- 1 slice green pepper

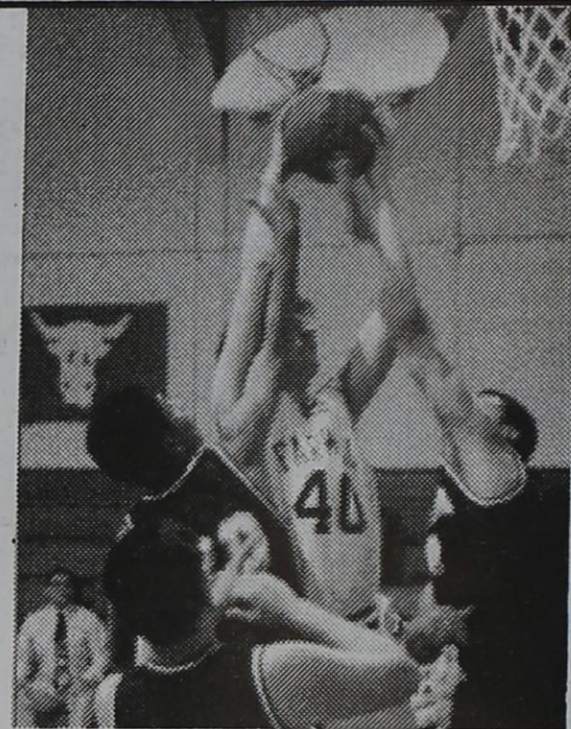
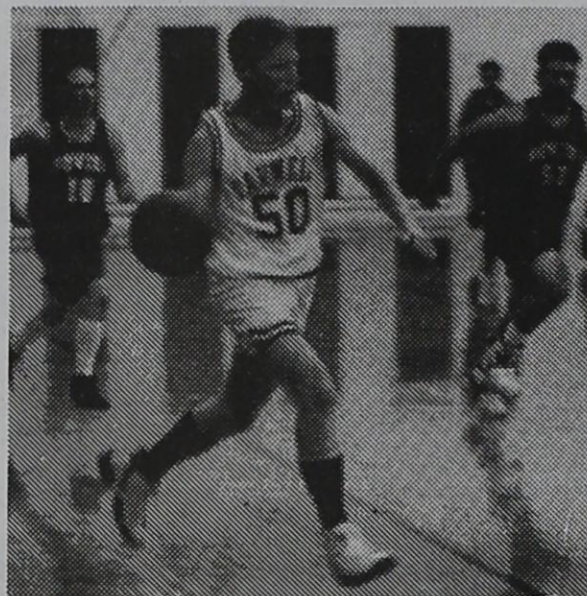

Reasonable Notice On New Open Meeting Law

The Texico Board of Education met in a regular session on March 9, 1999, and decided that reasonable notice to the public as required in Open Meetings Act (NMSA 1978, Section 10-15-1 to -4), would be as follows:

Notice of a regular meeting will be written notice published in the State Line Tribune and the Clovis News Journal at least seven days prior to the regular meeting or by annual notice since the Board meets at 7:00 p.m. (MT) September through May and 8:00 p.m. (MDT) June, July and August, on the second Tuesday of each month. A notice of a special meeting shall be given by posting a notice on the window of the Administrative Office in the Texico Educational Complex at least one day prior to the meeting. A notice of an emergency meeting will be posted on the window of the Administrative Office in the Texico Educational Complex as soon after an emergency arises as is possible.

Welker resigns

The Lazbuddie School Board on Tuesday received the resignation of teacher Ralph Welker. He was in charge of the elementary physical education program, coached and was assistant band director.

- In other business, the board:
- Renewed teachers' contracts.
 - Approved Krisse Burton as a substitute teacher.
 - Set the driver's ed rates for this summer at \$85 for local students and \$150 for out of district students.
 - Approved the summer school budget. About 23-24 students participate each year.
 - Approved the annual vehicle tax for next year.
 - Adopted textbooks.
 - Okayed a policy to limit funding for students who attend national competitions. The board will pay room and board costs but not for transportation. This is a cost-saving measure.
 - Okayed the school calendar for next year but it may be changed if the state adds teacher in-service days, as has been proposed.

Spring break will be the week of March 13 next year so that it matches up with the South Plains College break. This is being done to help Lazbuddie students who will be participating in the ITV program, whereby they take classes via TV with SPC instructors. Other schools in the 5 Area consortium are expected to do likewise.

We've come a long way from the days when Henry Ford said you could order his Model T in any color - as long as you wanted black.

Today, we want choices, and that's just what we're getting for retirement planning. With Roth IRA's and improved traditional IRA's, there's something for everyone. Any working American under age 70 1/2 can contribute up to \$2000 per year to a traditional IRA. Americans of any age can contribute to Roth IRA's as long as their annual income is less than \$95,000 (\$150,000 for couples). You can have either or both types of IRA's, but the total contribution per individual cannot exceed \$2,000 per year.

The main difference between Roth and traditional IRA's is when you pay your taxes. Roth IRA contributions are included in your taxable income each year, but the money grows tax-free and most withdrawals are tax-free. The traditional IRA allows many people to take a tax deduction today, deferring taxes until they withdraw the money in the future. You can deduct your full IRA contribution from your taxable income each year if you're not covered by an employer-sponsored retirement plan. People who are covered by employer-sponsored retirement plans can still deduct all or part of their IRA contributions if their income falls within certain limits.

Some younger folks shy away from IRA's fearing their money will be untouchable until retirement. Withdrawals before age 59 1/2 are subject to a penalty on top of taxes, but penalty-free distributions are allowed for special needs: qualified college-expenses, a first home purchase (up to \$10,000), disability or death.

Wolverines beat Mora in 3 overtimes to advance to state

The Texico Wolverines had to face an old nemesis in the finals on Saturday of the Region H Tournament -- the Jal Panthers.

Jal won, 67-61, and both teams advance to the state tournament next week.

The Wolverines, 20-6 on the year, will play at 8:30 p.m. MST on Wednesday, March 17, in the state quarter-finals in Albuquerque at Valley High School.

The Texico-Jal games have been close. Jal won the first game by 4 points, 78-74. Then Jal won, 83-68, but Texico actually held a 5-point lead into the final quarter.

What was frustrating about the regional final is that the Texico defense stepped up and held the high-scoring Jal guard to only one point. But the other guard "was unconscionable" in his shots, said Coach Richard Luscombe, and his point total made up for the star's lack of scoring.

Both teams started off at a slow pace, which Coach Luscombe felt was due to the fact that both squads had played tough games the previous night. Texico had won in triple overtime, while Jal put away a tough Cimarron team.

Neither team shot well in the first quarter and Texico took a 9-3 lead at its end.

In the second quarter, Jal outscored Texico, 22-13. Chris Hall led the way for the Wolverines with 8 points in this quarter. But that Jal guard hit a trio of 3-pointers (including a "fadeaway"), and had one score (in which he was fouled) when he basically just flipped the ball up at the basket.

Luscombe was happy with his defense, saying the Wolverines were playing one of their best defensive games of the season. Texico went into halftime, down 26-22.

Jal won the 3rd quarter by a slim 18-16 margin. Texico had balanced scoring and the game remained tight throughout. The same was relatively true of the final quarter, which Jal won 24-23.

Texico was hurt by free throws. The Wolverines only made 13 of 17 from the charity line, despite the stress put on it during practice. In the final quarter, Texico hit 3 of 7 free throw tries while Jal cashed in on 9 of 14.

Both teams were tired by now. The Wolverines climbed to within 3 points but then turned the ball over twice to end its last threat.

Foust has played JV all year. But Coach Luscombe put him into the game and he scored 9 of his points in the 4th quarter, on a pair of 3 pointers and by making 3 of 4 free throw tries. His outside shooting helped open up the floor for Texico's offense.

Jake Boazman and Steward had 10 rebounds each. Burford and Michael Marlow, 6.

Jake Boazman had 7 rebounds and 4 steals.

led with 3 steals and Marlow had 3 assists.

In the opening regional game, the winner would head on to state and the loser would go home. Both teams wanted badly to win. And the victory went to the Texico Wolverines in three overtimes -- they beat Mora, 79-75.

Texico started really well, jumping out to a 21-10 lead after the first quarter. Jake Boazman and Justin Steward had 6 points apiece. The Wolverine defense was strong and held up well during the whole game except for part of the 3rd quarter, said Coach Luscombe.

In the first quarter, Ross Burford, Michael Marlow and Johnny Sena had 3-pointers. This extended the Mora defense and opened up their inside for easy shots.

The 2nd quarter was much more even. Josh Boazman had 6 points but both teams had several turnovers.

