The concept of responsible citizenship and service with others has always been a basic one in Girl Scouting. Today's Girl Scouts are involved in projects to help close the gaps separating economic, racial, cultural and age groups.

Texico-Farwell Brownies, Junior Girl Scouts and Senior Girl Scouts have worked this year to serve the local communities by representing the

area at Our Cabana in Mexico, entering the first place float in the Border Town Days parade and presenting a Texas flag to Farwell Elementary School.

Cadette Girl Scouts were active until November of 1972, but the group disbanded when the girls found themselves trying to do too many things. Reta Dollar was leader of the troop.

Sheriff's Dept. Active - -

Trailer, Tool Thefts Abundant In County

Parmer County Sheriff's officers investigated the theft of several items from the Gary Coker home north and east of Lazbuddie Tuesday, March 6. A G. E. radio, some towels and sheets and a man's sport coat, brown in color, were apparently taken from the house Monday, March 5.

Officers are also investigating thefts from several places between Farwell and Lazbuddie. All of the thefts took place Wednesday, Feb. 28. Reported missing are a Sears battery from an irrigation motor owned by Hubert Gohlke of Oklahoma Lane community, boxes of tools from a pickup owned by Freeman Davis of Lazbuddie and from a tractor owned by Lloyd Routon of Oklahoma Lane, and a tape player from a car owned by Joe Rodriguez of Oklahoma Lane.

Six persons were transported Friday, March 2, to Huntsville by Sheriff's officers. They were Charles Archie, 20, of Clovis, whose probation was revoked and who will be serving a three-year sentence stemming from two counts of theft a year and a half ago; Gwin Askew, 26, and Letha Johnson, 27, both of Clovis, who were tried Friday in District Court and each given four year sentences for burglary of the Riley Goodnough home in December.

Also, Clifford Steele, 25, of Bovina, whose probation was revoked earlier will serve a three-year sentence for burglary of Sherley-Anderson-Pitman Elevator and Truitt Hardage's Barber Shop. Jessie Parker, Jr., 28, of Clovis will serve a two-year sentence on a burglary charge stemming from a burglary of the Teddy White farm north of Friona. He was sentenced by a jury.

Mrs. Atchley Services In Okla. Lane

Funeral services for Mrs. Cecil (Myrtle) Atchley, 60, of the Lariat community were Friday afternoon in the Oklahoma Lane Methodist Church with Rev. Oran Smith, pastor, officiating. Burial was in Oklahoma Lane Cemetery under the direction of Singleton-Ellis Funeral Home of Muleshoe.

Mrs. Atchley passed away Wednesday, Feb. 28, at West Plains Memorial Hospital in Muleshoe following a lengthy illness.

She had been a resident of the Lariat community since 1920 moving there from Paducah. She was born April 20, 1912, at Emory in Rains County, Tex.

Mrs. Atchley worked as a replacement at the former Lariat Post Office. For many years she attended Oklahoma Lane Methodist Church where she was a member.

She married Cecil Atchley May 6, 1929, in Farwell.

Col. Sandvick was shot down over North Vietnam on August 7, 1966, while a member of the "Wild Weasel" fighter pilot group flying the F105 fighter plane. He was listed as Missing in Action for almost four years, and it wasn't until early in 1970 that he was definitely reported to be a prisoner.

His wife, the former Shirley Ham of Farwell, and their son Warren, age 10, have lived in Farwell where Warren attends Farwell schools. Sandvick's mother is now living in Coeue

d'Alene, Idaho, but he was born in Frazer, Mont.

Upon arrival at Clark Air Base in the Philippines, Col. Sandvick was allowed to call and talk with his wife and son. He reported that he was well, in good spirits and happy and excited to be "home". His family said he sounded "wonderful" and they were anxiously awaiting their reunion.

At press time it was known that Col. Sandvick had been flown to an Air Force Base in the United States where his

wife and son will be on hand to greet him. It is not known at this time when he will be able to visit in Farwell as medical checkups and intelligence debriefings will require some time to complete.

At a later date, the Chambers of Commerce of Farwell and Texico will declare a "Flag Day" for the Twin Cities and ask that all businesses and homes fly the national flag as a token of respect and honor for Col. Sandvick.

