## Education Agency --

### School Accreditation Team Gives Praise, Condemnation

Farwell Independent School System Superintendent W. M. Roberts received a report recently from a school accreditation team which visited the school here in late November.

The lengthy report lauded the school system for improvements, yet cited a list of necessary improvements to be made at the school.

According to the report issued by the three-man team, the Farwell Independent School District has a total assessed valuation of \$13,818,366, which represents 39 percent of the market value. The tax rate of \$2 provides \$1.50 for maintenance and operation and 50 cents for retirement of a \$673,000 bonded debt.

It further listed a 1973-74 budget of \$569,368 to serve a school system employing a professional staff of 39 persons. With the instructional program housed on a single site of approximately 10 city blocks, the Farwell School also uses an additional three-acre site, with a barn, in conjunction with its vocational agriculture program.

The accreditation team described each building in the Farwell school complex and commented, "Most of the district's facilities appeared to have received adequate preventative maintenance and custodial care. The grounds were free of debris and well-maintained. There was maximum utilization of the facilities and a free flow of students at all levels."

inherent in small schools, was that the variety of course offerings and extra-curricular activities was restricted by the number of staff members, students, and facilities, even though total school offerings and activities were made available to all students."

It continued, "The seventh grade electives were band and remedial reading; whereas eighth grade electives included band and a second year each of science and physical education. For eighth grade students not in the band, the district offered homemaking for girls and industrial arts shop for boys. While the curriculum for grades seven and eight provided for instruction in all required subjects and technically met minimum requirements for elective courses, the limited nature of these electives did not fulfill the intent of accreditation standards. On the day of the visit, two violations of accreditation standards were observed: (1) a seventh grade mathematics class had an enrollment of 42

## Burn Victim --

### Frocia Lindop Dies; Funeral Thursday

Mrs. George (Frocia Mae) Lindop, 76, who was critically burned in a fire at her home on Friday, Jan. 4, died Monday, Jan. 14 in the Burn Center at Bernalillo County Medical Center in Albuquerque.

A native of Sherman, Tex., Mrs. Lindop had moved to

Farmer County in 1932 from Electra. In 1933, the Lindops moved to the Oklahoma Lane community where they resided until they retired in 1959 and moved into Farwell. Her husband, George Lindop, died on December 24, 1968. She was a member of the Oklahoma Lane Demonstration Club.

Funeral services were conducted at 2 p.m. Thursday in Hamlin Memorial Methodist Church in Farwell with Rev. W.T. Perry, pastor, officiating. Burial was in the Oklahoma Lane Cemetery under direction of Steed-Tood of Clovis.

Survivors include a son, Tom, of Farwell; five grandchildren, Diane Lindop of Clovis; David Lindop of Mesa, Ariz.; Jeanette Ford, Farwell; Mrs. Carolyn Davis, Clovis and Leslie Lindop of San Jose, Calif.; and seven great-grandchildren.

Farwell Fire Chief Lee Hutchins discovered a fire at the home of Mrs. Lindop at 604 Second Street at mid-afternoon on Friday, Jan. 4. He alerted the fire department and entered the blazing home where Mrs. Lindop was discovered lying face down with severe burns.

Initially, she was given emergency treatment by Farwell firemen before being taken to Clovis Memorial Hospital. Mrs. Lindop was transferred to the Burn Center in Albuquerque the following day, where she was hospitalized at the time of her death.

## 55 MPH --

### New Speed Limit Effective Sunday

Parmer County Texas Department of Safety Officers Jim Bishop and Glenn Fant, who are stationed in Farwell, have been notified there will be no "period of grace" when the new 55 mph speed limit goes into effect at 12:01 a.m. Sunday, Jan. 20.

They, along with all other Texas Highway patrolmen, city and county officers, have been notified that on the effective date and time, tickets are to be issued for speed violations.

The speed limit action, limiting the maximum speed to 55 mph on all state, federal, city and county highways and roads was taken in keeping with the law passed by the recent special session of the Texas Legislature, empowering the Texas Highway Commission to set lower speed limits to comply with federal energy saving actions.

Under the terms of the Emergency Highway Energy Conservation Act signed by the President January 2, a state not establishing a 55 mph maximum speed limit would not receive its share of federal highway construction funds.

Federal taxes on items related to the operation of motor vehicles -- notably a four-cents-per-gallon levy on gasoline -- go into the Federal Highway Trust Fund. These funds are apportioned back to the state for the federal

government's share of highway construction.

