The U. S. Department of Aariculture announced the signup in the new 0-25 program for soybeans will be Jan. Since sunflowers and safflowers may also be planted on conservation use acres as approved non program crops, signup for those crops is not required.
Producers may sign up to plant soybeans on no more than 25 percent of their permitted acreages for 1990 whea feed grains, upland cotton, extra long staple cotton and rice. Producers participating in this option will to lose or gain farm acreage base or individual crop acreage bases on their farms as a result of the $0-25$ plantings.
based on the anticipated additional 0-25 soybeate whethe the average market price for the 1990 crop of soybeans will be less than $\$ 4.98$ per bushel ( 110 percent of the 1989 loan rate for soybeans of $\$ 4.53$ per bushel). If the soybean price is
expected to be below this level, CCC will reduce or eliminate all or a portion of the permitted acreage that may be planted to soybeans under this program.
Program benefits other than soybean price support and purchases will not be available to producers who participate in the $0-25$ program.
Producers may obtain further information from county Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service offices.
