Odds and ends today, folks:

A clarification:

Personally speaking, I think it's a neat idea and hope that community folks get together to plan a 4th of July picnic at KKR Park.

March 31 is the deadline for Texas retailers who want to be licensed for the first day of lottery ticket sales.

Sales start July 1 and Texas estimates about 15,000 retailers will participate.

I expect Farwell to have several participants - since a lot of business will flow this way from Clovis, Portales and Texico.

Retailers will make a 5 percent commission on all sales.

For more info, retailers should call 1 (800) 37-LOTTO. The fee is \$125 and a clean record (a criminal background check is taken).

We've carried a couple notices in the past about this, but have been asked to repeat it:

Parmer County now has a 911 enhanced emergency telephone system in place. This allows the police and fireboys to know immediately where the problem is throughout the county.

But it's only good if rural residents give exact locations to the police to be installed in the 911 computer. So far, only about 10 percent of the Oklahoma Lane folks, for example, have filled out the cards on where they live.

Cards are available at the Parmer County sheriff's office and Farwell City Hall. Parmer County rural folks are asked to come by and fill out a card so the exact location of their homes can be put into the computer.

It just takes a second for a card to be filled out - and it can mean the difference between life and death.

The Texico Booster Club will host a Card Show in gym No. 2 from 10 a.m. - 4 p.m. on March 7. There will be dealers to buy, sell and trade almost any kind of card. The admission will be 50 cents.


The team also received first place trophies for winning the most games during the 1991-92 domino playing season which runs from November through February each year.

Engineering funds sought

The water well situation was discussed at Tuesday's Texico City Council meeting.

Here's the problem: the state has approved a grant of \$125,000 for a new well, to replace the contaminated KKR Park well. But Texico doesn't have enough money to have it engineered. So Texico officials will ask the state if it can use some of the grant money for engineering.

The city only has one working well (at Lions Park), which has been on line for some time. Councilman Butch Tharp is worried that the water level is sinking and may be a problem when summer arrives. The city wants to drill a new well west

Also part of the problem is that the contamination plume still hasn't been found. And the state environmental folks don't want Texico to drill a new well until it has found it. But the state hasn't been active in seeking the plume source.

Meanwhile, summer is approaching and Texico officials are getting apprehensive. The city is broke and has no money for engineering a well, said Tharp.

In other business, the council:

- Approved a life safety (fire) code, modeled after the state's. City Attorney Duane Hamar and Fire Chief Lewis Cooper went over the code before recommending it for approval.

 Discussed clearing the vacant lot at 501 Wheeler. Because the city will clean up this private property a lien will be placed on it and foreclosure may take place later.

- Discussed leveling Lions Park and removing stumps and concrete. The county will be asked to do it. Once completed, the Lions Club will install a sprinkler system already purchased by the city. The club then will plant trees and make other improvements there.

- Agreed to have Tharp build a road to the old landfill. The city will buy the fuel. The county had been asked to do it, Tharp said, but only had scraped it. So Tharp, who owns a dragline service, volunteered to make the improvement.

- Agreed to participate in the metro drug task force. Because two other government entities have joined it, the cost to Texico will be \$404, down more than \$300 from last year. The force is re-applying for a state grant, too.

Ordered caliche to repair the streets.

- Heard councilman Oran Jay Autrey say he and Steve Meeks will do the sand blasting and painting at the city pool for the same costs as last year. The city was asked to ante up \$750 for materials. No decision was made.

- Heard mayor Doyal LaRue report he attended a solid waste topic meeting in Santa Rosa Monday and "recycling is imminent." Deputy marshal Kirk Roberts noted that the new youth council is working on that.

- Heard Roberts report that someone may be living at the former Westerner Motel. The city would like to see the motel demolished. Roberts said a state building inspector has checked it and will write a letter saying he won't condemn it but that it can't be repaired.

Roberts asked if the city could foreclose on the motel, then sell. it. Hamar spoke against foreclosing because the city might get stuck with it - and its liabilities. The motel owner cannot be found. A title search will be taken.

- Discussed cemetery improvements but since no cemetery board members attended, no decisions were made. Cemetery board members will be asked to be at the next meeting.

their transcript compared to 26.7% in the state.

The report lists the total revenue spent per pupil is \$5,809 for Lazbuddie, as opposed to \$4,890 for its group, and \$4,141 for the state average. Lazbuddie has a total district revenue of \$1,516,024. Revenue comes from: local tax, 28.8%; other local and intermediate, 4.3%; state, 54.1%; and federal, 11.8%.

The total expenditure per pupil is: Lazbuddie, \$5,806; group average, \$4,846; and state average, \$4,200.

The professional staff consists of 25.6 people -23.2 teachers, .8 professional support, 1.5 campus administrators, and .2 central administrator. There are also 8.5 educational aides and 10.8 auxiliary staff members.

Of the teachers, 18.7 hold bachelor's degrees and 4.5 hold masters degrees. This year's staff lists 1 beginning teacher; 9.7 teachers with 1-5 years experience; 2.5 teachers with 6-10 years experience; 7 teachers with 11-20 years experience; and 3 with over 20 years of experience. The average experience of the teachers in the district is 9.3 years compared to 10.8 years for the group and 11.3 years for the state.

Actual salaries for the staff include: teachers, \$24,092; professional support, \$36,062; campus administration, \$40,667; central administration, \$45,746. Lazbuddie provides housing for its teachers.

Students are enrolled in several special programs: special education, 57 students, 21.8%; vocational education, 67 students, 25.7%; bilingual/ ESL, 47 students, 18%; gifted and talented, 27 students, 10.3%.





Cucumbers With Bacon


2 large cucumbers 2 slices of bacon 1 tsp. butter or margarine

Lazbuddie trio honored

Three students from Lazbuddie Junior High School have qualified and participated in this year's Talent Search for mathematically and verbally advanced students sponsored by Duke University's Talent Identification Program (TIP).

Heath Brown, son of Mr. and Mrs. Scott Brown; Janis Hernandez, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Johnny Hernandez: and Blake Mimms, son of Mr. and Mrs. Clay Mimms participated in the talent search. The program identifies highly able 7th graders from a 16 state area.

While the project of National Dietary Research, aptly named Food Source One, would not be used to successfully fulfill its original goal, the formula which has since been improved with other natural colloids has been a windfall for some overweight people. A Daytona Beach, Florida woman fighting a weight battle for 12 years used the product on the recommendation of her physician and lost 30 pounds. She stated, "Not only have I lost 30 pounds but my cholesterol has dropped from 232 to 143. I have two closets full of clothes which have not fit me in two years that I can now wear." In a separate report, a telephone interview revealed that a Wilmington, North Carolina pharmacist lost 14 pounds in 3 weeks on the product and was never hungry.



2 Tbs. vegetable oil

1 lb. boneless pork shoulder roast, cut into 3/4 " pieces 2 cans (10 3/4 oz. each) Campbell's condensed cream of celery soup

3/4 c. apple juice 1/2 tsp. pepper

1/2 tsp. caraway seed

2 medium red potatoes, cut into 1 -inch chunks

In 4 - quart saucepan over medium heat, in hot oil, cook pork half at a time, until browned on all sides, stirring occasionally. Remove pork as it browns.


