
The tournament probably will be over by noon that day, but will depend on the number of participants.

The Farwell City Council Tuesday learned that a major development company is interested in placing rental apartment units for senior citizens in Farwell to be called "Farwell Senior Apartments."

The council voted to send Calhoun Property Management, of Louisiana, a letter "welcoming them to do the program in Farwell." This letter is needed for the firm to apply for a long-term loan from Farmers Home Administration.

Realtor Daren Sudderth represented Calhoun at the meeting. Mayor Chris Gikas stressed that before Farwell made an official commitment involving services to the proposed development, the council should meet with Calhoun officials.

Sudderth said Calhoun picked Farwell because of U.S. Census Bureau statistics showing a need for housing for senior citizens here. They have an option to buy land from Terry Travis, outside Farwell's city limits at its southwest corner (near State Line Road). It is believed that Calhoun also has 6-month options on property in Bovina and Friona and would lean toward those communities if it doesn't work things out in Farwell. The \$1 million project calls for 12 duplex apartments (24 apartments) in a 3- acre area. The 1- and 2-bedroom units, with 900 to 1,000 sq. ft., would be brick. Lots would be large enough for trees and gardens. Persons must be 62 years old or older to qualify for them. It's okay for married couples -but no families. Apartments would be maintained by their renters. These are not lowincome, subsidized units. The rent would be based on 30 percent of the renter's income - after his basic needs are taken care of. Once the 12 units are filled, Calhoun would build 12 more. The maximum would be 72 duplexes. Sudderth said he has checked out the company and it's reputable. They have built 88 other projects, with 2,600 units such as those proposed here. Calhoun would provide curbs and gutters, and water and sewer lines, for its subdivision. But the city would have to annex the area and provide city water and sewer services. That capability is available.

Vehicle crackdown upcoming

Farwell is about to begin a crackdown on unlicensed, abandoned and wrecked vehicles within the city limits.

At Tuesday's City Council

Part of the addition is the wing added to the junior high school, and part of it is the addition to the Texico Cafeteria. There are now new restrooms and some additional space.

One of the most outstanding things about the addition is that it was finished early enough that supplies and desks could be moved in before school starts in the fall. All of the books and computers and materials will be in place for the teachers right from the start of the year.

Another neat thing about the addition is the size of the rooms. They are all large and spacious. There are four large classrooms and the science lab. There are also: a book storage room, a teachers' workroom, rest rooms, and office space for the principal and the school secretary.

The science lab, of example is so large that coach Scroggins has referred to it as "Gym 3." Actually there is a large laboratory, a room which can house greenhouse plants, an aquarium, or other science projects, and an office. The lab will be equipped with gas jets and sinks and electrical outlets. There is even a shower in case of emergencies with toxic chemicals.

There is now a teachers' workroom large enough to house the copy machine, a paper cutter, rolls of construction paper, and other supplies. It will be nice for the teachers to have a place to work.

Junior High Principal Anna Southard has just moved into her new office – it is quite a change for her after working for years in a closet sized office. So, too, has Mrs. Jesko moved into her office.

The addition required sacrifices on the part of many people.

- Students and teachers alike had to learn to live with noise and dust from the construction.

- Lockers were emptied and moved earlier this year, so students had to watch out for their belongings. - Mrs. Southard spent part of the year without an office, and she was displaced from her classroom. She had to travel from the junior high building to the elementary school where she taught her classes. - Coach Littlejohn had to share his classroom with the school's only copy machine. Each staff member had to do his copying before or after school or risk interrupting the classes. - School maintenance man Glen Neie and board member Ferry Max Winkles rolled up their sleeves and helped do the work around the building

No. 4 - "Putter's Paradise" at Lions Park. You can chip or putt within a 40-foot circle.

No. 5 - "The Sand Storm" at the sand volleyball court at First Baptist Church. For an extra \$1, you can get a 1-shot deduction but hitting within 5 feet of the circle.

No. 6 - "Plumber's Nightmare" means hitting over the old barracks (which is being demolished) next to the First Baptist Church. A toilet tank has been laid on its side and you must putt into it. If you hit into the toilet bowl, you get a 2-shot deduction.

No. 7 - "Bullseye" at the school football field. You chip into an old tire near the shot put area. There's a 7-shot maximum on this hole.

No. 8- "Field Goal" at the school football field. The 110yard hold means hitting within a small circle. And if you hit over the goal post, it's a 2 stroke deduction.

No. 9 - "Extra Point" at the school football field. Like Hole No. 5, for an extra \$1 you get a 1-shot deduction if you hit within a 5-foot circle. You get five tries to hit over the uprights. Women will have a shorter hole, and the flag pole won't be in their way.

Holguin is new Texico deputy

Texico's new Deputy Marshal, Gilbert Holguin, thinks police work is better the second time around.

Holguin, a Deming, N.M., native started his career in law enforcement in 1982 as a Luna County deputy jailer. He stayed in law enforcement until 1990, leaving to fulfill a childhood dream - driving semi-trucks. Now he has returned to law enforcement, in spite of a substantial pay cut.

"If you are in law enforcement, you know you aren't in it for the money," says Holguin.

Like many kids growing up in rural New Mexico, Holugin wasn't really sure what he wanted to be when he grew up. He just knew it wouldn't be farming.

Law enforcement was one job that appealed to him early in life, but it wasn't the only job that appealed to him. He gave law enforcement a good try – first as a deputy jailer, then moving to Clovis in 1984 as a patrolman. Later he spent several years with Clovis' canine patrol. He was a sergeant with the canine patrol when he decided that he needed a career change.

