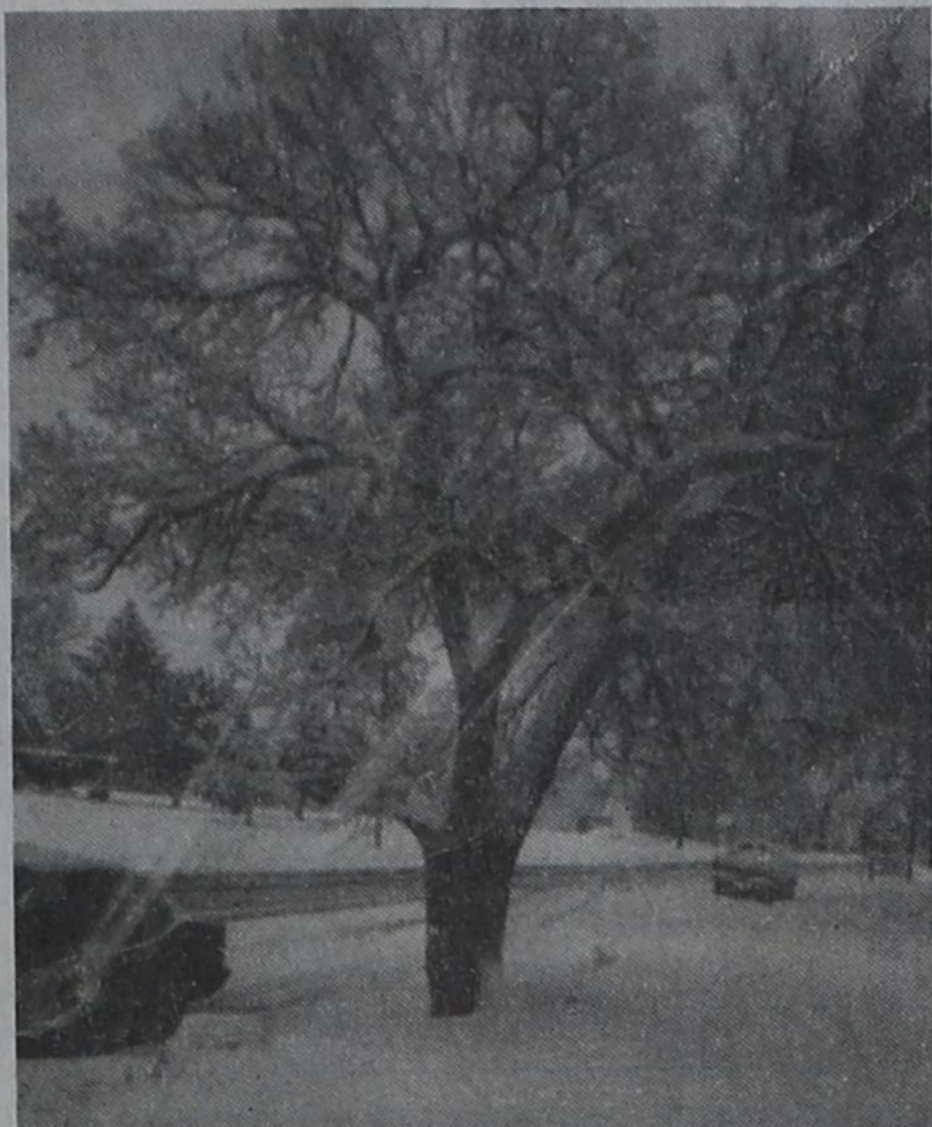
Is that fair?

6 - 8 inches of snow falls

Big, beautiful flakes of fluffy white snow blanketed the area on Jan. 9.

The snowfall brought much needed moisture to the area. About 6 to 8 inches of snow were measured by various people in our area.

According to Lonnie McFarland of Lariat, only 11.16" of moisture fell near the Sherry Anderson elevator there in all of last year - that is less than the 17" we normally get. So, the 7" blanket of heavy, wet snow was especially welcome there.

"It's hard to tell, but usually with wet snow we get about .1" inch of moisture for every inch of snow that falls," he said.

"We really needed this moisture because we haven't had

any good moisture since September," he said.

McFarland noted that snow is in some ways more beneficial than rain because it slowly melts and soaks into the soil better than a rainfall does.

Fréd Chandler of Sherry Anderson Pittman elevator of Farwell noted that this snow was good for the wheat.

