The most precious gift



Adam Burford

In the hustle and bustle of this holiday season, we often get

caught up in the business of "who gets what?" and "what am I going to buy?"

We ask our children what they want for Christmas, what they want for their birthdays and we applaud the material gifts that they receive. We try to do our best to teach our children how to give unselfishly, without asking in return.

Many times this is the hardest lesson of all to learn.

That wasn't the case with Adam Burford, of Pleasant Hill.

He was a happy, bright young man who had the uncanny habit of touching others' lives. Adam was prematurely taken from his family and friends after an accident on June 20. But, ironically, he gave the most precious gift he could have ever given ... life.

Adam was an organ donor.

Adam's story didn't end on June 20 when his organs were transplanted into patients who so critically needed them. The latest chapter in Adam's story occurred on Dec. 5 - last week.

Adam's family was left to deal with the pain of their tragic loss. One way that his paternal grandmother, Geraldine Burford, has dealt with her grief was to actively seek out the locations that Adam's organs were sent to.

"I wasn't doing this to find out the recipients' names or their addresses, I just wanted to know the area or towns that they lived in," she said. "It was just something that I felt driven to do, for my own peace of mind."

Geraldine, or Jerry, as she is known by her friends, had learned that Adam's heart and one of his kidneys had been placed in the Lubbock local area. This area covers a large section of West Texas and the Panhandle. The only other information that she could find about the recipient of his heart was that it was a man who was an eye doctor.

"I felt better knowing at least this much. I had made the statement at the time of Adam's death that I wished for his organs to be given to fine, upstanding people who were truly worthy of such a precious gift. Adam was one of the purest people I have ever known and was worthy of only the best," Jerry explained.

She had basically quit searching for the location of his heart after learning this information. But fate stuck its hand into the picture.

On Dec. 5, Jerry was to undergo gallbladder surgery at Methodist Hospital in Lubbock. She and her husband, Joe, arrived at the hospital at 6 a.m. and were sent to a small waiting area to wait for a room to become available for Jerry's surgery.

A woman walked in, all bundled up with a coat and a sterile mask covering her nose and mouth. Jerry, being the curious type, began to question her as to why she was wearing the mask. The woman explained that she had undergone a heart transplant. Her transplant had taken place over three years ago, but she still had to be very careful to protect her immune system; thus the mask was necessary to protect her from nerms.

A few moments later, a tall man entered the room wearing the same type of sterile mask. He sat down and greeted the Burford's and the other woman. Eventually, the man and woman began a conversation. He asked the woman if she had undergone a transplant. She answered "yes, a heart transplant."

"Do you know where your heart came from?" he questioned her further.

"Santa Fe," she answered, "and it must have been a Mexican woman. I've never liked chile peppers, but ever since my transplant, I have craved them!"

"Do you know where your heart came from?" she asked the man.

"University Medical Center," he said, as he pointed his arm towards the North, "and all I know is that it came from a 17 year old boy."

At that moment, Jerry and Joe almost fell out of their

"I slapped my leg and jumped up." Jerry said. "I blurted out before I could stop: 'You aren't an eye doctor are you?"
He responded, somewhat shocked, "Why, yes. Yes, I am."

"The world stopped right then. I looked at him and said: When did you receive your heart?" Jerry recounted.

"June 20, 1994," he answered.

"I shouted: You have my Grandsons' heart!" Jerry exclaimed

The three people then sat and explained the circumstances of Adam's death and the times and dates. Everything

They cried together in the waiting room, yet rejoiced in the discovery. The Burford's showed the man pictures of Adam and explained what kind of young man he was and how much he meant to his family and friends.

Jerry was then called in to be prepped for her surgery.

"I couldn't imagine going through the surgery after crying for over two hours in the waiting room. I didn't know if it was wise to try to go through with it after going through such a shocking, emotional experience." she stated.

The man darted out of the waiting room before she could get up to leave, or say anything to him. He was standing outside the door waiting for the Burfords. The man embraced Jerry, then Joe. The three stood in a circle, hugging each other for several minutes.

The man then explained, "I laid in the hospital for 93 days, dying, while I waited for a heart. The doctors had given me approximately 2 to 3 days to live. I prayed for a heart and to feel young again. I wanted so badly to live, but someone had to die and donate their heart in order for me to live. Then I got the word about a heart coming to me and I was prepped for surgery. I laid out on the gurney in the hallway outside the surgical rooms and looked across from me. Another man was lying there waiting to receive a kidney that had just become available. It had to have been Adam's kidney."

"I just want you to know that I have a halo on my head because of this. I would have never known that this would happen ... me finding my donor's family. It couldn't come at a better time than this because I had been searching for you too," he stated.

Farwell okays youth curfew

The Farwell City Council voted Tuesday to put into effect a youth curfew.

The ordinance is now in effect, since the legal ad was published in this issue of the Tribune

It is for youths under 18. Curfew on weekdays will be midnight, and at 1 a.m. on Friday and Saturday nights.

There are exceptions to it, such as for youths who work.
City Marshal Roy McGaa is expected to make enforcement of this curfew a priority. The city has been concerned about youths coming to the Twin Cities from other communities.

