It never ceases to amaze me the opportunities that are offered our youth in such a small community like Texico - Farwell.

And those opportunities are so important - because they lead to successes. Those successes often help our youngsters mature into the kind of people who have still more successes in life.

All our kids can't be great athletes. All our kids can't be great scholars. All our kids won't have fantastic talents.

Thus, it's necessary to offer a variety of activities where kids can find paths where they can do well. Without those successes, the alternate lurks - failure.

Since I had never lived in a small community like ours, I had automatically assumed that there wouldn't be much opportunity here, just due to the small size of the town. What I had not reckoned with was the spirit among parents to disregard the lack of population base and to provide as many opportunities as possible.

Thus, Texico - Farwell continually supports excellent athletic teams. For a Texico team, whether it be basketball, football or volleyball, to earn a state playoff berth is not unusual. And Farwell teams of late have set city records.

Music? I think residents of both towns would agree the local band programs are excellent, with caring instructors. What would life be without music, I ask you.

Similarly, even though activities like ballet, dance and gymnastics are not offered locally, they are available in close proximities like Clovis and Muleshoe. Most parents use area facilities (car pooling works wonders).

Academics? The range of opportunity is here. There are the ag courses for future farmers; there are the advanced academic programs for college bound; there are basic vocational programs for those inclined toward the crafts.

I know our town cannot offer the range that the big city schools can, but we can, and do, offer the basics. If the youngster is inclined in a direction, it's up to him to carry forth. Texico - Farwell boasts a fine array of students who have earned degrees in academia ranging from medicine to law to engineering to home economics to farming. It can be done if the will is there.

What brought about this particular column is a 9th grade basketball game I saw at Sudan last week.

Farwell has a large 9th grade class so athletic director Rex Cumpton and basketball coach Larry Gregory decided to split it into two teams: some would be part of the Junior Varsity squad, while the others would form a 9th grade team.

This was done so all young athletes would have the opportunity to develop instead of just sitting on the bench and getting only a few minutes of playing time during the season due to the large size of one squad.

When I was watching those 9th graders at Sudan, I was thinking of that decision. And I was thinking how lucky these youngsters were to get this kind of opportunity. For some kids, if they had been attending the big school, there would be no way they could earn a spot on the team. They would have been cut without having the opportunity to develop.

While it's true that many of those playing now may not make the varsity team, it also is true they are having the opportunity to grow and develop. And while doing that, they have successes,

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Parmer Livestock Show upcoming

The Parmer County Junior Livestock Show will be held in the Friona Community Center Jan. 29 - Feb. 1.

The show is a combined 4-H, FFA, and FHA show open to all county youth who are enrolled in grades 3-12 at any of the county's public schools.

The registration deadline is Jan. 22. Entry cards and fees must be turned in to the Friona Agricultural Dept., Box 97 by

that date. The fees are: \$8 - steer; \$5 - lamb; \$20 - heifer; and \$5 - barrow.

All animals will weigh in from 3 - 7 p.m. Jan. 29. Animals will be tagged or marked as they are weighed. Tags of other shows will not be allowed.

Classes for this year's show will be determined at the time of weigh-in. There will probably be classes for Heifers and Steers; Lambs, Fine wool, Crossbreed, Hampshire, Suffolk, Southdowns, and Otherbreeds and Crosses; Barrows, Yorkshire; Chester White, Crossbreed, Berkshire, Duroc, Hampshire, Polands and Spots.

There will be trophies for the Grand Champion and Reserve Champion of the show. Showmanship trophies will also be awarded. There will also be an award for the Breeding Project Essay.

The final day of the livestock show will feature a sale of the animals at 6:30 p.m. About 50 percent of each class will be in the sale up to 140 head.

Judges will be: Steer and Heifers, Ross Caviness; Barrows, Lanny Tucker; Lambs, Denny Belew.

The Parmer County Stock Show Board's Advisory Committee includes: Farwell, Stan Austin and Mark Schwertner; Bovina, Ted Clayton and Jessee Stone; Lazbuddie, Johnny Mitchell and Lloyd Bradshaw; Friona, Glen Salyer and Jerry Simmons.

Commissioners give EPA their views

The Parmer County Commissioners last Friday prepared a resolution to the Environmental Protection Agency.

It requests the EPA consider revisions to its landfill regulations that would be flexible enough to cover areas like Parmer County where there is low population density.

The commissioners believe it is not economically feasible to operate the kind of landfill that the EPA requires in an area such as Parmer County where there are so few people per square mile. Nor is it economically feasible to carry solid waste over long distances.

It points out that Parmer County has low precipitation and the kind of soil conditions which make the possibility of groundwater contamination remote.

Copies of the resolution are being sent to the Texas Department of Health, U.S. Senators Lloyd Bentsen and Phil Gramm, and Congressman Larry Combest so that they might assist in obtaining modifications to the EPA regulations.

In other business, the commissioners:

- Paid the second installment to Grimes and Associates, the engineering firm handling the courthouse elevator project.

Texico Schools participate in computer program

Texico Schools are participating in the Furr's Computers for Classrooms program, a program designed to provide computers, printers, and software to schools.

The schools are asking that children bring in cash register receipts from Furr's, Safeway, Save 'n Gain, Food Emporium Super Duper, or Shoprite food stores. When a school has \$175,000 worth of receipts, it will qualify for a computer with a printer.

As an incentive to get students to bring in cash register receipts, Texico Elementary school is sponsoring a free weekly drawing. Students write their names on the back of each cash register receipt they bring in. One

student each week will receive a chocolate milk shake as an incentive to bring in cash register receipts.

PTO president Sherry Christian said, "This is a wonderful opportunity for the whole community to support education by acquiring state-of-the-art computer technology for our students and teachers."

"The program is very simple. Our school collects participating register receipts and returns them to the store in exchange for computers we need for our school."

"IBM computers are the business standard," says Jim Pierce, school superintendent, "and we at Texico Schools

Four more enter Texico election

There was a flurry of activity Tuesday, the day Texico residents could sign up as write-in candidates for the March 6 city election.

Two residents signed up for the mayoral post: Doyal LaRue and Kathy Dionne.

LaRue, a councilman for the past four years, originally had signed up for re-election to that post. But last week he withdrew from the council race, and announced he would be a write-in candidate for mayor after no one had filed for mayor.

Also Tuesday, two residents signed up for the vacant council post that LaRue had withdrawn from - Ronnie Warmuth and Karen Kosier.

Without opposition are the two incumbent city councilmen seeking election - Oran Jay Autrey and Butch Sharp.

Thus, Texico will have two races on the ballot in March: LaRue vs. Mrs. Dionne and Warmuth vs. Mrs. Kosier.

Mrs. Kosier and Mrs. Dionne are sisters. To be a write-in candidate, you had to sign up Tuesday. If a person didn't sign up Tuesday, and still got a majority of the write-in votes March 6, that person is disqualified.

There will be spaces on the ballot for write-in votes, although the candidates' names will not be listed. The names will be listed on a bulletin board in the polling place.

City Clerk Marie Christian explained that even if a name is misspelled as a write-in, it still will be counted because the law says the "intent" should be used as the decision on whether to count a vote.

The election officials will be Mae Stone, Theodora Rojas and Bernice Thigpen. Steve Chancy is the alternate.

Chancy, current mayor, is not seeking re-election.

Mrs. Dionne has been a Texico resident for nine years, living in Clovis before that. She is a registered nurse and is certified in I.V. therapy. She has three children - Kim, Paul and Elizabeth.

She is a member of the I.V. Nursing Society and American Cancer Society and has had articles published in R.N. Magazine. Art is her hobby.

Mrs. Dionne said: "I've lived in our community long enough that I feel a need to participate in keeping it a great place to live. We have an excellent school system and the makings of a charming little town. But we do need a general cleanup of the community - a kick in the pants would help."