"It's the best thing that could happen for the crops, and it's not even bad for the livestock- they may need supplemental feed, but it wasn't that bad."

Chandler reported about 6 inches of snow fell in Farwell.

June Hunt of Lazbuddie noted that about 7 to 8 inches of snow fell there. "It was a nice straight snow with big, beautiful flakes," she said.

Jr. livestock shows on tap

The 23rd annual Farwell FFA-4H Livestock Show will be held at the Farwell Community Center Jan. 19.

Lazbuddie and Friona will also hold their stock shows on the 19th.

Farwell

Animals will be checked in at the Farwell Livestock show before 11 a.m. The show begins at about 1:30 p.m.

Ike Trimble of Dumas will judge this year's show. Willie Roberts will announce the entries.

According to Farwell agriculture teacher Richard Montgomery, there will be about 18 lambs and 55 barrows in this year's show.

Trophies will be given to the Grand and Reserve Champion hog and lamb. Showmanship trophies will be given to the youths who do the best job of showing their hogs and sheep. Ribbons will be awarded to class winners.

The 4-H Club will sponsor a snack bar during the show.

The parents and committee members started setting up the community center for the show on Wednesday. They had to cover the floor with peanut hulls and set up pens. They will also clean up after the show on Saturday.

"It's really a big job to have this show, but if everybody takes care of his own part it all gets done," said Montgomery.

The local show gives Farwell students experience before they go to the county show next week or to the big livestock shows. This year the county show will be held Jan. 25-27 in Friona.

Sometimes an animal that may not be of prime weight and development for our local show will win at one of the big shows. The showmanship experience gained locally will be of importance to the animal's owner.

Lazbuddie

The annual Lazbuddie Livestock Show will be held on Jan. 19 at the old Co-op building 1 1/2 miles west of Lazbuddie on Hwy. 145.

The weigh-in will be held from 9 a.m. - noon. The show will begin at 1:30 p.m.

The judge will be Curry County Agriculture Extension Agent Bruce Hinrichs.

According to Lazbuddie Agriculture teacher Rick Copp, the entry fee will be \$3 per head, but there will be no limit to the number of entries.

Belt buckles will be given to the grand champion and to the junior and senior showmanship champion in each division. The grand champions will receive rodeo jackets. There will also be prize ribbons given.

Parmer County

The 1991 Parmer County Junior Livestock Show will be held in Friona on Jan. 25-28.

The show is open to any Parmer County 4-H, FFA, or FHA boys or girls in grades 3-12 in one of the four public schools in the county.

The big annual show will begin with barrow weigh-in from 1-5 p.m. on Jan. 25.

Sheep, steers and heifers will be weighed in and clas-

sified from 7 - 9 a.m.

The sheep show begins at noon on Jan. 26. The barrow show follows at 4:30 p.m.

The steer and heifer shows will follow at 2 p.m. on Jan. 27.

The animal sale will begin at 7 p.m. on Jan. 28.

Entry cards and fees are due at the Friona Agricultural office one week prior to the show date.

Board extends Boothby's contract

The Farwell School Board voted Thursday to extend Supt. Richard Boothby's contract an additional year, through 1993.

Also, they met with their attorney, Duane Hamar, to discuss a lawsuit pending against the district and involving taxes.

The board also:

- Shelved the proposal to purchase new school buses until they could get more bids and also find out the cost of remodeling the bus barn if the safety escape hatch on the new bus is too tall for the current bus barn door. Joe Stanton was delegated to get

this information.

- Heard LeAndra Byrd give the financial report. She explained that cash flow is up this year due to cuts in salaries, decreased spending in the past five months, and increased revenues from the state.

- Voted to give Mrs. Byrd discretionary power to purchase up to \$8,500 worth of computer equipment and software for student services and PEIMS record keeping.

- Heard Boothby report that Farwell Elementary School has been designated a target school for a parental involvement project.

Texico discusses water well worry

The Texico City Council had a workshop meeting Tuesday with Don Gonzales, of Roy F. Weston engineering firm of Albuquerque.

Texico has hired Weston in the wake of having to close the KKR Park well due to contamination.

Gonzales explained what his firm could do and also hoped to do. After the city signs a formal contract, Weston will draw up a feasibility study.

Gonzales said there is a possibility that the KKR Park well can be re-claimed, thus negating the need to put in an expensive new well. This will be determined by where the contaminant has come from. The source still remains to be found.

Also, Gonzales said Weston will help the city install a water management program.

The council agreed to put the pump back in the KKR Park well in case of a major fire. It will not be connected

unless that occurs. The city is down to one water well, at the Tower Park.

Pickup trucks purchased

The Parmer County Commissioners accepted bids Monday to purchase two pickup trucks for Pct. 1 and Pct. 4.

Friona Motors' bids were picked. One other bid was received, from Robert D. Green, Muleshoe.

The commissioners also:

- Approved the 1991 salary schedule.

- Changed the Jan. 28 meeting to Jan. 25.

what they do.

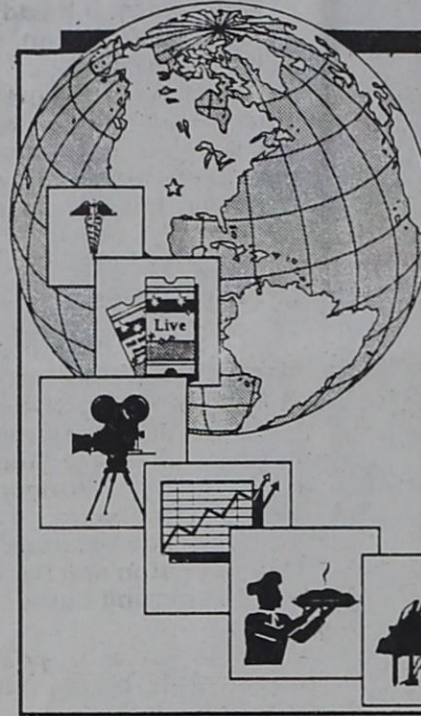
According to the new district UIL rules in Texas, varsity girls basketball games

Chadwick scored 21 of Texico's 29 points, and she had 6 rebounds.

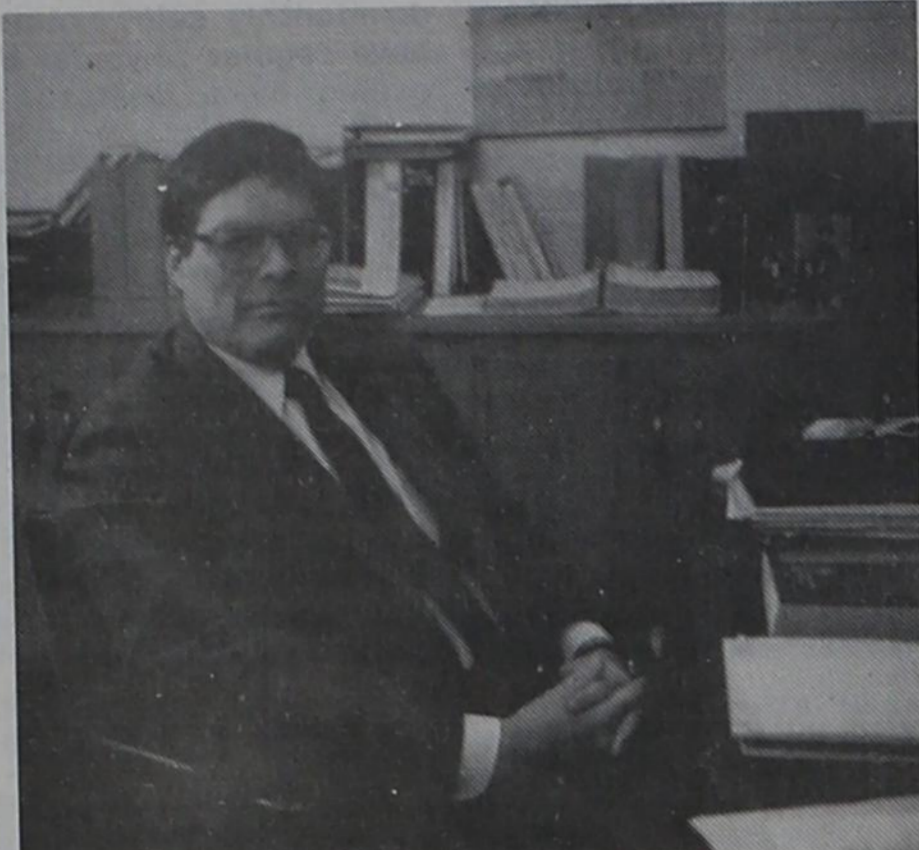
Also scoring were: Kelly Delgado, 7; and Joni Pate, 1. Andrea Montano led in rebounds with 8.

The Owens community, he said is much like Lazbuddie. It is mostly houses and farms and a gin where farmers gather for a cup of coffee.

"I've been going to school all my life," he said. "I'm not going to go to school this

The unit will be in Farwell Jan. 22.

Mammography is an X-ray examination of the breast, which the American Cancer Society and other medical experts see as the best means for the early detection of breast cancer.

The program is voluntary and is designed to insure that women receive optimum quality mammographic examinations. The process is done through a peer review evaluation of the facility's staff qualifications, equipment, quality control and

quality assurance programs, image quality, and breast dose. The accreditation must be renewed every three years.

Breast cancer will strike one in 10 American women. The American Cancer Society predicts that about 41,000 women will die of breast cancer this year. As there is no way to prevent the disease, early detection and treatment offer the greatest hope for survival.

The American Cancer Society recommends that women do monthly self-exams and have regular physical breast exams by a doctor.

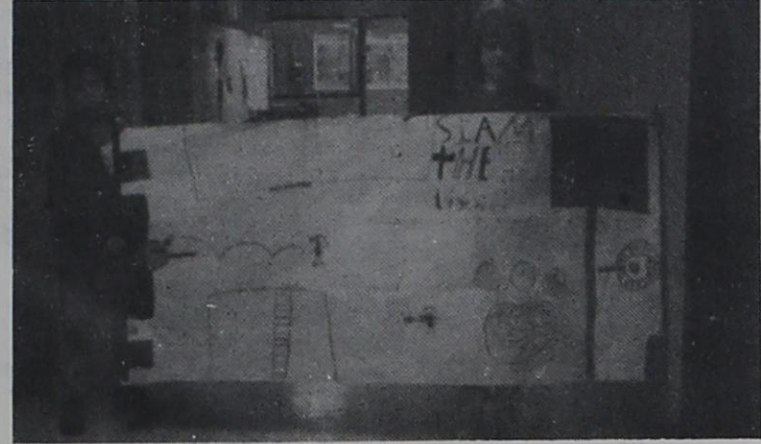

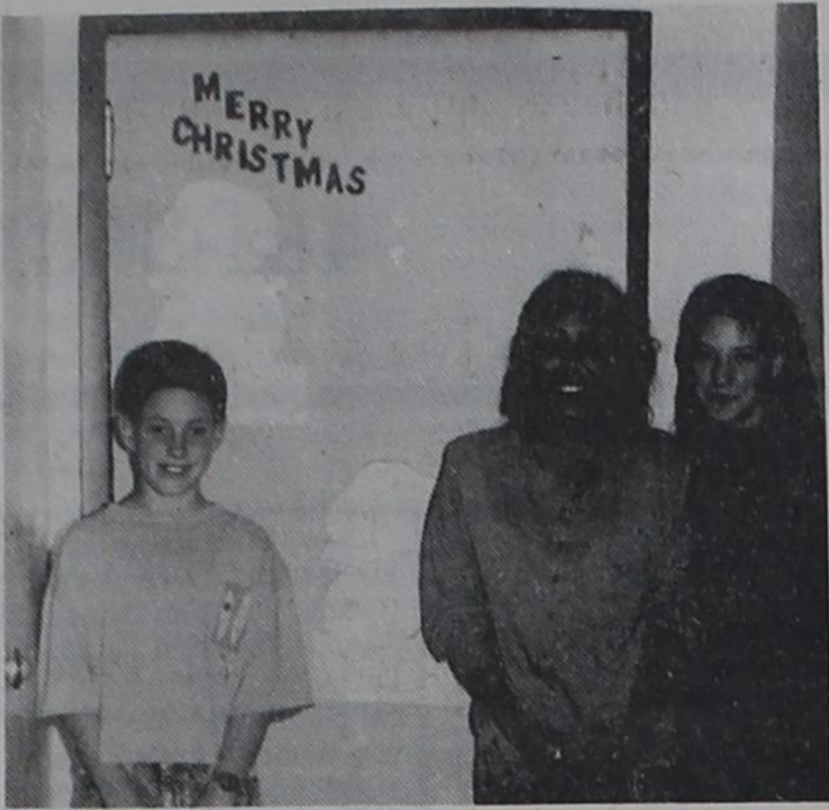

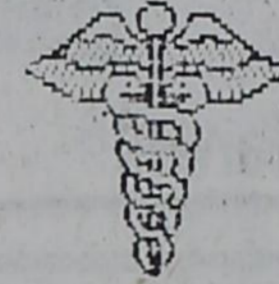
