Carnival Rides To Be Installed --

Parade Kicks Off Celebration

The "kiddie" carnival rides which will be a part of the Border Towns Days celebration will be set up in the Farwell Park, in the southwest corner, Wednesday evening, July 31, and will be ready for use by the Twin Cities children early Thursday morning, August 1. The rides will be left in town until completion of the celebration on August 3, according to Mr. Horn of Plainview who is bringing the rides to the area.

The second annual celebration will be kicked-off with a gigantic parade through downtown Texico-Farwell beginning at 4 p.m., August 1. Parade participants will assemble in the area west of the Burger Barn in Texico at 3 p.m., on that day, according to parade marshal Fred Chandler.

There will be three big rodeo performances at 8 p.m., each

evening during the celebration, and in addition several other feature attractions are planned, Saturday morning, a golf tournament is scheduled at Farwell Country Club, beginning at 8:30 a.m. At 10 a.m. and 1 p.m., Texico-Farwell Lions will sponsor Trap Shoots at the Trap north of Texico on the State Line Road. Also at 1 p.m., several events will begin at Farwell City Park and continue until 4 p.m. Included in these events will be western music provided by Ed Hardage, Jimmy Schell, Fred Chandler and others; a Minnie Pearl Hat contest, hog and cow calling contests, whittlers, country crooners, and possibly a square dance exhibition.

Also on the agenda for the afternoon is interviewing of the queen contestants at the city park.

At 4 p.m., and continuing until 7 p.m., a barbecue meal will be served at the park. Price of the meal, to be cooked by Adolph and Henry Haseloff, assisted by the cafeteria ladies, is \$1 per plate.

Each evening prior to the rodeo performances, (7:45 p.m.), all of the queen contestants will be introduced. The queen and two runners-up will be named and presented immediately following the grand entry at the rodeo performance on Saturday evening, after the judges have been introduced.

Mrs. JoAnn Liethen, general celebration chairman, and Delbert Garner, Arena Association chairman, invite all area residents to get into the "mood" by dressing in western clothes during the three-day celebration.

Rodeo Plans Revealed

At a meeting of Farwell Arena Association Monday night, final plans were made for the AJRA Rodeo being held in conjunction with the Border Town Days celebration, August 1, 2, 3. Rodeo performances will be held each evening at 8 p.m. during the celebration, according to Delbert Garner, president of the Arena Association. Price of admission is 50¢ for students, \$1.00 for adults, and no admission for pre-school children.

Rodeo headquarters are, as last year, at Magness Real Estate offices in east Farwell. Mrs. Julia Langford and Mrs. Sharron Hughes will be in the office handling entries of AJRA contestants.

Herbert Williams, Lubbock, a former Farwell resident, will

be master of ceremonies at the rodeo, Lexie Branscum of Earth will serve as flagman at the performances. Bucking judges are Don Randolph and Jerral James, both of Earth, and pick-up man is Ken Angle, also of Earth. Bucking stock for the shows will be furnished by Dick Ratjen. He will also furnish the dogging steers and the Arena Association will furnish all other animals for the performances. Mitz Walling will serve as arena director.

Events in which participants will be entered are calf roping, ribbon roping, breakaway roping, barrel racing, pole bending, flag race, bareback bronc riding, steer wrestling, and bull riding. Contestants will be divided into three age groups; 12 years of age and under, 13-15, and 16-19, in both boys and girls divisions.

All of the entry fees will be paid back in prize money to the contestants. In addition, hand tooled saddles will be presented to the best all-around cowboy and best all-around cowgirl, courtesy of Farwell Fertilizer, Olin Chemical and Farwell Equipment Co.

Six belt buckles will also be presented to the top contestants with a buckle going to the top boy and girl in each age group. Donors of the belt buckles are Nickels Gin, Williams Fertilizer, Mil and Mary's, Worley Grain, Tide Products, Inc. and Citizen's Bank of Clovis-Texico Branch.

