BTD plans move into high gear

The Border Town Days Committee held its monthly meeting May 30 at the Spur Restaurant and all seems a-okay for the July 27 celebration.

BTD Chairman Mike Pomper reported that this year's event will have several new features that youngsters and adults alike will enjoy. For example, the Billy the Kid troupe from San Jon, N.M., will return. Last year, the plays weren't put on. Also, the Clovis Christian School will bring two neat rides for kids. There may be pony rides, also. Plus popular items will be back, like the petting zoo, water polo, volleyball, etc. And well-known Friona musician Charles Turner will entertain at the gazebo.

A question arose over what groups can sell refreshments at the Day in the Park activities. The committee decided to continue restricting it to non-profit groups within the Texico and Farwell school districts.

Another question arose over refreshment sales in the arts and crafts area. The committee voted to exclude refreshment sales from this area, but will allow baked goods as usual. The committee also voted to raise funds to build a train (see details in Border Banter).

Fred is now in the process of making sure the mower works okay. Once that is done, Ted and Teddy Lopez of Tedson Trailers have agreed to weld on some metal to make it look like a train engine.

After it's completed, the train will be housed at the Texico Fire Department. And St. John Lutheran Church of Lariat has agreed to operate it for LTD.

We won't only use the train for LTD. At the May 30 LTD committee meeting, it was voted to allow other Texico-Farwell non-profit groups, such as churches, to use it, also.

Meanwhile, I was authorized by the LTD committee to raise some funds to pay for the train work. I'll be working on that shortly, once we get the total cost. We already have commitments from the Rotary Club and St. John's.

If you would like to contribute some funds toward this community project, it sure would be appreciated.

Letter To The Editor

Dear Mike,

Your article "State officials discuss overpass" May 24th was very informative. As any of Farwell's senior citizens will tell you, this issue goes back "to '06."

When I was a boy growing up there, I remember how horrified everyone was every time a Santa Fe train hit a car at the Farwell-Texico crossing. One accident in the early 1930s killed a whole family.

It was interesting to note that you correctly reported the bottom line of the meeting -- "after the discussions, no action was taken."

So, Santa Fe will add more tracks and more trains because that route is the prime coast-to-coast rail line. The rail freight business is literally exploding as is Santa Fe's profits. Will Santa Fe do anything to help with the overpass project? Not! Will Texas Highway Department and/or New Mexico's Highway Department do anything more than lip service? Not likely.

Why has this very serious road hazard and traffic delay problem rated only back burner treatment for 70 or more years?

Mike, it's simply that no crescendo of "squeaky wheels" has been heard in Austin or Santa Fe, respective state capitols. The Santa Fe Railroad corporate offices have heard few "squeaky wheels" from Parmer and Curry counties. Give them a crescendo of "squeaking wheels" -- and that's what politicians and railroad moguls alike respond to as everyone knows.

Here's one way you can do it by applying the old adage -- the squeaky wheel gets the grease:

1) The Farwell-Texico councils jointly should circulate a resolution petition throughout the region with strong "whereas's" for building the overpass.

2) Send the petitions to Austin, Santa Fe and the Santa Fe Railroad.

3) Create a media event some Saturday afternoon when the Texas Lottery is up to about \$20 million and there are hundreds of cars crossing the tracks, i.e., "we are mad as hell and we ain't going to take it anymore."

Mike, I'll bet you a cold Muleshoe watermelon it will get the overpass started, or at least funded -- pronto.

Recipe of Week

EGGPLANT RELISH SALAD

- 1 large eggplant (about 1 lb.)
- 2 tablespoons lemon juice or wine vinegar
- 2 cloves garlic, minced
- 1 cup cooked rice
- 1/4 cup (1 oz.) chopped California walnuts
- 1/4 cup minced green onions
- 2 tablespoons chopped parsley
- salt and pepper to taste, if desired

Prick the eggplant several times with a fork and place it on a microwave-safe plate. Microwave on high for 12-16 minutes, turning it 2 or 3 times, until very soft. Remove from the oven and let stand until cool enough to handle. Quarter the eggplant lengthwise, then chop it coarsely. Add the lemon juice and garlic and beat vigorously to combine the ingredients—a potato masher works well. Add the rice, walnuts, green onion and parsley. Season with salt and pepper to taste, if desired. Serves 4.
