Those words are beautiful and should be the way it works. And it does at the local and area levels, but not at the national level.

Remember what I wrote a couple of years back? That folks go to Washington for either sex, money or power.

Of course, I'm kidding.

Now that brings us to the latest battle between President Clinton and GOP-controlled Congress.

Let's take an objective look at the GOP's "Contract With America."

It's been pretty much a failure. Well, you won't see that on TV. Instead, the TV will show you jubilant legislators praising the Contract, their "revolution" and extolling how well it worked. Gosh, they are wonderful.

And, worse yet, you will believe it -- because it's on TV!

But have you heard one word on how much of that Contract has been signed into law?

I believe two things got changed. One was putting Congress under the same laws as other Americans. The other change I've forgotten.

That's been the extent of the "revolution."

I doubt you believe me. No wonder -- I'm not on TV or in the tabloids like "The Globe."

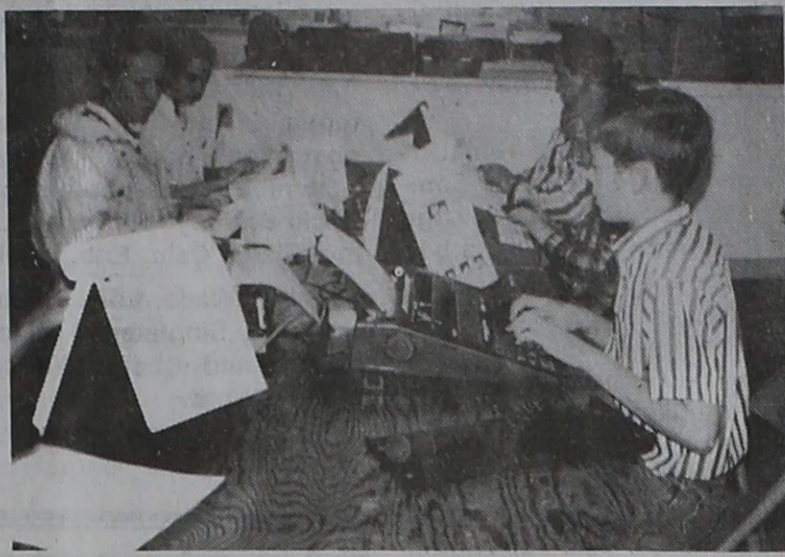
Why did the "revolution" go bust? No, I don't blame Clinton. He's a Democrat and hidebound to oppose Republican policies -- that's politics.

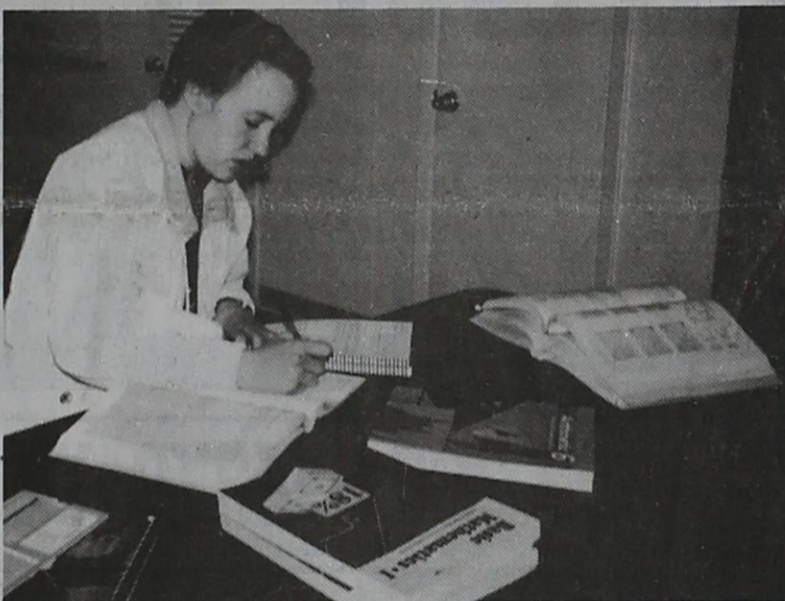

UIL realigns Farwell districts

The Texas UIL has made its biennial realignment for high school sports.

