English style riding... in Texico

Horse fans in the area had the opportunity to see something a bit different for these parts on April 11 - an English riding school show.

During the course of the show, the students had the opportunity to show the horsemanship skills that they had learned.

Liddell Brown of Texico learned to enjoy English-style riding as a girl living in England where her father worked for a time. She has been teaching English-style riding since she and her husband, the Rev. Bob Brown, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Texico, moved here.

She calls her riding school "His Way" because she has dedicated it to the Lord. It is located on South Garwood.

At the schooling show, students were asked to participate in two different kinds of tests, dressage and jumping, these are two of the four equestrian events which will be part of the Olympics. Students are scored on their ability to get the horse to move through the activities as smoothly and effortlessly as possible.

During the dressage phase of the schooling show, the students are asked to ride specific patterns at specific speeds within a rectangular field. The object is to get the rider and the horse to move as one. The rider and horse are graded upon factors such as fluidity of motion, and the ability to change direction and speed quickly and gracefully.

In major shows grooming of the both the rider and the horse help to sway the judge's favor. Smartly polished boots and saddles are part of the overall image. In the Texico show, the students worried more about polishing their riding skills than they did about establishing an image.

In the formal dressage activity, markers along the side of the rectangular dressage field help the rider to know when to change direction or speed as an official calls out the movements that are required. In addition to the walk, trot, canter and gallop that are familiar to horsemen here, the dressage has a speed called working walk.

In English style riding, the rider does not use spurs to coax the horse into action. A English saddle allows the rider to direct the horse with leg pressure rather than foot pressure. Unlike our western saddles, the English saddle has no saddle horn on the pommel. It is smaller and lighter weight than a western saddle.

Eight charged in burglaries

The Parmer County sheriff's office and Bovina Police Chief Ted Blair have worked together to solve several burglaries in the county.

Don Hatley, chief deputy for the Parmer County sheriff's office, announced the arrests of 8 persons in connection with at least two burglaries. In addition, other suspects are being interviewed.

Last summer, Bovina High School was burglarized and \$6,000 worth of items and damage caused. Hatley and Blair began checking on possible suspects and came up with some names.

Hatley said five men have been arrested on charges of burglary of a building in connection with the school burglary:

- Rey DeLarosa, 21, Bovina.
- Lorenzo Rocha, 21, Bovina.
- Cesar Marquez, 18, Bovina.
- Angel Espinoza, 20, Bovina.
- Mario Gonzales, 19, Laredo, Texas.

DeLarosa, Rocha, Marquez and Espinoza have had bond set at \$10,000 apiece and their cases are pending before the Grand Jury.

In addition, Hatley said a warrant is out for Ray Estraca, 22, Dimmitt, Texas, in connection with the school burglary. The charge also is for burglary of a habitation.

Gonzales was arrested in Laredo Tuesday morning. Blair was scheduled to drive there this week to bring him to Parmer County.

Hatley said some items, such as shoes, t-shirts and warmup pants, have been recovered from some of the suspects.

Hatley announced that two Bovina residents have been charged with burglary of a habitation. It concerns a burglary at the Larry Mitchell residence in Bovina. Taken were 16 silver dollars and a .38 pistol.

Charged were Kris Cowger, 19, Bovina, and a 15-year-old Bovina boy. Bond is set for \$10,000 for Cowger and his case is pending before the Grand Jury.

Hatley said Cowger allegedly was paying for items in town with silver dollars.

Also, silver dollars were stolen from the home of Virgie Cary, Bovina.

Hatley said warrants are out for two New Mexico men charged with burglary of a habitation. One suspect lives in Clovis, the other in Albuquerque.

This involves the burglary of the Jeff Grissom home, north of Bovina, in March. More than \$15,000 worth of items, including cameras, rings and a motorcycle, were taken.

Hatley will go to Albuquerque shortly to interview that suspect.

Last week, a man stopped by several homes in the Hub and Lazbuddie areas, "asking for gas, etc.," said Hatley.

Deputies Bob Davis and Hatley found the man and have interviewed him.

No one has filed any charges yet and the case is still under investigation.

Hatley said a warrant has been issued for a suspect in the burglary of the low

income buildings in Bovina last summer. Close to \$200 in cash was taken.

And a suspect will be interviewed in the theft of cash from the Bessie Trimble home in Bovina.

After high school, he worked on ranches throughout the West plus feed yards, sale barns and the oil field. Meanwhile, he embarked on a writing career, having his stories published in periodicals such as "The Livestock Weekly", "Team Ropers

Times", "Horse and Ride" and "Country Magazine."