A sportsmanship award will be presented to the boy or girl showing the best sportsmanship and best appearance. All awards will be presented following the final performance of the rodeo on Saturday night, Aug. 3. A representative from each of the

Swarms of green bugs rising in large numbers on Saturday created a "stir" among local residents. The bugs seemed to be feasting on the milo crops in the area. All agriculture representatives agree that some damage to the crops will result although just how much can not be determined until harvest time some two or three months away.

Green Bugs Swarm, Damage Local Crops

A phenomenon which is not often seen in this part of the country (first time ever) had area residents wondering Saturday, as what appeared to be small tornadoes made their appearance over the countryside.

Upon investigation the "tornadoes" proved to be swarms of green bugs. Mrs. Sarah Marsh at Monsanto Ag. Center, who was one of the first to notice the unusual activity, stated that the "swarms" would begin near the ground and rise in a funnel shape to the sky, finally disappearing into the distance. At times the bugs were so thick that one could scarcely get his breath, if he happened to be outside at the time.

The bugs were still swarming to some extent on Tuesday morning, but they had thinned out considerably.

Agronomists, elevator men, farmers and other agriculture men in the area were reluctant to make an estimate on the amount of damage done to the milo crop by the green bugs; however, they all agree that some damage was done - but since the crop is two or three months away from maturity, it is impossible to tell at this time just how much damage has been done.

Where the bugs came from and where they were headed remains a mystery.

Death Claims John Aldridge

John H. Aldridge, 63, a Farmer County resident for the past 62 years and prominent Farwell lawyer for many years, passed away at Parmer County Community Hospital in Friona early Sunday morning following a heart attack.

Funeral services were conducted from Hamlin Memorial Methodist Church in Farwell Tuesday at 2:30 p.m., with Rev. Hurshel Thurston, a longtime friend and retired Methodist minister, officiating, in absence of the local pastor. Burial was in the Aldridge plot in Bovina Cemetery, directed by Claborn Funeral Home of Friona.

John H. Aldridge was born in Watseka, Ill., March 5, 1905 and moved to Parmer County, settling at Bovina, with his parents, the late Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Aldridge, in 1906. The family moved to Farwell in 1918. He attended Bovina and Farwell Schools, graduating from Farwell High School. He later attended West Texas State Teachers College and the University of Texas, receiving a degree from the latter school in 1925.

Following graduation from the university, he returned to Farwell and studied abstracting in the office of Lawyer A. B. Crane and worked with his mother, who was then serving as county treasurer. It was from this beginning that the law firm and abstracting business of Aldridge-Aldridge-Harding was born.

Mr. Aldridge was elected county judge of Parmer County at the age of 23, making him the youngest man in the United States to serve in that capacity. After serving as county judge for two terms, he returned to

private practice; but in 1943 he was appointed to serve as district judge, succeeding James A. Witherspoon. He was later elected to the district judgeship and served one additional term. He then returned to his private law practice and abstracting business in which he was active at time of death.

In addition to being a well-known lawyer, he had served on the official board of Hamlin Memorial Methodist Church for many years, was a Mason and Shriner, and had worked with many civic organizations. He was a member of Hamlin Memorial Methodist Church.

Survivors include his widow, Lillina; two daughters, Mrs. Mary Belle Washington, Columbia, Mo., and Mrs. Nancy Mehler, Cleveland, Ohio; a brother, Sam Aldridge, Farwell; two grandchildren, Caroline Lee and Robert Aldridge Mehler; and his mother-in-law, Mrs. Jessie Orr, Moberly, Mo.

SCREWORM SITUATION -- Screwworm cases in Texas continue to crop up in South Texas. If cases go undetected, they could mean trouble ahead for livestock producers further to the north and west. Officials of the eradication program urge livestock producers to continue sending in worm samples from all animal wounds. Once a case is located immediate treatment of the area with sterile flies can stop further spread of the pest. Be alert.