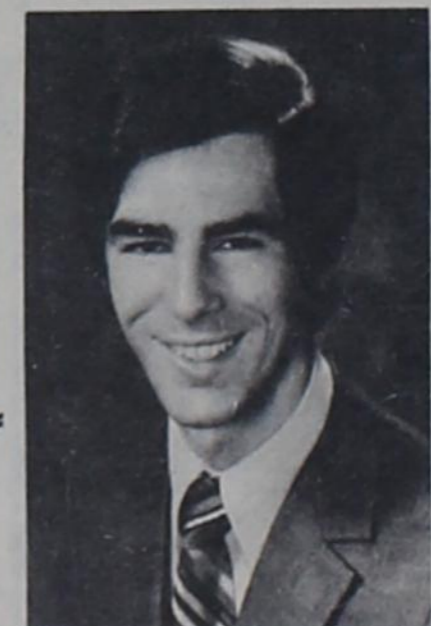
Mike Toby, evangelist from Pasadena, Tex., will be leading the revival. He is a student at

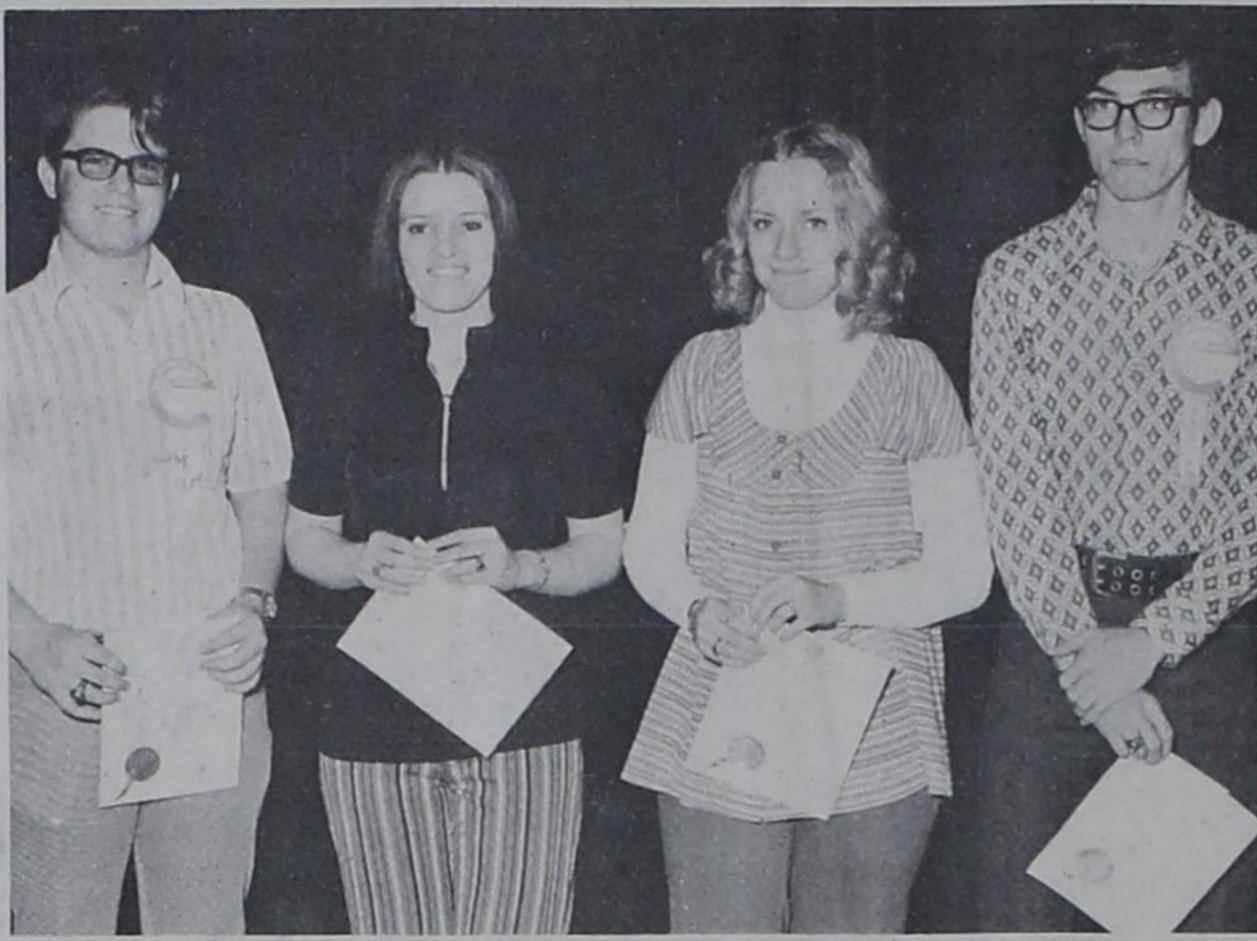

The county SWCD participa-

tion in the programs is based on the District's activities in 1972.

The year 1972 was an active and diversified year for presenting conservation to the farmers in the Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation District, according to officials.

High point of the year was the Final Acre Ceremony Held at Parmerton, a central point in the county, it signified the completion of the field work for the Standard Soils Survey in Parmer County. An attractive brochure was prepared to publicize the event and was distributed throughout the county.

When the four attained the rank of Senior Scouts, they had completed two years as Juniors and three years as Cadettes. Two girls were First Class Scouts because they had completed all requirements as Cadettes. They wear first class pins on their Senior uniforms.

The Seniors use a Wheel of Opportunity from which to

choose their programs. They chose "Panorama" as their special interest.

"Panorama" means a wide, unbroken view, a survey, a continuously changing scene. The panorama plan is for those troops wanting variety rather than specialization. Inspiration for the year's activities is drawn from the project suggestions of all eight major interests listed on the Wheel of Opportunities.

Service is one of the most important aspects of Girl Scouting. Each girl goes out on her own to be a service aide. After 50 hours of service she receives an aide bar to wear.

Local Senior Scouts have contributed 450 hours of service. Among the four girls, there are nine service aide bars.

The aide bars include office aide, library aide, public relations aide and laboratory aide. Miss London has office and laboratory aide bars; Miss Nance, office, laboratory, public relations and library aide bars; Miss Warren, office and public relations aide bars; and Miss Crook, public relations aide bar.

During the past summer, three Senior Scouts, Misses Crook, Warren and Nance were among girls chosen to represent Lubbock Girl Scout Council for seven days at Our Cabana in Mexico.

During three days of guided tours in Mexico City, the girls collected knowledge of the Mexican culture and gave of their time to service projects.

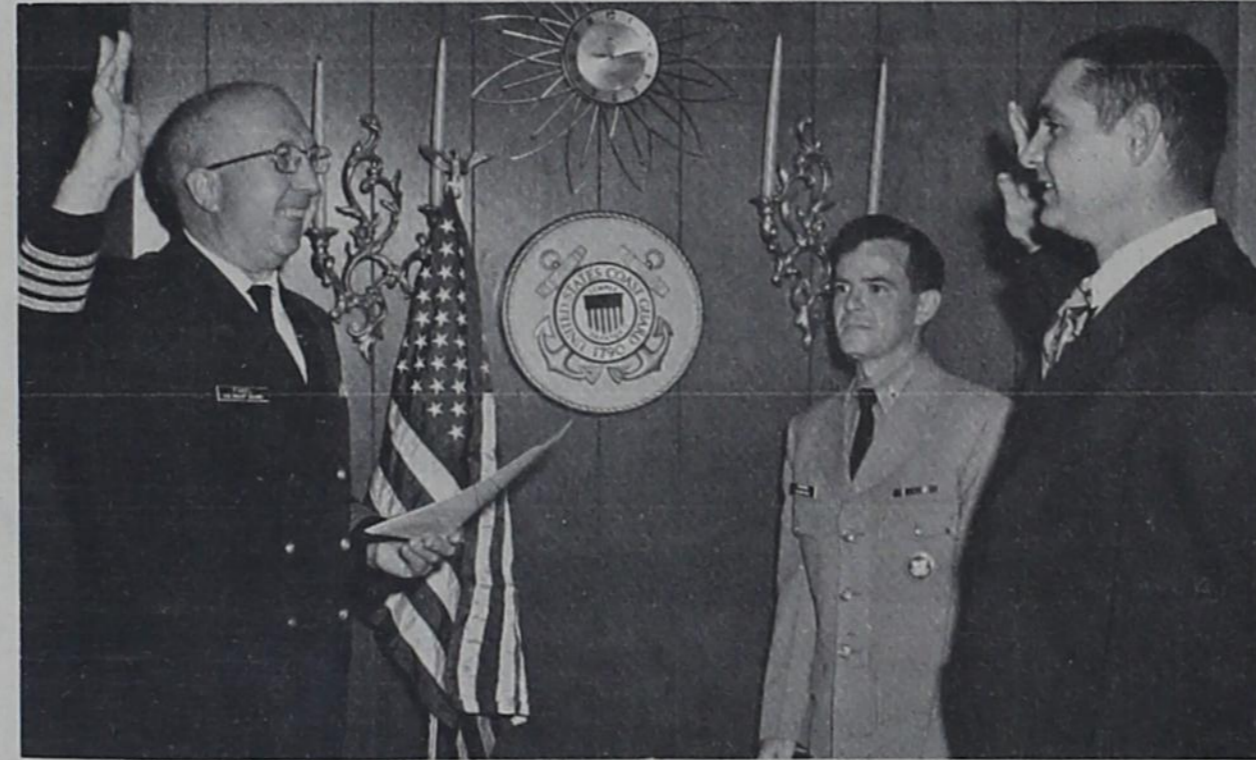
Radioman Petty Officer Armstrong left the same day to assume his duties in com-

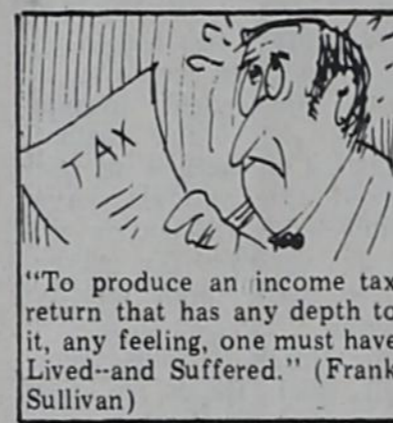

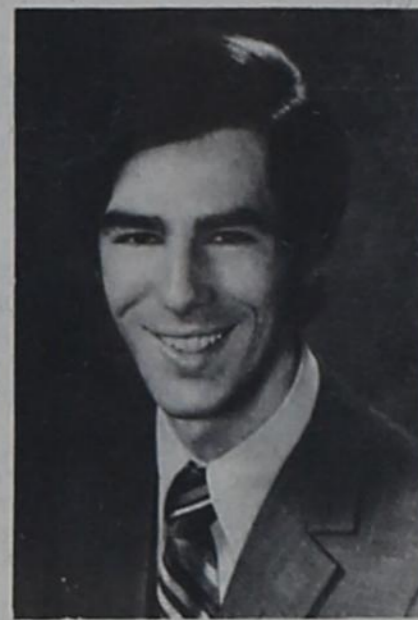

Texico Girl Honored As Betty Crocker Homemaker

Marilyn Walters, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. B. Walters of Clovis, has been named Texico High School's Betty Crocker Homemaker of Tomorrow. She is a senior at Texico.

She was selected by score in a written knowledge and attitude examination taken by both senior boys and girls on Dec. 5, 1972. She will receive a specially designed award from General Mills, sponsor of the annual Betty Crocker Search for American Homemakers of Tomorrow. In addition, she remains eligible for state and national honors.

The State Homemaker of Tomorrow, to be chosen from all school winners in the state in judging centering on performance in the Dec. 5 test, will receive a \$1,500 college scholarship. A 20-volume reference work, "The Annals of America," will also be presented to the state winner's school by Encyclopaedia Britannica Educational Corporation. The second-ranking student in the state will receive a \$500 scholarship.

In late April, the 51 Betty Crocker Homemakers of Tomorrow representing every state and the District of Columbia - each accompanied by a faculty adviser - will gather in Washington, D. C., for an expense-paid tour of the capital city and Colonial Williamsburg, Va. Culminating the tour will be announcement of the 1973 Betty Crocker All-American Homemaker of Tomorrow and three runners-up. To be selected through personal observation and interviews during the tour plus state-level judging results,

they will be awarded increases in their scholarships to \$5,000, \$4,000, \$3,000 and \$2,000.

Instituted in last year's Betty Crocker Search, a \$1,000 Nutrition Scholarship is included in the program again this year. Recipient of this grant will be the participating student who is planning a college major in nutrition or a related field, ranks among the highest in his or her state on the overall examination and,

from those meeting these two criteria, achieves the top score on the Test's nutrition questions.

A total of 665,600 seniors were enrolled in this year's Search, the first in which boys were eligible to participate. Since the program began in the 1954-55 school year, approximately nine million students have taken part and, with this year's grants, scholarship awards will exceed \$2 million.

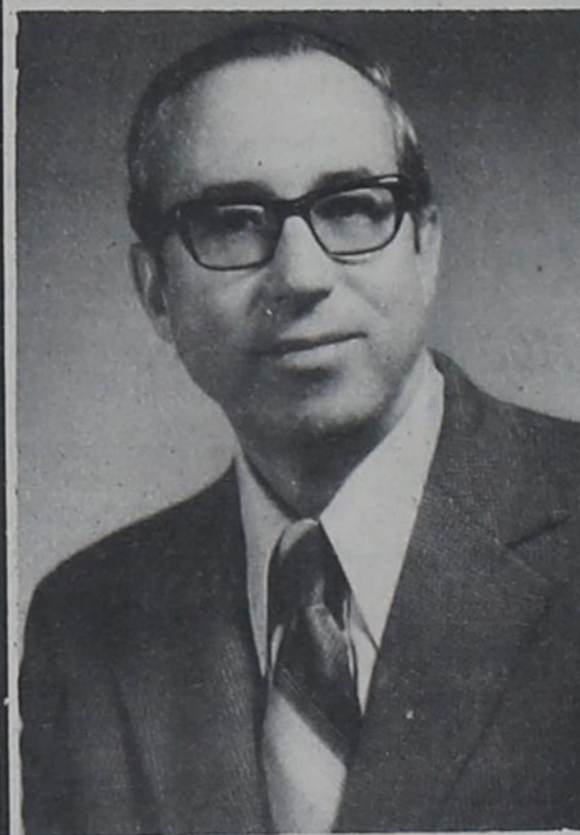

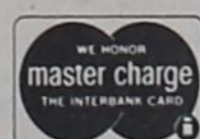

SCS Releases 2nd Report

Soil Conservation Service in Parmer County has just completed its second wind erosion report for the present blow season, according to Herb Evans, District Conservationist. "We consider the blow season from November to May," Evans said.

This report shows that conditions in Parmer County are the worst in years for blowing to occur. We have good moisture conditions, but the soil surface has been "fluffed up" by freezing. Also the moisture we have has come as snow and has not packed the surface at all, continued Evans. Another reason for the blowing conditions is there has been more burning of crop residues than normal. It is common knowledge that the worst wind erosion is in burned fields.

Another point covered in this report was the wind storm of Jan. 27. It was the worst in years. "We are all thankful for the large amounts of residues still on the surface in the county," Evans concluded.

DOES MISERY LOVE COMPANY?

We have all heard the statement: "Misery loves company." It is true that when one is sick or in trouble, he does not feel quite so sorry for himself when he realizes that others are as unfortunate, and perhaps more so than he.

However, some have used this phrase: "Misery loves company," in speaking lightly of hell. Perhaps you have heard someone say: "Well, if I go to hell, at least I'll have lots of company." This is true, but the company the lost will have when cast out of God's presence will hardly afford them comfort.

The Bible story of the rich man and Lazarus brings this fact out with great force. The rich man, you will remember, "fared sumptuously every day," while Lazarus "was laid at his gate, full of sores, desiring to be fed with the crumbs which fell from the rich man's table."

In the process of time, both died and the rich man, having felt no need of salvation, suddenly was made to experience God's wrath upon sin, for the sacred record says: "In hell he lifted up his eyes, being in torments"

(Luke 16:23). From his place of torment, the rich man saw Lazarus with Abraham "afar off" but this surely afforded little comfort, while we do read that "Lazarus was comforted." The rich man, still with haughty superiority, asked Abraham to send Lazarus back to earth to warn his five brothers "lest they come into this place of torment." He did not wish his brothers to join him in hell. "Misery" among those cast out of God's presence, then, does not "love company."

The story is brought to a close as Abraham refuses the rich man's request, explaining that if his brothers did not hear the Word of God "neither will they be persuaded though one rose from the dead" (Luke 16:31).

The way to avoid the lot of the rich man, then, is to believe the Word of God, particularly that part of the Word which tells how Christ died for our sins that we might be justified by grace through faith. Don't be fooled by the old adage: "Misery loves company." Receive Christ as your Savior today. "Believe on the Lord Jesus Christ and thou shalt be saved" (Acts 16:31).

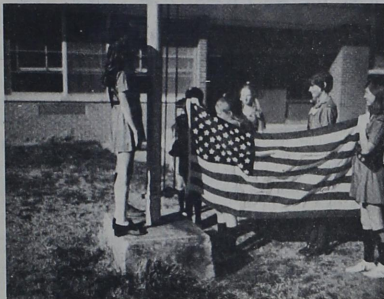
