

The Chief's Corner

by Farwell Police Chief Roy McGaa

The Fourth Amendment prevents the police from charging into someone's home or arresting them because they think a crime has been committed. They must have probable cause. and many times that probable cause is information received from the public.

Keeping a lid on crime is never accomplished by the police alone, it always takes the support of the community. By the same token, I have known communities where the citizens were fed up with crime but were unable to get the police of their southern posteriors.

Only when there is teamwork between the police and the community will crime be kept to a minimum. How much is too much crime? In the first 12 months of the Farwell Police Department's existence, citizens of Farwell were hit by crime against persons or property once every four days. That statistic doesn't mean anything to the victim of a crime, for them crime is personal. And, keep in mind that we are only talking about the crimes that were reported; many are not.

When a community gets involved in their security and when the police give full support to the community, criminals take a beating. When this happens the community develops a reputation in criminal circles. It then becomes a good idea to pick another town that is a little more tolerant of bad guys. The citizen / peace officer team works.



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



New flower bed


The Farwell Convalescent Center has added a new flower bed at the north end of the building. The center section of the flower bed has the Convalescent Center's initials written in colored stone.

Bank to place photos on credit cards

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Beginning next week, Bank of America customers in Farwell will have the option of placing a color photograph of themselves and their signature on the form of their Bank Americard, Master Card or Visa Credit cards.

The new photo cards are designed to help reduce bank card fraud, which Bank of America says cost the card industry more than \$1 billion in 1993. Almost half of their loss occurs from lost or stolen cards and another 20 percent occurs from cards stolen in the mail.

Customers may obtain the free photo card free by going to the Farwell branch, 203 Ave. D, to have their photos taken.

The photo process takes just a few minutes to complete. Customers receive their photo cards in the mail in 3 to 4 weeks.

The photo, approximately three - fourths of an inch square, is printed on the card and placed on the left side of the front at Lazbuddie on Sept. 8 at 5 of the card, alongside the customer's digitized signature.

Buses available, so Texico takes no action on crossing

The Texico City Council Tuesday discussed whether they could take any action to make Wheeler Avenue (the highway) safer for youths who cross it from the south side of town to go to school.

Deputy Marshal Larry Garrison said youths are having to dodge vehicles to cross Wheeler and asked whether a "slow down" sign might be appropriate.

And councilwoman Carolyn Burrows said a resident called her about the danger, too.

But Marshal Gil Holguin reported he had talked with school Supt. R.L. Richards about the situation. Richards said school buses are being provided for the area south of Wheeler, according to state law, and no school student has to walk across the highway.



She and her friend formed a company, Larae Lee Designs, and they began to do some homework. Mrs. Workman continued to do sewing and alteration jobs from her home to help support the project.

During the past two years Nancy and her partner began by doing some research on the project.

While taking a course at a local college, Nancy interviewed several ladies to find out what they are looking for when they purchase undergarments. The complaints the ladies expressed included: underwire discomfort, cup size and shape, width of shoulder straps, size of back straps, and comfort of closings. She discovered that placement of underwiring or boning can also greatly affect the comfort of the garment.

Mrs. Workman wrote a report summarizing her findings for the class she took, and used it to seek financing for the project. The partners have also visited lingerie stores to see what is currently on the market. They visited every single store they could looking at designs.

"As of yet I have not seen anything close to the design we've come up with - not even down in Dallas," said Mrs.

Workman. "Hopefully by the end of the year we'll have one." Then they will begin the process of manufacturing a bra themselves.

"We're going to start mainly with cottons because cotton breathes and absorbs moisture, so it should help with sweating," she said. The ladies are also in the process of testing various types of underwire, boning and supporting materials.

"We're probably going to try round wire," she said.

Years ago, Howard Hughes put the engineers of Hughes Aircraft to work on just such a project. They designed a bra which was quite advanced compared to many of the other designs on the market at the time. In the past 30 years or so there have been many, many new materials and designs devised to support a woman's bustline. Styles have changed, too. There are new stretch laces and elasticized fabrics. There are also a wide variety of colors and fabrics on the market which were not available years ago.

"We'll also go into maternity bras," said Mrs. Workman. New mothers often need added support while they are nursing.

"There's nothing pretty available - they come in white, beige, and black," she said of the maternity bras. She would like to see more color and variety for maternity bras. "This is a matter of trial and error she noted."

Until the bra designing business is complete, Nancy will continue to sew and to make alterations. She has turned one of the bedrooms of the Workman home, 900 Lamar St., into a sewing room.

4 tsp. water (exactly)


4 eggs, well beaten


The additions to the Farwell School complex are scheduled to be ready for use this fall when school starts.





Blackwater Draw: a bit of history

by Judy Pomper

The tiny Blackwater Draw Museum north of Portales draws people from all over the world - partly because it is so near to Cannon Air Force Base which is home to airmen from many parts of the country, and partly because it houses a collection of archaeological artifacts from one of the longest excavated Paleo Indian sites in world.

On April 1, for instance, there were visitors from Minnesota, Iowa, Montana, and Texas. There was even one visiting student who is studying underwater archaeology at the University of California.

The archaeological dig site across from the museum is world famous in archaeological circles. It was home for Clovis Man about 11,000 years ago.

The brochure said that wooly mammoth, camel, horse, bison, sabertooth tiger and dire wolf remains had been found at the site. I was all ready to call him up and say, "Camels didn't come to this part of the world until Jefferson Davis imported some in the 1800's (before he became Secretary of War for the U.S., and before he became Vice President of the Confederate States of America)."

I also wanted to say that horses weren't introduced to the New World until the Spanish arrived - about 1520 in this part of the continent. Boy, I was ready to tell him off.







The display in front of the museum calls this site the 1st New World mammoth kill site, excavated in 1932; the first New World multi-component Paleo Indian site, the type site for mammoth hunting, the site of the earliest

known hand - dug wells in the New World, and the longest excavated Paleo Indian site.

"Ten years ago I would have said that this definitely the earliest Paleo Indian site, but now there are some claims that may be older," says museum curator Matt Hillsman. He mentioned sites in Ore Grande, N.M., Meadowcroft, Pa., and a third in Alaska which are now contending with Blackwater Draw as the earliest Native American site.

"There have been very stringent requirements on archaeological claims," said Hillman. So far, none of the contenders has successfully displaced Blackwater Draw as the earliest site.

What makes the Blackwater Draw site different from other sites is that distinctive tools called Clovis points were found in the same soil strata along with wooly mammoth bones. There were also camel, horse, bison, and sabertooth tiger and wolf bones found in the same level of dirt.

Archaeologists have dated the Clovis Cultural material to about 11,300 years ago. They use a variety of methods to estimate the age of the archaeological material.

One method involves measuring the depth at which archaeological material is found. The archaeologist carefully records the place where artifacts are found, and the type of rock or dirt that surrounds it. Then the artifacts are compared with artifacts found in the same type of soil or at the same depths in other parts of the world.

The most modern method of dating is radio carbon testing. It involves measuring the half-life of radioactive carbon compounds in matter such as bone. Using radio carbon testing, the archaeologists are able to date the material quite accurately.

"The precision and accuracy depends upon the quality of the sample," said Hillsman. He also noted that the skill

of the people doing the tests and the equipment that they use is important in getting accurate estimates of dating.

"Oftimes samples are sent to different places for testing," said Hillsman. Comparing two or three samples gives a fairly accurate estimate of age.

Hillsman did his work at Eastern developing a method to determine the source of the rocks or stones that the earliest men in the area made into tools.

"Tools need to be sharpened," said Hillsman. Using computer analysis, he was able to identify the source of many tiny fragments of stone as either Alibates Plateau Flint or Edwards Plateau Chert. This knowledge will tell anthropologists how far the early settlers had to travel to get materials for tools.

"Archaeology spans side looking radar to discover archaeological sites" to digging by hand just as the most primitive people did.

Hillsman, who says, "I never thought I'd become a museum curator," moved to Portales from back east a few years back to study archaeology and anthropology at Eastern New Mexico University. When the museum curator's job opened up, he applied, and was surprised to get it.

"A curator is essentially responsible for the care of the material in the museum," says Hillsman. He found himself repairing display cases, arranging displays, classifying material and guiding tour groups through the facility. In his spare time he reads scientific material about archaeology. And, he visits neighboring museum sites.

The museum is open 10 a.m. mdt - 5 p.m. mdt Monday - Saturday and noon - 5 p.m. mdt on Sundays, Memorial

Day through Labor Day.

The actual site of the archaeological dig is across the street from the museum on the road to Cannon Air Force Base. It is open on weekends from 10 a.m. mdt - 5 p.m. mdt and on Sundays from noon - 5 p.m. mdt.

Just because an item is old does not automatically mean that it is valuable or significant. It may just mean that it is old.







Recalling the first Farwell School building

The cornerstone of the original Farwell School building has been incorporated into the new Farwell gymnasium along with a photo engraving of the original building.

Junior High School Principal Jerry Dee Owen and former Farwell School janitor Foster Watkins saved the cornerstone from being destroyed when the old building was demolished. They set it aside until the new building was built.

The cornerstone lists the names of the people who were members of the Farwell Public School Board in 1910 when the old building was constructed: J.M. Hamlin, president; J. B. Younger, secretary; B.E. Nobles, Alex Shipley, J.M. Kindred, O.A. Linthicum and C.L. George.

The original Farwell School building was a two-story red brick structure with a full basement, and a windmill. It had a covered slide fire escape from the second floor to the ground. It was erected for \$20,000 - quite a sum in 1910 when farm land sold for just a few dollars per acre.

The staff consisted of the superintendent, Mr. E.A. White, who earned \$1,000 for the 9 month school contract, three teachers, and a janitor. Miss Mable Kinney, Miss Eva Hendricks and Miss Hazel Wilson were the first teachers, they each earned \$60 per month. Mr. Vaughn was the janitor, and earned \$40 per month.

The 1981 edition of the county history book, "Prairie Progress," notes that there was a constant turnover of teachers and board members in the early years at Farwell Schools.

J.M. Hamlin was the vice-president of the Farwell Development Company. He also served as Parmer County Clerk and District Clerk.

According to the 1974 edition of the county history book, Hamlin was born in Pittsburg, Pa. in 1843. He was engaged in manufacturing glass back east. He then managed the St. Louis Religious Press Association in St. Louis before moving here. He served as one of Missouri's presidential state electors before moving here. He purchased a farm about two miles from town.

B.E. Nobles was listed in the 1974 edition of "A History of Parmer County Texas" by Nelson Lewis. It says that Nobles left Deport, Texas in Lamar County to come to Farwell in 1907. The Nobles family traveled by train with all of their household goods, and settled in Farwell where they operated Daniels' Grocery. Later the business was moved next to the Old Farwell State Bank on Third Street, and dry goods were added to the store.

Nobles was active in civic affairs. He served as County Commissioner, Justice of the Peace and a school board member. He was instrumental in the formation of the first Masonic Lodge in Farwell, and he belonged to the Methodist Church. Both B.E. and Mrs. Nobles died in 1947. They were buried in the Clovis Cemetery.

D.A. Linthicum was the vice-president of the First National Bank of Farwell.

This information about Capt. J. M. Kindred comes from the (*) 1974 history of Parmer County Texas:

Kindred was born in Kentucky, and served in the Civil War as a quartermaster. He was a sheriff in Kentucky, a hotel owner in Georgia, and a postmaster and stock farmer in Amarillo before moving to Farwell.

Kindred became president of the First National Bank of Texico. While serving in that capacity, he traveled to the

World's Fair in St. Louis at his own expense to advertise the area and induce immigrants to come here.

He served on the School Board, and he was an officer in his church.

According to Zelfa Younger of Melrose, 1910 school board member J.B. Younger was her husband's uncle; J.B. ranched in this area. J.B.'s brother, W.H. Younger, taught and served as an administrator locally.

When you think of all the great entertainment, concessions, parade, etc., I don't think asking \$2 is too much.







