The annual American Angus Association meeting was held over four days last week in Amarillo. On Sept. 8, participant visited North Plains ranches. And the next day, about 350 as sociation members came to the Lust-Dodd Angus Partnership

## in Lazbuddie.

The partnership is owned by Tim Lust and Troy Dodd. They work with Mark Gardiner, of Kansas, one of the premier Angus breeders in the United States. Lust and Dodd have received bred cows and heifers from Kansas through an agreement with Gardiner.

Glenn Lust reports that Gardiner was here to show the vis tors cow pregnancy test demonstrations, and demonstrations on fixing embryos.

The Lazbuddie site is now a high-tech breeding program facility for top bulls in the U.S., said Lust. During the tour, participants saw cows displayed by breeders from Texas and New Mexico, and visited the heifer development facility and feed yard

Barbara Lust said that the group also had lunch during its visit here. They were treated to microwaveable pot roast. This is a new certified Angus beef product that is new to the mar ketplace, and Mrs. Lust said she hopes it will be sold in our area soon.

button, if you have ever sewn know that a lengthy piece of thread can be a problem. It twists, knots and catches in loops where you don't want them to be. It only takes a foot ot 18 inches of thread to sew a button onto the garmen.

More is not better.
The thread that is left in the package has to be rolled onto a spool or a bobbin or at least it has to be wrapped around a piece of paper.
