


On July 16, the contestants will participate in a style show at North Plains Mall in Clovis at 7 p.m. cdt.

Sheriff: Farwell needs an officer

The Farwell City Council met with Parmer County Sheriff Rex Williams Tuesday to discuss police protection in the city.

City officials have has been split for many years on whether to hire a police officer. From comments made Tuesday, Mayor Wendol Christian and councilman John Carlson oppose it, while councilmen Martin Kube and Pat Howard favor it. Other councilmen are Royce Bethel and James Chadwick.

At the conclusion of the meeting, the council decided to ask the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission to study the situation and make a recommendation.

Also discussed was the possibility of holding a citywide referendum.

Sheriff Williams said Farwell needs its own police officer. He said about 70 percent of the calls his department gets are from Farwell residents. He noted another recent rash of windows being shot out and lots of calls complaining of drag racing. "We had over 30 hours of calls in Farwell in May," he said.

Williams noted that shots were fired recently in Farwell and it took 15 minutes for a deputy to get to the scene. "My worry is that something bad will happen here and liability may be a problem for the city," he said.

The sheriff said he won't permit his deputies to work overtime as a Farwell police officer, saying they need their time off. He also said none of his current staff would want to do it. This was in response to Christian's question over whether the city could hire a sheriff's deputy to work locally on overtime.

"It would be better for Farwell to hire an officer rather than for me to have another deputy," Williams said. A Farwell officer would help cut down on the shot-out windows and drag racing, for example.

Williams said he has been paying a lot of overtime money due to the Farwell calls and his budget is running short. He said this may result in his department not being able to respond to some calls now, like about drag racing. However, he would continue to respond to calls involving burglaries.

Texico discusses trailer situations

Mobile home problems were discussed at Tuesday's Texico City Council meeting.

Although a variance was denied to Ralph Autrey Sr. in April to place two mobile homes on Hutson, it was reported a trailer house had been moved there. City Attorney Duane Hamar was asked to check on it.

Hamar reported there's nothing to prevent a trailer from being put there as long as no one is living there. If folks live there, it can be removed.

City Clerk Treasurer Marie Christian reported Autrey had told her he had sold the trailer and the folks who bought it are renovating it and will move it later. Texico Marshal Fry Urioste said he had been in it and it's not liveable.

No action, therefore, was taken.

BTD Queen Contestant Rules

1. Entries are open to any girl residing in Texico or Farwell school districts and attending Farwell or Texico High School next year.

2. She cannot be over the age of 18.

3. Entrant must be of good health and of good moral character.

4. There will be a scholarship awarded to the queen upon completion of high school and enrollment to further her education or training.

A. She will be given a certificate at the park when she is crowned Queen during Bordertown Day's activities.

B. The scholarship account will be set up as Bordertown Day's Queen with her name and the names of the President and Secretary of Bordertown Days.

C. The scholarship must be used within 3 years of completion of high school.

D. The Queen must attend a college, university, trade or vocational school.

E. The scholarship check will be made payable to school of choice of the Queen.

F. The queen will forfeit the scholarship if she does not complete her term as Queen or does not further her education after completion of high school.

G. Interest build up in this account will be used for future scholarships.

5. There will be an automatic forfeit if the Queen marries, becomes pregnant or does not complete high school during her year as Queen.

6. The crown will be passed on to the first runnerup or 2nd or 3rd, if necessary.

7. If substitute serves as Queen then she cannot be a contestant that year, but will be eligible for the next year.

8. Each year the Bordertown Days Queen Committee has the right to set guidelines on suggestions for judging, activities, and prizes.

Most Texico staffers to get pay raises

The Texico School Board Tuesday approved the 1992-93 budget.

School Supt. R.L. Richards said the budget has no major changes when compared to last year's.

The staff, excluding those teachers at the top of the salary schedule, will get 1.2% salary hikes. Those at the top of the schedule and administrators will not receive any increase.

The mayor said the city doesn't have the money available to begin a police department and extra revenue would be needed. Estimates ranged from \$35,000 to \$100,000.

Councilman Howard said he has taken an informal survey the past few weeks, interviewing 45 city residents.

As for their view of city services, he said 43 gave the city good marks.

On having a city police officer: citizens voted 24 yes, 5 no and 2 undecided; businessmen voted 7 yes, 2 no and 2 undecided; and 1 wanted part-time aid.