In other business, the council:

- Heard that the city is contracting with former city employee Floyd Robinson to pick up dogs at \$15 per dog. So far, he has caught 16. He has been working at night. City

employees are catching cats running loose.
 Received the report for November from McGaa. Calls included 2 accidents, 1 DWI, 2 thefts, 2 criminal mischiefs, 2 parking violations, 3 suspicious vehicles and 5 traffic

- Heard city fire marshal Lee Hutchins suggest that some houses, including two in the 500 block of Second Street, need to be demolished due to their hazardous conditions. Mayor Chris Gikas said the building demolition ordinance is expected to be approved by the council at the January meeting. After it's enacted, he plans to move ahead on this. He acked Hutchins to put together a list of houses proposed for demolition

- Agreed to close City Hall on Dec. 23 and 26 for the Christmas holiday.

Christmas holiday.Approved Christmas bonuses for city employees.

- Approved a pay raise for city employee Joe Servin, who

recently passed a water certification course.

- Approved the annual agreement with Parkhill Smith Engineers, of Lubbock. They are paid for their services only

- Heard that the city mural has been removed from the side of City Hall so artist Cherokee can re-work it. He will change it a bit, use different type of paint and add a strong coating in the hopes it will last longer. It will be back on the side of


City Hall in March.

- Heard Hutchins ask if the city can do something about semi-trucks parking on narrow streets. The council had discussed this problem earlier this year but took no action.

 Heard that the city is exempt from liabilities if it starts a used oil collection site on city property. A grant has been okayed for Farwell.

- Approved banning parking on the north side of Avenue A from Third Street to the state line. McGaa said there has been a safety problem there with vehicles parking on that

Approved a building permit to allow three more apartments to be built at Heritage Square, the complex adjacent to the Farwell Convalescent Center. They will be added to the six apartments already there. The goal of the hospital district has been to place 12 there. The apartments to be built will look like the six already in place.



Adam's recipient had purchased every newspaper that he could think of to try and locate the obituary of the 17 year old boy that had passed away right after he had recovered enough to do something. He had also written several letters.

"I had started writing letters to my donor's family, to give to them if I could ever find them. But I could never finish them. It was like writing to a stop sign," he said.

A nurse came in and asked if everything was okay and to tell Jerry that it was time for her to go in for her prep work for surgery. She felt at enough peace to go on with her surgery.

"It was a piece of cake, it went really fast and well. I got home on Tuesday and have been recovering very fast," she said. "Thursday morning the phone rang and we got another pleasant surprise. It was him."

"Granno Burford?" he said.

"Who am I speaking with?" Jerry said.

"This is the doctor ... Adam's doctor," he said.

"How did you do in your test? Did you get a good checkup?" she asked.

"I came through with flying colors! My heart is extremely healthy. I just wanted you to know that I truly feel that I am now a part of your family and that I will always be a part of it," he said. "I would also like to come and visit you with my family after the holidays."

The magic of Christmas and the spirit of the season is truly reflected in Adam's unselfish act of signing the back of his driver's license. This simple act only added to the pride he felt at getting his driver's license.

The decision to donate organs is a very private, personal decision. As the Burford's have had to endure the pain of the loss of one life, another gains the hope of life through the donation of healthy organs.

Perhaps, during this time of giving, we could all think about signing our driver's licenses. After all, as this story has proven, Adam's gift to the eye doctor was the most precious gift of all.

Singleterry heads Pals





Cloud seeding explained

The following information came from High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1:

George Bomar, senior technical specialist, water planning and assessment division of the Texas Natural Resources Conservation Commission, says, "It is certain that drought will occur and reoccur in West Texas. This gives us reason to consider again the amount of available fresh water that West Texans can tap, and with climate changes and the threat of drier weather, we're going to need to explore new, different ways of using the water we have, as well as developing additional fresh water resources."

Bomar has assisted in the regulation of water modification activities in West Texas during the past 20 years. Weather modification is the attempt to change or control natural development of precipitation cloud forms in the lower half of the earth's atmosphere.

The typical large cumulus clouds that form in the High Plains are have relatively few natural nuclei (such as salt particles or specks of dust) around which moisture in the air can coalesce or grow together to become raindrops.

As a result, Bomar says, most of the cloud moisture is never converted to raindrops because not enough natural nuclei are present.

"Cloud seeding is designed to increase the number of nuclei. You want to cause 5 to 10 times as many tiny raindrops or water droplets to form, which will then interact with other droplets, collide and coalesce to form larger and larger raindrops," he says.

Silver lodide, or Agl, is the most popular cloud seeding agent used today, because it very closely approximates natural ice crystals. "By introducing silver iodide through cloud seeding, you hope to transform enough of the cloud moisture into water droplets to generate enough large raindrops to survive the fall through the dry subcloud layer and reach the surface as meaningful rainfall."

He added that as the cloud water is transformed into water droplets, the additional heat generated causes the cloud to grow taller. As the cloud system grows taller, its updraft strengthens and imports most moist air from the surface.