Farwell stayed in Class 1A because the high school reported an enrollment of 143. The cutoff for Class 2A was 149. Bovina, with an enrollment of 150, moved up to Class 2A.

Lazbuddie will continue to play 6-Man football and Class 1A basketball.

Basketball

When UIL announced its new districts last Friday, Farwell was put in District 3 with Lazbuddie, Happy and Vega.

But Farwell officials got a surprise Tuesday. A call came from UIL officials saying they had made an error and were adjusting District 3 -- to include powerhouse Nazareth.

Convalescent Center receives safety certificate

The Farwell Convalescent Center was honored Feb. 6 with a Safety Achievement Award.

The special award, given to nursing homes who go a full year with no lost time, was the first given out in the state of Texas.

It was presented to the Convalescent Center by Mary Ann Leon, safety chairperson for the Good Samaritan Society.

Also on hand for the ceremony was Lavon Heubrock, regional director for the Good Samaritan Society.

Center director Ronald Kilgore complimented the safety committee for its fine work -- Debbie Parmer, Carman Dotson, Elmer Zeffer, Liz Worm, Ralph Gutierrez and Carla Muniz.

The UIL decision is final; there can be no appeals.

Nazareth originally had been put in District 6, with Silverton, Groom and Hedley.

Lazbuddie had been in a district with Cotton Center, Amherst and Spade. Those latter three teams are now in District 8, with Three Way and Whitharral.

Since Lazbuddie and Farwell are now in the same district, it means the annual pre-district games will be cancelled between the two teams.

Meanwhile, Sudan went to District 7 along with Springlake Earth, Anton, Kress, Lorenzo and Petersburg.

Football

Farwell was put in District 2, arguably the toughest football district in the state.

Also in the district are Springlake Earth (moving down from Class 2A), Happy, Kress, Matador, Nazareth, Sudan and Valley.

Of those eight teams, five were in the state playoffs last year.

Because the new district has eight teams, Farwell will play three non-district games, followed by seven district games.

Farwell fans can look forward to some lengthy trips. Matador is northeast of Plainview, about 130 miles from Farwell. Valley (where Jerry Monk is from) is just a bit shorter, between Turkey and Quitique.

The district in which Matador and Valley had been in was eliminated by the UIL.

Meanwhile, Lazbuddie stays in their same Six-Man district with Amherst, Cotton Center, Three Way, Silverton and Whitharral.

Friona and Muleshoe found themselves in a difficult district (same for football and basketball) due to some long traveling.

Their Class 3A district includes Dalhart, Perryton, Sanford Fritch, Dimmitt, Tulia and Amarillo River Road.

That means some 4-hour drives for their fans.