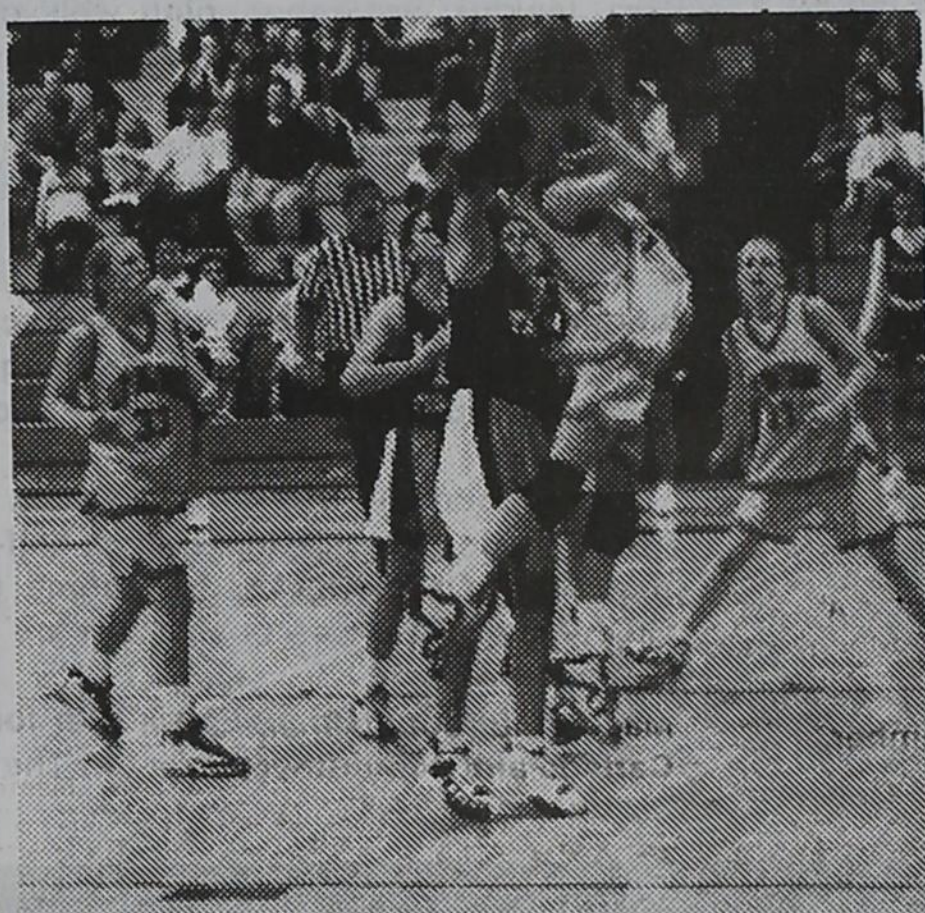
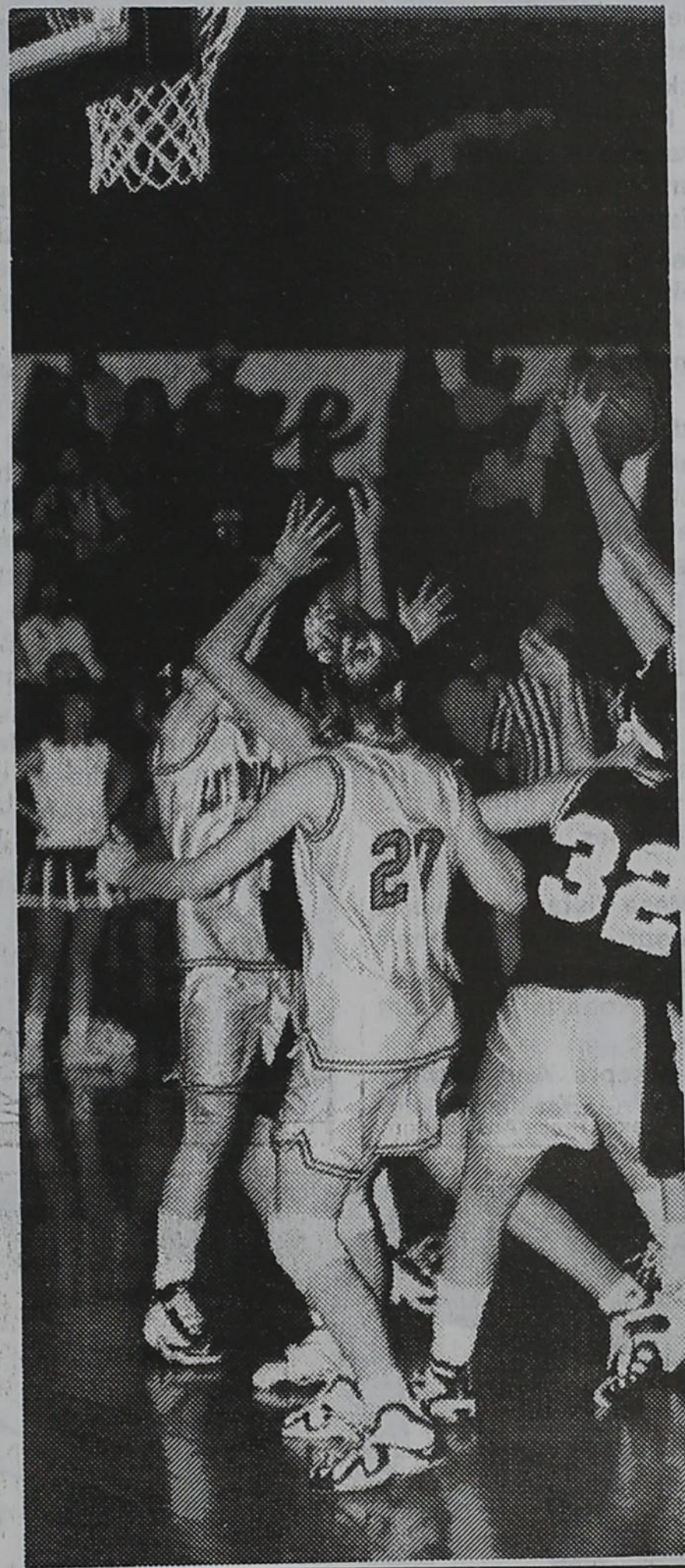
Extension service schedules Open Forum

