Gil Patschke is the new mayor of the City of Farwell. He was elected Tuesday in what Janie Bowery, Farwell city clerk, terms a record vote. Patschke received 98 votes to win the two-year term of mayor. One-hundred eighty-five votes were cast in the city officer election Tuesday. "This number is almost three times as many votes as have ever been cast in a city officer election," Mrs. Bowery said. She noted that the most votes ever cast in an election for the

City of Farwell was in a special sales tax election. Ninety-eight votes were cast then. The highest number of votes cast in a city officer election, previous to Tuesday, was 62, said Mrs. Bowery. J. T. Ford, Patschke's official opponent received 82 votes. Clyde Magness received one write-in vote for mayor. In the commissioners' race, Fred Chandler was re-elected

for another two-year term. He received 95 votes. Jim Berry was also elected commissioner. He received 106 votes. Others in the running were L. R. Vincent, 28 votes; B. V. "Shorty" Hughes, 60 votes; and Richard Deel, 69 votes. Vincent was seeking re-election. The three new city officers took their oath of office Wednesday morning from Mrs. Bowery.

More interest in all phases of government than ever before was thought by Mrs. Bowery to be the reason for such a good voter turnout. "Well-publicized happenings nationwide have caused people to sit up and take notice of their government during the past year," she said.

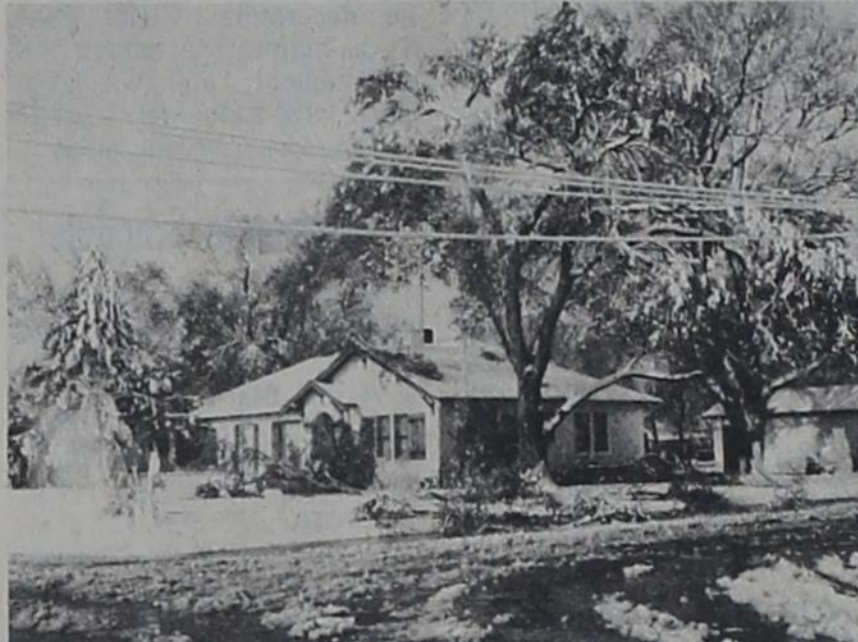

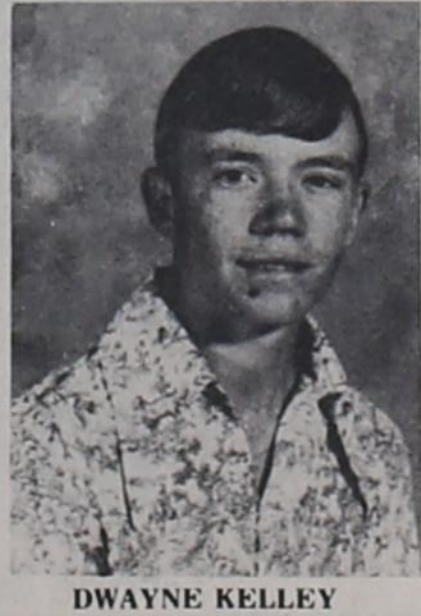

## Texico Teams Second In Melrose Track Meet

Texico High School varsity and junior high track teams each won second place at Melrose Saturday during the Buffalo Relays for varsity teams and Little Buffalo Relays for junior high teams.