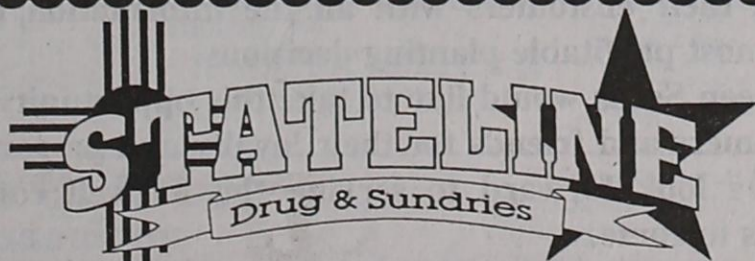

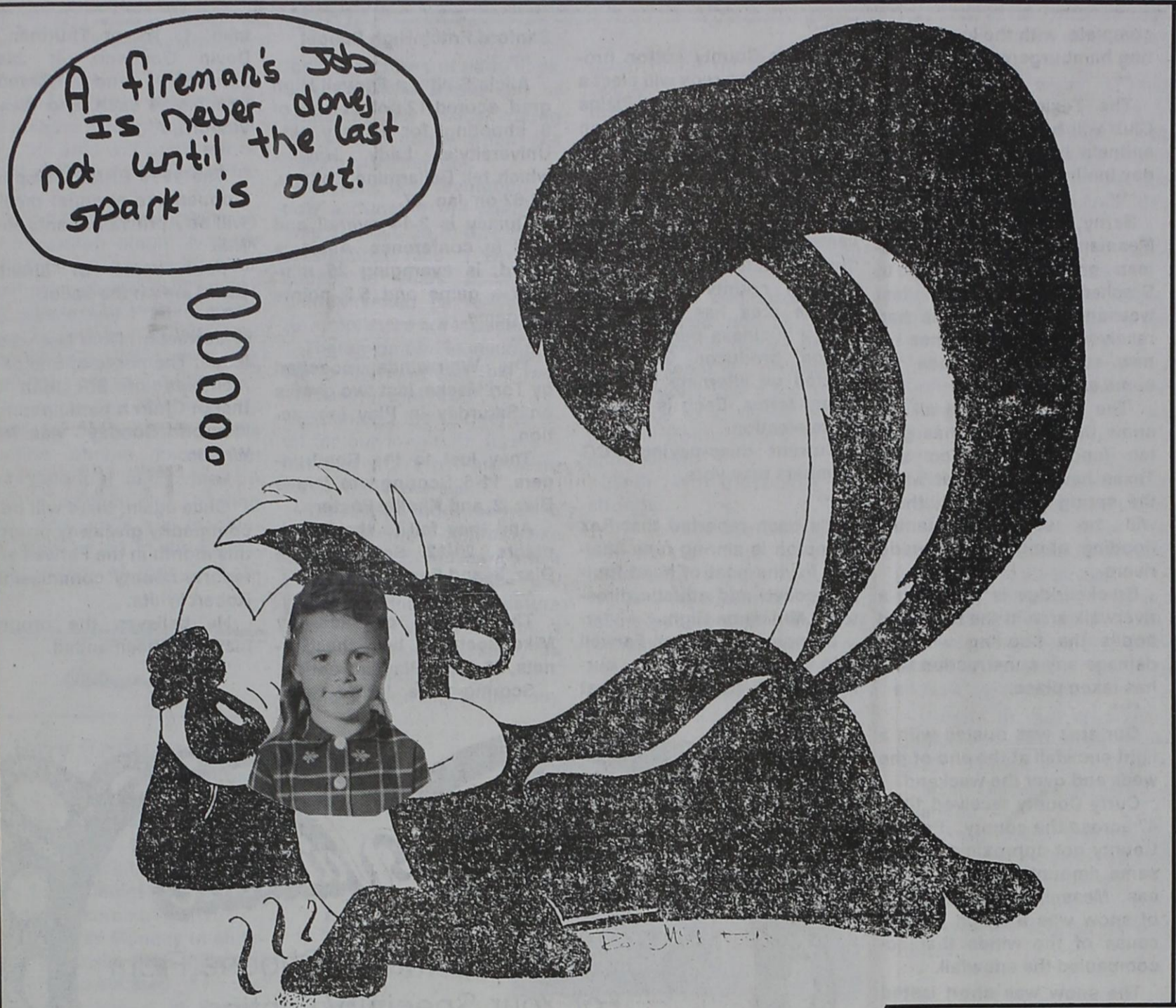

Kelly Green Seeds

Mr. and Mrs. Pat Patrick founded Kelly Green Seeds, in Farwell, in 1962. Jerry Monk started to work there in 1971. After Mr. Patrick's death in 1973, Jerry managed the business until he purchased it in 1982.

Kelley Green Seeds, Inc., is a regional seed company. They retail corn, sorghum, soybeans, cotton and forage seeds to the local and surrounding areas. They also contract with local growers to produce their own lines of seeds, including sorgo-sudangrass hybrids, hybrid grain sorghums, hybrid forage sorghums, millets, soybeans and small grains such as wheat, triticale, barley and oats. Seed from this production is distributed locally as well as domestically and for export.

