A magical season

They lost a lot of their first string - 3 pass receivers, 2 linebackers, kickoff returner, punt returner, tight end, safety, kicker, place kicker, halfback, and a tailback who gained well over 1,000 yards on the season.

And still they only lost to Rankin by 3 points. That showed a lot of heart. By the entire team. I think it might be argued that the Rankin game might have been Farwell's finest. It showed the team had character.

I was particularly impressed by quarterback Greg Actkinson. You know that Rankin was keying on him. Yet he led the team admirably. His gutsy performance was one of the year's highlights. Actkinson showed poise and maturity in captaining the Steers to what would have been an upset win, considering the injury problem.

And he wasn't alone. Joel Smith showed a lot of heart in his slicing runs. And fellows who hadn't caught many balls this season came through.

And the line held. The line held. The offensive line did a remarkable job. And, except for the second quarter, the defense was very strong. The players obviously were down when the injuries were discovered. But they came back. Still more character.

There's no question in my mind that Steer fans can feel

pride in how the 1990 team performed. When I was sitting in the press box at Seminole and looking down at the sidelines - where Haseloff stood with his broken arm, where Delgado was lying on a stretcher and where 3 boys were trying to ease the pain in Stewart's leg - I was wondering if Farwell would be blown out.

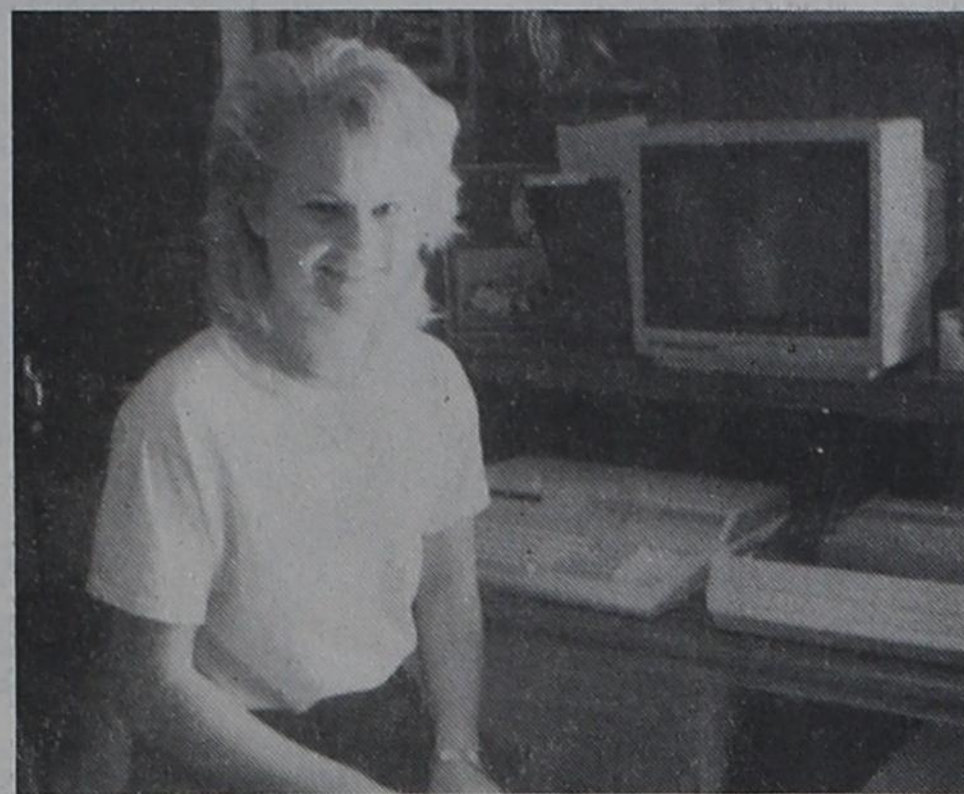
No way. They fought back. And were only a yard and a half away from an upset triumph. They didn't quit. They kept coming. They never lost - they just ran out of time.

It was a heckuva year. If Farwell had wanted, it could have scored nearly 100 points in several games. It was a beautiful, well-oiled team. No team beat Farwell. Just injuries. And that's part of sports.

The boys on the team, their coaches, managers, etc., will always have the memories of this great season.

