## AZTX changes permit application

Cattle Co. (Farwell Feed Yard) applications for air and water permits has taken a new route.

The application by AZTX for the issuance of an Air Quality Permit has been withdrawn.

Due to the complicated nature of the permit structure and application process, Farwell Feedyard is now applying for a simpler version - the Standard Air Permit.

According to the technical engineers at the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission, the feedlot operation currently meets the

The process for the AZTX specifications for a standard attle Co. (Farwell Feed Yard) air permit.

The same scientific specifications will be met in the proposed expansion of the feed-lot from a 29,500 head operation to 50,000, according to

TNRCC officials.

The application for the Standard Air Permit does not require public notice or hearing opportunities.

The status of the feedlots amended Water Quality Permit is that the application has gone through the TNRCC chief clerk's office and that it is now in the public comment phase

The only types of comments that can now be heard on the waste water permit are those of persons that are directly and negatively affected by the proposed expansion.

If there are any cases brought to the TNRCC's attention about the expansion and permitting, a formal hearing will then be set by the TNRCC.

The public comment phase lasts a total of 30 days. The air permit will not be processed without the subsequent passing of the waste water permit.

## Galvan sentenced to prison

Bill J. Galvan, 18, of Farwell, has been sentenced in the shooting death in December 1997 of Red Prather, owner of Play-o-Rama in Texico.

Galvan had pled guilty to accessory to armed robbery, a second degree felony. and was sent to the Grants, N.M., facility for a diagnostic evaluation.

Galvan, who was 17 at the time the slaying occurred, was sentenced as an adult.

Bill J. Galvan, 18, of Farwell, has been sentenced in years in prison, with six years the shooting death in Decemsuspended.

After prison, he must serve five years on probation and two years on parole.

Two other persons were involved in the shooting death.

Michael Treadway, 19, of Farwell is being held without bond at the Curry County Adult Detention Center with his trial set for March 29

through April 30.

Treadway is charged with

first degree murder, armed robbery with a deadly weapon and conspiracy to commit armed robbery with a deadly weapon.

Ronald Armstrong, 19, of Farwell, has pled guilty to conspiracy to armed robbery, a third degree felony, and has been sent to Grants for a diagnostic evaluation before sentencing.

John Austin Graham, 79, of Abilene, died Wednesday, December 30, 1998, at a local nursing home after a lengthy illness. Mr. Graham was born September 23, 1919, in Farwell, TX, to B.N. and Irene Graham. He graduated from Farwell High School in

1938 and attended Texas Tech and West Texas State Colleges before enlisting in the Army Air Cops in late 1940. During his 5 1/3 years of World War II service as a C-47 me-

chanic and crew chief, Mr. Graham was stationed in Texas, the Philippines and Korea and achieved the rank of Staff Sergeant.

In July 1944, before shipping out to the Philippines, Mr. Graham wed Farwell's schoolmarm, the former Edith Marie Neill, of Merkel, Texas. After the war, the Grahams lived a short time in Dawn, Texas, before moving to Lubbock, Texas. In 1949, Mr. Graham went to work for General Electric Supply Co., where he held a variety of positions until 1972, when he was transferred to Abilene to manage G.E. Supply's Abilene warehouse. He retired in 1982 after 33 years with the company.

The Grahams joined Lubbock Trinity Baptist Church in 1949, shortly after the congregation was established. During their 25 years there, the Grahams were an integral part of the church's mission and growth. After moving to Abilene, the Grahams joined Pioneer Drive Baptist Church where Mr. Graham continued service as a deacon. At t the time of his death, Mr. Graham had served over 40 years as a deacon.

Mr. Graham was a Life Member of Kiwanis International. He joined the South Abilene Club in 1973 and until his illness, he had a record of 25 years perfect attendance. He served as president of the South Abilene Club and was elected to two terms as Lieutenant Governor for Division 35 of the Texas-Oklahoma District. In 1995, Kiwanis International honored him as a George P. Hixson Fellow. The Kiwanis' Legion of Merit will be presented posthumously at the funeral.

Mr. Graham was preceded in death by his parents, one brother and one sister. He is survived by Edith, his helpmate of 54 years; son Kent and his his wife Lyn, of Moore, OK.; and their sons Justin, Johathan and Jereemy; son Air Force Col. (Dr.) Dennis Graham and his wife Angie, of Columbus, MS., and their daughter Katherine; daughter Kathy and her husband Mike Chauveaux, of Abilene, and their children Kristen, Kurt and Katie; daughter Sarabeth and her husband Perry Brown, of Rowlett, Texas, and their daughter Molly; sister Katie Ross, of Morton; Texas, and brother Howard Graham and his wife, Betty Tom, of Pampa, Texas.

Services for Mr. Graham were held January 2 at Pioneer Drive Baptist Church in Abilene with the Rev. H.B. Terry, Dr. Jeff Reid and Rev. Stan Allcorn presiding. Interment wwas at Elmwood Memorial Park under the direction of Elmwood Funeral Home.

James Loren Allen, age 92, passed away January 2, 1999, in his Tucumcari, NM, home.