He has participated in the Cowboy Symposium and Celebration in Lubbock, as well as the Staked Plains Roundup in Hobbs, the Cowboy Gathering in Goodwell, Okla., the Eastern New Mexico Cowboy Poetry Gathering in Roswell and others.

He was the banquet speaker at the 75th annual meeting of the Texas Folklore Society. He has appeared at the Cowboy Hall of Fame in Oklahoma City.

Brummett has had three books published - "A Snake in the Bathtub", "My Dog's A Democrat" and "Roping Can Be Hazardous To Your Health."

The stories he writes and tells are about "heroes who are just common everyday ranch kids or grownups that are just trying to survive."

Plans finalized for hoop tourney

Plans were finalized at Tuesday's Texico Community Activities Organization meeting for the 3 on 3 basketball tourney.

The fund-raiser will be held at 1 p.m. mst Sunday at the Texico High School parking lot where there are several small basketball courts. It's open to all area youths.

A giant firecracker mockup will be placed on the fire pole in front of Texico City Hall. It will show the progress being made toward that \$2,500 goal.

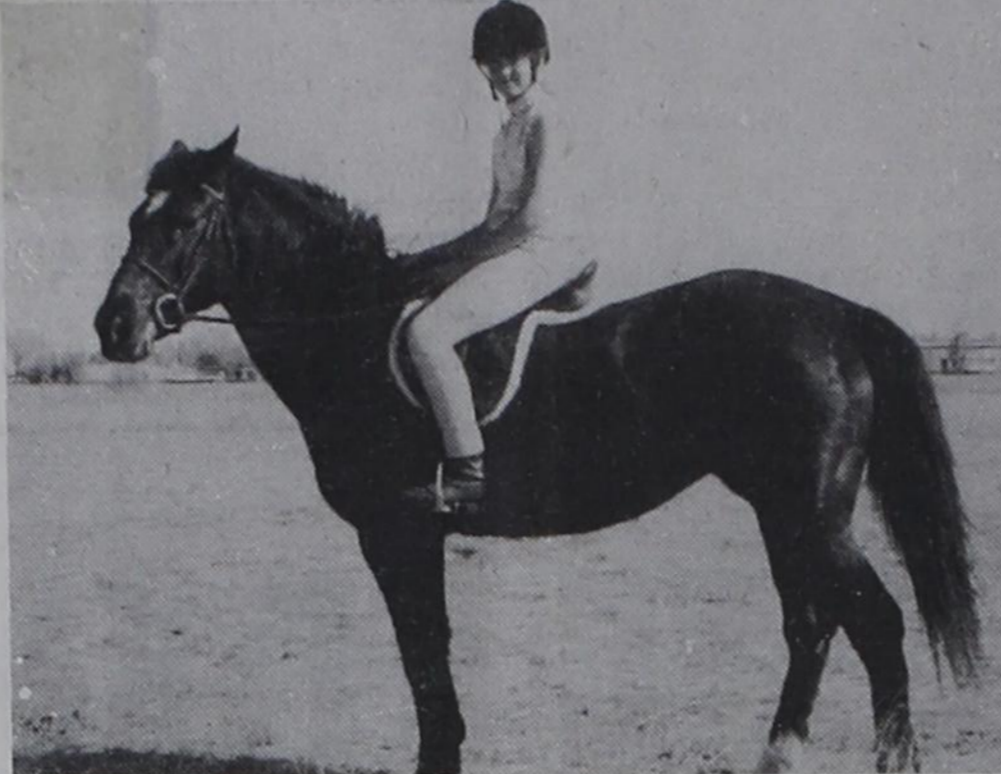

The horse is also directed with subtle movements of the English style halter and bit, too. An English halter has a throat latch and snaffle bit. It also has a noseband to keep the horse's mouth shut.

The second portion of the schooling show is the jumping course. Experienced jumpers take their horses through a series of 8 jumps of different sizes and styles. Beginning jumpers ride the course, but the jumping bars are placed right on the ground rather than higher. The bar is raised in relationship to the rider's ability for a schooling show.

At major shows, the jumps are more elaborate. They often include water courses or high brick walls. The horse and rider have to clear these hurdles without falling or balking. Often there is very little room to give the horse a running start. It takes great strength and balance to remain on horseback while the horse goes through these motions.