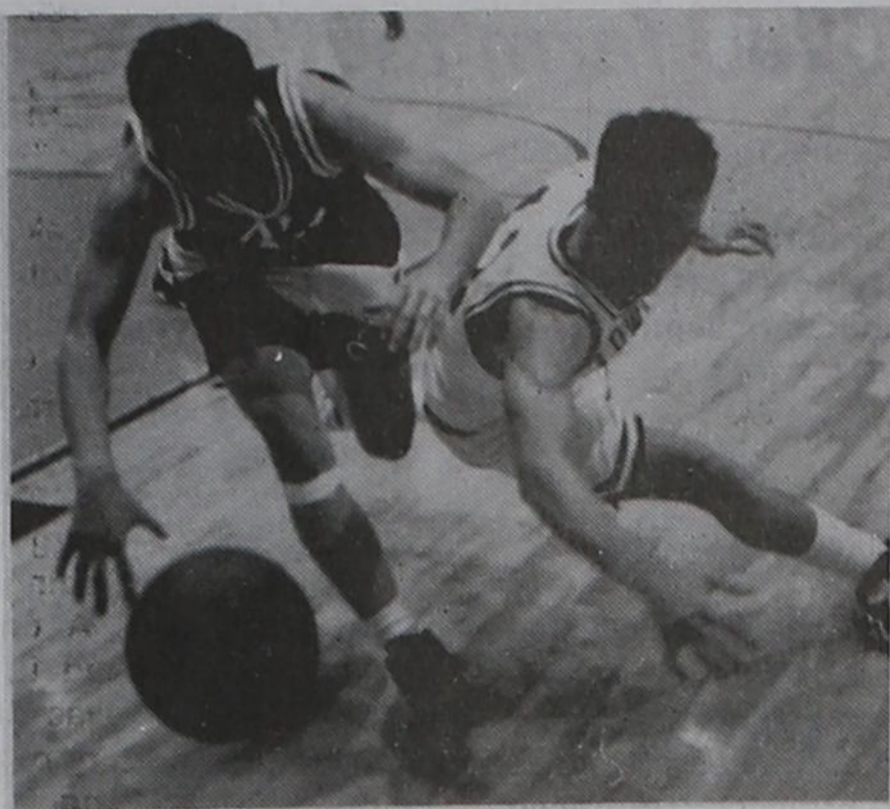
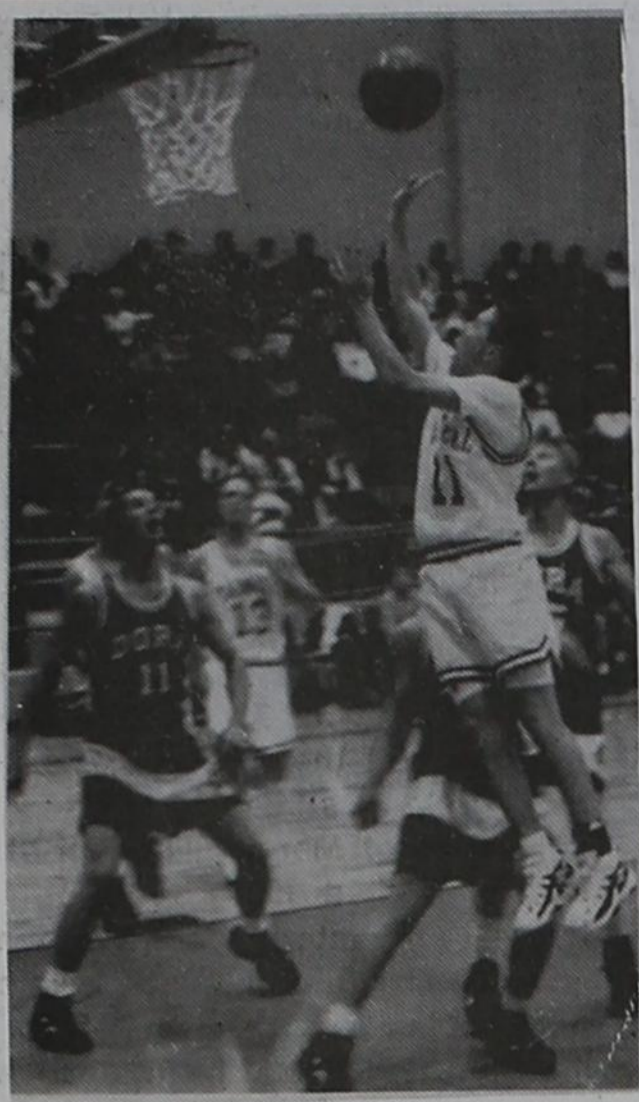

