Commencement address

Well, we're about to enter May - a time for celebration and graduation.

It's an exciting time for graduates at all levels, especially high school seniors. With some trepidation, they look forward eagerly to the future.

To some, that means institutions of higher learning. To others, a time to join the work force. And to some, a chance to get away from home and spread their wings.

Shortly, you will be seeing stories in the newspapers and magazines about what commencement speakers had to say. I've never been asked to speak at a graduation and doubt seriously I ever will be.

So I think I'll use this space to give the type of commencement speech they I guarantee you will never see given by any graduation speaker.

I know what I am supposed to say:

"Kids, you are the Class of Tomorrow. Aim high and you will hit high. The future is with you - make the older generation proud of you. Go forward and carry the torch of your antecedent. Your options are limitless."

But you know me. I'm just not very good at doing what's expected. If I had to give a commencement speech, it would be ultra-short and to the point:

"Kids, our nation is heading into a two-tier society - a lower class and an upper class. Money isn't everything - but it doesn't hurt to have some. I've been poor and I can tell you from experience that a few bucks in your pocket or purse is a whole lot better than having nothing.

"The most important thing for every graduate here is to zero in on getting a job which will keep you from being in poverty your whole life. That means one thing, and one thing only: *Get a government job.*

"By having a government job, you will have benefits plus a decent salary. And it affords you the opportunity to end up in the higher of the two classes. Plus, the tenure that comes with government work is a definite plus.

"More than 53 percent of all Americans now work for the government. This number has been skyrocketing the past few years, and will continue to do so. This is where future opportunity lies - not in the private sector. Read the handwriting on the wall."

See what I mean? As I said, you will never see that type of speech being given at any commencement exercise.

But be honest. Aren't I right?

After I wrote the above column, I saw this Associated Press story in the May 6 issue of the Lubbock paper.

It noted that the recession is ending (a statement I personally disagree with) and that only two major sectors have taken on more workers - health care services and government.

Of the 150,000 jobs created during the past two months, 125,000 were in government.

That's an amazing statistic. If the number of U.S. workers in government were at 53 percent last year, and likely will advance to 56 or 57 percent by the end of this year, what does that say?