Lady Wolverines stopped by Navajo Prep for state championship

The Texico Lady Wolverines climaxed a wonderful season by claiming the Class AA state runner-up title at the state tournament on Saturday.

Texico, which finished the year with a sparkling 25-4 record, lost in the championship game to a more experienced Navajo Prep team, 70-59.

The Lady Wolverines are a very youthful team, with several freshmen and sophomore starters, who will be back for next season -- which should find Texico ranked No. 1 with an excellent chance to win the state crown. Texico's squad had no seniors this year.

Well over 100 Texico fans made the lengthy trip to Albuquerque to cheer on the team. They got a lot of thrills as the Lady Wolverines won its quarter-final and semi-final games.

As usual, Texico came out with its suffocating full-court press which caused the Lady Eagles problems, including several turnovers early but not as many later in the game. NP had some strong players and were adept at the 3-point shot.

But Texico came out fired up. After falling behind 3-0, Elizabeth Richards canned a 3-pointer at 5:45 to tie the game. She then made a pair of free throws to knot it at 5-all. The Lady Wolverines took the lead at 9-8 on a Jennifer Roberts jumper. After the Lady Eagles tied it, Callie Rucker's jump shot put Texico ahead again.

After a Callie Rucker lay-up, Jennifer Roberts hit a shot, off a Richards pass, to push the lead to 15-11. Then Jennifer Roberts hit a shot at the buzzer to keep Texico up, 17-13, as the first quarter ended.

The second quarter started on a high note as Krysta Morris knocked down a 3-pointer to push the lead to 20-13. But NP fought back, tying the game at 20-20. Texico was missing its shots and free throw tries. But after the tie, Texico went ahead again on a lay-up by Jennifer Roberts and a free throw by Richards. The lead increased to 6 points when Jennifer Roberts ripped a 3 pointer, 28-22. The quarter ended with Texico ahead, 31-24, on a Jennifer Roberts free throw.

As the refs left the court, they were booed lustily by the NP contingent since they had called NP for 12 fouls and Texico only for 4 in the first half. Whether this criticism worked or not is debatable, but in the 3rd quarter Texico was whistled for 9 fouls and the Lady Eagles only 2.

Navajo Prep did a better job at handling the Texico press in the second half and also hit their shots. After a Richards bucket gave Texico its biggest lead of the game early in the quarter at 35-26, NP went on a tear.

Despite good Texico defense -- Shayna Lewis took a charge and Morris had a steal -- Navajo Prep took the lead at 38-37 at the 3:30 mark.

After a Texico turnover, Coach Roy King called a time-out to settle the troops. But the Lady Eagles kept scoring as Texico went cold in their shooting. Down by 7 points, Texico got on the boards when Jennifer Roberts hit a 3-pointer to narrow the margin to 44-40. But NP hit a 3 pointer at the buzzer to end the quarter with a 49-40 lead. NP had won this quarter, 25-9.

NP had another 3 pointer to open the final quarter. Kristen Roberts responded with a bucket. But NP increased its lead to 56-42. The margin narrowed on a steal by Jennifer Roberts,

two free throws by Richards and a bucket and 2 charity tosses by Jennifer Roberts. Then Lewis scored and Texico was only down by 10.

But, again, the Lady Eagles went on a roll and scored 8 unanswered points. Texico's shots were not falling. Both Roberts girls fouled out.

Texico closed the deficit to 12 points on back to back 3 pointers by Morris and Richards, but NP went into a semi-stall and the parade to the free throw line began.

Coach King cleared his bench to let all his kids play in the final minute.

Scoring were Richards, 15; Kristen Roberts, 6; Jennifer Roberts, 21; Rucker, 6; Morris, 6; Kara Jenkins, 2; Lewis, 2; and LaMicah Drager, 1.

Richards had 9 rebounds, Morris 7 and Jennifer Roberts 5. Richards had 4 assists and 4 blocks to lead in these categories.

Texico's Lady Wolverines had an easy game in the quarter-finals at state by routing the Mesa Vista Lady Trojans, 85-41.

The now-famous Texico press caused 47 turnovers. Combined with good Texico shooting, the game was a rout from early on.

The Lady Wolverines soared to a 9-0 lead on baskets by Elizabeth Richards, Krysta Morris and Jennifer Roberts. With 3 minutes left in the quarter, Texico was ahead 17-2.

The total kept climbing. Callie Rucker hit. Then Jennifer Roberts canned a couple. Then Kristen Roberts struck. Now it was 25-2 before the Lady Trojans were able to score again. That was rapidly answered by a Kristen Roberts basket, and Texico led 27-4 at the end of the first quarter.

The second quarter saw more of the same. Coach Roy King had rested some of his starters at the end of the first quarter, and they returned to the floor. Jennifer Roberts immediately hit a 3 pointer, one of three shots from beyond the arc she made in this game.

On the defensive end, Morris, Richards and Kristen Roberts were working the boards well. Meanwhile, Morris canned a 3 pointer (she had 2 for the game) and it was now 35-5. Also, Kara Jenkins was rebounding well, getting jump balls. One negative then occurred -- Bobbi Williams hurt her ankle.

LaMicah Drager entered the game as a Texico guard, and handled the Mesa Vista pressure well. Brittany Bradley had a steal. The Lady Trojans continued to struggle controlling the board due to the relentless pressure of the Texico guards.

Bradley rebounded a shot to make the score 42-9. Then Drager put back two rebounds for scores and it was 46-11. The quarter ended with Pam Schjang making a shot to put Texico ahead, 50-14. All the Lady Wolverines played in the first half.

Morris kept get more steals, then went on the offense with a 3 pointer. Rucker added a 3 pointer and it was 70-33. On defense, Drager was playing superbly, and Morris had another steal. Schjang had a steal on defense. After baskets by Drager and Bradley, the game ended with Schjang making a pair of free throws.

Scoring were Jennifer Roberts, 19; Kristen Roberts, 17; Morris, 9; Rucker, 9; Bradley, 6; Drager, 6; Schjang, 4; Jenkins, 2; Williams, 2; and Richards, 11.

Richards led in rebounds with 11 and Jenkins had 6. Richards has set a school record for rebounds in a season and Coach King will have an announcement on the new total later. And Richards is only a freshman.

Morris led in assists with 5.

Morris also led in steals with 13. She also has set a school record for steals in a single season and Coach King will have the specific totals later. She and Leslie Steward were tied as the leaders in this category going into this game with about 175. And Morris is only a sophomore.

Yes, it's true -- Coach Roy King was actually smiling after the Lady Wolverines' victory in the state semi-final over the Animas Lady Panthers, 72-55.

At the risk of being redundant, Texico's full court pressure was hard for Animas to handle and they turned the ball over 35 times. Meanwhile, Texico handled the ball well.

Animas had a trio of 6'1 girls. One of them blocked a shot by Kara Jenkins, batting it into the 2nd row of the bleachers!

Texico, displaying a lot of hustle, raced off to an 11-6 lead on a basket by Elizabeth Richards. The score moved up to 14-6 on a Richards free throw and a basket by Krysta Morris. Kristen Roberts then stole the board and scored. Morris had to guard one of those 6-footers and did a great job defending her.

The game was closely officiated with lots of fouls called. But Texico kept moving ahead, with Callie Rucker hitting a 3 pointer at the buzzer so that Texico led 21-9 after one quarter.

Animas might have had great shot blockers under the basket due to their height, but they were unable to stop Texico's 3 point shot specialists. So the Lady Wolverines rained in buckets in the 2nd quarter.

First, Shayna Lewis canned a 3-pointer to make it 25-13, followed by a Morris 3-pointer. Then it was Callie Rucker's turn to knock down a long one, to put Texico up, 31-15.

The cascade continued. After a Jenkins basket, Richards hit a 3-pointer to double the lead, 40-20. After Animas scored, it was Rucker's time to can a 3-pointer.

Meanwhile, Coach King was using his bench to keep up the attack. Although Animas' shortest player was 5'8, the height advantage couldn't offset Texico's depth, speed, quickness and shooting abilities.

LaMicah Drager hit a free throw and Pam Schjang added two more as the half ended with Texico ahead, 47-32.