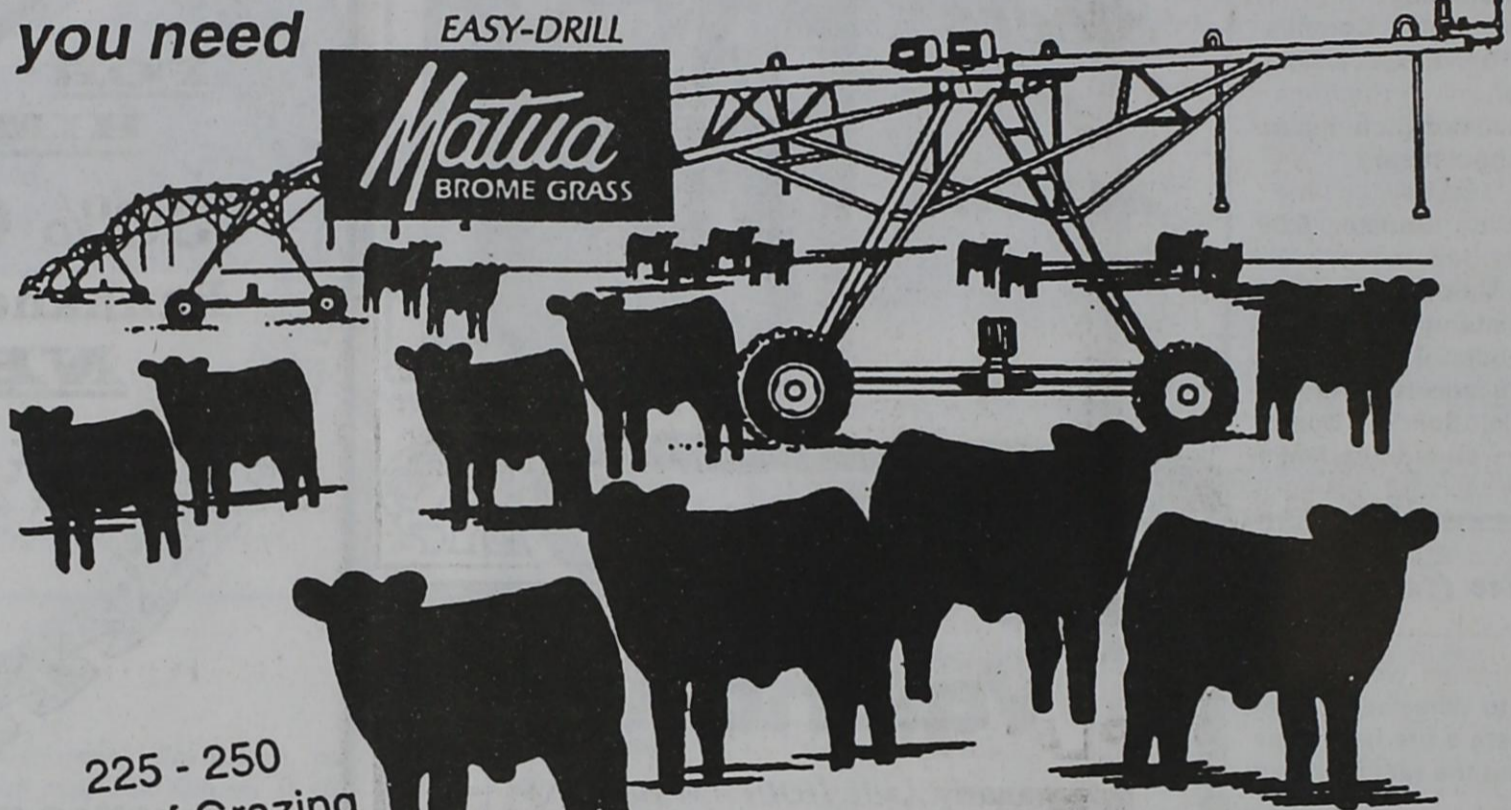

He was ordained to the ministry in 1981.