Texas' share amounts to some \$240 million annually which would be withheld if the lower speed limit was not set by early March.

This action is subject to review within eight days by Texas Governor Dolph Briscoe. The lower speed limits will apply to all highways in the state, including highways under the control of the Texas Turnpike Authority, cities and counties.

New speed limit signs replacing the old 70 mph maximum speed limit on the state's major highways, will be in place by the effective date. Most of the signs have been placed in Parmer County at this time. The Texas Highway Department is making and posting the new signs.

The commission also directed the Highway Department to monitor and document circumstances "which might relate to the establishment of speed limits and to report to the Commission on a monthly basis." This is in order that the Commission may make findings as to whether the 55 mph speed limit should continue in effect.

Many motorists in Texas already have voluntarily reduced their driving speeds to below 55 according to Highway Department spokesmen and law enforcement agencies.

## No Salary Increases --

### Commissioners Approve Tentative 1974 Budget

Looks like no salary increases are anticipated and no additional help will be hired by Parmer County for the year, with the tentative approval of the 1974 budget for the county as proposed by county auditor Bernie Gowen on Monday.

As Gowen explained each item in the proposed budget, the four commissioners turned down possible increases as they said no salary increases could be possible without raising taxes. The only exception was approval for an increase in pay to the auditor.

Commissioners present salaries of \$461.09 was left in the budget as it has been in past years, although the travel expenses for the commissioners will be increased from \$4,800 to \$6,000. The judge's auto allowance was also increased to \$75 per month.

In salaries budgeted for the four precincts, Precinct one salary schedule is \$34,000; Precinct two, \$38,000; Precinct three, \$32,000 and Precinct four, \$32,000.

Provided in the proposed budget was an increase for the

auditor with the amount to be worked out at a later date.

All county officials will be on the pay scale they have had before the new budget, with no salary increases budgeted for elected officials or deputies.

Almost all other departments in county operations are expected to remain the same, as county commissioners explained increases would not be possible without raising taxes.

Parmer County Judge Archie Tarter said Parmer County has a salary schedule which is above \$290,000 per year for county officials and employees.

In other county action, commissioners approved payment of bills; heard a report that the latest revenue sharing check to arrive on January 7 was in the amount of \$25,906; and the present revenue sharing balance on deposit is \$180,271.59; and approved an increase in travel pay for Parmer County Home Demonstration Agent Jana Pronger to \$720 per year from the present \$500 allowed.

District Clerk Dorothy Quickel was given approval to send checks for travel pay to two out-of-state witnesses who will be in Farwell for district court next week, and she explained that the state will reimburse

PURELY PERSONAL

We received a glance at the report issued by the Texas Education Agency following their inspection last November of the Farwell School System. There is a full news report elsewhere in the paper, so we will confine our remarks to the philosophical or political angle. Today it is difficult to distinguish between philosophy and politics, so we will probably stand accused of just plain meddling.

In a covering letter by Gilbert Conoley, Education Director, Office for Technical Assistance (Pheew, what a title), he says that there is no evidence of racial discrimination in enrolling students or in student participation in extra-curricular activities. Not much to comment on here as this community has always made an effort to assure every child his right to an education. The letter goes on to say that an examination of faculty records disclose that there has never been a minority teacher employed by the Farwell ISD and that the district should begin active recruitment of minority teachers.

Here, we are forced to comment. If there is a good paying job available, we feel that a person should apply for it. Not the job applying for the person. We firmly believe that were a qualified "minority" teacher to apply at the Farwell ISD for a job and it was open in the normal course of teacher turnover, said applicant would be hired the same as any "non-minority" teacher.

We apparently have good teaching jobs in Farwell. If a person wants a job in Farwell, let them come and ask for it. We do not believe in chasing anybody down and handing them a free ticket.

This applies across the board as far as we are concerned, be it in school teaching, brick-laying, or any other line of endeavor.

We will not quarrel too much with the body of the report except to note that the general tenor seemed to downgrade the quality of education in small schools in general. This, we think, is only a reflection of the thinking rampant in education circles, namely, that it's got to be good. This is pure egghead hokum. We think that our little school has, on a per capita basis, turned out as many advanced degree holders in all phases of life as have Amarillo, Lubbock or Austin. We know they have turned out less hippies, yuppies and other assorted kooks.

The thinking in elevated education circles is that to have "quality", the pupil must be exposed to a multitude of disciplines and a plethora of laboratories. Pfooie---in the final analysis, "education" is what the pupil sucks up and retains, not what he was exposed to. Like the horse, you can't take him there, but you can't make him drink from the fountain of knowledge -- unless he wants to.

