

New church opens in Farwell

Farwell has a new church - the Church of God in Christ, Mennonite. The congregation is led by James Koehn.

They meet at 10 a.m. each Sunday for Sunday School, and at 11 a.m. for worship at the former Calvary Baptist Church building in Farwell. Anyone is welcome to attend their services.

The local congregation plans to open a parochial school in the building, and to use the parsonage as a home for their teachers. Some groups of Mennonites around the world meet only in homes of members, but the local group will use a church building for the services and for their school.

"Many of our children have had home schooling," said Koehn. "We have eight students in six grades at present." he said. Koehn said that congregations in Texline, Paris, El Campo and Victoria have worked out ways to run parochial schools with their congregations, so they know it can be done.

Currently, the congregation here has five families, and their Church Conference is helping other families move to this area. They will also invite others in the community to join the church and to send their children to the school.

One of the key reasons why the group plans to open a school is to control unwanted outside influences that might lead their children astray. Diligent training of their children is a goal.

According to Darrell Schmidt, a member of the congregation, members profess to "live a simple life with a simple standard. We don't profess higher education. We make our living by working."

The Church of God in Christ, Mennonite is an offshoot of the Mennonite Church which became separate in 1859.

Some groups of Mennonites follow less worldly lifestyles than others do. One group, referred to as the "Hooks and Eyes" Mennonites, refuses even to use buttons. They do not use electric lights or other common inventions. Some Mennonites speak only "Pennsylvania Dutch," an amalgam of German, Swiss, and Holland Deutsch, while others speak the language of their native country.

The Mennonite men who live here wear beards, and the ladies wear simple dresses and devotional head coverings. Schmidt noted that his home does not have TV or radio. "We don't want those influences on our children," he explained.

While they prefer simplicity, the Farwell Mennonites do not spurn all inventions. They use inventions such as wristwatches, trucks, washing machines, refrigerators and tractors.

"We're not a backward-type people," said Schmidt. The original Mennonite Church is named for Menno Simons who founded the church in the Netherlands in the 1500's. From there it spread to many other

countries. Mennonites have made the advancement peace and alleviation of human suffering their goal. Some Mennonites were staunchly anti-slavery at the time of the American Civil War.

At some periods in history, Mennonites were social reformers who steadfastly refused to bear arms in time of war. And, some groups of Mennonites have refused to pay taxes to governments of which they did not approve. For this they have been persecuted during their history.

The group which has come to Farwell is part of the Church of God in Christ, Mennonite. They require adult baptism and active church membership. Some congregations of Mennonites live more simple lifestyles than the Church of God in Christ, Mennonites does; others live more worldly lifestyles.

Koehn became a preacher in Winton, Calif. Mennonite preachers are elected by their church. They wear no special garb, and are not considered to have any divine authority. They go through a period of tutorship with an older minister. They do not have formal seminary training. Preachers usually do not receive a salary, and they have to work to provide for their families.

Before moving here Koehn worked as a house mover, and he also grew almonds. Koehn, his wife, Donna, and three sons - Brandon, 15; Layne, 12, and Derek, 7, moved to Farwell about 3 months ago from California along with two horses, a donkey and a dog. They moved to Connie and

And that's where it stands...

Here's a follow-up on the illegal license plate situation in Farwell:

In June, the Farwell City Council voted to send a memo to all city residents telling them that if they live in the city and have illegal New Mexico license plates on their vehicles, they will be fined.

Councilman Jimmie Mace said he had counted 187 New Mexico license plates on vehicles inside the loop.

Here's what has happened since:

- Farwell city officials sent out the memo, saying the city (presumably Farwell police chief Roy McGaa) would put together a list of such illegal vehicles and turn the list over to the county tax assessor.

Farwell Mayor Chris Gikas indicated it wasn't the job of the city to enforce this provision since none of the taxes collected on the license plates go to the city.

Most of the taxes on license plates go to the state, some to the county. But when you get a license plate, it goes on your personal property taxes, of which the school system gets a large chunk.

- Parmer County Tax Assessor Doris Herington said her office wasn't an enforcement agency and that the city had sent out the letter to all city residents without her knowledge.

- Parmer County Sheriff Rex Williams said he had no comment on the situation.