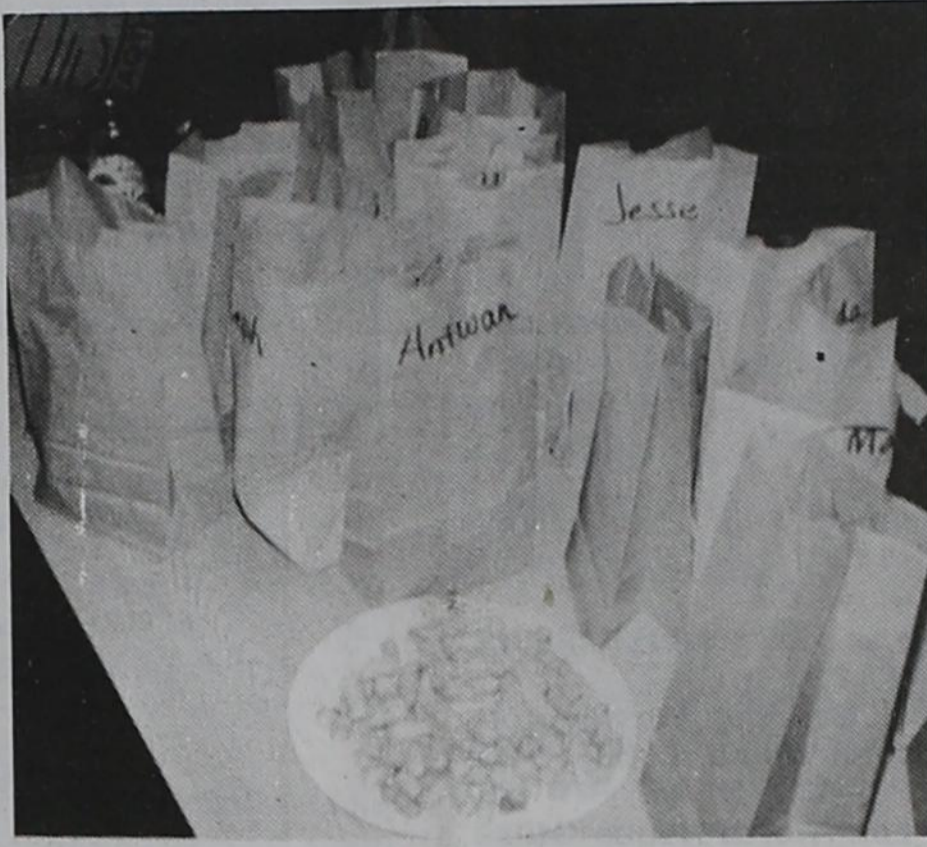





Recipe of Week

Sloppy Johns

2 cans (15 oz. Each) blackeye peas
1/2 cup teriyaki baste and glaze
4 teaspoons brown sugar, packed
1/8 teaspoon ground red pepper (cayenne)
3 slices bacon, diced
1 cup finely chopped onion
1/2 cup finely chopped celery
8 slices (each about 1/2 inch thick) Italian or French bread, toasted

Reserving 2 tablespoons liquid, drain, rinse and drain blackeye peas. Set aside.

Combine teriyaki baste and glaze, brown sugar, red pepper, reserved bean liquid and 1/4 cup water; set aside.

Cook bacon in skillet over medium heat until crisp. Remove and drain. Reserving 1 tablespoon, drain off excess drippings. Return reserved drippings to pan. Add onion and celery; stir fry 2 minutes. Gently stir in teriyaki baste and glaze mixture and blackeye peas. Bring to boil.

Reduce heat. Cover and simmer 8 minutes, stirring occasionally. Remove from heat. Stir in bacon. For each serving, spoon blackeye peas mixture over 2 toasted bread slices. Makes 4 servings.
