## Herington, Williams win

In the two contested Parmer County races, Rex Williams was re-elected as sheriff and Doris Herington was re-elected as tax assessor-collector.

Williams, a Democrat, defeated Republican challenger Randy Gerles, 1789 to 1197. Mrs. Herington, a Democrat, defeated write-in opponent Jerry Stover, 1630 to 1065.

A total of 3,098 votes were cast in Parmer County. Total registration was 3,859. In Farwell, 557 votes (of 865) were cast; plus 176 (of 230) in Oklahoma Lane and 269 (of 362) in Lazbuddie.

Parmer County officials who were re-elected with opposition were:

- Johnny Mars, a Democrat, County Commissioner from Friona, 617.

- Robert White, a Democrat, County Commissioner from Farwell, 703.

- Johnny Actkinson, a Democrat, District Attorney, 2115.

- Charles Aycock, a Democrat, County Attorney, 2124.

State Rep. Pete Laney was re-elected with opposition. The Democrat got 1846 in Parmer County. State Sen. Teel Bivins, a Republican, also was unopposed; he got 2151 votes in Parmer County.

U.S. Rep. Larry Combest (R) won Parmer County over Terry Moser (D), 2150 to 704. Combest was re-elected with about 75 percent of his district's vote.

## Roberts beats Langston

Earlene Roberts (R) defeated Dewey Langston (D) for the State Representative 66 District, which represents Texico.

Mrs. Roberts, of Lovington, won with 52 percent of the vote - 4,212. Langston, of Portales, had 48 percent - 3,935. In Texico, Mrs. Roberts won 185 votes to Langston's 139.

A total of 485 persons voted at the Texico polls.

Other Texico totals included:

State Sen. Billy J. McKibben (R) got 218 votes. He was unopposed.

For State Board of Education, Lynn Medlin (R) got 225 votes. She was unopposed.

Randy Harris (D), unopposed for District Attorney, got 222 votes.

Incumbent Caleb Chandler (D), won the Division 1 District Magistrate's post. He got 205 votes in Texico. His opponent, Gordon Hayes (R) got 122.

David Snider (D) was unopposed for re-election to the Curry County Commission. He got 220 votes.

Coni Jo Lyman (D), unopposed for re-election as County Clerk, got 238 votes.

Joyce Deavours (D), unopposed for re-election as County Treasurer, got 229 votes.

For President, George Bush got 198 votes; Bill Clinton, 75; and Ross Perot, 57.

For U.S. representative, Bill Richardson (D) won re-election. He got 181 votes in Texico to F. Gregg Bemis Jr.'s 141.

For Justice of the Supreme Court, Stanley Frost (D) got 184; Harris Hartz (R) got 137.

units. Each unit has a 1,400 square foot home with brick exterior. Each is a two bedroom, two bath unit with an attached garage. There is no lawn for the senior citizen to maintain.

The homes are located beside the Farwell Convalescent Center so that residents can use the medical, dental, spiritual, and recreational facilities available at the Convalescent Center, and yet they have the privacy of owning their own low maintenance home.

The property, services and security are furnished by the Hospital District. For more information about Heritage Square Garden Homes, contact the Farwell Convalescent Center.

The additional homes will be built in an L shaped grouping to complete the square started by the L shape of the current homes. The new foundation for the addition was poured on Oct. 29.

Current residents of the Heritage Square Garden Homes all expressed their pleasure at residing there.

"I've enjoyed living here," said Lucille Barnes. "It's just what I need. They are just real nice homes."

Lucille moved out of her large farm house in Lazbuddie and into the Heritage Square home so that she could have the conveniences of our town such as churches and grocery shopping close by.

Heritage Square resident Helen Hutchins related an incident that underlined the importance of being close to the Center when an emergency arises. She noted that her husband Art had had some health problems awhile back.

"I just picked up the telephone and hit the bar on the phone, and here came a nurse and an aide. They were here in just a matter of minutes."

They notified Hutchins' son, Lee, and the volunteer fire department had an ambulance there in no time at all. Art was on his way to the hospital in 10 minutes.

Helen also mentioned that she can have Meals on Wheels delivered from the Center that provide her with a balanced diet that she needs for her heart condition. "They are very accommodating at the Center," she said.

Helen also has a cleaning lady who comes twice a month from the Center to help with the chores that are too difficult for her and Art to do for themselves.

It was hard for the Hutchinses to decide to move from the large home Art had built for them 52 years ago, but now they are delighted that they did.