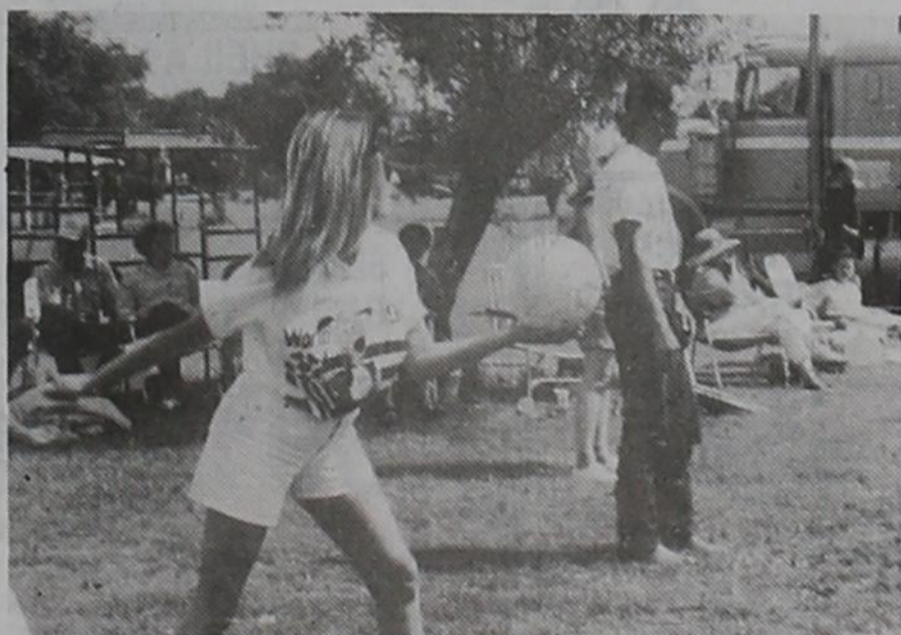

Artie Hutchins

Services will be held for Artie Lee Hutchins, 84, of Farwell at 10 a.m. mdt today (Friday) at First United Methodist Church of Clovis with Dr. Terry Anderson and the Rev. Carl Treat officiating. Burial will follow at Mission Garden of Memories Cemetery under the direction of Steed Todd Funeral Home.

Hutchins died on July 5 in Clovis.

He was born Jan. 27, 1910 in Bellview, N.M. He grew up in Broadview and Clovis area. This is where he completed the first six years of school. He also went to school in Holene and Grady and graduated from Clovis High School. After high school he went to Texas Tech where he completed engineering school.

After college, he began working with the New Mexico Highway Department and the U.S. Department of the Interior. He started to work with the U.S. Department of Agriculture in 1937, and retired after 32 years of service.

Hutchins married Helen Van Vacter on April 6, 1935. He was very family oriented.

He served during World War II as engineer in charge of roads, runways and grounds at Clovis Air Force Base. He continued his interest in wheat farming as a carryover from his early years on his parents farm at Broadview by overseeing wheat farms in Curry County.

He was a member of First Methodist Church where he served as an usher for 49

years and was on the church board of trustees at various times. He also served as church lay leader at the time the Methodist Men were organized.

He was a member of the Clovis Masonic Lodge #40 AF & AM, the National Association of Retired Federal Employees, Worthy Advisor to the Eastern Star, and the Clovis Rotary Club. He was awarded the Rotary International Paul Harris Fellow Award.

He and his wife moved to Farwell's Heritage Square Apartments in May of 1991 after living in Clovis since 1935.

Surviving are his wife; 3 sons, Van, of Denver; Jerry, of Vancouver, Wash., and Lee, of Farwell; and a sister, Mildred Starnes of Riverside, Calif.

Station has new manager

The gas station in Texico has opened under new management.

"Ron's 66" on Wheeler Avenue is now being operated by the Boyd Batton family.

The full service gas station will be open 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. cdt Mondays through Saturdays. The telephone number is 482-9428.

It will offer vehicles washes, oil changes and minor repairs.

Batton, 31, is a native of Tennessee. He currently is an airman at Cannon Air Force Base but is due for discharge this year. He and his family live in Melrose but plan to move to Texico.

His wife, Gerdy, is a native of the Netherlands. She already has been hosted at Mesman Farms by the Berny Mesman family, also Dutch natives.

They have two children - Jarno, 15, and Daphne, 18. Jarno will be working at the gas station with his folks.

5 Area plans to purchase five GTE exchanges

Five Area Telephone has signed an agreement with GTE Southwest to buy five of GTE's exchanges - Muleshoe, Sudan, Earth, Springlake and Olton.

All five exchanges border the current Five Area territory. If the deal works out (federal, state and local entities' approval are still needed), Five Area will create a separate corporation, "West Plains Telecommunications, L.L.C." to handle the new exchanges.