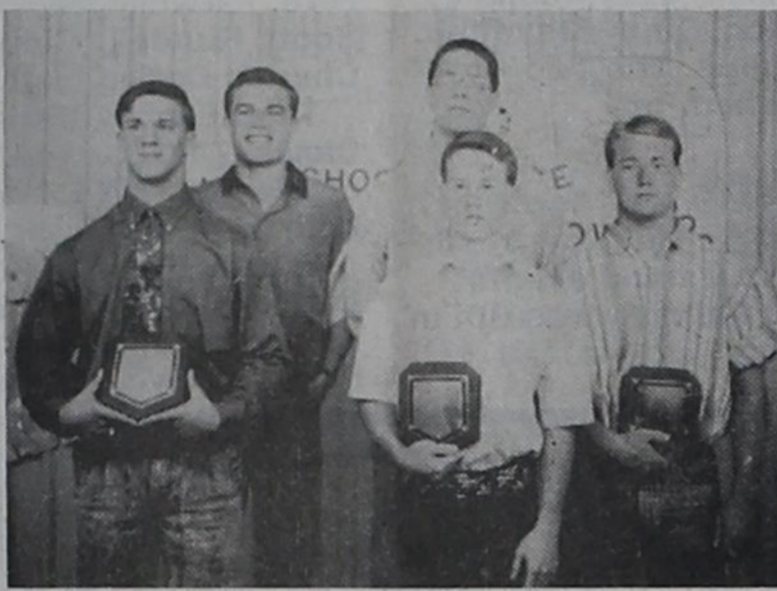

Monk, Miller, Foster grab Farwell honors

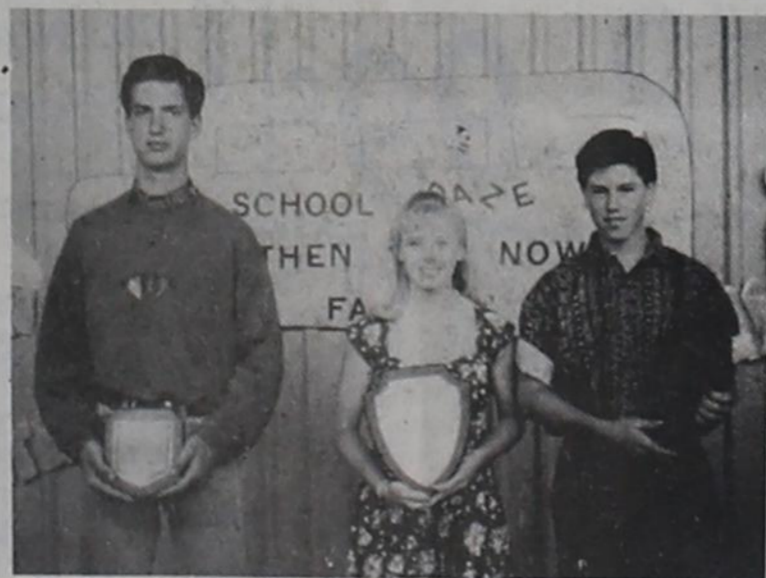

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Texico buys site for well

The Texico City Council held a special meeting Monday to approve spending \$14,000 to buy a site for the proposed water well.

The vote to buy four lots from Clarence Brown at the corner of Anderson and Kindred streets was 3-1. In favor were Butch Sharp, Oran Jay Autrey and Ronnie Warmuth. Opposed was Carolyn Burrows.

For the past several weeks, the council had been looking at city school-owned property at Kindred Street to be donated for a new well. The city originally had asked to meet with the school board May 12 but the school board instead asked for a special meeting May 14.

LaRue said the Brown property became available last week so he called the special meeting. The mayor has made it his top priority to get moving on a new well. Since the contamination of the KKR Park well was discovered, the city has had only one working well.

Test holes will be drilled around the KKR Park well in mid-June by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency. The state has given Texico a \$125,000 grant to build a new well, to be engineered by Bob Lydick Engineers, Clovis.

LaRue said he checked with state Environmental Division inspector Brown Edwards about the new site and Brown said any land in that area was okay as long as it was at least 600 feet from the KKR Park well.

Mrs. Burrows argued that the council should meet with the school board first before purchasing the Brown site. A land donation, for example, would save the \$14,000 cost. It was later noted that the school board might not simply donate the land, but might negotiate for better water rates, for example.

It was said that the Brown land originally went on sale for \$4,000 a lot - \$16,000 total. But he reduced the price for the city. The city likely will just need one lot and will attempt to sell the other three.

Mrs. Burrows also brought up another site near Craig and Lamar streets but underground utilities apparently precluded this choice.

It was noted a submersible pump will be used, meaning less noise. Also, a fence likely will be placed around the 11x14-ft. building.

At Tuesday's Texico City Council meeting, Mayor Doyal LaRue asked City Attorney Duane Hamar to check into a situation involving a trailer.

At the April 28 council meeting, a request for a variance to place two mobile homes on Hudson from Ralph Autrey was denied. Thirteen letters were sent to nearby property owners and 9 were returned - 1 in favor and 8 opposed.

LaRue said Tuesday a trailer has been placed at the location and a family is living in it.

In other business, the council:

- Received 4 bids for the annual audit. CPA De'Aun Willoughby, who has been doing the city audit for several years, was re-hired at a fee of \$2,200. A state formula is used for judging the bidders and Willoughby finished first.

- Approved closing a half-block of Anderson Street the morning of July 25 for the Border Town Days decorated bike contest.

- Discussed an upcoming request by the Texico Community Activities Organization to block streets for the 4th of July Jamboree and use city-owned land across from KKR Park for mud games. Hamar said he was concerned about insurance coverage and will check into it.

- Heard that several folks in Texico have been getting obnoxious phone calls about 3 a.m. US West will be getting a technology later this year where origination points of phone calls can be found out automatically even if the caller hangs up before the call is answered.

Farwell discusses police situation

Whether Farwell should have its own police officer again was discussed at Tuesday's Farwell City Council meeting.

The council will ask county sheriff Rex Williams to meet with them at the June council session.

Although the council has been stalemated on this question for several years, it appears a majority now favors having a part-time police officer. The council would like to work it out with the county

that a county deputy sheriff could work for the city in some of his off-duty time.

The discussion was touched off by new councilman Pat Howard, who said folks told him they wanted local law enforcement.

The other new councilman is James Chadwick.

In other business, the council:

- Heard Howard say he has received complaints about junked cars. Mayor Wendol Christian alerted folks that city ordinances will be enforced.