They weren't sure that it would be large enough. But,

they soon found that it was fine. "Our other sons have come to visit us here, and they were just amazed at the accommodations," she said.

Mora Schleuter also loves her home at the Heritage Square. "I love it. It couldn't be any better. I've got the best neighbors."

"I'm still able to go places and drive my car, but I can get

help if I need it. The house is not too big, but everything is convenient," she noted.

Mora mentioned the convenience of having an enclosed garage with storage space, and the convenient appliances in the kitchen—a built in dishwasher, self-cleaning oven, stove and refrigerator. "It's a perfect place to live," Mora said.

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# Wolverines top Ft. Sumner to earn playoff berth

The Texico Wolverines won a berth in the state playoffs last Friday by whipping Ft. Sumner in an away game, 54-14. Texico finished district as the co-champions with Tatum at 4-1. Overall, Texico is 6-4. The Wolverines play at Loving at 5:30 p.m. cst in the state semi-finals. The game will be broadcast over KSEL Radio, Portales.

Texico started on its 7. Kelvin Gooden carried twice for a first down. Texico was then held and Aaron Ketterling punted to the Foxes' 42. Ft. Sumner was stopped and Texico got the ball back. On their second play, QB Joel Barba broke loose for 26 yards to the Foxes' 45. But Ketterling had to punt again.

On defense, tackles were made by Billy Rogers and Corey Horner. So the Foxes had to punt to Texico's 32. Barba slipped past the Foxes' defense, rambling 68 yards for a TD at 3:52. The kick failed.

Richard Stephens tackled the returner at the 35. Johnny Salinas had a good tackle. Then Kelvin Gooden intercepted, returning it 85 yards for a TD at 2:45. Barba passed to Bobby Winegeart for a 2 point conversion and Texico was up 14-0. Tackles were made by Louie Delgado, Kelvin Gooden, Anthony Garcia and Winegeart. But Ft. Sumner drove downfield, culminating in a 5-yard TD run at 11:10 of the 2nd period. A pass for 2 point clicked and it was 14-8.

Kelvin Gooden returned the kickoff to the 34. Hadley Gilbert gained 5 and Barba made the first down. Texico was stopped and punted. Steve Horner had a good tackle. Two passes were incomplete and Ft. Sumner punted. Runs by Kelvin Gooden and Barba came up short and Ketterling punted, with Gilbert tackling the returner near midfield.

Steve Horner pressured the QB, causing an incompletion.

Winegeart and Garcia had tackles. Texico took over at the Foxes' 47. Kelvin Gooden broke several tackles for a 47-yard TD run at 1:14. Ketterling's kick made it 21-8.

Ft. Sumner went to its aerial game, as Matthew Williams and Kelvin Gooden broke up passes. But the Foxes hit a 7-yard TD pass with 6 seconds left in the half. The extra point try failed and it was 21-14 at the half.

Ft. Sumner was on the offensive to open the 3rd period, with Garcia making two stops. Salinas intercepted at the 36. Kelvin Gooden carried twice for a first down. He finished the drive with a 2-yard TD plunge at 7:42. The kick failed and it was 27-14.

Mike Eaton tackled the kick returner at the 31. Tackles were made by Manuel Estrada and Stephens. Ft. Sumner punted to the Texico 32. The Wolverines drove downfield until Gilbert raced 31 yards for a TD at 5:22. The pass for extra points failed and Texico led 33-14.

On defense, tackles were made by Estrada, Steve Horner, Williams and Winegeart. Barba intercepted and returned it 15 yards to the Texico 25. Kelvin Gooden then raced 75 yards for another TD, at 2:48 of the 3rd period. Ketterling's kick made it 40-14.

Now in the final period, tackles were made by Salinas, Stephens, Steve Horner and Garcia. Barba intercepted in the end zone. Kelvin Gooden immediately broke loose for an 8-yard TD gallop at 10:53. Ketterling's kick made it 47-14.

On defense, Williams blocked a pass. Salinas had two tackles. The Wolverines took over near midfield. Gilbert carried for a first down. Salinas raced 43 yards for a TD at 7:35. Ketterling's kick made it 54-14.

Josh Jorde tried an onside kick, recovered by Tyrone Gooden. Eaton ran 28 yards. The Wolverines were at the Ft. Sumner 4 when the game ended.

Coach Bruce Scroggins commented, "The offensive line played really well, with 3 runners each gaining over 100 yards. And the defense played really well, with 4 interceptions to its credit."