Of Ruben Lucio blocking punts. Of Stewart turning the corner - and turning on the after burners. Of Actkinson throwing the 60-yard bomb to Michael Arce. Of Smith hurtling for the first down. Of Delgado disrupting the opponents' plays. Of the magnificent line that opened wide holes for the runners and kept the defense at bay for its quarterback. Of the gang tackling. Of Haseloff letting the opponents' running backs know he was there. And so much more.

I know Steer fans are disappointed that the match with No. 1 Munday didn't materialize. But, down the road, there will be another

'School here is a lot more sports minded'

Maria Lund Jensen is Texico High School's foreign exchange student this year. She is staying with the Don Placek family.

Maria is a 15 year old student from Hals, a port city in northern Denmark.

She already has completed high school in Denmark. When she returns home she hopes to study to become a pilot.

Maria, and her parents Jens Otto and Ann Lund Jensen live in a spacious five bedroom red brick home in Hals. Her father is a shipping purchasing manager and her mom is a medical consultant.

Her family also includes a brother, Christen, 18, an apprentice electrician, and a sister, Katherine, 9.

Maria arrived here on Aug. 12. Her first reaction to our area was surprise at the searing summer heat.

"It reminded me of Australia," she said. Maria has visited Sydney and Queensland, Australia twice because her aunt lives there. Her family visited the land down under when she was 5 years old and again when she was 11. They toured much of the island continent and camped along the way.

Maria liked the heat here, and she liked many other things, too. She liked the idea of selecting the courses she wanted at school and she liked the style of teaching here.

"I like doing something all the time in class, it's not as boring as in Denmark," she said of school. This year Maria is studying chemistry, biology, English, history, computer, communications skills, and physical education at Texico High.

"School here is a lot more sports minded," she noted. Volleyball was more than she had bargained for.

Maria was surprised that it is possible to learn to drive before age 18 here. In Denmark one must wait until their 18th birthday before they begin to learn to drive. They must also pay a high tuition to a driving school.

She does not like the length of the school day here. "In Denmark I would get home at 2 p.m. at the latest, sometimes I'd get home at 12.

She has not felt homesick, but she has missed a few of her favorite things. Licorice, for instance, isn't the same here as in Denmark. She hopes that her family will send some of her favorite candy to here.

She also misses going to discos with her friends. "It's a lot more free there. You can always find something to do," she noted.

In the summer she and her friends swim and sail. She also works at a deli type sandwich shop during her vacations.

Once in a while, when she is not in school or working, she and her father enjoy long bicycle trips. "We use bikes a lot more there," she notes. Bicycles are a major form of transportation.

Maria sometimes plays team handball in Denmark. It is played with a ball about 8 inches in diameter. The object is to throw the ball into a goal.

In the winter it is too cold in Hals to swim. Her family sometimes goes skiing in neighboring countries, but it's difficult because there are "no snow and no hills" in Hals.

Maria enjoys shopping, going out with friends and reading all year long. She also likes to cook occasionally.

Before she leaves the U.S., Maria hopes to visit either Disney Land or Disney World. She also hopes to visit her uncle who lives in Massachusetts.

Recipe of Week

Pecan- Cheddar Wafers

1/2 lb. mild cheddar cheese, grated
7 Tbs. butter
1 tsp. salt
1/2 tsp. red pepper sauce
2 c. all purpose flour

1/4 c. plus 2 tbs. finely chopped pecans
5-6 pieces crystallized ginger, finely chopped

Cream cheese and butter together in a food processor or with a mixer. Add salt and red pepper sauce. Gradually add flour, process until well blended. Remove and stir in the 1/4 c. pecans. Flatten mixture into a round, wrap and chill until firm, about 1 hour.

Preheat oven to 325 degrees. Combine the remaining pecans with the ginger. Set aside. On a lightly floured surface roll out dough to 1/4" thick. Cut out rounds with a 1 1/2" diameter biscuit cutter and place on ungreased cookie sheets. Repeat with remaining scraps. Press a few pieces of pecan and ginger into the center of each wafer. Bake for 8-10 minutes, until just barely colored. Remove and cool on racks.