"Also, we need more citizen involvement. While we have good activities for senior citizens and our churches go a real fine job, we still need more programs and activities for our citizens, especially our youth."

Warmuth has lived in Texico more than 11 years, teaching high school math at Texico all this time. He is vice president of the Texico Education Association and Student Council sponsor.

Warmuth's student group sponsored the watermelon feed for the community. Also, he keeps the clock at home basketball games and statistics for the Texico varsity teams on a computer.

Warmuth said: "The city, schools and com-

munity should work together. I want Texico to be a nice community to live in and everyone must pull together."

Warmuth is a member of the First Baptist Church of Texico.

Mrs. Kosier has lived in Texico for two years, living in Clovis for four years before then. A housewife, she has four sons - Michael, Steven, Jerome and Tony Rennhack.

She attends the First Baptist Church of Texico.

Mrs. Kosier said: "Basically, I would like to bring new ideas to city gov-

ernment. I want to work for our community and do my part for it."

LaRue, a member of the First Baptist Church of Texico, is owner and operator of LaRue Jewelry in Clovis.

LaRue said:

"Continuity is important in city government and I believe my four years' experience on the council should be helpful. We have a very good community in Texico and I would like to help continue the progress we are making in keeping it strong and healthy."

Texico seeks summer pool operator

The Texico City Council Tuesday decided to advertise for a pool operator for this summer.

In other business, the council:

- Will check into buying two roof type air conditioners for the community building. The building is being renovated and the Chamber of Commerce thought that roof type air conditioners would be a plus for it.

- Approved a proclamation thanking the Texico - Farwell Lions Club for its 40 years of service. The club is having a special Charter Night in March.

- Discussed the plaque honoring the late Bill Christian that will be placed on a fountain at KKR Park. The fountain will be built this spring and is being paid for by the Texico - Farwell Rotary Club.

- Heard Mayor Steve Chancy report on the meeting last week discussing the initiation of the enhanced 911 emergency telephone system, due to be installed in Texico in December 1990.

- Asked councilman Doyal LaRue to prepare a plan for emergency evacuation in case of a disaster. It was

noted that hazardous materials are trucked and placed on trains that go through Texico and plans should be made in case of an emergency.

- Approved the annual audit.

- Applied for \$2,000 in state beautification funds to help dredge the pond at KKR Park. The city also must ante in \$1,000 for the project.

- Accepted an offer from EID to test the city's water for about \$750.

Rumor of the Week: A Texico - Farwell business is about to open a manufacturing facility and business in a major Texas city.

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

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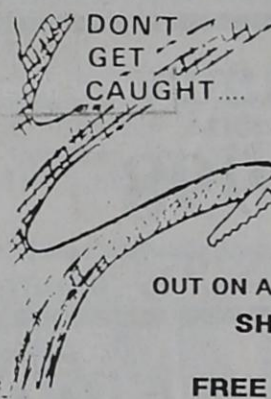
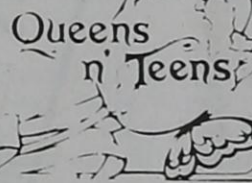
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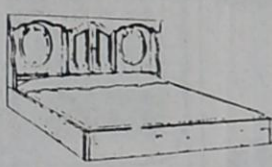


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Stewart's 34 paces Steers over Olton