Kelvin Gooden was named Player of the Week for the New Mexico area by the Amarillo and Lubbock newspapers.

Individual statistics were: rushing - Gooden, 18 carries for 267 yards; Gilbert, 9 for 103; Barba, 6 for 120; Johnny Salinas, 1 for 43; Mike Eaton, 8 for 43. Receiving - Bobby Winegeart, 1 for 15. Passing - Barba, 1 of 4 for 15 yards.

Team statistics were: first downs - Texico 7, Ft. Sumner 12; yards rushing - Texico 41 for 576; Ft. Sumner 46 for 185; passing - Texico 1 of 4 for 15 yards, Ft. Sumner 14 of 41 for 163. Total yards - Texico 591, Ft. Sumner 348. Punting - Texico 4 for 32.7 yard average, Ft. Sumner 2 for 33 yard average; penalties - Texico 13 for 95 yards, Ft. Sumner 5 for 30 yards.

## Gooden still No. 1

Here's a look at the area football leaders according to statistics kept by the Lubbock newspaper:

Texico's Kelvin Gooden was named its New Mexico Player of the Week for his work against Ft. Sumner. All today, Gooden is the New Mexico area's top rusher with 195 carries for 1,561 yards - 173 yards a game. Gooden also is the No. 2 scorer with 110 points.

Other Texico statistics include Louie Delgado as the 9th rated passer with 12 completions in 48 attempts for 244 yards. Texico, 6-4, is now ranked 2nd in New Mexico, behind Loving, 7-3. Quarterback Joel Barba, who replaced Delgado when he was injured a couple of games back, was put on the Lubbock paper's New Mexico honor roll for rushing 6 times for 120 yards and completing 1 of 4 passes for 15 yards.

Lazbuddie is ranked 5th among the area 6-Man teams on team offense, with 397 yards a game, and 2nd on team defense, allowing 206 yards a game. Brett Thomas ranks 2nd among the passers with 126 completions in 189 attempts for 1,879 yards - 208 yards a game. Ranking among the top receivers are Leland Brockman, 3rd, with 38 grabs for 655 yards; Matt Cozby, 5th, with 31 for 473; and Mario Zamora, 10th, with 22 for 232.

Cozby was put on the Lubbock paper's area honor roll for participating in 15 tackles against Silverton, including four behind the line of scrimmage, while catching 4 passes for 57 yards and 3 TDs.

Hart's Longhorns, one of the state's top rated teams, beat the Farwell Steers 28-8, last Friday at W.M. Roberts Stadium.

Farwell is now 3-6 on the season and 1-3 in district. The Steers play at Kress tonight (Friday) at 7:30 p.m. It will be their season finale.

Brent Harrison, who suffered a concussion two weeks ago, was back in the lineup against Hart.

Farwell kicked off with Nash Armstrong tackling the returner at the Hart 7. Tackles were made by Clay Corn, Dean Rubio, Derrick Haseloff, Kade Kent and Rob Pomper but Hart moved the ball on the ground. Hart was 4th and 1 at the Steer 37, making it by less than a foot.

Justin and Jody Mahaney had good tackles, as well as Shawn and Derrick Haseloff. But Hart scored on a 16-yard pass at 5:00. The kick made it 7-0.

Farwell started at its own 20 after Hart kicked into the end zone. Ryan Williams hit Derrick Haseloff with an 8 yard pass. On 4th down and 1, Farwell attempted to punt but a roughing the kicker call against Hart gave the ball back to the Steers. Harrison raced around end for 17 yards. Farwell was held at midfield and punted. A clipping penalty put the ball at the Hart 6.

As the second quarter opened, Derrick Haseloff and Harrison had strong tackles. A face mask call gave Hart a

first down. Michael Mendoza had 2 tackles as did Derrick Haseloff. A personal foul call gave Hart a first down on the Farwell 2. But two penalties against Hart, plus a good tackle by Harrison and a pass knocked down by Harrison forced Hart to try a 32-yard field goal attempt. It was wide and Farwell took over on its 22.

Farwell was held and its punt try was blocked, Hart taking over at the Steer 9. The Longhorns scored on a 9-yard run at 3:36. The kick made it 14-0.

Harrison returned the kick 20 yards to the Steer 29. Harrison ran for 8 and Shawn Haseloff for 10. Hart intercepted at its 40 and returned it to the Steer 42. Four passes failed, with Shawn Haseloff breaking up the 4th down try as Farwell took over. The half ended shortly thereafter.