Physical skill isn't the only factor in an equestrian event. Mental skills are also important. A course can change due to wear and tear during the course of the day at a big show. It can also be changed to suit the level of competition. When the officials post the course, and the riders have to memorize the pattern that they must take very quickly. It takes an intelligent person to be able to do this.

The judge for the local schooling show was Julie Higgins, an instructor from England. She holds an instructor's rating with the British Horse Society. She earned her rating while working for a show jumper in Surry, England.

Julie met her husband, Sean, while he was stationed at an Air Force base in Yorkshire; he is now assigned to Cannon AFB.

Some of Mrs. Brown's students became interested in English style riding while they lived in England. Shelby Hickey, for instance, has ridden for 6 years. She started when her father was stationed at Lakenheath Air Force Base in England. She attended an American School in England.

Liesel Fielder of Clovis learned to ride while she and her husband lived in Albuquerque. She groomed a friend's horses in exchange for learning to ride English style.

Riding is a sport for the upper classes in England. One person estimated that it costs the equivalent of about \$175 per day to ride in England. The gentry enjoy riding along lovely, green bridal ways that are part of the public lands.

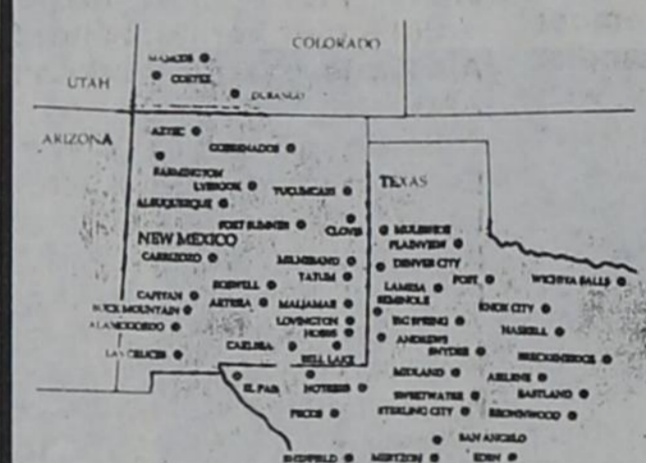
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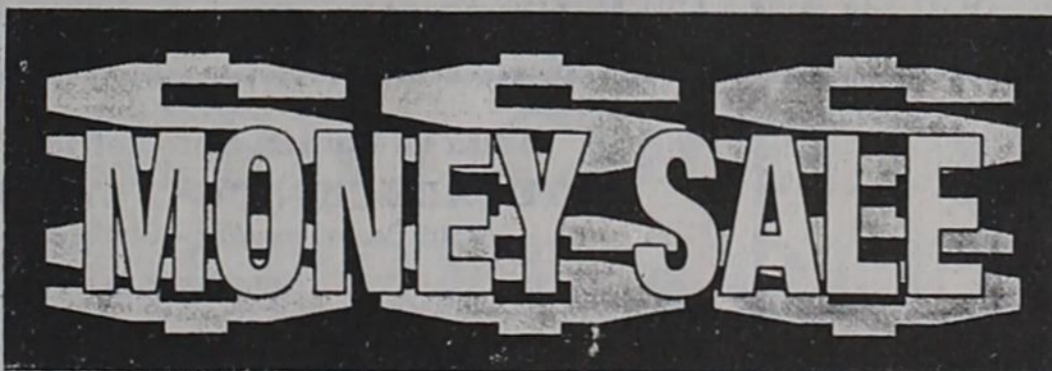
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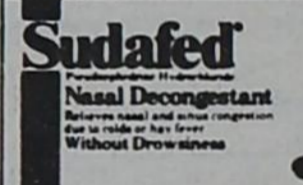
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**Knowledge test**

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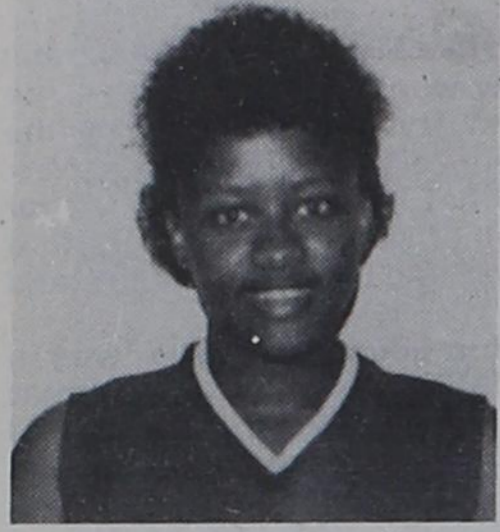

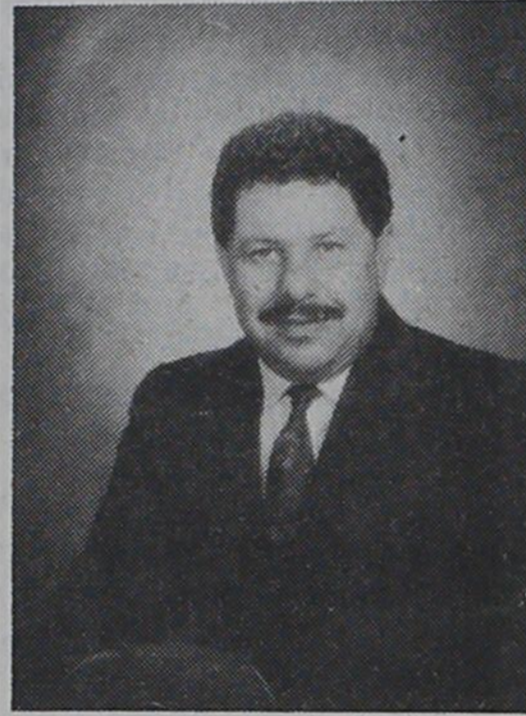

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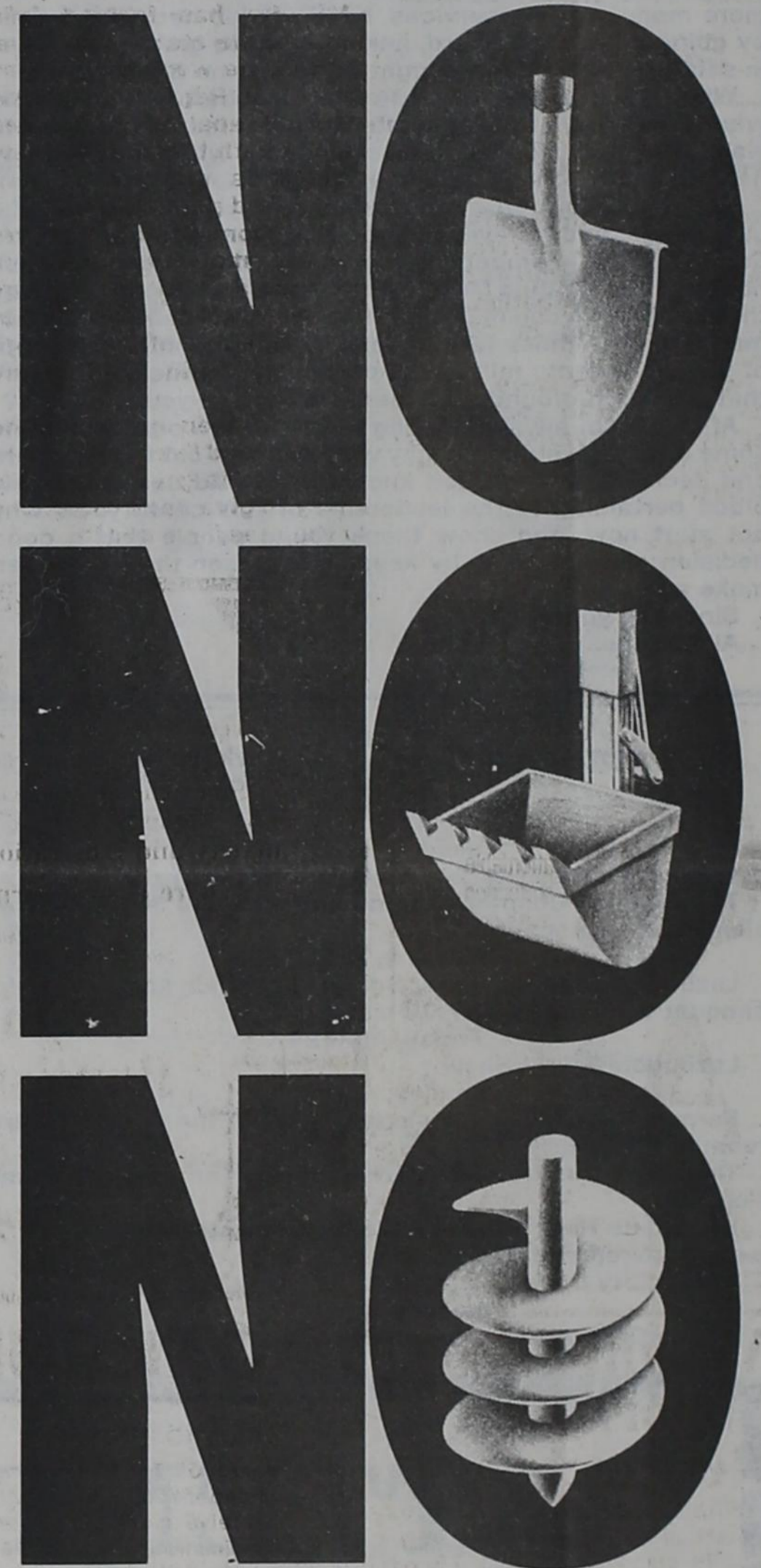