Texico varsity tracksters accumulated 76 points to win second place. According to Coach Bucky Walters, Tatum was third with some 40 points. He mentioned that New Mexico is on a 10-7 point system whereas Texas is on a 20-10 point system.

Ten points are given for first places in relay events and seven for individual first places in the New Mexico point system. In Texas, first places in relays receive double the points individual first places receive.

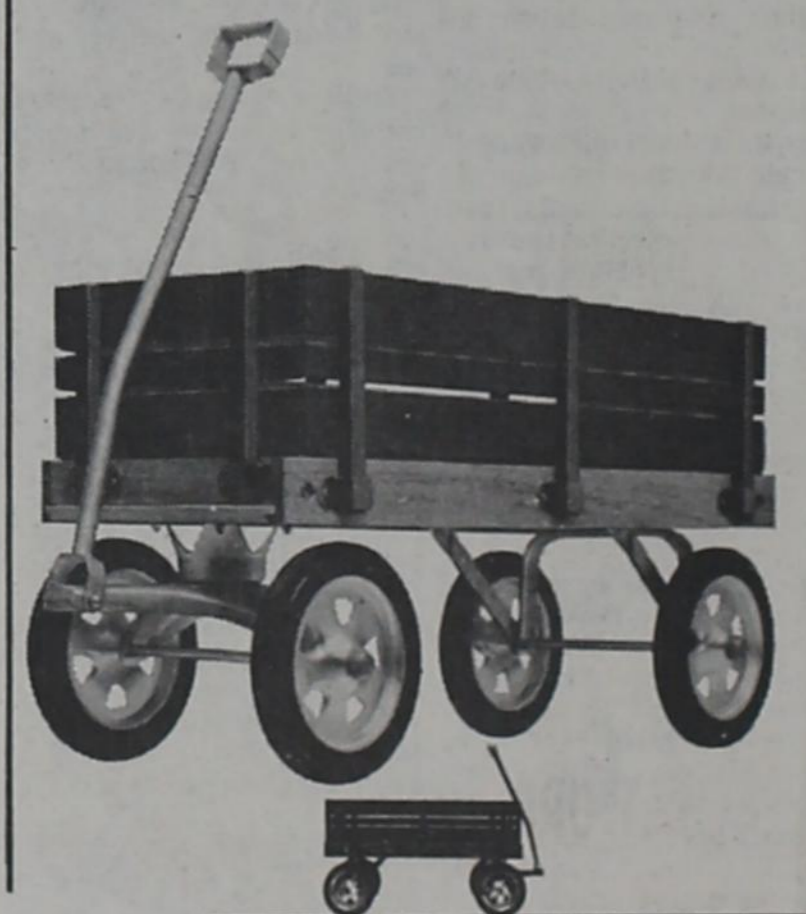

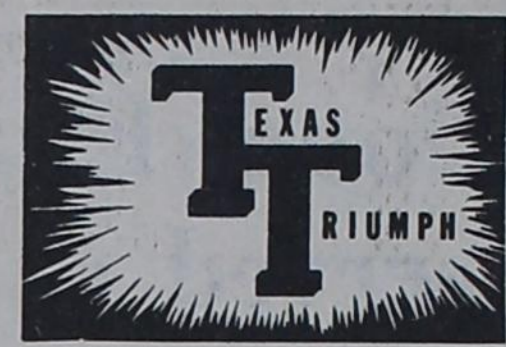

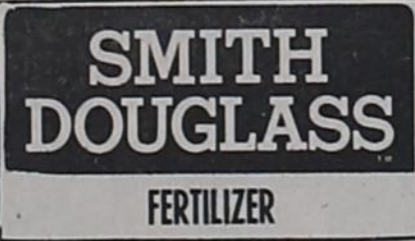

**At Home In Parmer County**

With all we hear about this vitamin and that supplement and oftentimes about quacking in the food supplement and health food business, I thought you might like to see the following information from our specialists in College Station.

Contrary to advertisements, there's little foundation for claiming vitamin E a miracle cure-all.

"Although this nutrient is essential for good health, it isn't everything it's promoted as being," Karen Kreipke, foods and nutrition specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University, contended.

"Studies and clinical trails fail to link vitamin E with 'curing' heart disease, cystic fibrosis, blood disorders, leg ulcers, diabetes and miscarriages," she emphasized.

"Actually, very little is known about the vitamin. "It functions in the body as an antioxidant and helps red blood cells live as long as they should.

"Small amounts of the vitamin are stored in various body organs, muscle and fat tissues. "A fat-soluble vitamin, it requires presence of fat and bile salts for absorption.

"There's little chance that a person eating a well-balanced diet will lack vitamin E since most common foods contain modest amounts," Miss Kreipke added.

"Estimated adult daily requirement is 25-30 International Units - the average U. S. diet furnished 2-66 I.U. daily.

"Best food sources are leafy vegetables, whole-grain food products and fats - especially vegetable oils," the specialist concluded.

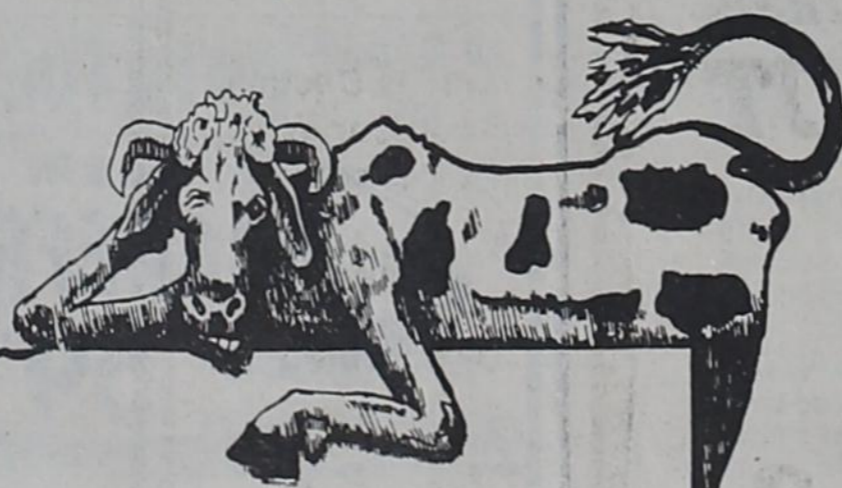

Buses are the main mode of travel in Spain, according to Dempster. He mentioned that there were very few cars. The ones he saw were very small.

A warm temperature, 59-65 degrees in the spring, which is the current season, allows the Spaniards to raise citrus fruits, grapes, sugar beets, ensilage, German Millet and rye, Dempster said.

SEALED WITH THE SPIRIT

"In whom ye also trusted, after that ye heard the Word of truth, the gospel of your salvation: In whom also, after that ye believed, ye were sealed with that Holy Spirit of promise."

Most English translations of the Bible make it clear that the words "after that," in the above passage, actually have an immediate result in view. Upon hearing (or "heeding") we believed, and upon believing we were sealed with the Spirit.

What is perhaps even more important to note, is the fact that upon believing "the gospel of . . . salvation," we are "sealed WITH" the "Holy Spirit," not "by" the Spirit. There is a difference between the two, which can be simply illustrated.

Here is a housewife, let us say, who is "putting up" jam or preserves and sealing each jar with wax. Now, the jars are being sealed "by" the woman, but she is sealing them "with" wax. Thus it is not merely that the Holy Spirit causes believers to be sealed and made secure. Rather He Himself is the Seal that keeps us eternally secure as God's loving children. We are sealed, not "by the Spirit," but "with the Spirit"—the Spirit Himself the Seal.

It is wonderful indeed to know that before the bar of God, the simplest believer in Christ has been fully justified (Acts 13:38,39). But this is a court action, a matter of record. Besides this, the Spirit, who first brought the sinner under conviction, now gives him life—eternal life. This is why Rom. 1:2 tells us that "the law of the Spirit—(that) of life in Christ, hath made me free from the law of sin and death." Thank God for the Spirit, who convicts, regenerates and seals believers in Christ!