FUNGUS COULD CAUSE THE TROUBLE -- Brown patch, a fungus which attacks St. Augustine lawns during the spring and fall seasons, could be the troublemaker for homeowners experiencing grass troubles. Dr. C.W. Horne, Extension plant pathologist, suggests an application of PCNB (Tertracolor) as soon as the disease is identified. It is characterized by a circular pattern in the lawn. The fungus kills only the leaves and normally does not attack the stolons.

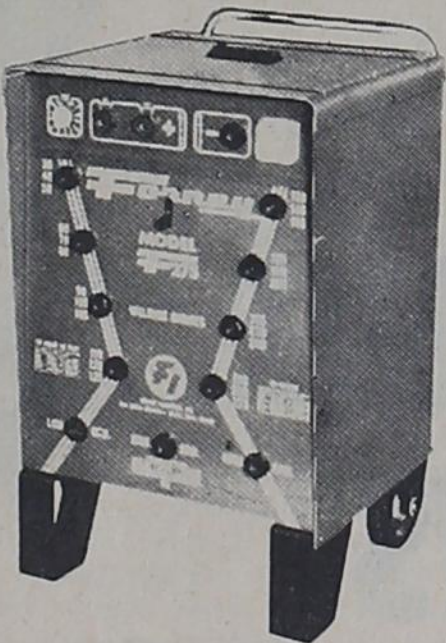

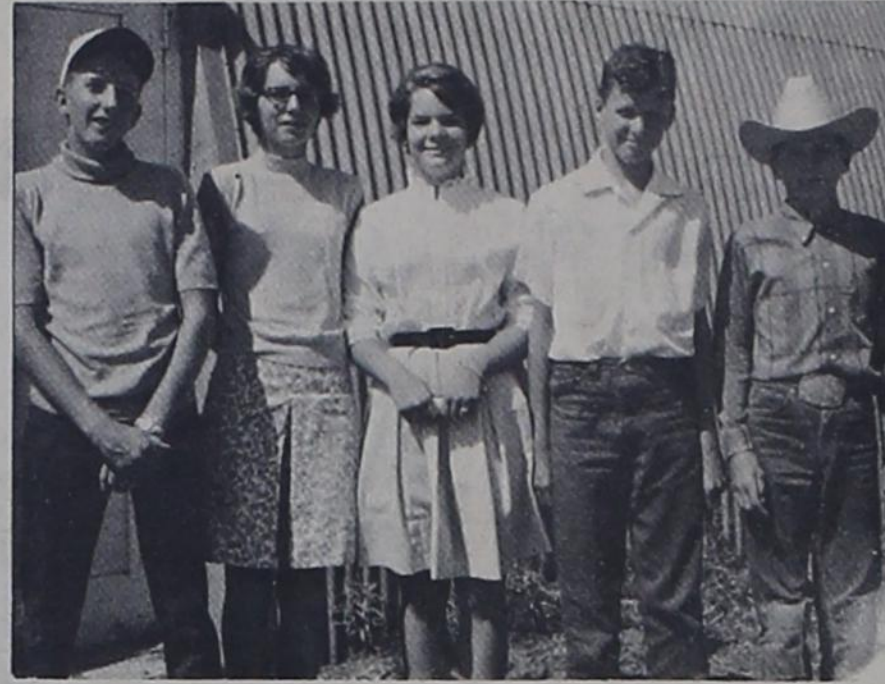
Officials Boost Border Town Days Celebration

Gift certificates will be awarded to winners in the tournament. All area golfers are invited to participate in the tournery, according to Deeds.

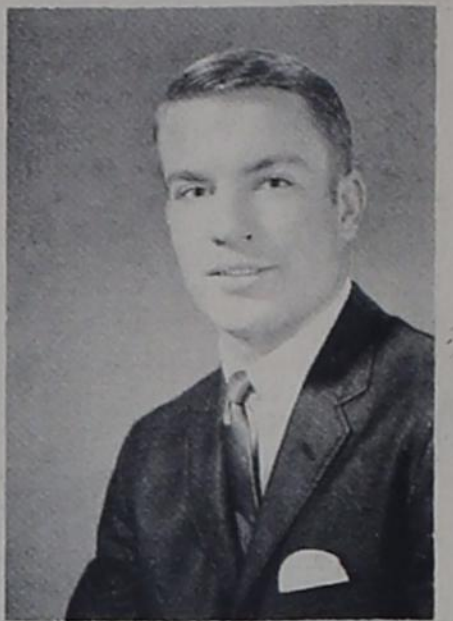
Attend Youth Seminar

C. C. Christians --

No Place Like Home

(By Chris Moss)

"Praise God from whom all blessings flow we have made it home and be it ever so humble there is no place like home" said Mrs. C. C. Christian upon arriving back in Texico-Farwell following a one month trip which took she and her husband, Clarence, to several states, inside the U. S. Proper, Canada and Hawaii.

The Christians left Farwell at 10:53 a.m. on May 27 and arrived back in their home town on June 28. They visited with several relatives and friends along the way and spent some time with their youngest daughter and son-in-law, Phyllis and Van Crume in Oak Harbor, Wash.

Mrs. Christian kept a day to day diary of the things they saw and did along the way. Arriving in California on May 29 they were taken on several tours by Christian's sister and brother-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. Roy Nix, former Farwell residents. Mrs. Christian comments that "we didn't even run over a movie star in the drive through Palm Springs." Other places of interest they visited were Disneyland, lemon groves near Santa Barbara, the Santa Barbara mountains, and a shopping trip to Macy's. She commented that the smog was so bad in the Santa Barbara area that "we could hardly see the sun."

On Sunday, June 2 the Christians attended church in Willett's Calif. and then drove through the Redwood Forrest as they continued their trek to Washington. On June 3 Mrs. Christian commented that "surely today we can get out of California - it sure is a long state." Finally arriving in Washington Mrs. Christian suggested that they take an eastern route to Seattle since they had been the other way - this they did and arrived at Port Townsend at 7 p.m. to find that the last ferry for the day had gone out at 5:20; therefore they were stranded there until the next morning.

Arriving in Oak Harbor, where their son-in-law is stationed with the Navy the Christians spent the next several days resting and listening to news of the Kennedy assassination. However, on June 8 they took a trip to Vancouver and Puget Sound and then came home to pack their bags for the plane flight to Hawaii.

The trip from Seattle to Hilo, in the Islands took only five and one half hours. Mrs. Christian describes the beauty of the flight and how the plane was met by Hawaiian girls who presented her with an orchid lei and also presented Clarence with a yellow floral lei and a "kiss" each. Clarence commented at this point "I'd recommend the trip highly!"

The Christians commented that in Hawaii they did indeed "live the life of Riley" with maids coming in to turn down covers on the beds and place orchids on the pillows.

They were privileged to visit the largest orchid nursery in the world, rainbow falls, volcano and lava beds, banana, coffee and pineapple plantations and also attend various programs which had been planned for the benefit of the tour group

before leaving Kona Island. They also took a ride in a glass bottom boat along the coastline of Kona and saw the coral formations.

On June 12 they left Kona and landed on Maui where they took a bus trip to "The Needle" a fern-covered volcanic spire. Along the route they saw fields and fields of sugar cane and pineapple. They also saw the "Carthagean" a floating museum used in the picture "Hawaii", and visited the old prison where the whalers spent time. Mrs. Christian comments that Maui is a more beautiful island than Kona.

On Kauai island the Christians soaked their feet in the "Old Pacific" and visited the harbor, fish ponds, an old sugar mill (chewed sugar cane), and also visited Warhea Canyon, the grand canyon of Hawaii. Here they also visited "Spouting Horn" a salt water geyser, and a flower garden which had over 3000 kinds of plants growing. Grand finale of the tour on June 13 was a boat ride up the Aialua River to the Fern grotto, fern growing down in a cave. Here the natives sang lovely songs, native girls did the Hula as the tour group made the 20 minute flight to Honolulu.

Although the Christians liked the natural beauty of the other islands better they took a tour of the city, visited the capital building (which will soon

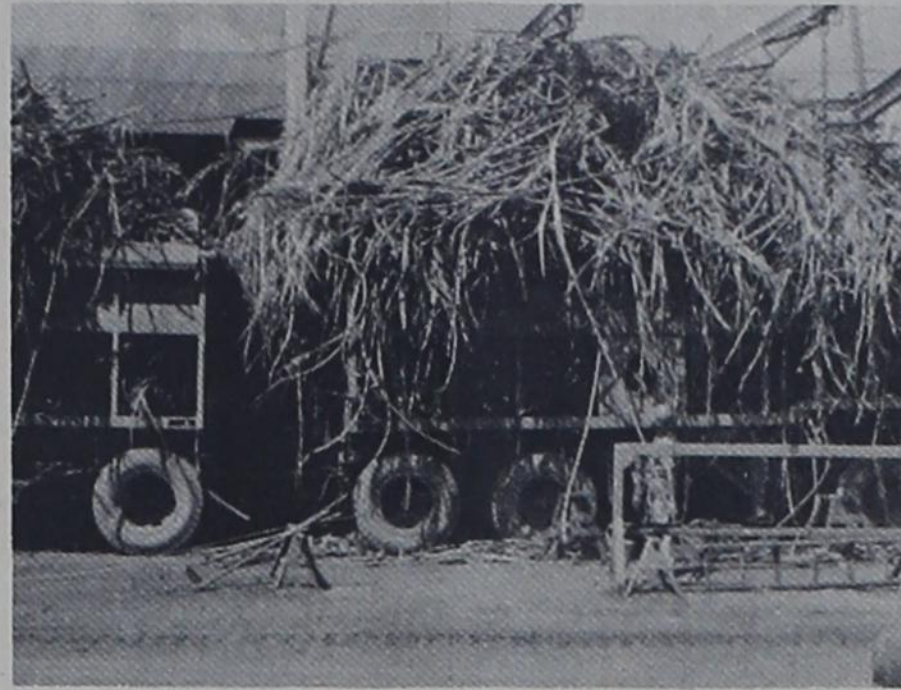
become a museum - as soon as the old one is finished); visited the homes of affluent citizens of Hawaii, and took a trip to the National Cemetery where Ernie Pyle is buried. They also took a trip to Pearl Harbor-which brought back memories of that tragic day in 1941.

On the last day in the islands they went shopping in the largest shopping center in the world (155 shops) and also shopped in the International shopping center. Favorite food for Mrs. Christian was the papaya (similar to a cantaloupe) except that it tasted similar to apricot. On the return trip on the plane Mrs. Christian stated that after a fine meal she curled up and went to sleep only to awake to the red glow in the east heralding the coming of day (three hours difference in time 3:25 in Hawaii-6:25 in Washington).

The next few days after arriving back on the Mainland were spent in resting and doing the thousand and one things necessary after such a trip. However, later that week they ac-

companied by their daughter, Phyllis and son-in-law, Van, made a trip to British Columbia where they visited the San Juan Islands, the Buchart Gardens (most beautiful I have

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Chas Oakleys Are Modern Day Betsy Rosses

Flags of any size or kind is the unusual hobby of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Oakley of Clovis, who not only collect them, but also make them. The Oakleys are loaning their flag collection to be used in the Border Towns Days parade in Texico-Farwell on August 1.

The Clovis couple has been collecting designs and making flags for about eight years, ever since Chas had a heart attack and decided to take up a hobby in which they could both participate. The Oakleys have the largest known private collection of flags that have flown over America.