## Sheriff seeks deputy, van

Plans are under way to begin the new Parmer County inmate work program.

Two weeks ago, the county commissioners received half the \$69,726 in state funds promised.

This new state-mandated program calls for counties to keep more non-violent offenders in their local jails instead of sending them to the Texas Department of Corrections' facilities.

Inmates will be allowed to do community service, for non-profit and government groups. Sheriff Rex Williams will screen inmates.

Also, a work-release program will be started. Group and individual counseling will be available, plus residential care for addicts.

The onus for running the new program falls on the sheriff's office. Toward that end, the sheriff is buying a van to transport inmates and plans to hire another deputy to watch over them when they are out in the community working.

It's still going to be several

weeks before the program officially opens. Williams said groups that wish to use the inmates will need to contest members of the committee set up to oversee the program. This committee was named by County Judge Bonnie Clayton last year.

Williams estimated about half a dozen inmates will be available the first year for the program. But this number will increase the following years since many inmates are serving multi-year terms.

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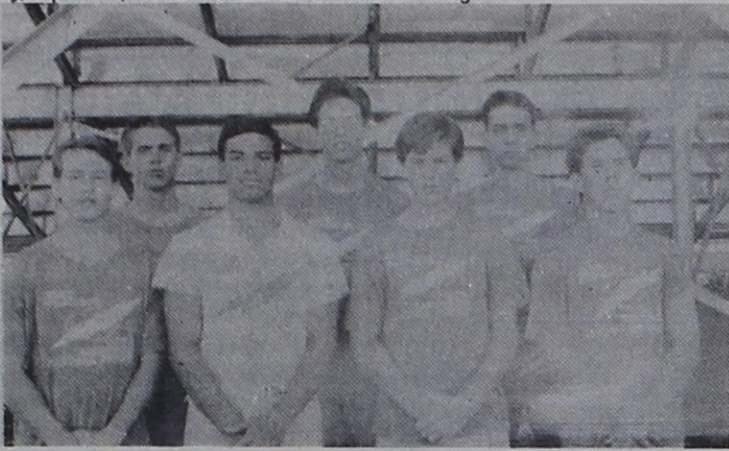

Benny Haney of Capitol Foods has been clearing space for a lottery ticket vending booth in the back of the store.

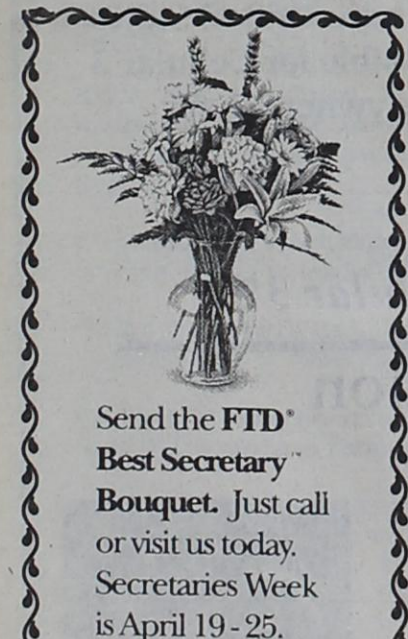
**Miller picked**

Rendon of Anton 6-2, 6-1.

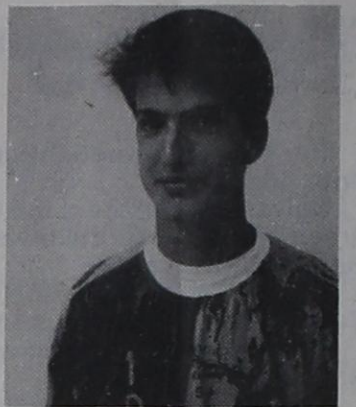