Animas fought back in the 3rd quarter as Texico missed its shots and the press was not as effective. After the Lady Panthers crept to within 7 points, at 47-40, Jennifer Roberts hit a

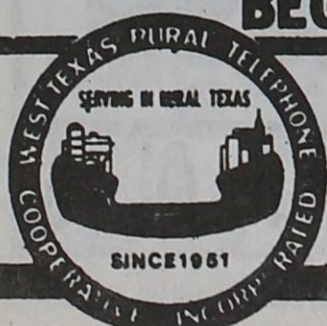
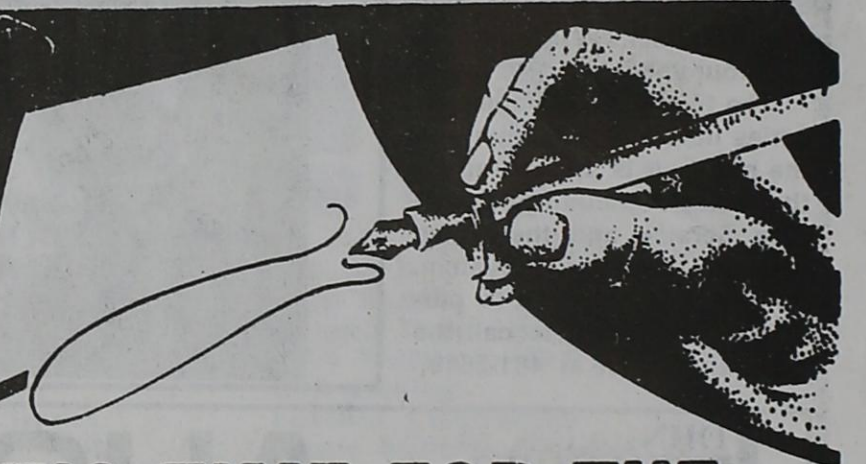

"We've got some real good juniors who may not have gotten as much 'ink' as the younger girls, but who are the backbone of our team," said Coach King.


He praised his juniors for their leadership roles.

"Our team plays well together and gets along well, and our junior leadership has

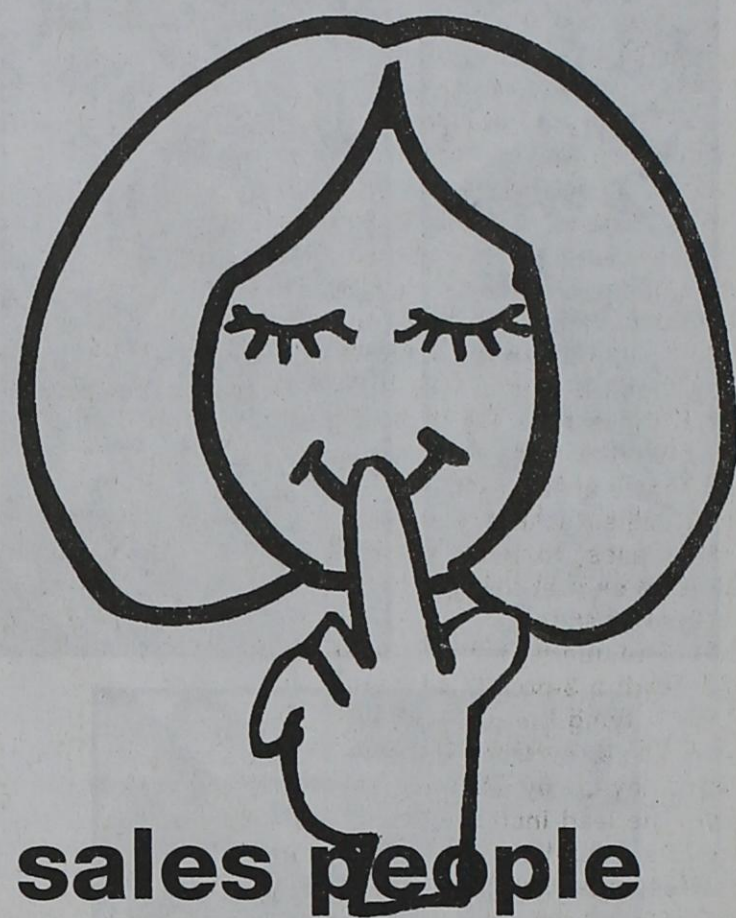
helped that," said Coach King.

Salado tips Lady Blue in state semi-final

You hate to see a referee's whistle determine the outcome of an important game in the final second.

But that's what occurred as the Farwell Lady Blue fell to Salado's Lady Eagles, 39-37, in the state Class 2A semi-final game at Austin last Friday.

It was a memorable game. Farwell, due to cold shooting in the second quarter, was down by 10 points against an outstanding Salado team which had won 18 in a row. But the Lady Blue battled back ferociously, even taking the lead in the final minutes.

The Lady Blue ended their finest season in school history with a 26-8 record.