Make no mistake about it, the Texas Education Agency, like its 49 other counterparts, is a monster bent on crushing the small community school concept. The drive has been long going on to radicalize our education system and it has gained a measure of success.

It now turns out high school graduates who cannot read, write or cipher. Some accomplishment!!!

## Paper Drive In Full Swing

Contributions to the local "paper drive" are rolling in, according to Parmer County Home Demonstration Agent Jana Pronger, who is coordinating the 4-H campaign to help ease at least one shortage.

Members of the Oklahoma Lane and Farwell junior leaders are picking up reusable paper materials and storing them for transport to a paper recycling plant in Clovis. The Agent explained that newspapers are the main item solicited by the 4-H'ers, although cardboard boxes and used ledger sheets will work.

She emphasized that "slick" finish magazine paper is not acceptable as the recycling plant is unable to process that type of paper.

At this time, the material is stored in a pre-arranged depot

in Farwell until a load is collected for delivery to the Clovis plant. Miss Pronger said pickups will still be made by 4-H club members at the home or business of anyone who will call 481-3619 between 8:30 a.m. - 5 p.m. weekdays.

Arrangements also can be made for the donor to deliver paper by calling the above telephone number.

No permanent depot location has been worked out yet, although the youths are seeking a permanent location at this time.

Although the youths do not receive much money from the sale of the used paper, all proceeds are returned to the treasury of the 4-H clubs involved for use in local projects.

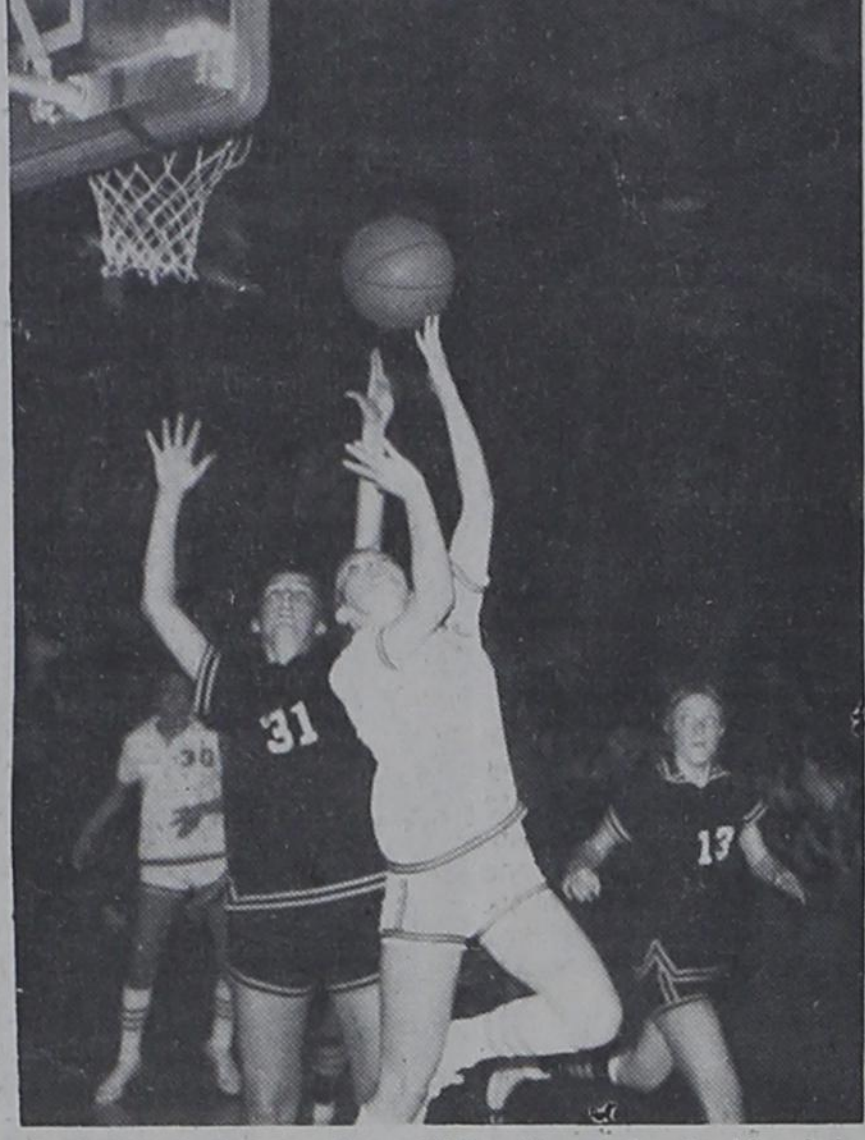

Curtis Lindley won high point honors against House with 19 points. Craig Chumley had 17 points, followed by Randy Harrison who had 14 points.

