Highway department had to bring in a load of sand before the spill was declared completely cleaned up.

Byrum noted that several firemen responded to the call. They transported Schmidt to the hospital, directed traffic, washed up the mess, and brought coffee for everyone at the scene.

"We have a super fire department," said Byrum.

According to Byrum, this is the second time in about a month that the Texico Fire Department has been called to clean up a hazardous waste spill. The first time was spilled gasoline at the Town and Country in Texico about a month ago.

Water District readings taken

High Plains Underground Water Conservation District personnel are expecting to find drier than normal soil moisture conditions over most of the Water District service area when annual pre-plant soil moisture monitoring begins in mid-November.

The southern High Plains normally receives 16 to 17 inches of its annual rainfall by November. Through October, however, most of the Water District service area had received only 11 to 13 inches of rain.

"We anticipate that soil moisture conditions will be so dry that most irrigators in the Water District will need to irrigate to fill their pre-plant

soil moisture profile. Having a full soil moisture profile at planting helps ensure maximum economic yields," says Mike Risinger, Soil Scientist with the USDA-Soil Conservation Service and coordinator of the Water District's soil moisture monitoring program.

Data collected at the 271 soil moisture monitoring sites will be used to construct soil moisture availability and deficit maps for the 1990 pre-plant season. The maps will be provided to the news media for publication as soon as they are completed. These maps will illustrate the estimated moisture available in the soil profile for plant use; the moisture distribution

within the soil profile; and the amount of water that must be applied to bring the soil profile to field capacity.

Water District personnel measure soil moisture conditions with neutron moisture meters. The neutron moisture meter is one of the most ac-

curate soil moisture measuring devices available. Readings are taken at six-inch intervals throughout the five-foot soil profile by inserting a neutron probe into a previously-installed aluminum access tube. Landowners who allow Water District soil mois-

ture monitoring sites on their land are provided with data regarding their field's individual soil moisture conditions.

The High Plains Water District reminds producers that Water District personnel Jerry Funck, Obbie Goolsby, Arnold Husky and Mike Risinger will

be out in the fields taking soil moisture readings from November to January. Blue and white Water District vehicles are easily identified and personnel will be happy to answer landowners' questions while collecting the soil moisture data.