The game opened with Farwell jumping out to a 4-0 lead on baskets by Ashley Crawford and Lisa Herington. After Salado scored, Crawford was fouled on a driving layup and made both charity tosses for a 6-3 lead.

After another Salado bucket, Ramsey Bennett scored on an assist from Chelsi Kaltwasser. Meanwhile, Lady Blue guards Crawford and Megan Miller were causing turnovers; the entire Farwell team was playing strong defense.

Miller canned a 3-pointer to put Farwell ahead 11-5. Then it was Salado's time to battle back, tying the game with a 3-pointer with 1 minute left in the first quarter. Crawford and Nicole Stout forced turnovers as the quarter ended.

Then came Farwell's cold shooting quarter, in which they only scored 2 points, on a layup by Marni Lunsford, off a steal by Bennett. But Farwell's defense kept it in the game, with steals by Crawford and Britney Hunt, and a block by Kaltwasser.

But Salado was able to score, and they went into halftime ahead, 23-13. To counter Farwell's inside defense, the Lady Eagles went to a 4-corner offense, forcing Farwell to play one on one. But Farwell defended against it well.

The Lady Blue came out in the 3rd quarter with a determined look. At the 6:10 mark, Crawford hit a jumper, followed by a layup by Hunt to close the gap to 23-17. Bennett then caused a turnover.

After Salado scored, Kinzi Woods hit a jumper, followed by a steal by Lunsford. Crawford then drew a foul on her drive to the basket, made both free throws and the deficit was only 5.

Toward the end of the quarter, Miller had to go out due to injury. But baskets by Woods and Crawford cut the Salado lead to 28-25 going into the final period.

Farwell's defense was brilliant. The entire squad was in-

tense as it continued to fight back. After Salado hit two buckets to move its lead back to 7, here came the Lady Blue.

At 5:40, Crawford scored on a layup. Seconds later, she hit a jumper. Then Kaltwasser ripped home a jump shot to close to within 1.

Crawford stole the ball. And Hunt hit a driving layup, as Farwell regained the led at the midway point in the quarter.

Salado's 6-ft. center responded with a score. Then Bennett had a big rebound, and Crawford caused a turnover. With 2:16 left, Kaltwasser hit another jumper to put Farwell ahead, 35-34.

Salado responded with a 3-pointer with 1:17 to go. Crawford then had yet another steal as she was a demon on defense. With 26 seconds left, Hunt rebounded, put in a short jumper to tie the game at 37-37.

But with less than a second remaining, a foul was called on Farwell during a rebound battle. The free throws were made by Salado. There was also a question on which Salado player was fouled (due to twin sisters) and which one went to the foul line.

Scoring were Crawford, 14; Miller, 3; Hunt, 6; Lunsford, 2; Herington, 2; Kaltwasser, 4; Bennett, 2, and Woods, 4.

Farwell was called for 15 fouls; Salado 8.

Farwell outrebounded Salado, 41-40. Crawford led with 9 boards.

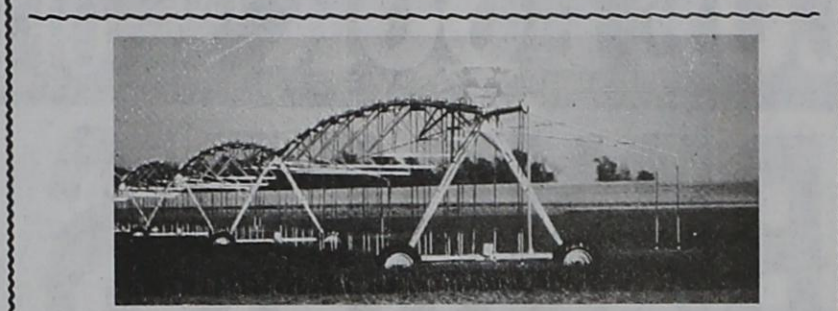

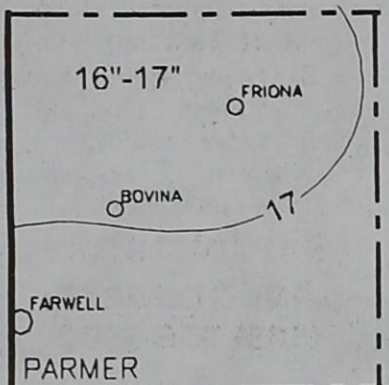
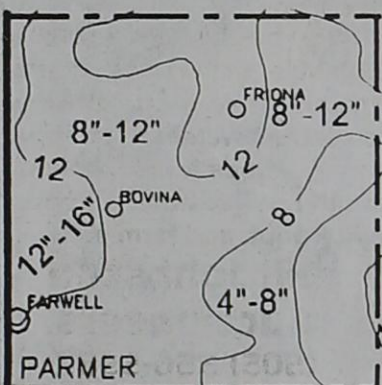

Crime Stoppers can be effective

In a follow-up to the story that the Tribune ran last week about the drug and gang activity going on in Parmer County, it's important to stress the important role that the Crimestopper organization can play in putting a halt to crime.