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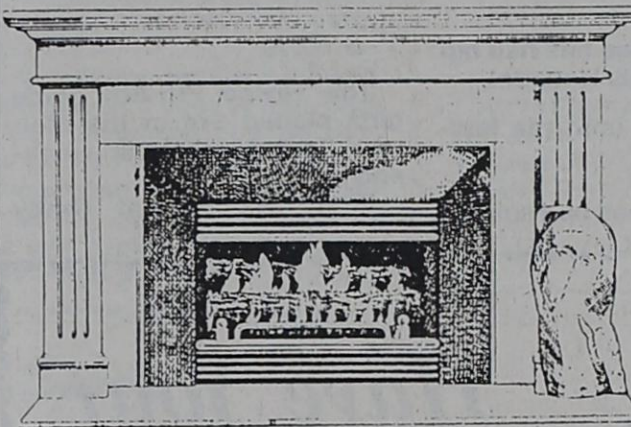
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Farwell Elementary School Christmas Card Project

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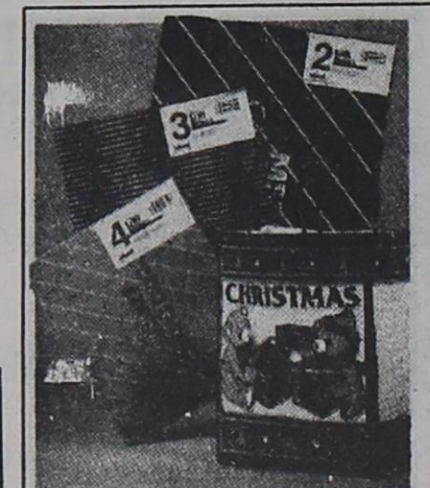

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Injured Steers fall in regionals

Injuries, the bane of sports, were the deciding factors as the Farwell Steers lost to the Rankin Red Devils, 17-14, in the regional football semi-finals at Seminole last Friday.

Farwell finished the year at 11-1. Rankin will meet Munday. It was the furthest the Steers had ever gotten in the state grid playoffs in their history.

Farwell went into the game without tight end - middle linebacker Darren Haseloff, who broke his arm two weeks earlier against Booker. Then tailback Shawn Stewart, who suffered a muscle sprain in his right leg last week against Spur, was unable to play except for a couple of plays. And early in the game, running back - linebacker Monty Delgado suffered a severe knee sprain.

This left the bulk of the offense to quarterback Greg Actkinson and fullback Joel Smith. Both performed admirably. Actkinson hit 8 of 16 passes for 57 yards and rushed 17 times for 76 more. Smith caught one pass for 13 yards and rushed 15 times for 63 more.

Others helping on offense were: Michael Arce caught an 8-yard pass; Cody Monk caught a pass for 9 yards. Ray Haseloff caught 2 passes for 19 yards and rushed 3 times for 21 yards. Kirk Lingnau snared an 8-yard pass and rushed 4 times for 9 yards. Stewart carried one time for 3 yards and only was in the game early for a handful of plays. Delgado caught a pass for 14 yards and rushed 2 times for 8 yards before he was injured. Chad Byrd hit 2 of 2 passes for 17 yards. Roger Billingsley caught 2 passes for 15 yards.

The statistics were all in Farwell's favor. If the game had been tied, Farwell would have been declared the winner by virtue of having the lead in first downs - 19 to Rankin's 9. (Both teams had three penetrations within the 20 yard line).

Farwell rushed 43 times for 176 yards; Rankin 35 for 143. Farwell gained 74 passing yards to Rankin's 73. Both teams lost two fumbles. Rankin was penalized 3 times for 20 yards; Farwell 2 for 10 - both costly penalties.

There was a huge turnout of Steer fans at Seminole - 150 miles from Farwell. Victor Andriani, the foreign exchange student from Argentina, kicked off to the Rankin 10 and it was returned to the 22. Two off tackle runs gained 5. On a busted play, Rankin QB Kirk Kennedy - who was his team's virtually entire offense - ran for a first down at the Rankin 43.

Two more off tackle runs gained 2. Then Delgado knocked down a pass forcing a Rankin punt to the Steer 31.

Actkinson hit Delgado with a pass, and Delgado then gained 4 on the ground. At this point, Stewart went out of the game, only to return later in the first quarter for 2 or 3 plays.