Five Area general manager Hubert Kidd said that with the acquisition, Five Area will be sharing resources with West Plains Telecommunications which will benefit the overall operations for both. As an example, the co-op currently employs 25 fulltime employees and serves about 1,450 active subscribers, along with the cellular telephone and mobile phone services and businesses and residential systems sold and maintained. The acquisition will increase the total number of access lines to about 6,000, and will increase the manpower requirements by 8 to 10 people. Other benefits include the ability to respond to all area customers' needs, making additional services available and minimizing the costs of operations.

Kidd said, "We, at Five Area, are excited about the possibility of expanding our operations. With this move, it will enable the cooperative to grow and establish a customer base that enhances the overall viability of our total operations. It will also be a life saver for Five Area since the number of rural residential subscribers have been decreasing year after year."

Overall, GTE has signed agreements to sell 10,739 access lines in Texas to four buyers.



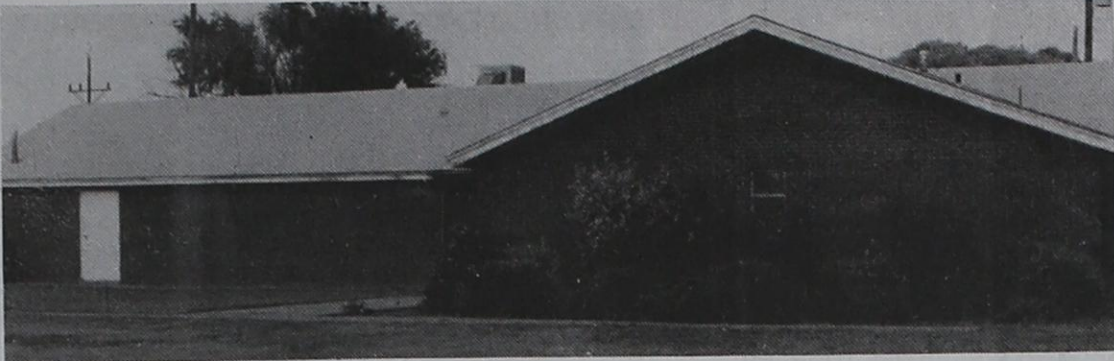

Kay Ray's place between Farwell and Bovina. Koehn plans to farm, minister to his congregation, run the parochial school, and raise his family.

"Generally, the congregation helps out quite a lot," said John Unruh, a deacon from California who was eating dinner in the home of the Darrell Schmidt family in Farwell and staying with the James Koehn family. "Over the years it's worked out very well."

"Starting a school is a high priority," said Mrs. Koehn. "It's a commitment our church has made conference-wide - it's not just our decision."

"The emphasis will be on basic education: reading, writing, arithmetic," said Unruh.

"We will start each day with the Bible," said Mrs. Koehn. "Controlling of environment is important. We believe in providing good guidelines."

Prayer has an important place in the parochial school. Unruh said that students in Livingston, Calif., a community near his home, were turned down when they asked to have a non-denominational prayer said at the graduation ceremony. By having a parochial school, the prayer could be included.

When asked to explain their beliefs, Mrs. Koehn noted: "Our salvation is in our conversion to the Lord. We stress humility, simplicity, and economy."

"We are not Mennonites because we were born Mennonites. We make a choice to be a Mennonite. It takes a conversion experience; it's an individual decision," she explained. "Most of our children do choose to join us, but some don't. That is their choice."

Simplicity of lifestyle is one way that the Mennonites are different from other groups. "We wear wrist watches - they serve a useful purpose - but we don't wear jewelry," Koehn explained. His members do not take photographs, and the congregation does not use musical instruments in the services. But, they try not to carry their goal of simplicity to ridiculous extremes. For instance, the porch of Darryl Schmidt's home was filled with toys belonging to the four Schmidt children. Toys are not considered frivolous.

While the goal of simplicity of lifestyle is the ideal, there was a smile on Koehn's lips as he said: "I don't know if we live a simple life or not. We sure keep busy. A lot has happened since we came here."

The church promotes small congregations where each individual member has a chance to participate fully. Once the members become active, the Church Conference encourages them to move out and start a new congregation, so that the church can grow.

The Church Conference sent a committee here to investigate land prices and opportunities. "Some of the people at Texline liked this community, and heard about things here," said Schmidt. They spread the word that a new congregation could be started here and they will help others move to the Texico-Farwell area.

