Living in China

I got a letter from an old friend of mine recently.

He teaches music at a small Indiana college - but recently spent a year in China in an academic exchange program. So for 12 months, he and his wife and two children lived in Manchuria while he taught at a conservatory there.

I thought the letter might be of interest, so here are parts of it:

Dear Mike:

We left for China in mid-August and returned in mid-June. We were in Shenyang (Mukden). I taught at the Conservatory of Music: Janina taught at the Northeast Technical University. We both moonlighted by teaching at the U.S. Consulate School.

Jacinth was enrolled in first grade in a Chinese primary school; Joseph was in a kindergarten.

By Chinese standards, we lived in a place fit for three or tour tamilies - our own bathroom (with western toilet), running cold water, two bedrooms, a color TV, piano and IBM computer (we furnished the printer), a refrigerator and a large parlor.

Even better, we had running HOT water two hours a day. By U.S. standards, it was spartan. We ate in the first-floor restaurant because we had no hot plate or gas burner to cook on. After two or three months, our systems adjusted to the oily food and we came to enjoy many dishes through we never did like boiled Chinese meat-filled dumplings.

We formed many good friendships. Some of our friends spoke English; a few spoke French; some spoke only Chinese (and we learned enough to communicate in simple language). Like all foreigners we were exotic at first, though they came to recognize us as people - after several months.

When the demonstrations arose in May, nearly all the students and teachers supported the strikers, though my conservatory was a "hotbed of rest." After two days of demonstrations after the Beijing massacre, the Party clamped down and students returned to classes.

We were NEVER in any danger, and our Chinese hosts protected us even more than our mothers would have - not for political reasons but because we were their guests. If any guest became ill, even with a cold or flu, a doctor would arrive with the president, perhaps one or two vice presidents, etc. (hyperbole here - only a little).

Had any danger been present, I am certain all of the administrative officers, students, deans and faculty would have been in our apartment to protect us. In short, we were treated with great consideration and kindness.

I read a great deal of literature, studied the art, read Mao Zedong and tried to figure out what was happening. Perhaps the greatest challenge was to try and understand the values and attitudes of my colleagues and students. By the end of the year, I had succeeded to a small extent.

Mao is indeed the key to understanding China today (indeed, even Deng's Beijing massacre) though I am reading a biography of Lenin that shows substantial parallels with Mao.

Some good friends were deeply-devoted Party members, though only one I think was a fairly blind ideologue (he believes in the thought of Chairman Mao), but his

brother is a physician living in Australia who is an evangelical Protestant!

In any event, the more I read and tried to under-

Farwell enrollment decreases

First week enrollment figures for Farwell Schools are down from last year. Farwell Elementary reported

The drop in enrollment will not affect Farwell's 2A classification for this school year. School Board receives more bad \$\$ news

The Farwell School Board received some bad news from Supt. John Grigsby at its public hearing Tuesday night on the proposed budget.

The hearing was to discuss the proposed tax rate, which is going up 7.99 percent. The vote will be taken Sept. 12 at 7 p.m. at the administration office.

Grigsby reported that the current enrollment is 502 students. This is a loss of about 24 students from last year's average daily attendance figure. If correct, it means Farwell will receive about \$47,0000 less than expected - and budgeted - from the state.

Thus, the adopted budget of \$2,310,000, which already called for a \$10,000 deficit, now has an estimated deficit of \$57,000. The board likely will take action Sept. 12 to eliminate that deficit, either through cutbacks or through the use of reserve funds.

Several residents attended Tuesday's public hearing: Mr. and Mrs. Tim Norton, Mr. and Mrs. Robert Mitzelfelt, Patsy Berry, Tom Nichols, Wesley

Davis and Robert Anderson. Nichols discussed financial figures with the school officials. Grigsby reported that there is \$153,000 left in the school reserves.

Nichols also noted that state statistics show, according to Farwell's "peer group" (a state classification) that about \$4,100 are spent on each student. But the Farwell School budget has about \$5,000 spent per student.

Besides Nichols, several

questions were asked by the

Nortons and Mitzelfelts. Grigsby said in past times the entire budget wasn't spent but it was last year due to unanticipated expenses, such as higher teacher salaries passed by the state legislature at the 11th hour. He said the board hopes to "hold the line" with this year's budget and be able to increase the reserve and not raise taxes next year.

Board members pointed out that many cuts were made in the "wish list" presented by the three principals earlier this summer, plus some cuts in present services.

For the 1988 school year, school officials said they received \$2,236,631 in revenue and spent \$2,477,938. The difference was made up through the use of reserves.

Board member Roberta Johnson stressed that there was no school "deficit" because the funds were on hand in the reserve. She noted that the School Board did not spend money it didn't have on hand.

Nichols said he fears the school district will have another financial problem this year and "there's not much left in the reserves."

Board President Doyle Johnson and Roberta Johnson pointed out that some building projects had not been done for a number of years "and it caught up with Farwell." So, three years ago, the board decided to begin renovations.

Doyle Johnson said the \$75,000 spent on the junior high windows was nec-

School lunch program brings in funds

By John Grigsby Farwell School Superintendent

Everyone knows that Farwell Schools provide a nutritious lunch and breakfast on a daily basis.

Our cafeteria manager, Linda Moss, does a wonderful job of providing meals that are nutritious, economical and delicious. These meals must meet very rigid guidelines, yet Linda and her crew of ladies make them delicious. They also utilize the few government commodities in such a way that our cafeteria operates very close to a "break-even" basis. Very few school cafeterias can come close to that.

But most people do not know that student participation in the cafeteria lunch program affects the over-all school funding. The district is paid by the federal government for every student who participates in the free and reduced lunch program. This amounts to approximately \$60,000.

But the state of Texas pays an additional allotment to the district, based on the participation in free and reduced lunch program. These monies are to be used for educational purposes because some of these students have special learning needs and cost more to educate. These monies are called Compensatory Funds. In 1988-89, the district received \$89,000 to be used for Compensatory Student Education. That is equal to over 14 cents in taxes.

So, participation in the school lunch program means more to the district than just eating breakfast or lunch. Students can be assured of getting a wholesome meal that is delicious, nutritious and inexpensive. The school benefits from federal dollars which reduce the cost of operating the cafeteria, as well as additional government commodities. And, we receive additional state dollars which are applied to our instructional

These dollars add up - and we need every dollar we can to keep our costs down.



Rules tightened

By David Reynolds Farwell High School Principal

Texas has mandated, due to Senate Bills 417 and 1112 that students in state public schools must be in attendance in each and all classes for 80 days of each semester of school.

A students cannot be given credit for a class if he has been in attendance fewer than 80 days in a semester.

If a student failes to be in attendance the required number of days, the student may appeal the denial of credit to a committee established by the Farwell Schools.

The committee will review the reasons for the absenteeism and decide if extenuating circumstances existed. The local board will establish what constitutes "extenuating circumstances" and what alternative ways will be used to allow for make-up work or regaining lost credit due to absences.

This new attendance rule will have far-reaching effects in small schools like Farwell. It does not delineate between UIL days for football, basketball, stock shows, track or any other school related activity.