The Steers were held and Lupe Garza punted; it was

returned to the Steer 46. Three runs up the gut gained 8 so Rankin punted to the Steer 14. Farwell tried 3 running plays, gaining 9. Garza, a freshman, punted to the Rankin 45.

Kennedy was sacked for a 5 yard loss. On 3rd down, Delgado broke up another pass and Rankin punted to its 32. On runs by Smith and Stewart (his only carry), the Steers gained a first down as the first quarter ended.

A third down pass failed and Garza punted to the Rankin 41. Running back Gabe Hyatt broke 2 tackles in posting a big run to the Steer 21. A Kennedy run gained a first down at the Steer 4 as Delgado went out, injured. Kennedy ran in the 4 yards for a TD at 7:43; then he kicked the point after for a 7-0 lead.

Rankin's kickoff was returned 13 yards by Michael Loera to the Steer 33. Farwell lost a fumble at its 38. Kennedy ran 34 yards for a TD at 6:34. His kick was good and Rankin led 14-0.

On offense, Smith ran for 3 and Billingsley caught a 6 yard pass. Actkinson kept for a first down at the Steer 44. Ray Haseloff broke off tackle for 13 and Smith gained 9 up the middle. A pass to Ray Haseloff gained 9. Then on 4th and 8, Smith raced for 14 to the Rankin 9.

Actkinson kept to the 4. On the next play, he pitched out to Smith who bulled his way over a defender for the TD at 1:15 of the second quarter. Because of a bad snap, Actkinson ran for the 2-point conversion and Rankin led 14-8.

With 33 seconds left in the half, Rankin used a middle screen pass play to gain 39 yards to the Farwell 15. Arce scored a quarterback sack, as Rankin lost 7 yards. With one second left, Kennedy kicked a 39-yard field goal and it was 17-8.

Byrd returned the kickoff 22 yards as the half ended.

Farwell took over on its 22 to open the third period. Billingsley took a Byrd pass for 11 yards (on the halfback option). Haseloff carried for 5. Lingnau took a 9-yard pass for a first down at the Steer 46.

Smith ran for 9 and Actkinson snuck for the first down. A pass to Haseloff was good for another first down at the Red Devil 21. Monk then grabbed a pass for a first down at the 9. Actkinson ran for 3, then for a 6-yard TD at 6:10. The extra point kick was off and Rankin led 17-14.

On defense, Brian Johnson had a strong tackle, followed by a Lingnau stop. It appeared Rankin would punt at mid-field but it was a fake. When the ball was mishandled by the shor man, Lucio recovered the fumble at the Rankin 28.

A pass to Arce gained 8. Lingnau ran for a first down at the Rankin 4. Actkinson's keeper gained 2. Then an illegal procedure penalty put the ball back on the 6. Rankin intercepted on a leaping catch by Louis Gonzales in the end

zone with 32 seconds left in the 3rd quarter.

In the final period, a host of Steer defenders gave the Rankin runner a 1 yard loss. A holding penalty put the ball back to the Rankin 10. But Kennedy threw a perfect pass on 3rd down to Gonzales at the Red Devil 41.

Three Rankin runs were unable to gain a first down (Lucio had a big stop) and Farwell took the punt at its 27. Smith gained 8 and actkinson kept for a first down at the Farwell 39. Actkinson then scampered to the Rankin 40. A clipping penalty against Farwell made it 1st and 25 at the Steer 45.

Farwell lost a fumble at its 43. On the next play, Lucio recovered a Kennedy fumble at the Steer 41.

Again, the Steers went on the offensive. Actkinson picked up 2 first downs to get to mid field as 5 minutes were left in the game. Smith gained 5, then Actkinson ran for another first down at the Rankin 36.

Actkinson gained 2. But a reverse lost 5 and a pass failed. On 4th and 13, Byrd took a pitch, then threw back to Actkinson who made an athletic catch - but 4 yards short of the first down. With 2:10 left, Rankin took over.

Arce recorded a QB sack but Kennedy ran around end for a first down and the Red Devils were able to run out the clock.

Coach Rex Cumpton said, "You never want to end with a loss, but sometimes it happens. We let them get 2 TDs upon us and could never get it back. I felt our kids gave a great effort and showed a lot of character. We had some injury problems but the players that played for those injured boys did a great job.