"The cloud system then becomes more efficent, it will grow taller, last longer, pull in more moist air and transform that air into more moisture droplets" he says. As the rainfall load increases, it sinks in the cloud, overcomes the updraft, and falls out of the cloud as a rainshield, bringing with it a very cold downdraft.

This, in turn, causes additioanl updrafts, which help create extra cloud growth on the periphery of the system. The resulting feeder cells on each side of the thunderstorm can cause rain to fall over a greater area, may result in a longer life for the storm system, and may cause more rainfall to be produced.

Weather modification projects don't increase rain in one area at another's expense. Bomar says clouds are inefficient since they don't gather and release all the moisture that's available. Clouds only contain an average of one percent of the total atmospheric moisture at any time. If cloud seeding doubled the efficience of a cloud formation, it would likely only contain two percent of the available moisture - leaving 98 percent available for other areas.

The Colorado River Municipal Water District at Big Spring has operated a cloud seeding program since 1971, running from April to October to augmetn rainfall runoff into the district's reservoirs and increase water supplies for irrigation purposes. This program has increased average annual rainfall by 30 to 40 percent (4 inches) in its target area. Results also show that dryland cotton yields from 1970 to 1988 increased by 46 percent in Border, Scurry, Howard and Mitchell Counties, other areas targeted by the cloud seeding program.


Here is the weekly report from Texico Marshal Gil Holguin:

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

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LEGAL PUBLICATIONS

Ordinance No. 127 - Minor Curfew Ordinance

An ordinance establishing "curfew hours for minors"; defining terms; creating offenses for minors, parents and guardians of minors, and business establishments, violating curfew regulations; providing defenses; providing for enforcement by the police department; providing for waiver by the municipal court of jurisdiction over a minor when required by the Texas family code; providing for a review of this ordinance by the city secretary; providing a penalty not to exceed \$500.00; providing a savings clause; providing severability clause; and providing an effective date.

In this ordinance, CURFEW HOURS means:

(a.) 11:59 p.m. on any Sunday, Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday or Thursday until 5:30 a.m. of the following day; and

(b.) 12:59 a.m. until 5:30 a.m. on any Saturday or Sunday.

DEFENSES: It is a defense to prosecution under Section 2 (1) that

(a) accompanied by the minor's parent or quardian;

(b) on an errand at the direction of the minor's parent or guardian; (c) in a motor vehicle involved in interstate travel;

(d) engaged in an employment activity, or going to or returning home from an employment activity, without any detour or stop;

(e) involved in emergency; (f) on the sidewalk abutting the minor's residence or abutting the residence of a next-door neighbor if the neighbor did not complain to

the police department of the minor's presence; (g) attending an official school, religious, or other recreational activity supervised by adults and approved by the City of Farwell, a civic organization, or another similar entity that takes responsibility for the minor, or going to or returning home from, without detour or stop, an official school, religious, or other recreational activity supervised by

another similar entity that takes responsibility for the minor; (h) exercising First Amendment rights protected by the United States Constitution, such as free exercise of religion, freedom of speech, and the right to assemble, or

adults and approved by the City of Farwell, a civic organization, or

(i) married or had been married or had the disabilities of minority removed in accordance with Chapter 31 of the Texas Family Code.

2. It is a defense to prosecution under Section 2 (3) that the owner, operator or employee of an establishment promptly notified the police department that a minor was present on the premises of the establishment during Curfew Hours and refused to leave.

Section 4, Enforcement: Before taking any enforcement action under this section, a police officer shall ask the apparent offender's age and reason for being in a public place. The officer shall not issue a citation or make an arrest under this section unless the officer reasonably believes that offense has occurred and that, based on any response and other circumstances, no defense is present. Section 5, Penalty:

(a) a person who violates a provision of this ordinance is guilty of a separate offense for each day or part of a day which the violation is committed, continued, or permitted.

(b) each offense, upon conviction, is punishable by a fine not to

Recipe of Week

Decadent Chocolate Oatmeal Brownies

2 c. 3 Minute Brand Quick Oats

1 c. all purpose flour 1/2 c. unsweetened cocoa powder

1 c. (2 sticks) butter or margarine, softened

1 c. peanut butter, creamy or chunky

2/3 c. granulated sugar

2/3 c. brown sugar

2 eggs 1/4 c. milk

2 tsp vanilla extract

2 tsp. baking soda

1 c. semi sweet chocolate chips

1 c. milk chocolate chips

1 c. white chocolate chips, divided

In a medium bowl, combine oats, flour, cocoa and baking soda. Set aside. In a large bowl, beat butter and peanut butter until creamy. Add sugars, beat until fluffy. Beat in eggs, milk, and vanilla until well blended. Gradually add oat mixture and beat until blended. Stir in chocolate chips and 1/2 c white chocolate chips. Spread into 13 x 9" baking pan. Bake in a 350 degree oven 35-40 minutes until slightly firm. (Do not over - bake). Let cool. Place 1/2 c. white chocolate chips in heavy plastic bag. Heat on high in a microwave for 30-60 seconds or until melted. Snip off one corner of bag and drizzle white chocolate over brownies. Cut into 20 - 24 bars.