- Decided to seek bids for the annual street repair work. The council also discussed new technology that involves a process whereby streets don't have to be redone as often as they are now. This will be investigated. Councilman John Carlson is taking the lead on this.

- Received two bids for the 1992 audit - from Kirkland and De'Aun Willoughby CPA firms. Willoughby bid \$3,000. Kirkland bid regular hourly rate not to exceed \$3,000.

Since Willoughby has done the city audit the past several years, the council voted, with Royce Bethel abstaining, to stay with her.

- Heard Thomas Reed, of Parmer County's Soil Conservation Service, discuss the new Resource and Conservation Development program. He asked Farwell to participate in it. It's a federal program administered by SWCD. Farwell will consider it.

- Received one bid, from Harry Sheets for \$7,210, to install a water line along three blocks of First Street (from D to G) to improve water pressure to about 10 homes. It was approved. The pipe will cost \$2,685, also.

- Received a request from the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission regarding the new Americans with Disabilities Act. PRPC wants Farwell to join in for a \$250 fee, with school provided to learn about the new federal act.

The council said it wasn't interested in participating at this time.

- Heard Christian say he's checking into ways to discourage birds here. A sound system is being looked at.

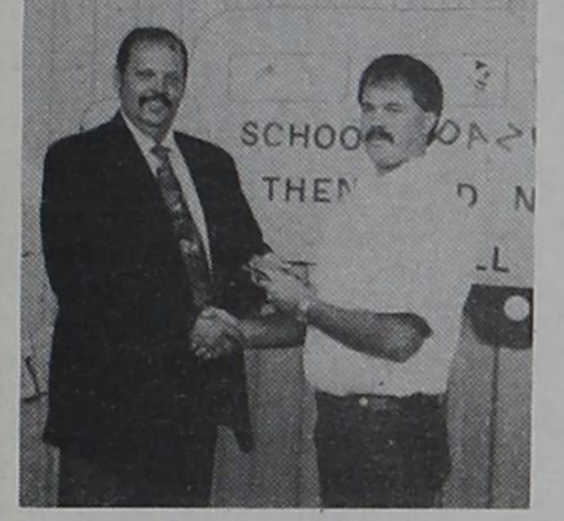

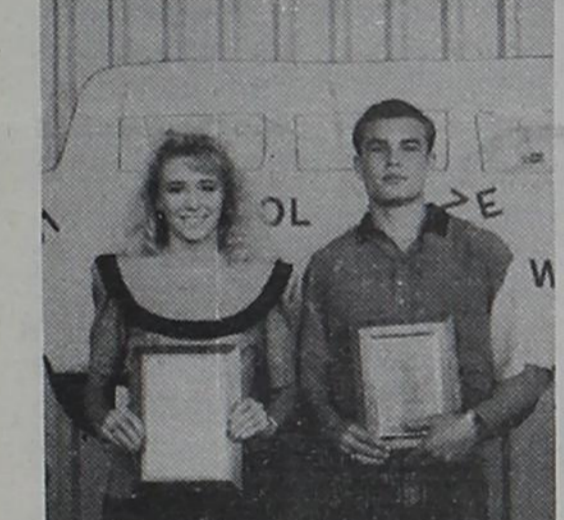

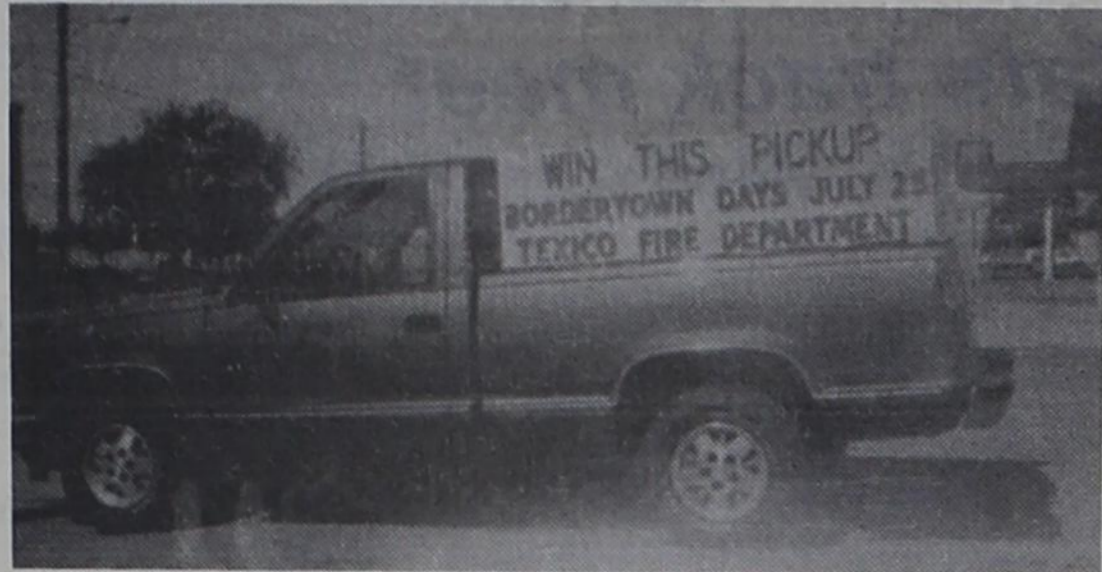

Pharmacist's Corner:

Area cattle totals still growing

Feedlots within the area served by Southwestern Public Service Company are feeding more cattle than ever before.

SPS's annual Fed Cattle Survey shows a 1.3% increase in fed cattle from 1991 from 1990 - the third consecutive year of growth.

Feedlots in the SPS service area fed 5,644, 113 head of cattle in 1991. The 1990 total was 5,570,203.

The survey showed that the one - time total capacity of area feedlots also posted a slight increase during 1991, from 2,887,275 to 2,904,585.

"Cattle feeding remains a vital part of this area," said Dave Krupnick, SPS manager of agricultural and wholesale marketing. "We hope the modest, steady growth of these feedlots- and the feedlot industry- is an indicator of economic growth for the entire region."

SPS annually prepares a Fed Cattle Survey including feedlots in its service area, which covers 52,000 miles. The region includes the Texas and Oklahoma panhandles, the Texas South Plains, eastern and southeastern New Mexico and southwestern Kansas.

Another good indicator for the industry from the survey, according to Krupnick, is the increase in the number of cattle

slaughtered at the 13 beef- packing plants in the SPS service area. Fed Cattle slaughtered in the area increased 2.7%

Krupnick pointed out that several packing plants are located just outside the service area. "That accounts for the difference between the number of cattle slaughtered and the number fed," he said.

Another one of those trends is a steady growth in the total number of feedlots in the area: 117 in 1989, 120 in 1990, and 122 in 1991.

Recipe of Week

Grits Yorkshire Pudding

2 cups. rich beef juices from a roast
1 1/2 c. water
1 1/2 c. plus 2/3 c. milk.
3/4 c. Jim Dandy Quick Grits
1/4 tsp. salt

2/3 c. Martha White self - rising flour
1 egg, lightly beaten

Preheat oven to 425 degrees. Pour beef juices into a 9 inch iron skillet. Put skillet with juices into oven to heat. Bring water and 1 1/2 c. milk to a boil in a large saucepan. Stir in grits and salt; return to a boil. Cover and reduce heat to low. Cook 5 minutes until thickened, stirring occasionally. Cool slightly. Add flour, remaining 2/3 c. milk, and egg to grits. Stir until well blended. Remove hot skillet from oven. Pour grits batter over beef juices. Bake 20 minutes or until the top is golden brown. Makes 8 servings.

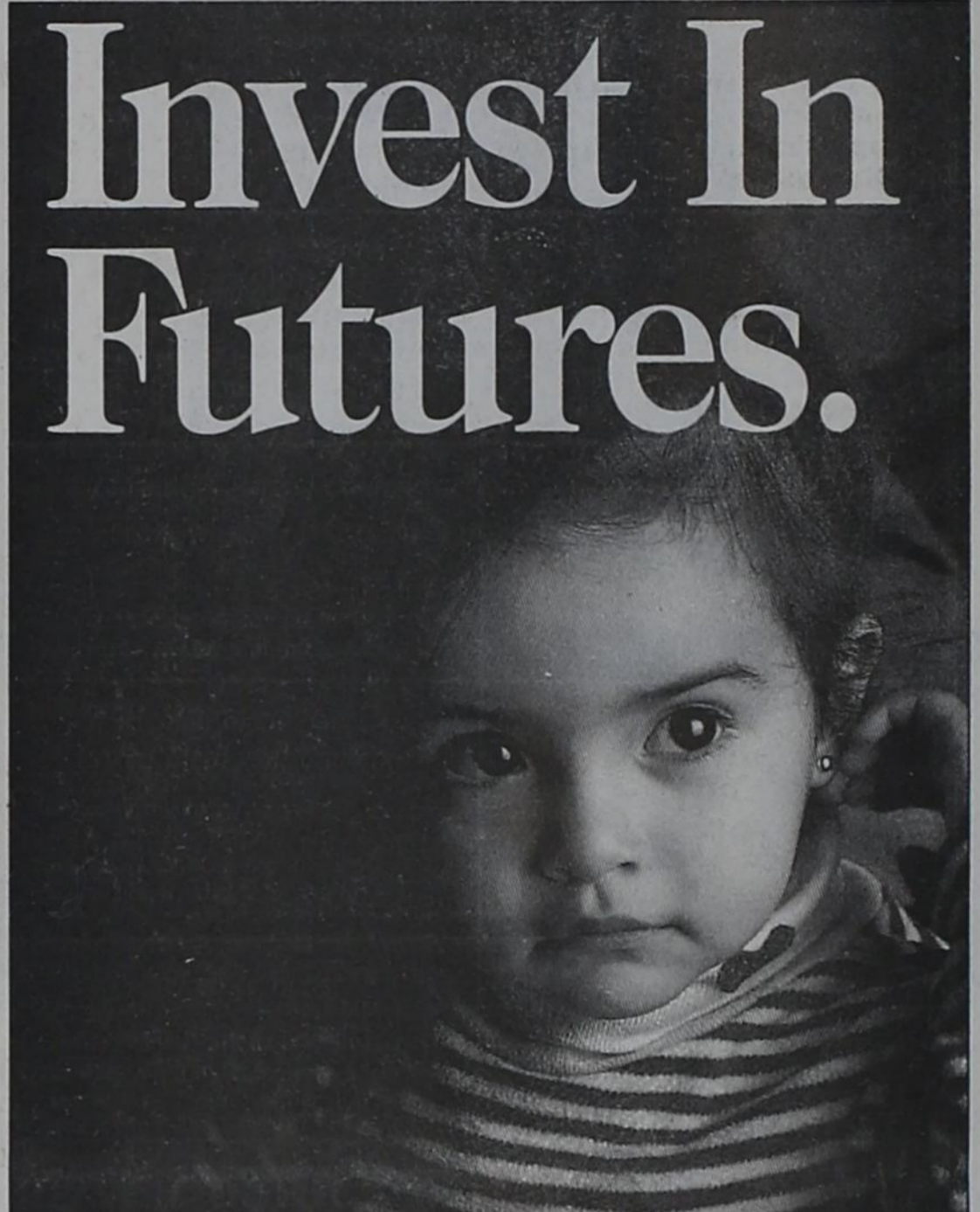

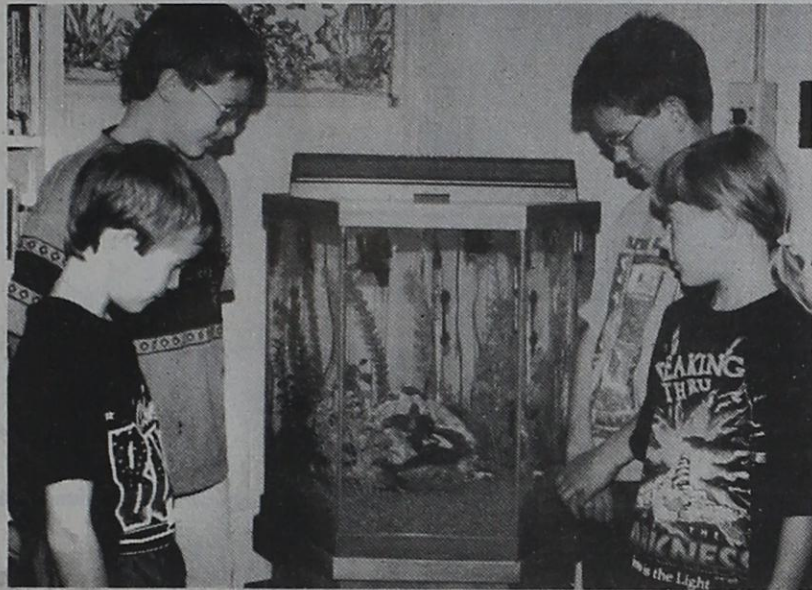

I suggest that the "CCVC" group use the money they have collected for legal fees for a scholarship for a deserving Texico student that might not otherwise be able to attend college.