Harrison returned the kickoff to open the 3rd quarter to the Steer 15. A halfback pass was intercepted at the Steer 10 by a Hart lineman, who returned it for a TD at 11:01. The kick made it 21-0.

Farwell started on its own 20, was held and punted to its 43. Pomper, who contacted the flu earlier in the week, had a good tackle. Harrison intercepted in the end zone to give Farwell back the ball.

Armstrong was put in at quarterback. Farwell was stopped and punted to its 43. Kent recovered a fumble at midfield.

Armstrong hit Eric Chadwick over the middle with a 33 yard pass to the Hart 22. Farwell was held as a 4th down pass failed.

On defense, Justin Mahaney had an outstanding tackle for a 4-yard loss on a sweep play. Hart was forced to punt but the Longhorns recovered a fumble by the Farwell returner at the Steer 37 as the third quarter ended.

On defense again, Clint Austin had a good tackle and Justin Mahaney had a QB sack. Hart's 35-yard field goal try missed.

Armstrong hit Dean Rubio with a 15 yard pass, then Shawn Haseloff with a 10 yard pass. On 4th and 5 at the Steer 35, a

reverse failed and Hart took over at the Steer 25. Hart scored on a 25-yard run at 6:12. The kick made it 28-0.

Armstrong returned the kick 15 yards to the Steer 45. Armstrong then threw a perfect pass deep down the middle to Harrison, who was double teamed, for a 53-yard score at 5:10. Austin scored 2 extra points on a run and it was 28-8.

Farwell tried an onside kick but it didn't go far enough, so Hart took over at the Steer 44. Kent had a good tackle. Hart was stopped and punted to the Farwell 22.

Rubio caught an 18 yard pass from Armstrong. A screen pass to Harrison failed to gain and it was 4th down. Farwell tried a fake punt but the pass by punter Lupe Garza failed.

Coach Rex Cumpton noted: "We have to more effective running the ball this week and keep improving on our passing. It's our last game of the season and we want to finish on a high note with a victory."

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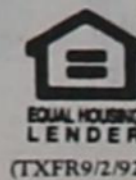

## Lazbuddie wins showdown

It was a showdown of the area's top two 6-Man football teams last Friday and the Lazbuddie Longhorns showed they are a strong contender for a state championship by whipping Silverton, 52-16, in an away game.

The Longhorns are now 9-0 overall and 4-0 in district. They end the regular season by hosting Cotton Center tonight (Friday) at 7:30 p.m. Then Lazbuddie moves into the state playoffs.

Silverton fell to 7-2 overall and 3-1 in district.

Coach Mark Scisson's team dominated the game, using a tough defense, which limited Silverton to 131 yards overall, while riding quarterback Brett Thomas's arm on offense. Thomas maintained his usual consistency, with 23 completions in 34 pass tries for 289 yards and 4 TDs.

The first quarter saw Lazbuddie roll to a 14-0 lead. First, Thomas hit Matt Cozbey with a 37-yard pass for a TD. Leland Brockman kicked the points after. Then Jon Colby Miller ran over from the 6 for a TD. The kick failed.

The second quarter saw much of the same, as Lazbuddie outscored Silverton, 22-8. After Silverton tallied on a 10-yard fumble recovery run, Lazbuddie went back to work. Mario Zamora scored on a 56 yard run; the kick failed. Thomas hit Cozbey with two more TD passes, one from 11 yards out and one from the 1 yard line. Brockman's kicks were good both times and Lazbuddie led at the half, 36-8.

The onslaught continued in the 3rd period. Zamora scored on an 11 yard pass from Thomas, with Brockman's kick good. The final Longhorn score came when Miller raced over from the 4 yard line; the Brockman kick was good. At the end of three quarters, Lazbuddie was comfortably ahead, 52-8. That was one point short of the 45-point rule which would have ended the game after the Miller TD.

The final period saw only one score: Silverton tallied on a 17 yard pass, with the kick good.

Coach Mark Scisson commented, "We had been looking forward to this game all year long. The game was our toughest all year because they have a very physical team. They have 6 kids over 210 lbs. We were smaller but quicker - a big advantage. I thought they would try to stop our passing attack so we stressed running. We were successful, and gained more than 200 yards on the ground."

The district championship trophy will be presented to the Longhorns, ranked 3rd in the state, at the Cotton Center game. The Longhorns hope to win so it will be an outright district title. If that occurs, it will be the first time the Longhorns went 10-0 and won a district title by itself.

As for the playoffs, Lazbuddie will play the 2nd place team in District 4 next weekend. If Ropes beats Smyer tonight, then Lazbuddie will face Smyer. If Smyer wins, there will be a 3-way tie in District 4 for 2nd and Lazbuddie will have to wait until Saturday morning to see who it plays.

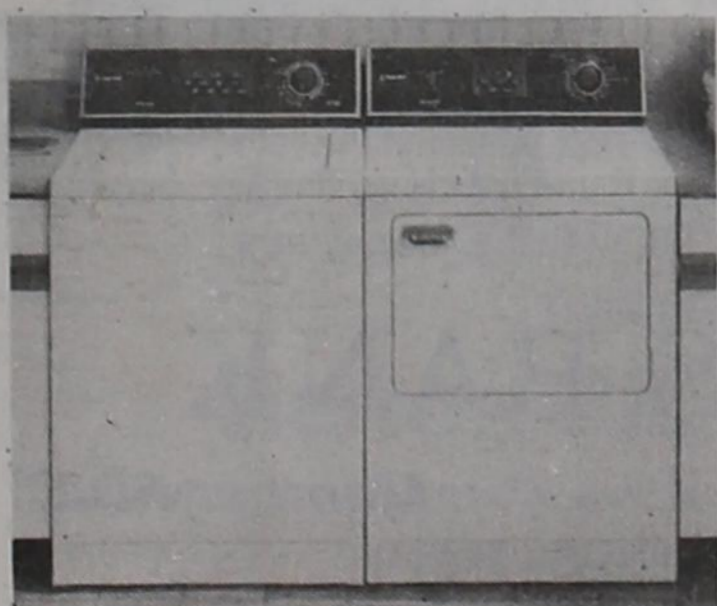

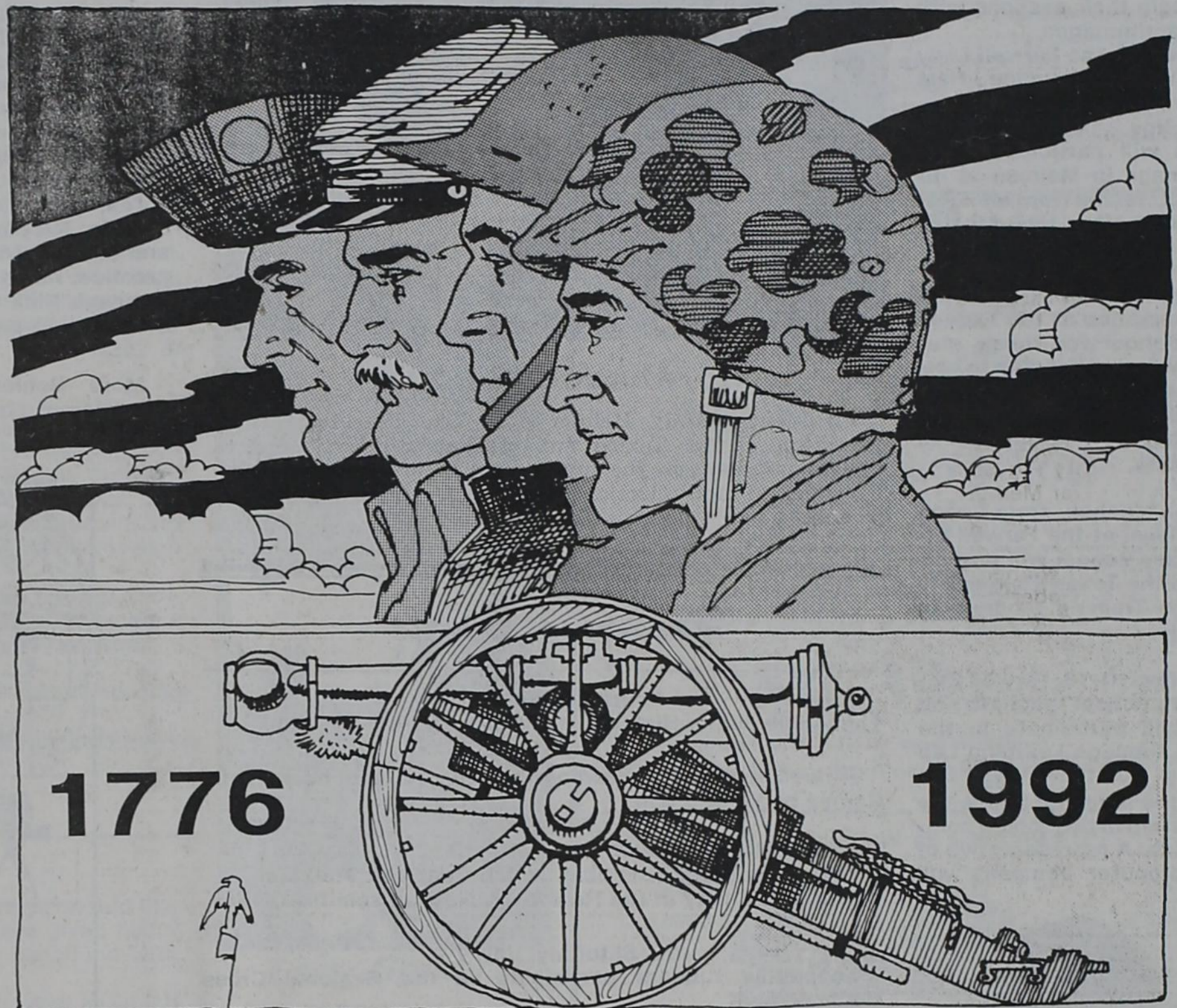
Seventh grade through 12th grade will have an essay