"We had a couple of opportunities to win the game, but just couldn't get it in. Special accolades to Joel Smith, who played real well on offense, completely out of position. Greg Actkinson did a good job at QB. Our offensive line blocked real well.

"We ended another successful year. Our football team is 22-2 over the past two seasons. Not many teams can say that. I would like to offer my thanks to the Booster Club and the community for their support through the entire season."

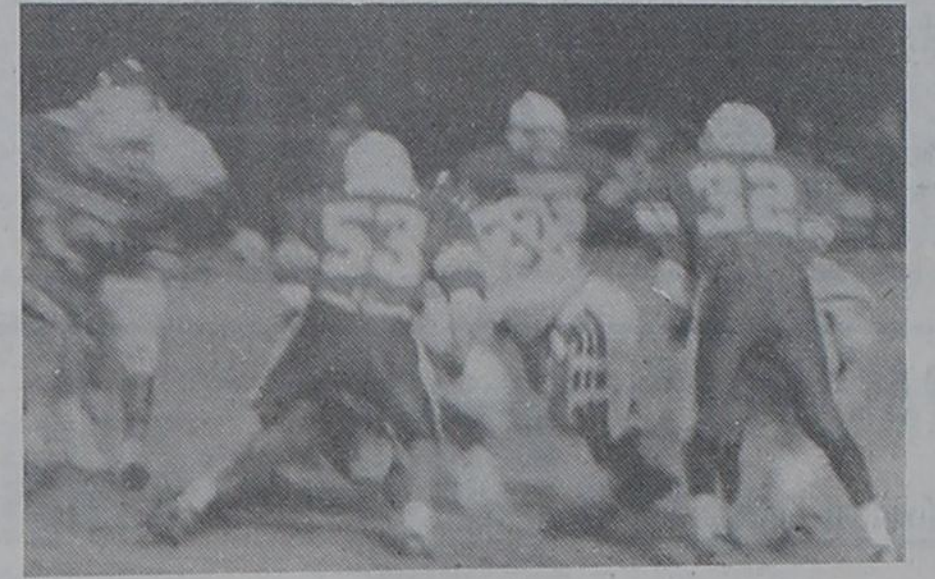
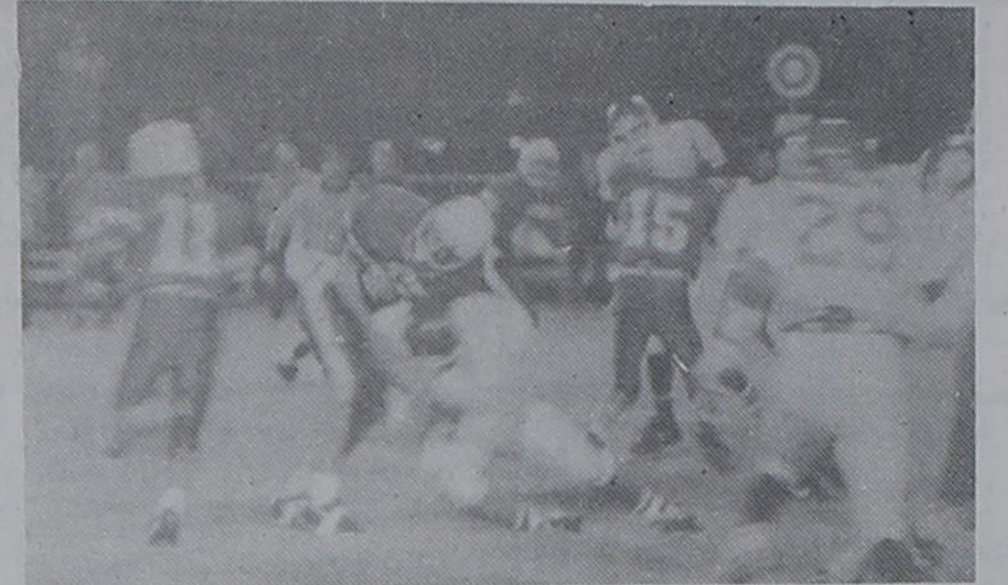
Jones reviewed the vocational and support programs of the school system. Gervase reviewed the basic school program and professional development for the school system.