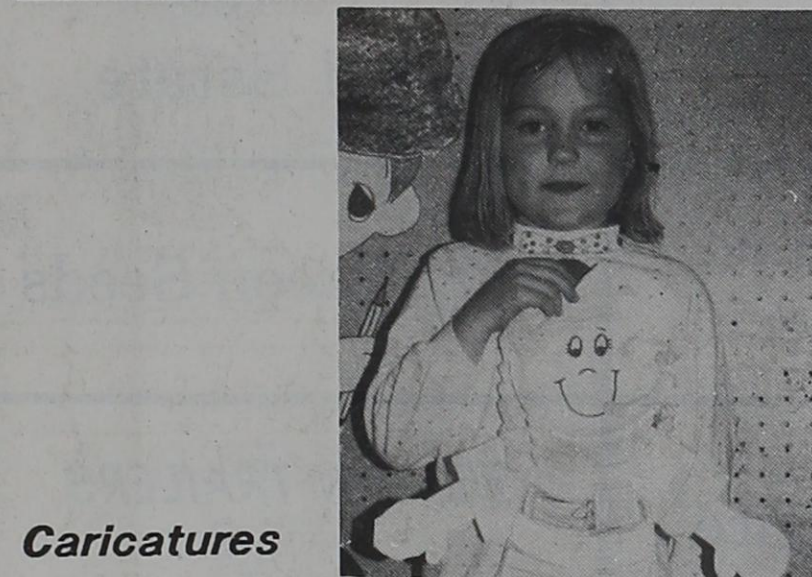

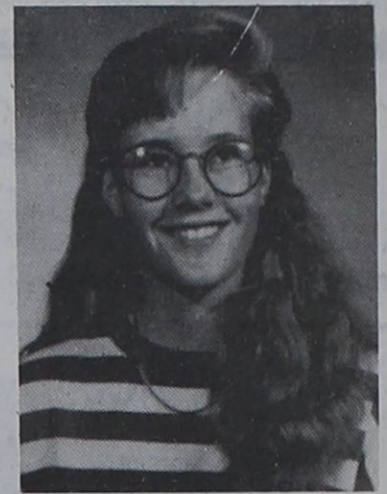

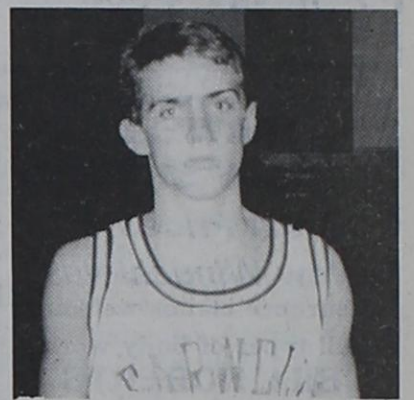

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Services offered by PCS include:

* The Department of Housing assists eligible households in paying rental costs for approved standard rental housing units.

* Operation Bootstrap provides assistance for housing eligible households, unemployed or underemployed people who are involved in post - secondary training to complete a program of study. This program assists by paying rental costs for approved rental housing units. Applicants receive vocational/ motivational testing and are selected by a coordinating board.

* Weatherization is designed to reduce energy costs for low income households, particularly the elderly. This is accomplished through the installation of weather stripping, storm windows, caulking, solid core doors, insulation of attics, or repair to existing doors and windows.

* Department of Transportation offers transportation to the general public. Twenty- four hour notice is required for this service.

* Low income individuals may be eligible for reduced fares. For 50 cents residents can get transportation to the local doctor or dentist or to a store to shop. For a higher fee, there is transportation available to take folks to Amarillo or Lubbock for doctor's appointments. Transportation for any Medicaid reimbursable service may be covered by Medicaid. The Transportation Services Division only offers transportation within the state of Texas.