If a person sees or hears of any type of criminal activity going on around the county, one only has to call the Crimestoppers number to report the incident or tip-offs.

This is how the Crimestoppers phone line works:

A person calls the county-wide number 1-800-774-TIPS (or in Farwell 481-9178). If it is during regular business hours, Crimestopper coordinator Gary Blair answers the phone. After hours it is answered by an answering machine.

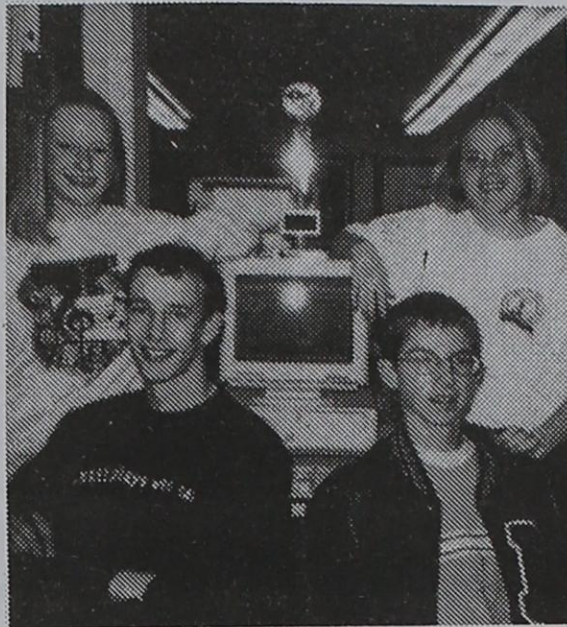
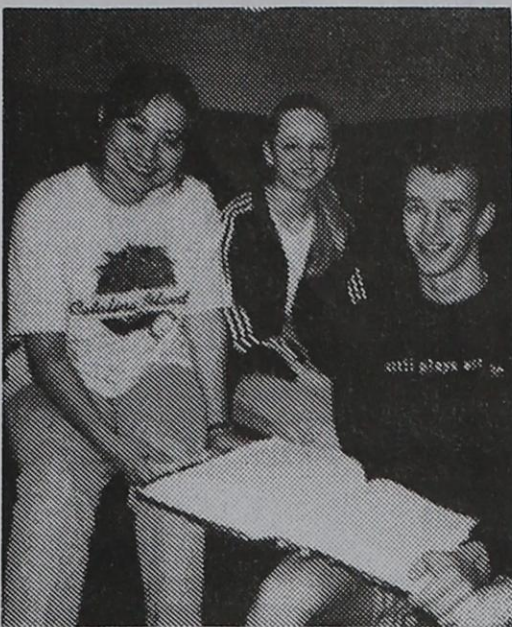
The person leaves a mes-

sage on the machine giving their phone number as their identification. Deputy Blair then returns the call, or when he answers the call, he assigns the person a number.

From this point on, any and all contact the Crimestoppers and/or law enforcement agencies have with the source, this number is used for identification.

The Crimestopper's phone numbers are answered 24 hours a day, seven days a week. All information and identities are completely confidential and the person remains completely anonymous.

All information that leads to the arrest or conviction of a criminal pays the informant from \$50 to \$500 depending on the crime.

State allows Texico EMTs, drivers to be paid for making out-of-town transfers

The Texico City Council on Tuesday heard that the state has approved a request by Texico fire department officials to pay drivers and EMTs who go on out-of-town transfers.

A letter was read from the Local Government Division of the state Finance Department which said it was okay.

Texico Fire Chief Lewis Cooper said the following will get paid:

-- On transfers to Albuquerque, drivers will get \$75 and EMTs \$150.

-- On transfers to Roswell, Lubbock and Amarillo, drivers will get \$50 and EMTs \$100.

These totals don't include meals. So the totals may be increased.

In other business, the council:
 -- Heard Marshal Kelley Brophy ask to meet with the council in executive session.

During the earlier open meeting, councilman Rick Queener said the city "was planning to hire another police officer."

But Mayor Marie Christian said that the city definitely will not be adding a police officer, citing financial restraints.

-- Had a discussion with Ken Glaze, of Glaze Monument, over new grave site requirements. He suggested some changes to make it easier to keep the areas cleaned. This will be discussed at the next council meeting.

Glaze said volunteered to help on a project to improve the old cemetery area, which he called "in bad shape." He suggested that community service workers could help level the ground, realign some monuments, etc.