The flag collection first began with small flags (4 by 6 inches) mounted on 12-inch poles in small wooden blocks. Chas still uses these when he makes displays for small groups.

The Oakleys have now amassed a collection of 92 large (3 by 5 foot) flags, and expect to add at least ten more in the near future. The flags range from the Viking flag of 1,000 A.D. to the current American flag. Also included in the collection are the 27 designs of the stars and stripes, the only collection of its kind in the world, Chas said.

"We found the stars and stripes designs from many sources such as old, old newspapers, magazines, museums, and various people." Chas is sure the collection is the only one of its kind in the world because he once wrote to the Smithsonian Institute and the Library of Congress for the designs. Each replied to contact the other since they did not have them.

Chas said, "No agency, Federal or otherwise, designed the stars and stripes until 1912. They were designed by the manufacturers, and when a new flag was made, the old ones were

immediately destroyed as there was no market for them."

Of the 92 large flags, the Oakleys have purchased 50 and made 42. They purchased the raw material from a flag manufacturer. The material, red, white and blue nylon, is then cut to the correct size for the stripes and canton. The Oakleys then stitch them together, add the gold fringe and the pole sleeve. Chas designs the location of the stars and they then embroider them on the blue field of the canton. It takes approximately three weeks to complete a flag.

Mrs. Oakley's favorite in the collection is the French Fleur-de-Lis. She designed and made the flag of fine silk and is especially proud of it. Chas says his favorite is the Bedford Flag which the Minute Men used and the one Ralph Waldo Emerson wrote about when he composed the Bedford Hymn.

"By the rude bridge that arched the flood, Their flag to April's breeze unfurled,

"Where once the embattled farmer stood, And fired the shot heard round the world!"

The large flags, kept in four large storage boxes are insured for \$10,000. The 92 flags have cost the Oakleys approximately \$4,000, with purchased cotton State Flags costing some \$800 including the poles.

Chas has display stands made of wood for all the flags where he can display the flags either six inches or one foot apart. When displayed one foot apart, the flags take up 100 feet of space, and "It's hard to find a large enough space to display them."

In the past few years Chas has given over 200 lectures on "Flags of America". He stated, "I thoroughly enjoy telling

people about them, and have received hundreds of letters from individuals and groups who have enjoyed hearing about them."

Chas and his wife, Leola, have recently compiled a booklet telling about the flags which have flown over America. The booklet also tells about the rules and regulations of the use of the flag, the American Creed, the Pledge of Allegiance, the Statue of Liberty, the Liberty Bell, the President's Flag, and the Great Seal of the United States, and many other items concerning the American Flag.

The booklet covers about 40 pages and at the present time the Oakleys are seeking to get it published.

On June 12 the Oakleys loaned their flags to Cannon Air Force Base personnel to carry in the "All America Flag Day" parade and Chas delivered the patriotic address.

Yes, truly Chas and Leola Oakley have combined their time and talent into a highly self-satisfying hobby; for while enjoying themselves, they have also learned a lot about their country.

They are one of the few fam-

ilies in the area who practice what they preach; weather permitting, they fly the flag of their country daily.

As Chas has said in one of his talks, "Faith in God, the desire to worship faithfully and freely according to the dictates

of one's own conscience inspired the birth of our Nation. And to this day, every hymn, every prayer, every act of reverence and service and sacrifice which flows from our hearts toward God, lifts the torch of freedom higher and higher and fans its flame to a brighter gleam!"

On The Farm In Palmer County

DIAGNOSTIC WORKSHOP AUGUST 1

A workshop set up to identify and solve specific problems in plant nutrition and fertilizer use will be held at South Plains Research and Extension Center Thursday, August 1.

The day-long workshop, aimed at West Texas fertilizer dealers and agricultural leaders, will consist of two sessions and will begin at 9 a.m., announces Jim Valentine, area soil chemist with Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

The morning session will deal with crop production considerations as related to fertilizer use. In the afternoon, participants will receive first-hand information on diagnosing nutrient deficiencies and related problems.