* Other programs available include: Job Training Partnership, Summer Youth Employment Program, Existing Rental Assistance, Protective Homemaker Services, Energy Crisis Program, Outreach centers, Retired Senior Volunteer Program, and the Temporary Emergency Food P

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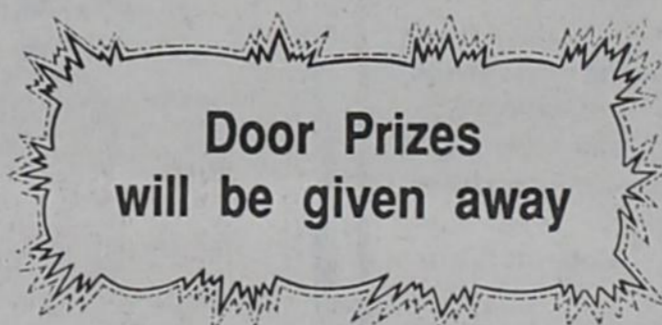
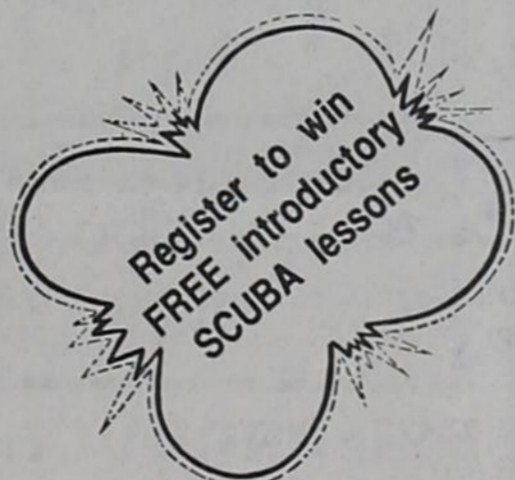
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Texico School Board revises its budget

The Texico School Board Tuesday received several letters from community residents concerning its decision not to renew the contract of longtime high school principal Ken Shaw.

Board president Herman Gerles noted, "We have a few letters here from the concerned citizens, but most of these letters are in support of the board and its decisions."

The board moved the meeting to the auditorium of the Educational Complex to accommodate about 45 people.

The board acknowledged the receipt of letters from concerned citizens requesting that the board postpone the hiring of a new high school principal.

Supt. R.L. Richards reported that copies of materials requested by the concerned citizens had been mailed to them on May 11.

In other business, the board:

- Heard resident Roy Lee Richardson compliment the school board, teachers, and students for the work that they do.

- Accepted the revised 1992-93 school budget as proposed by Richards. It allows no salary increases for the administration or for teachers at the top end of the salary schedule due to lower interest rates on the school system's CD's, and increased spending on buildings. It also reflects a slightly lower projected enrollment than had been projected originally.

The budget was reviewed by state officials in Santa Fe earlier this year and returned for changes. It will be taken to the state capital later this month.

A formal budget hearing will be presented at the next school board meeting June 9.

- Accepted the proposed budget for the RCC-6 as presented by the administration. The RCC-6 is the regional co-operative center which serves several New Mexico school systems.

Texico plans to use part of the Mary Peyton Williams property to house a special education program for RCC-6. This program will concern early childhood education, and special education for students with special needs. It does not include the gifted.

- Accepted the bid of Sandra Johnson to serve as the school system's auditor.

- Observed a demonstration of fashions which comply to the school system's proposed dress code by members of the Student Council. The board also reviewed the proposed dress code.

Gerles requested that the policy include a prohibition of earrings for males and nose rings for females. The board voted to accept the proposed dress code on a trial basis until the end of the school year.

Board member Paul D. Barnes asked if the faculty has a dress code.

- Accepted the donation of a storage house by John P.A. Drager. It's located at the Mary Peyton Williams property which the school system purchased recently.

- Voted to purchase an air compressor, welding equipment, telephone wiring, and other equipment for the Mary Peyton Williams property.

- Reviewed bids for athletic equipment and awards and voted to increase the budget for the items recommended by the administration.

- Approved the Chapter I budget as presented by the administration. The board also approved a \$10,000 budget transfer to allow for the purchase of computer equipment for Chapter I students.

Elementary Principal Joel Pate explained that two computers will be purchased each year for the next two years so that students in the Chapter I program can use them. Federal regulations do not allow the Chapter I funds to be used by any students except those in the program. This program's budget will be \$50,000 for next year.

- Re-hired aides for the Chapter I program: Evelyn Warmuth, Rhonda Qualls, Terri Brigham, and Karla Moore.