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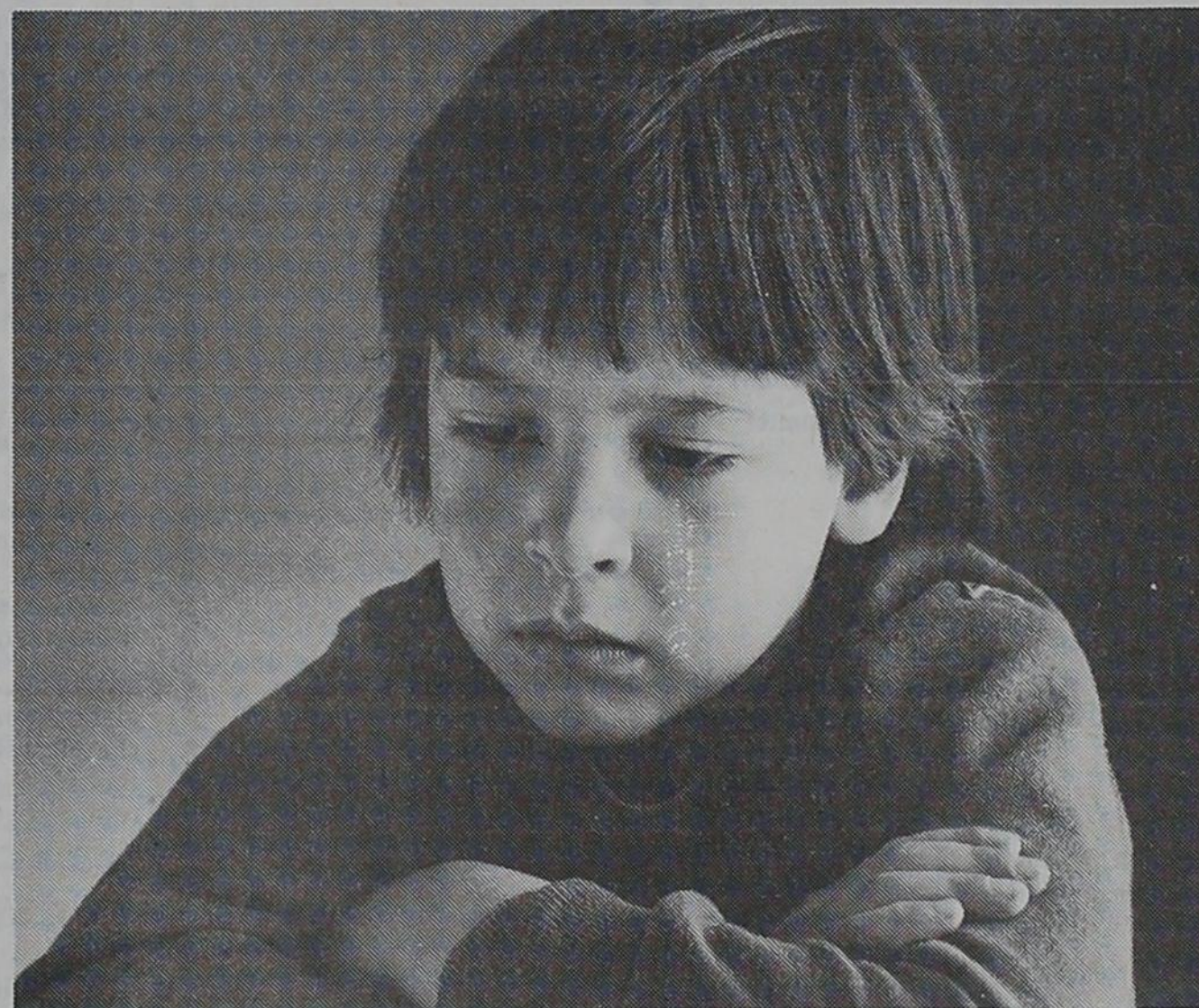
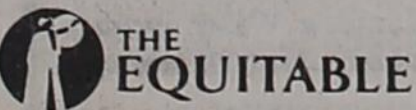
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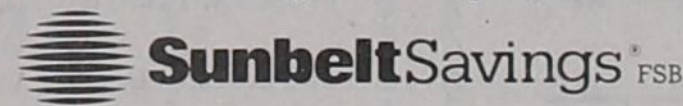

The score remained within 2 baskets most of the game, and there was just 2 points between the two teams during the final few minutes of play.