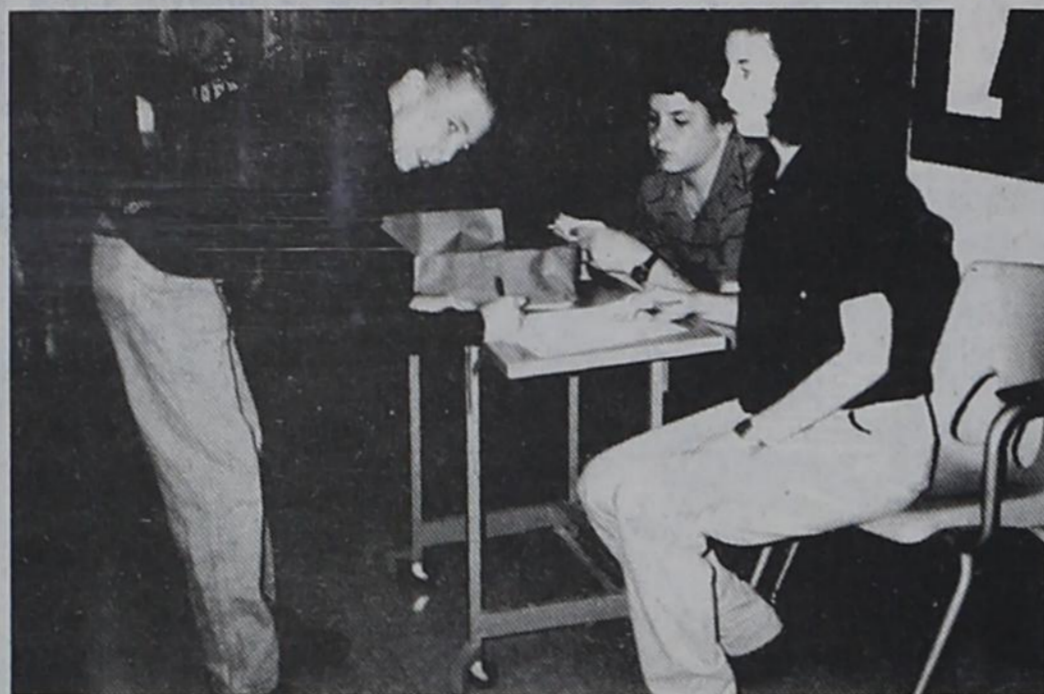

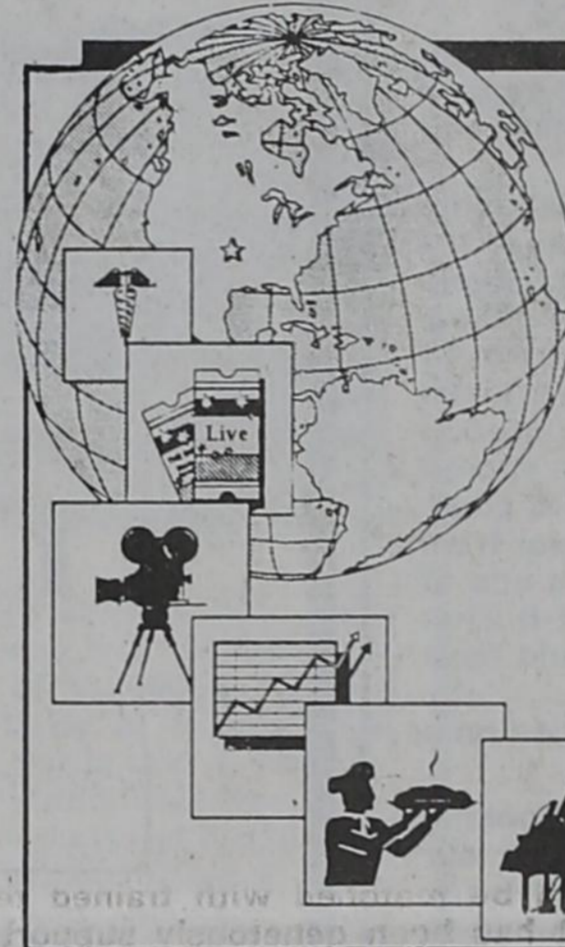

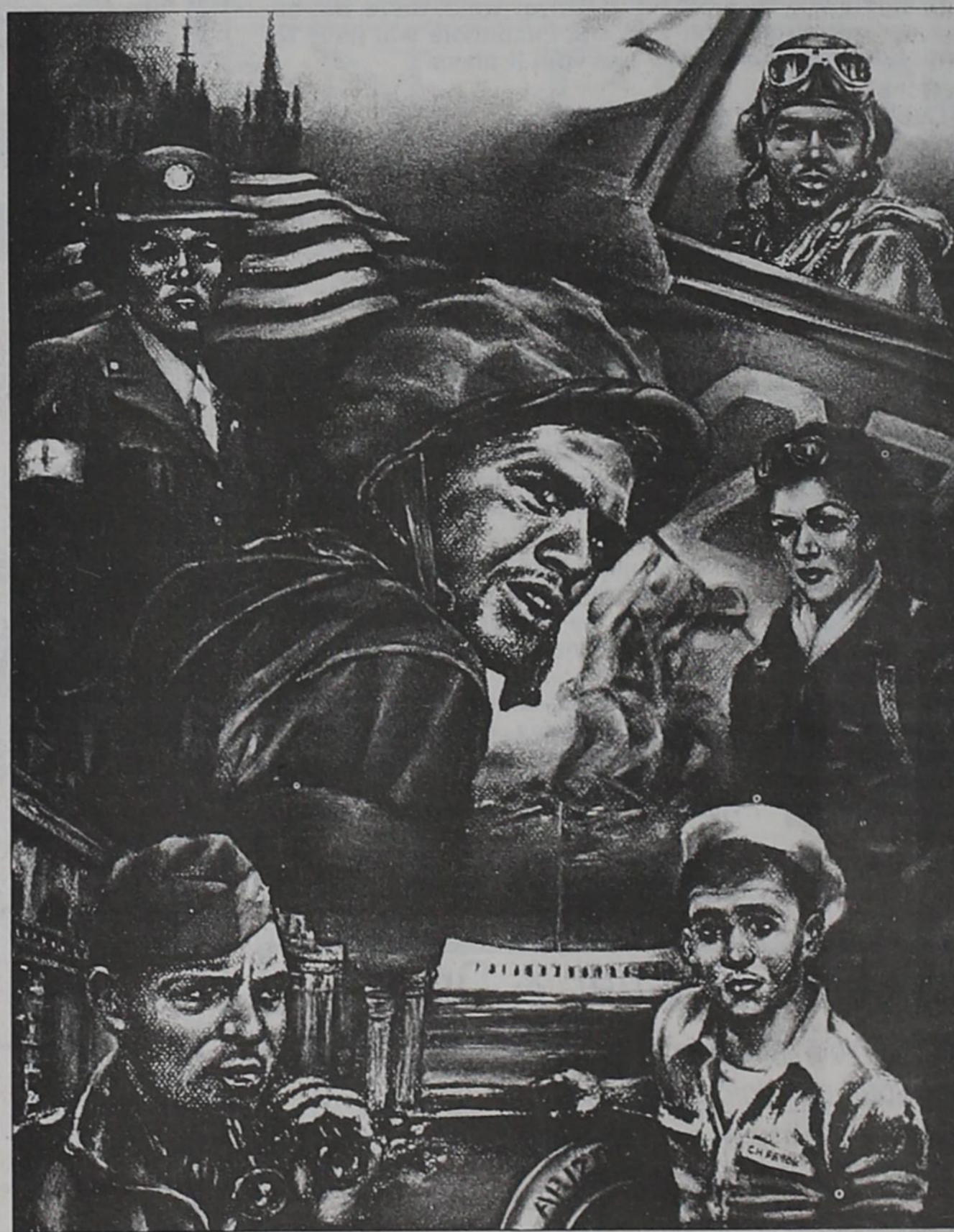

**Applications accepted**

The Texas Department of Agriculture is accepting permit applications for temporary grain storage facilities due to a bumper sorghum crop and a shortage of storage buildings in the Panhandle and South Plains. Agriculture Commissioner Rick Perry said recently.  
"Many West Texas farmers planted grain sorghum to replace cotton destroyed by weather, and we also are seeing better than average sorghum yields and a railcar shortage," Perry said. "So, for the first time in six years the department is issuing permits for temporary grain storage facilities."  
Grain that has a negotiable grain warehouse receipt must be stored in permanent facilities. The temporary facilities may store only non-receipted, producer-owned grain for a maximum of 90 days. Grain stored in temporary structures must be moved to apartment facility as space becomes available. If conditions warrant, TDA may grant approval to extend 90-day permits in 30-day increments.  
All permits for temporary storage must be requested in advance and will be approved in the same manner as permanent storage space. Outside storage must be constructed on an asphalt, concrete or compacted earth base and have rigid sidewalls. The warehouse operator is responsible for maintaining grain quality. The warehouse operator's surety bond must be increased at the rate specified by law and the grain must be insured against all risks specified in the grain warehouse law.



### Letter To The Editor

Dear Editor:  
I write this letter more to the citizens of Farwell than just to you. I want them to know that the committee appointed by the mayor to set the wheels in motion for the hiring of a police officer has had its first meeting and much was accomplished.