The church has participated in a mission program for several years. They have missions in the U.S., Canada, Belize, Brazil, the Dominican Republic, Guatemala, Haiti, India, Mexico, Nigeria, the Philippines, and Europe. Worldwide membership is estimated at about 15,000 people, two thirds of whom live in the U.S.

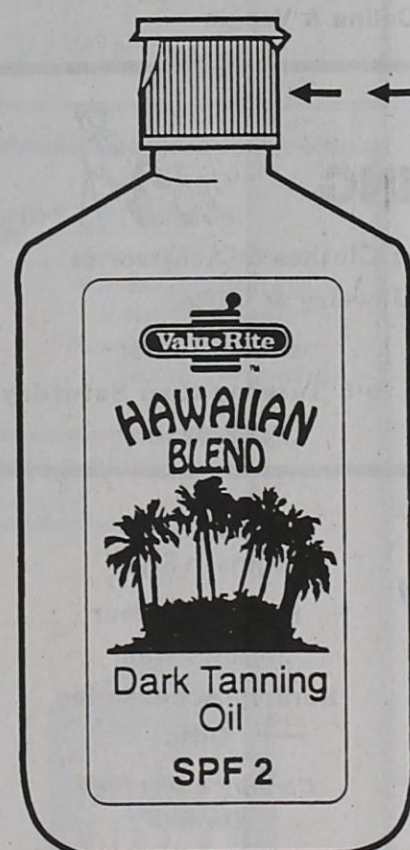

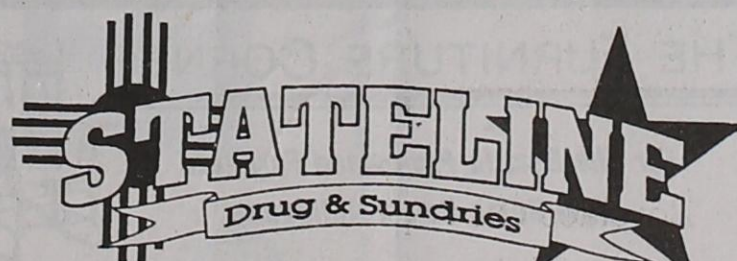

The Chief's Corner

'Legitimate' & 'otherwise'

by Farwell Police Chief Roy McGaa

Q. I have been hearing some complaints about you in the coffee shop lately. What have you been up to, and what do you have to say for yourself?

A. From what you say the complaint is general, to answer it, I need the time, date and location to "know what I have been up to." I classify complaints against the police as legitimate and otherwise:

Legitimate complaints against the police must be pursued. No one, least of all the police, want a bad cop on the street. At this point in time, I have spent approximately 16 years in law enforcement, I have completed three police academies and have a total of over 1,500 hours of classroom training, I am also within one year of my advanced peace officer's certificate.

I cannot and do not expect a civilian to have an operational understanding of my job. It is for this reason I am always happy to explain to anyone what I do and why I do it. For those who are not happy with my explanation and/or believe I have done something wrong, I have designed a citizen complaint form according to the law, that explains how to file a complaint. The City Clerk has these forms and will be glad to give them to anyone with a complaint.

Otherwise complaints. You must realize that with some folks, complaining is a way of life, especially in a coffee shop or similar location. The most likely reason a complaint is filed in a coffee shop instead of city hall is that it will not stand up under examination. Another reason complaints fail to reach city hall is that, as a matter of policy, all altercations with the police department are tape recorded. In that case I sure don't blame anyone for using the coffee shop forum.

It all boils down to this: if a person has a legitimate complaint, they should do something about it. The neighbor, the waitress or the barber can't help them. On the other hand, if the real reason for complaining is that someone got caught doing something wrong and didn't like it, it is their right to head to the coffee shop and tell everyone what a bum the cop is. That freedom is as American as apple pie, and I fully support it.

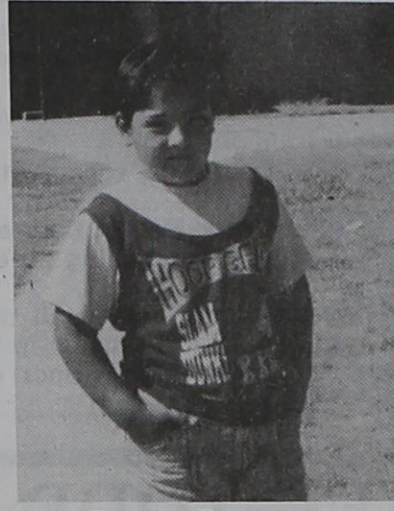