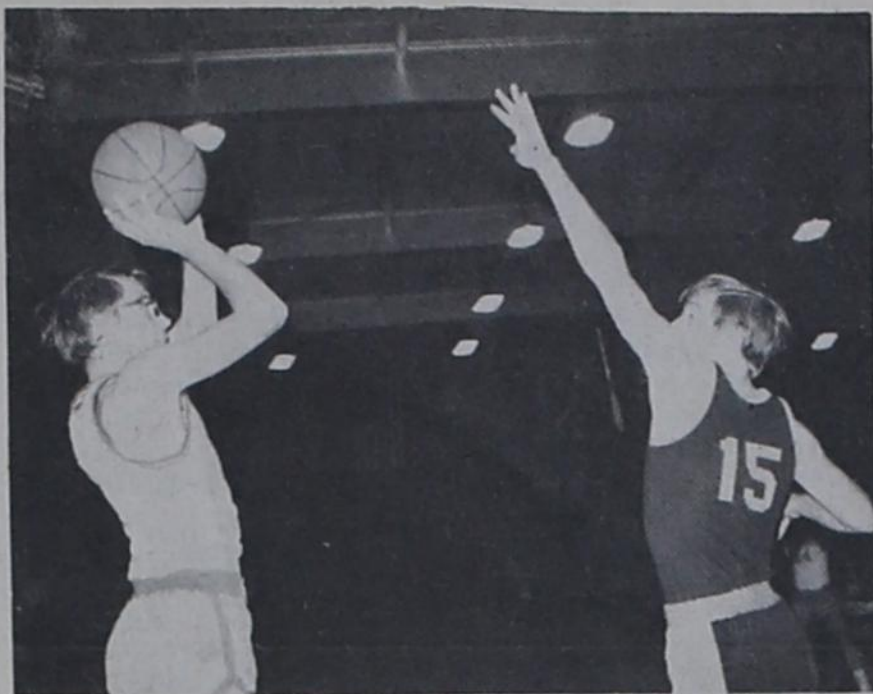
Texico B team suffered a loss to House, 34-22. Spencer Turner scored the most points for the Wolverines with 10.

## Soil Survey Can Boost Acreage

Farmers concerned with using the best available acreage to increase their cropland can get valuable data from a soil survey, Edward E. Thomas, state conservationist for the U.S. Soil Conservation Service, said this week.

Soil survey field work has been completed for 123 counties in Texas and the data is available to anyone making land use decisions.

Work is currently underway on soil surveys for all remaining counties in the state, Thomas added.

"With a soil survey map, you can read the land like a book," said Thomas. "Some soils are ideal for a particular crop. Others are better off in another crop, or left in grass, trees, or as wetland. And on some soils, the owner can choose between pasture, trees, or crops.

"The point is that a great deal of soil information is available to farmers and other land users. Even where surveys are not yet completed, the Soil Conservation Service -- working through local conservation districts -- often can provide at least partial soils data to anyone considering a change in land use."

After checking through hundreds of collected recipes, Wanda was asked for three of her favorite recipes. She gave the recipes listed below:

### VANILLA WAFER CAKE

2 sticks margarine or butter  
2 c. sugar  
6 whole eggs added one at a time  
1 12-oz. pkg. vanilla wafers, crushed  
1 7-oz. pkg. shredded coconut  
1 c. chopped nuts (preferably pecans)

Cream butter and sugar, add eggs one at a time - add vanilla wafers, coconut and nuts. Mix well. Bake in greased, floured tube pan for 1 hr. 15 min., at 325 degrees.

