

Tax Valuations Up For City of Farwell

The addition of personal property to the tax rolls, coupled with a natural increase from growth of the city, has resulted in a substantial increase in property valuations for tax purposes in Farwell.

 City assessor Wilfred Quickel reports that the town has recently been re-appraised, and that at a public meeting of the board of equalization last week, no protests were heard.

Six property owners showed up at the meeting, but after hearing the explanation of the city's action, voiced no objection.

The valuation of real property is up from \$890,000 in 1954 to \$1,200,000 for 1955. Personal property, which will be on the rolls for the first time this year, is valued at \$313,000.

Continued progress on the extensive inventory of ground water supplies by the High Plains **Underground Water Conservation** District has brought further proof that Parmer County's share of underground water resources is bouiltiful.

This week, "The Cross Section," official publication of the District, announced that a survey for Castro County-Parmer's neighbor to the east-has been completed, and that the survey indicates that there are 15,900,-000 acre-feet of water in storage beneath that county in the Ogal-

alla formation. The inventory of Parmer County's resources, taken several months ago, indicated that this county's storage totals 16,300,000

acre-feet. Parmer County was the first county to be so studied by District hydraulic engineers. Deaf Smith is the only other

county in which study has been made public. Last month, the District announced that county's storage as being 13,700,000 acrefeet.

These loss leaders are used as a legitimate attraction for store traffic, the theory being that once the housewife is inside the store, she will make purchases other than the "specials," and the groceryman items.

Raising grain sorghum for a cash crop under irrigated conditions is considered a fairly rigorous and exacting job by thousands of High Plains farmers, but the truth is, "they ain't seen nothin' " until they view the complications that certified seed growers run into.

The seed farm of Walter Watson which is three miles east of Lariat is a good example. A

visitor to the farm who is unfamiliar with the processes used in producing certified grain sorghum seed would be surprised at some of the things he would see.

Probably the most striking view on the farm at this time is the sight of thousands upon thousands of brown paper bags which have been tediously slip-

ped over the heads of the grain and clipped securely in place. This process is known simply as "bagging," and is performed for the purpose of insuring the purity of the seed. As the grain is self-pollinating the bag serves

to insure that pollen from no other plant nearby interferes with the LEGALcontrolled reproduction processes. The bagged seed is known as



Harvesting, incidentally, is quite a piece of work in itself. The bagged heads are cut by hand and taken from the field to be threshed separately from the remainder of the grain.

Then, the unbagged grain is combined in the conventional manner. It's quite an interesting departure from the typical cash-crop operations of the Plains with which most people are familiar.