Recipe of Week

Scalloped Sweet Potatoes with Streusel Topping


1 cup Pioneer Biscuit & Baking Mix 1/2 cup packed light brown sugar 1/2 cup cold butter or margarine 1 can (40 oz.) sweet potatoes

or yams, drained 1 cup dairy sour cream 1/4 cup packed light brown sugar 1/4 cup pecan pieces

In medium bowl, stir together baking mix and 1/2 cup brown sugar; cut in butter (using a food processor, pastry blender, or your fingers) until crumbly. Put half of the crumbs (about 1 cup) in a greased 8x8-inch baking dish; reserve remaining crumbs. Slice sweet potatoes and place in a layer over crumbs. In small bowl, stir

together sour cream and 1/4 cup brown sugar; spoon over sweet potatoes. Stir pecans into reserved crumbs; sprinkle over top. Bake on top oven rack at 375° for 20 to 25 minutes or until streusel topping is golden brown. Makes 6 to 8 servings.

Notice of Property Tax Reporting Requirements Property which was valued in 1998 in this county by the county assessor is not required to be reported or rendered for 1999 or subsequent years, EXCEPT FOR:

- 1. mobile homes
- 2. livestock, and
- 3. land used for agricultural purposes

If, for any reason, your property was not valued last year and it is subject to valuation this year, you are required by law to report it to the county assessor on forms provided either by mail or at the assessor's

All nongovernmental entities (property owners) which claim to be exempt from the property tax must report their property and claim their exemption for 1999 if the exemption was not claimed in 1998.

Reports for mobile homes, livestock, land use for agricultural purposes, property not valued last year and claims for exemptions by nongovernmental entities must be completed and mailed or delivered to the county assessor not later than the last day of February.

If you made improvements to your real property and: 1. the improvements cost more than \$1,000 and

- 2. a building permit for the improvements was not issued;

you must report the nature of the improvements and their cost to the assessor not later than the last day of February. These reports must be on forms provided by the county assessor.

If you believe property decreased in value during the preceding year, you must report on forms provided by the county assessor, a signed

- 1. describes the property affected,
- 2. states the cause and nature of decrease in value, and
- 3. states the amount you contend the value has decreased

This statement must be filed with the county assessor no later than the last day of February.

If application for the Special Method of Value for Land used for Agricultural Purposes was allowed in 1998 no new application is required. However, if that claim was not granted in 1998 and it is now claimed, claim must be made by the last day of February by filing with the assessor with the form provided by the assessor.

If the veterans exemption was claimed and allowed in 1998 no new claim for the exemption is required to be filed. However, if the exemption was not claimed and allowed in 1998 and it is now claimed, claim must be made by the last day of February by filing with the assessor the form provided by the assessor.

If the head-of-family exemption was claimed and allowed in 1998, no new claim for the exemption is required to be filed. However, if that exemption was not claimed and allowed in 1998 and it is now claimed, claim must be made by the last day of February by filing with the assessor the form provided by the assessor.

Beginning in the 1982 tax year, taxpayers are responsible for declaring their property classification to the assessor, as residential or nonresidential. When the declaration is accepted by the assessor, it shall remain as such and need not be made in subsequent years unless the classification changes. If a taxpayer has not declared their property to be residential in 1998 and desires that classification for 1999, they must complete a declaration of residential classification and return the signed declaration to the county assessor's office by the last day of February

Certain mineral property and personal property of contractors operating in more than one county are required to be reported to the Taxation and Revenue Department, Property Tax Division of the State of New Mexico in Santa Fe. Information about property to be reported to the Taxation and Revenue Department, Property Tax Division, can be obtained from the county assessor or the Central Assessment Unit. P.O. 



## Why does the EMS charge?

(Editor's note: The following information from Paul Fulcher is the start of a periodic series of articles that will appear in the Tribune sent by the Farwell EMS.)

As of Oct. 1, 1998, the Farwell Emergency Medical Service began charging for the ambulance service. EMS members have received many questions as to why charges are now being incurred by patients served by the ambulance.

All EMS members are volunteers from the community who receive professional and certified training to be members of an emergency medical service team. These dedicated volunteers serve this community by volunteering their time and expertise to the ambulance service.

The purpose for charging patients for the ambulance is twofold. First, the monies received go to replenish the medical supplies used on the ambulance and second, the charges actually help to lower the cost of the service to the residents who reside within the city limits of Farwell.

The unofficial statistics show that 60% of the EMS calls are made within the city of Farwell. Twenty-five percent are made for citizens residing in the Farwell School District and 15% of the calls are made to persons traveling through our area. In the past, when there was no fee charged for the ambulance service, 40% of the calls were paid by the city of Farwell, with no reimbursement other than a portion of the donations that were received. Now, by charging the individual patient for the use of the ambulance, the costs to the city will now be offset.

On the issue of patient confidentiality, please do not be offended when a member of the Farwell EMS cannot (and will not) answer a question concerning a patient or a call. Even though we are a volunteer system, we are under the same laws and regulations as a fully paid service. While we understand the concern about our friends and neighbors who are served by the ambulance, we are bound to maintain patient confidentiality.

The goal of the Farwell EMS is to be the best volunteer service in the state. To achieve this goal, we need the full support of our community. If you have any questions that we may answer for you, please feel free to write them to my attention at the following address:
