## Ground water levels decline

Parmer County ground water levels declined an average of 1.02 feet in 1991 in 96 privately-owned wells measured by
the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No.

This decline represents a reduction of 83,538 acre-feet of water from storage in the Ogallala Aquifer last year in Parmer County
Ground water levels in Parmer County decreased 1.28 feet during the 10 year period from 1982 to 1992 . A decline of
1.37 feet was recorded during the five year period from 1987 1.37 feet w
to 1992 .

Ground water levels in the Ogallala Aquifer within the Ground water levels in the Ogallala Aquifer within the
5.5 million acre Water District service area had an average decline of .73 of a foot from January 1991 to January 1992. This is a net reduction of about 602,250 acre-feet of ground water from storage in the Ogallala Aquifer within the Water District service area.
A network of 1,025 privately -owned observation water wells is used to determine the annual change in the quantity Plains Water District. The Ogallala Aquifer within the High re taken in January and February of each year in order to allow water levels to stabilize from the pumping during the previous growing season

one study published in the prestigious British Journal of Nutrition. Researchers in an earlier study had speculated that the weight loss was due to a decrease in the intestinal absorp-
tion of calories. While the project of National Dietary Research, aptly named Food Source One, would not be used to the formula which has since been improved with other natural colloids has been a windfall for some over-