Discussions on soil fertility, soil testing, weeds, education, research and coordination of the research-education effort will highlight the morning session.

Highlighting the afternoon portion will be a presentation on nutrient deficiency symptoms and herbicidal effects and how to identify these. Also on the agenda will be discussions on soil physical conditions and climate and diseases and nematodes. Demonstrations on tissue testing and on the effectiveness of soil testing will conclude the workshop.

A slate of noted speakers will headline the two sessions. They include such Texas A&M University officials as Dr. John E. Hutchison, Extension director; Dr. Morris E. Bloodworth, head of the Department of Soil and Crop Sciences; and Dr. Charles Welch, Extension soil chemist.

Officials from the SPREC on the program include Dr. Arthur Onken, soil fertility researcher; Elmer Hudspeth, agricultural engineer; Dr. Robert Berry, Extension area plant pathologist; Dr. Charles Wendt, soil and water researcher; and Valentine.

Billy C. Gunter, Extension District 2 agricultural agent, will welcome the workshop participants. Chairmen for the two sessions will be W. W. Grisham, Jr., Extension District 1 agricultural agent, and Tom Beck,

manager of agricultural chemical sales, Diamond Shamrock Oil and Gas Corp., Amarillo.

The workshop is being jointly sponsored by Texas Plant Food Educational Society and Texas A&M's Agricultural Extension Service and Agricultural Experiment Station in support of the Panhandle Economic Program (PEP) and the South Plains Development Program (SPD).

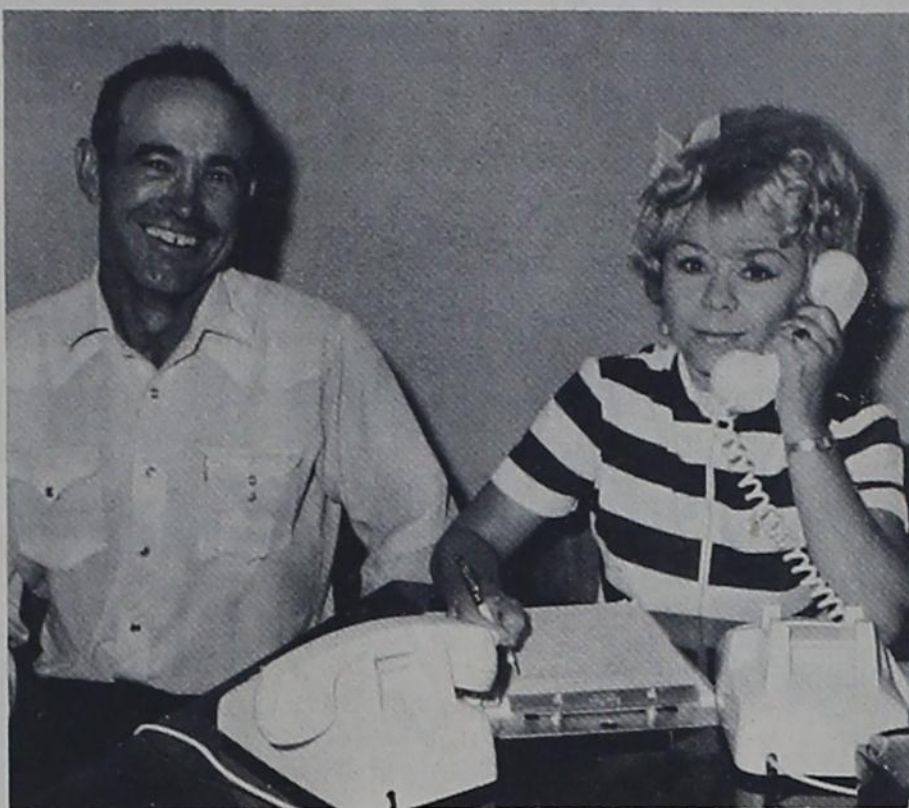