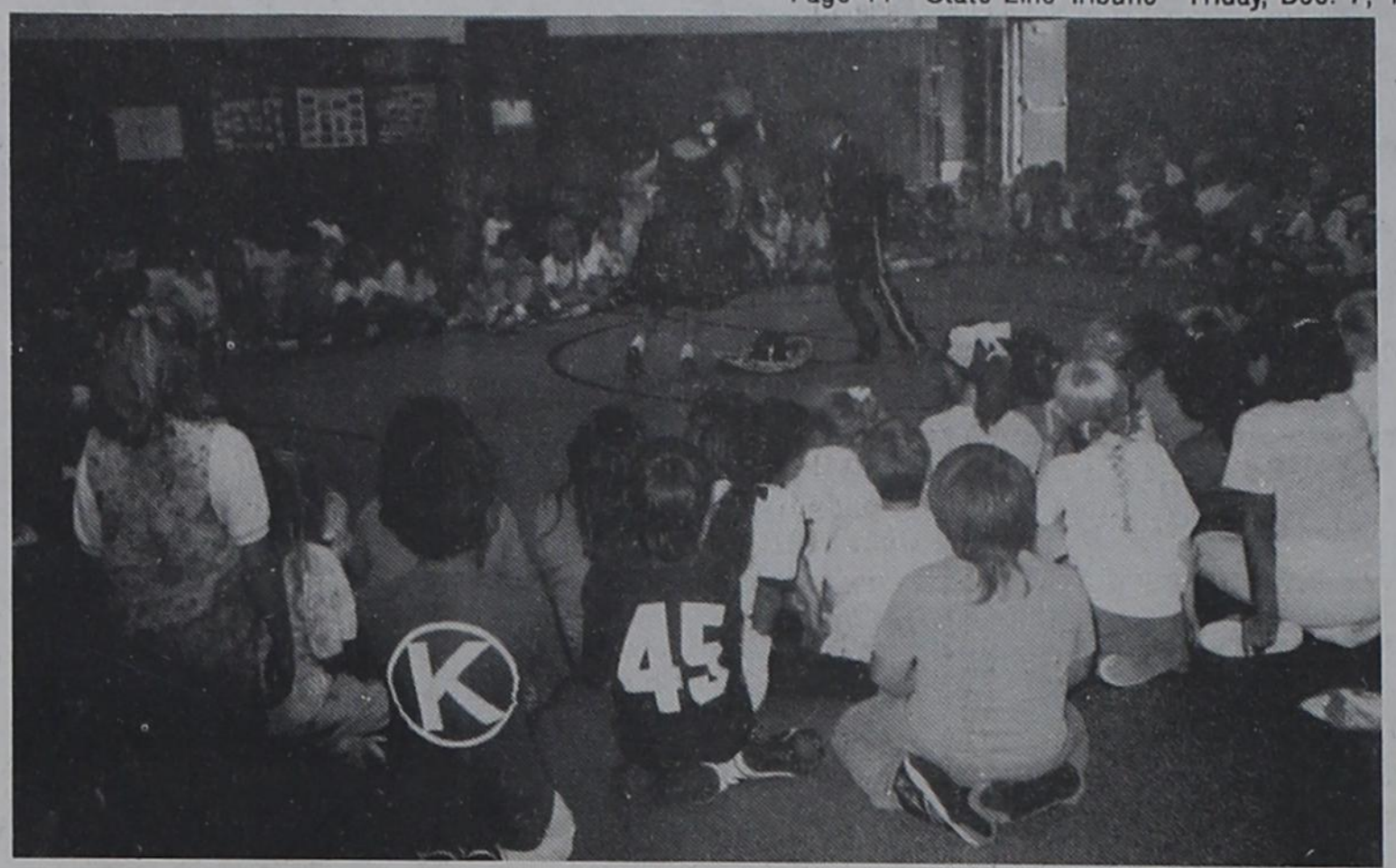
"They played a hard defensive game," said coach Patsy Camp, "We missed too many free throws."

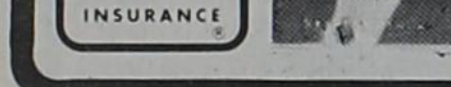