We, John Carlson, Royce Bethel and myself met on Oct. 28. Much discussion was held concerning what an officer would expect from the city and what the city would expect of him or her. Basic guidelines were set forth about salary, working hours, and the furnishing of equipment. To say the least it was very productive.

There is something I wanted the citizens to know and what that is contrary to what has been said, the reserve funds of the city will not be depleted in any form or fashion. The original motion that was made to seek out an officer for the city plainly stated that when we employ an officer that the startup cost and operational cost for the first year only would come out of the reserve funds.

The remaining years to come would have to be funded from taxes, leftover budget funds, etc. If we, the city, go into this venture clouded over with scare tactics placed about by a very minority group then the venture will fail. I do not mean an ethnic group when I say minority group. I mean the few that have run this city for so many years, getting what they want and the majority of the citizens not being heard. As far as I am concerned that type of activity is over and done with in this city.

I found out what the majority wanted by just talking to people. I saw what they wanted when they signed the petitions that were distributed throughout the city. It was something to behold when 130 people signed that petition saying they wanted their own police officer. As long as I am on the city council I will stand up for the majority of the citizens. I will not be influenced by the "few" that has had their way for so long. Also, even if I don't believe in something the majority of citizens want, I will back them. They have been "quieted" by the "few" for too long.

In closing, I want to put to rest something once and for all. A couple of citizens ( a couple in Texas, Mike, means more than one) have wondered if the reason I am pushing for our own police officer is that once we start the hiring procedure I will resign as city alderman and take the job. In no way do I want nor would I even consider the position of police officer for the City of Farwell. My only reason for pushing so hard for the officer is that I believe strongly we need one.

I also strongly believe that a majority of the citizens want our own officer. Contrary to the belief of a few, there is crime in the City of Farwell and it needs immediate attention. Ask some of the folks that have had their homes broken into in the past year, ask the people that have had their property stolen out of their yards, ask the folks that has had their property damaged for no reason, just ask the citizens what they think. You will find that the majority wants some protection and I feel that the city government owes them that basic right.

## Alert issued

The Curry County District Attorney's Office has issued a Consumer Protection Alert to merchants here concerning counterfeit credit cards.

Counterfeit bank cards from a fictitious bank, "Independent Financial" have been fraudulently used in New Mexico and Texas.

Law officials pointed out:  
- There is no "Independent Financial" Bank.  
- The cards are encoded and embossed with legitimate account information that was obtained fraudulently.  
- The embossing, hologram, Visa or MasterCard Logo, and signature panel are of poor quality.  
- None of the Visa Cards have the required, preprinted bank ID numbers above the embossing.  
- The identification presented, when requested, is usually stolen or counterfeit.

To date, these cards have been used predominantly to obtain cash advances. A number of suspects are in custody and the U.S. Secret Service is conducting an investigation into this scheme.