Five girls sign up for queen's contest

Gikas reported that Travis is amenable to annexation for this property and if the Calhoun project moves ahead, he would offer other parts of his property for estate development.

In other business, the council:

- Approved four building permits: Jerry Stover, 610 3rd St., home addition; John McFarland, 904 6th St., fence; Ralph Franse, Franse Irrigation, 50'x95' metal building; and Marvin Anderson, 400 2nd St., fence and driveway. The council rejected the request of Leo Gonzales for a carport at his home on 3rd Street because of the lack of space for it.

 Heard Larry Cochran, of Southern Union Gas, note that a gas rate price hike is on its way. The company would like Farwell City Council approval. Some of the councilmen had questions that Cochran will answer at the council's next meeting.

- Approved a request from Farwell Schools for its major building construction, with the stipulation that it meet city codes. The school system plans to use PVC pipe instead of cast iron pipe, to save money. Water Supt. Dee Hammit said cast iron piping was safer under buildings – and the city code doesn't allow PVC piping under buildings.

- Approved a peddler's license for Andy's Ice Cream, Lubbock. The fee is \$25.

- Heard councilman John Carlson report that the city doesn't need to buy any cellular phones to make sure city employees are contacted in an emergency. The city already rents pagers, and Carlson said the city can use the sheriff's dispatcher in emergencies for paging city workers.

 Discussed using county jail inmates for work projects, such as cleaning up weeds and for cleanup before Border Town Days. The sheriff will be contacted.

 Heard Hammit say that water taps need to be changed for properties belonging to Jack Landrum and Joe Walker. The council approved charging a relocation fee of half the new feet to set a tap. In this case, it will cost each property owner \$50. meeting, a letter asking for a crackdown was received from the Farwell Chamber of Commerce.

Letters will be sent to vehicle owners to begin the process of removing such vehicles outlawed by city ordinance.

Persons who know of vehicles that need to be removed are asked to call City Clerk Cynthia Thigpen at 481-3620.

Lunsford Auto Parts will remove such vehicles at no cost to the owner if called. However, the owner must have the title available. If no title is available, then the vehicle owner needs an "abandoned vehicle certificate" signed by the city police chief and including the vehicle's I.D. number.

The city will not pick up vehicles. And vehicles cannot be taken to the former city landfill.

The city also is having its annual cleanup this weekend. See information elsewhere in today's paper.

Farwell unhappy with '911'

The Farwell City Council Tuesday expressed its discontent with Parmer County's enhanced 911 emergency phone system.


Currently, Farwell calls are routed through a Friona police department dispatcher.

Farwell plans to contact ENMR Telephone to see if it can hook onto ENMR's system and leave the Parmer County one. Last year, Farwell recorded 265 "911" calls.

Councilman Pat Howard reported that Farwell Fire Chief Joel White wants out of the current 911 system.

Parmer County's 911 system used to be handled by the Parmer County sheriff's office. But the sheriff's dispatcher sometimes is away from his phone when he has to check on jail inmates. So the sheriff urged that Friona's police department, which has 24-hour dispatchers, be used for 911. This was approved. The current problem is with the phone lines. Farwell is on ENMR's system and Friona is on GTE's system. Sometimes, the Friona dispatcher gets calls on its 911 line without anyone answering at the other end of the line. For example, lightning reportedly caused two 911 calls to be received at Friona. Due to this, the Friona dispatcher now calls the Parmer County sheriff's dispatcher

Also on police matters, Gikas and councilmen Martin Kube and Jerry Stover said they have received reports from folks on how good it is to have a city police officer. Stover said more motorists are stopping at the 4-way stop on 3rd Street. The city also will look into buying a radar unit for McGaa's vehicle.

ask for verification of the call before fire and/or police units are sent. If the call is for real, then the sheriff's dispatcher calls the Friona dispatcher back - and the proper emergency units are dispatched.

However, if the Friona dispatcher gets a call - and someone answers at the other end of the line - then the dispatch is made immediately without verification with the sheriff.

So the problem is apparent only when there's no answer at the other end of the line. The extra phone calls made would cause a time delay if it were a true emergency.

As a boy he had always longed to drive one of those big rigs that he had seen rolling down the highway. He wanted to travel, and to see a little bit of the world. "Trucking gave me wings," says Holguin.

He visited just about every state west of the Mississippi through the work, and he also had the chance to see some places east of the Mississippi including Alabama, Ohio, and Michigan.

"I got to see the good and the bad," he says. "I learned a lot being on the road.'

According to Holguin trucking fulfilled several of his yearnings. His pay was about double what he earned in law enforcement, and he could let his hair down a bit after work, too.

The change to truck driving gave Holguin the opportunity to look at the flip side of traffic control. "Some police react to truck drivers different than they do to ordinary civilians," he noted. Holguin saw police officers who reacted to truck drivers with sensitivity and courteous, and he also saw some who seemed to be "out to get the drivers." It was an eye opening experience.

After a couple years on the road, Holguin decided that the long hauls weren't all the glory that he had imagined. There many long, lonely hours in the job.

Now that he has returned to law enforcement, Holguin has decided that "being a cop is all my life." He hopes to bring new perspective and sensitivity to his job because of the experiences that he has gained.


The movie addresses vital, timely issues relevant in today's society. It's for folks of all ages.