Even Waylon Jennings stopped at our Tourism Center







Here are some gardening tips

"A plant's leaves are like its clothes. Now you wouldn't want to be stripped down naked and lying in the sun in your yard in July, would you? You'd burn up in the hot summer sun, and so would a plant without leaves," answered Parmer County Extension Service Agent Brant Baugh to a participant in the County Lawn and Garden Seminar.

The lady had asked if it would be wise to prune grape vines in the spring. She was told that it is wiser to prune the vines in the winter after the grapes had been harvested. Grapes come from the new growth, on the plant.

Another participant asked if it was a good idea to use lady bugs to help control garden pests instead of using harsh chemicals.

Baugh answered that while naturally occuring ladybugs did control many garden pests, "When you buy the boxed ones in a store, they head back to the mountains they came from as soon as you open the box!"

Those questions and their answers were only a small part of the day's activities which ranged from: "Fresh from the Garden Cooking," "Unusual Plant Containers," "Native Plant Care," "Backyard Composting," and "Gardening Tips," to a covered dish luncheon.

During the session on "Gardening Tips," Brant Baugh showed slides of common garden pests in this area. He told the participants that the most important thing about controlling pests in the garden was identifying the pest. The county agent and the Texas A & M University System can often help with this task.

Once the pest is identified, Baugh cautioned gardeners to read the labels carefully. "Use the right chemical for each pest," he noted. Consulting a professional pest control person may save a crop.

Baugh also suggested pruning away dead branches and rotting fruits. "Take away a predator's food, and you won't have any predators!" he said.



Parmer County Extension Agent for Entomology, Brant Baugh, and Andy Williams, County Extension Agent for Castro and Lamb Counties, gave participants some great tips for summer gardening. Baugh showed some of the most common garden pests and discussed the proper way to get rid of them. Williams told the best way to make a compost pile to enrich the soil.


The gardening tips presented in the program were of special interest to the participants. One lady commented, "I quit raising kids this year, and started raising a yard. I have to start learning all over."


Gardening .

Parmer County Extension Service Agent Debbie Pollard completed a microwave Bread 'N Butter Pickle recipe in just 7 minutes flat. Three cups of sliced and peeled cucumbers, a cup of sugar and 1/2 c. of vinegar and some spices were microwaved for just seven minutes, and cooled. Later they were added to a sterilized jar to make a pint of pickles.

Pollard noted that most of us do not have a great deal of time to devote to cooking and preparing foods these days. Yet, a few minutes devoted to fresh garden vegetables in the peak of the season can save many dollars on a food bill in the winter that follows. She demonstrated a recipe which could be made in minutes and stored in the refrigerator.

Marilyn Neal, the Castro County Agent, demonstrated an easy Eggplant Parmesan recipe using produce that grows in abundance in a summer garden.

Neal noted that many people avoid eggplant because they had once had a bitter taste of this member of the nightshade family. She explained how to slice, salt and layer the eggplant between paper towels to remove the

bitter taste before using it in a casserole. She especially liked the easy meatless recipe because it can be made the night before entertaining so that when she got home from work at 6:30 p.m. she could pop it into the oven.

"It makes a great meatless accompaniment for a meat dish, or a nice light meatless luncheon dish," she said.

The county agents passed out leaflets which presented recipes and tips for canning and freezing to use the abundance of a garden while it is still in its peak. Recipes using microwaves, food processors, blenders and other time - saving cooking devices help to save the natural and abundant goodness that comes from a home garden.

Neal joked that, "Since moving to this part of the country, my skin looks like a lizard's, but my food stays fresh just great. Where I came from it (garden produce) all rotted because of all the moisture."

One of the highlights of the day was a demonstration of unusual plant containers to display the beautiful blossoms grown in a home garden. When garden flowers are available in abundance, homemakers sometimes find that every container in the house is full. By using a little imagination and some common containers, the lovely

home-grown blossoms can be displayed many, many ways. A representative of "An Added Touch," in Friona presented this segment.

A colorful paper sack can hide a garden pot. A tin can can tied in a bow can hold tulips and daisies. A western bandana tied around a water glass can hold blossoms. Even a hollowed out old rock can be planted with green plants.