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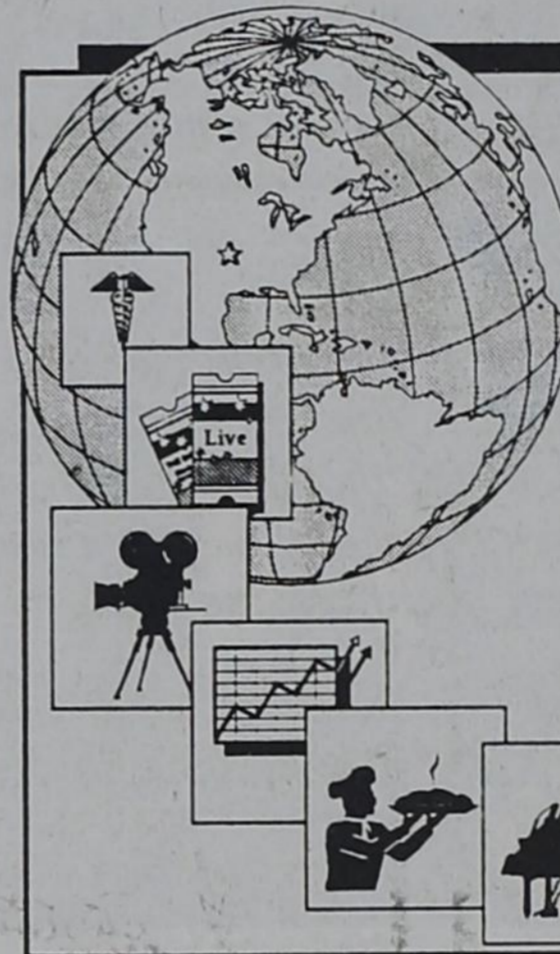
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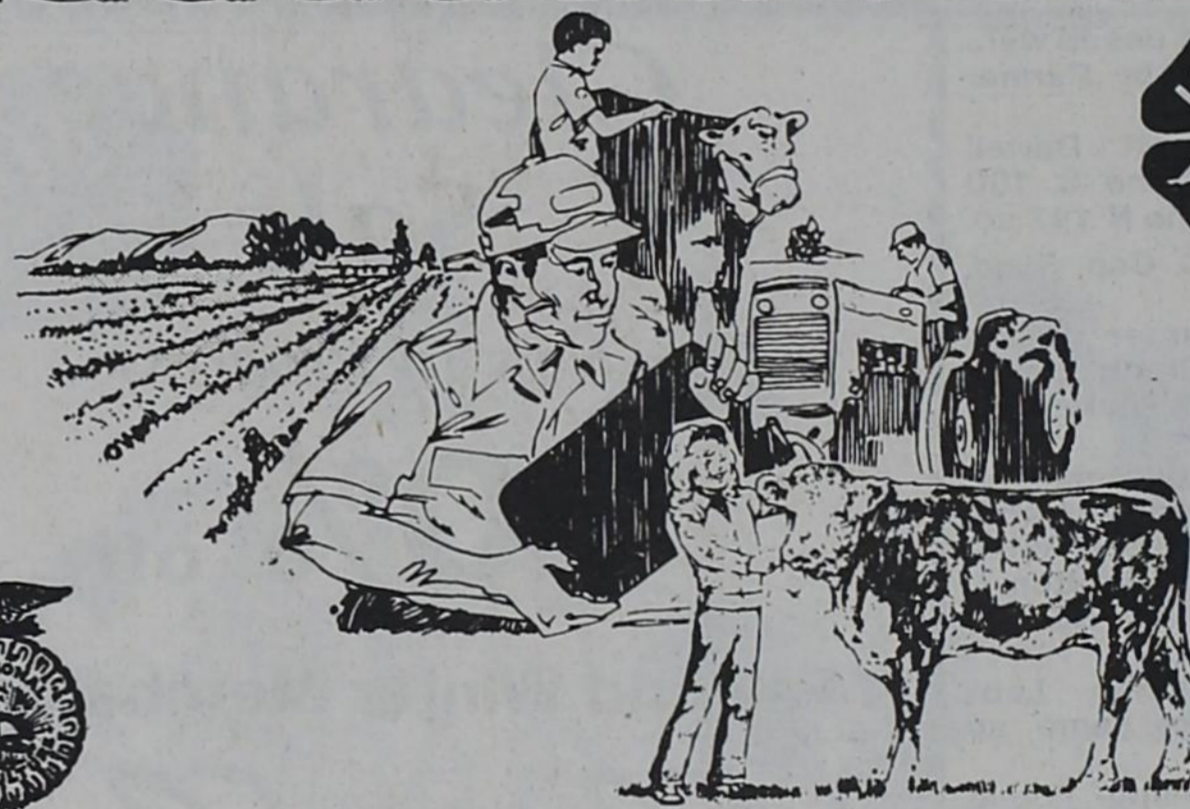
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Wolverines capture EPAC tournament title