In other business, the council:

- Voted to have a cleanup drive before Border Town Days. It will culminate July 11 when the roll-off at the landfill can be used free of charge for city residents.

- Approved a carport at 303 8th St.

- Was told that Donal Engram wants to beautify the railroad-owned land across First Street from City Hall. Santa Fe approval is being sought. Engram asked the city to contribute some funds to buy small shrubs. The council will talk with Engram about this.

- Approved a Farwell Chamber of Commerce request to use the city park for a memorial honoring Parmer County war dead. It tentatively would be placed facing 3rd Street.

- Accepted the only bid it received for street repair, from Eastwood Construction, at \$34,197. In favor were Christian (breaking a 2-2 tie), Kube and Howard. Opposed were Carlson and Bethel. Chadwick wasn't present.

Carlson and Bethel wanted to postpone awarding a bid because the council has been checking into a new technology called micro-surfacing, which is more expensive but lasts a lot longer. The council will continue to look into micro-surfacing before next year's street repair program.

- Waived a fee for the Border Town Days Committee to use the Farwell Community Center for its annual dinner and judging preliminaries.

- Officially agreed to sponsor the Border Town Days portion that is in Farwell. This was done to provide the BTD committee with city insurance. There is no extra cost involved.

Parmer rural roads to be numbered

The Parmer County Commissioners Monday discussed

the upcoming numbering for rural roads.

In order to help firefighters and police find rural addresses through the 911 emergency system, rural roads will be numbered and each house given an address.

Pamela Nielsen, a representative of the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission who has been involved in setting up the 911 system here attended the com-

missioners' meeting. She will help direct the addressing effort in Parmer County.

The first step the county. will take is to get feedback from various groups, such as the volunteer fire departments and EMS units, on how the numbering should be.

In other business, the commissioners:

- Decided to seek bids on carpeting the second floor of the courthouse.

- Renewed its health insurance' for county employees with Blue Cross / Blue Shield. The other problem involved a trailer owned by Ralph Autrey Jr. It involves a setback problem, apparently being too close to Phil Black's property line on Turner Street.

The council voted to send a registered letter to Autrey Jr. telling him he had 30 days to either get the trailer up to the city's aestethic standards or to remove it.

In other business, the council:

- Heard Kirk Roberts, head of the Texico Community Activities Organization, say that \$900 has been raised toward the \$2,500 needed to buy fireworks for the planned 4th of July celebration. A garage sale is planned to help raise funds this weekend.

When the TCAO meets Tuesday, if the \$2,500 isn't raised, there's a strong chance the fireworks show will be cancelled, Roberts said.

- Heard Roberts say he is checking into available state grants for a community building.

- Heard that the 7 tables the city had loaned the Chamber of Commerce for its annual banquet were damaged, apparently when being loaded for return. This apparently happened to many of the tables the Chamber borrowed, including those from the First Baptist Church.

It was reported that the Chamber will buy new tables. The Chamber is having a fund-raiser to get the money needed.

- Met with Hal Helton, of the Texico-Farwell Lions Club, to discuss plans to renovate Lions Park. Helton said after the city gets the ditches dug, club members will call for a work day to put the pine in, then get turf.

- Heard Mrs. Christian say that she won't know until July whether the city will have a budget deficit.

- Heard Mrs. Christian report that EPA officials will let the contract for monitoring the KKR well contamination about July 1. This will pin-



New principal looks ahead to Texico High

Texico's new high school principal, Carolyn Abell, will be taking a wait and see attitude before she makes any major changes at Texico High.

"I've heard it is a wonderful school," she notes. She was appointed to the post last week.

Mrs. Abell says she was impressed with the people she met here when she came for a job interview, and she is looking forward to meeting everyone. She plans to make several trips to Texico to become acquainted with the school and the community before she actually begins her work in July.

She has been an assistant high school principal in Artesia for six years.

Although Mrs. Abell's emphasis is on strengthening academic classes, she realizes that other things are also very important. Students need to be sufficiently well rounded that they gain experience in all subject areas as well as in extracurricular activities.

She mentioned the importance of sports and expressed the opinion that in smaller schools, sports helped to build a common bond.

One goal that Mrs. Abell expressed is that she hopes to "make the staff treat the student as a whole person."


Marshal's Report