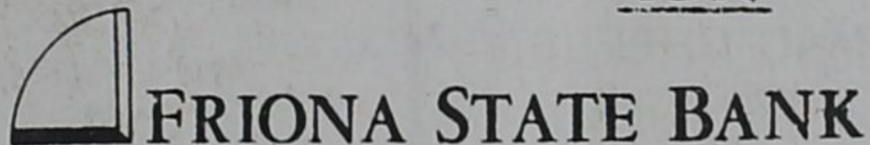
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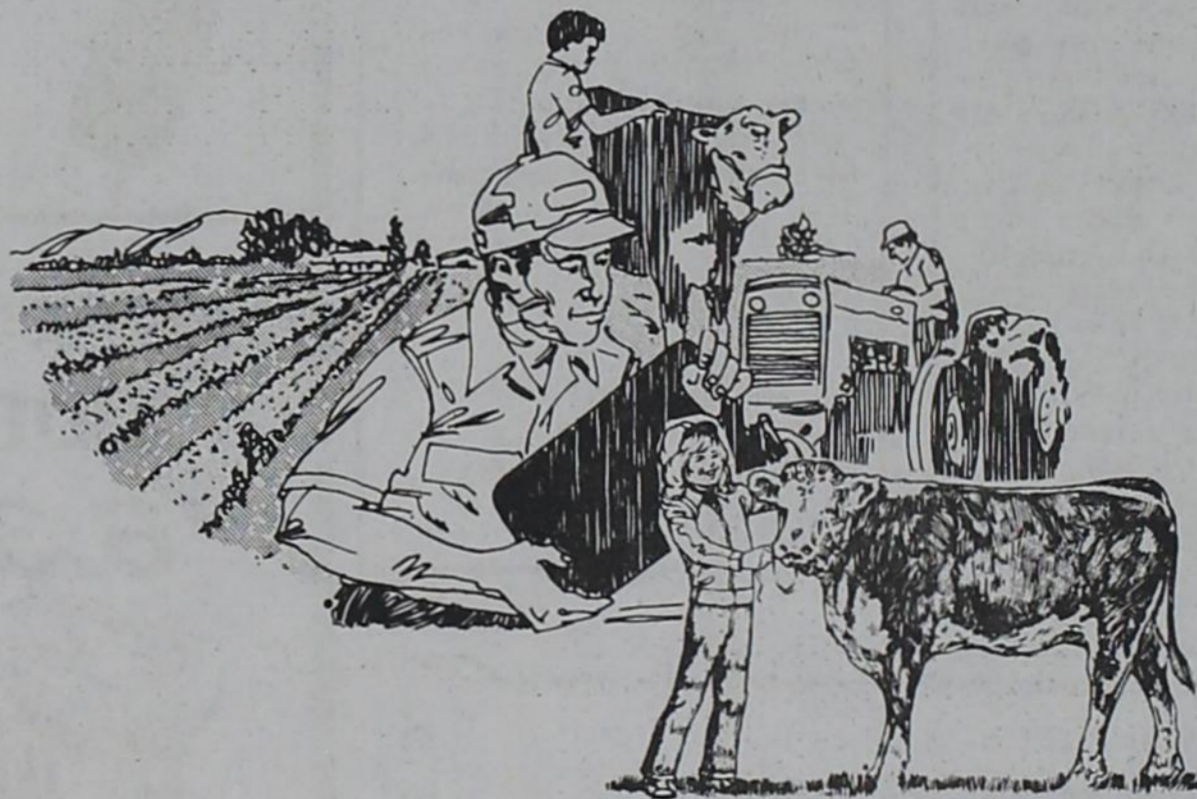