### HAM WITH APPLE RICE

1 1/2 c. rice  
1 three or four lb. canned ham  
1 1/2 c. apple cider or apple juice  
1 can (1 lb. 4 oz.) unsweetened sliced apples  
1 tsp. salt  
1/2 tsp. pepper  
1/2 pkg. (4 oz.) sliced cheddar cheese

1/2 tsp. ground cinnamon  
1/4 c. firmly packed dark brown sugar

Remove the ham from the can and save all the ham jelly. Cut 8 evenly spaced slits (about 2 inches deep) across the ham. Place the ham with the reserved ham jelly in a 3-quart shallow casserole with cover. Around the ham, add the rice (uncooked), cider, apples, salt and pepper. Stir well. Cover tightly (to steam the rice) and bake in a preheated oven 350 degrees for 1 hour and 15 minutes. Remove the cover, insert half a slice of cheese in slits. Mix cinnamon and brown sugar and sprinkle

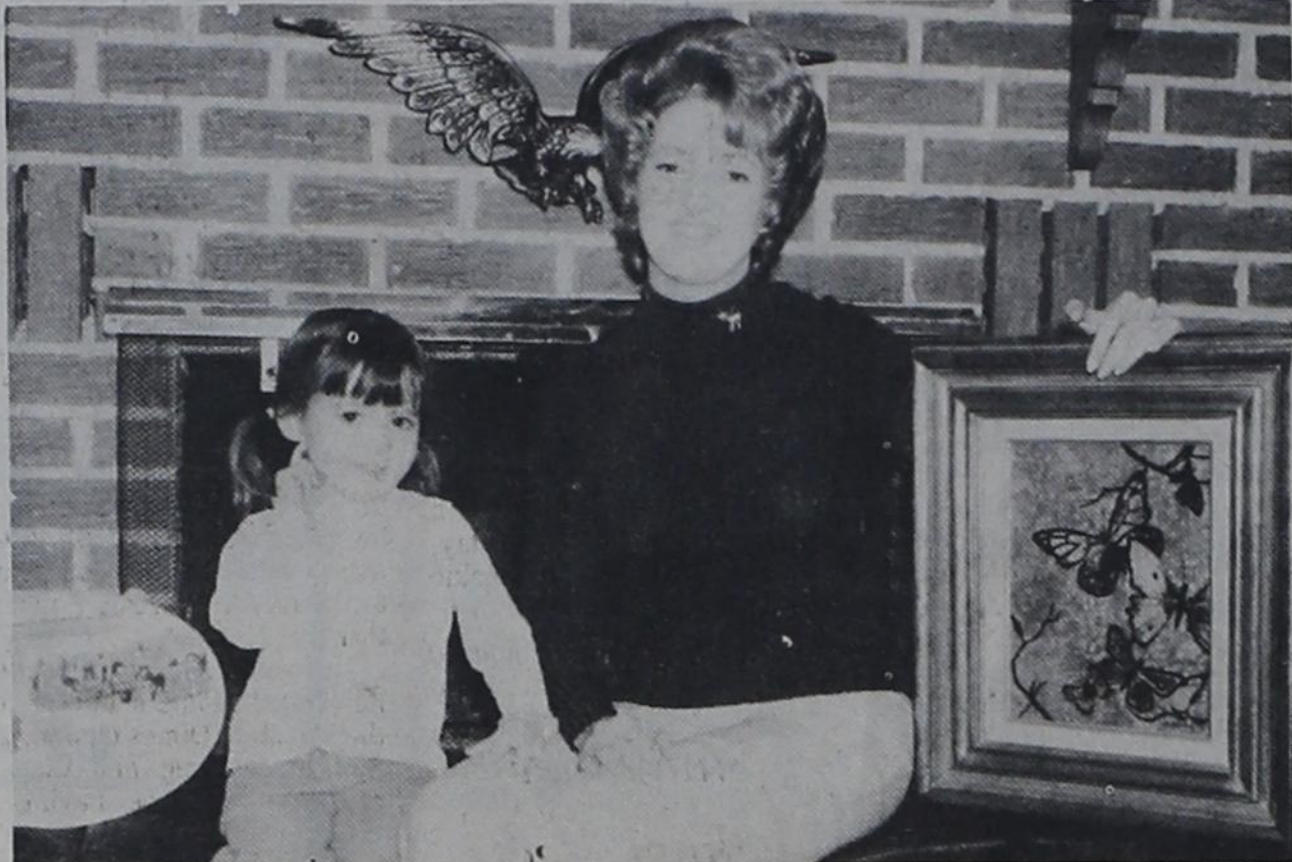
over rice and ham. Continue baking for 15 minutes or until the cheese is melted and ham is browned. YIELD: 8 servings.

### BARBECUE MEAT LOAF

1 1/2 lbs. ground beef  
1 c. fresh bread crumbs  
1 medium onion, chopped finely  
1 egg  
1 1/2 tsp. salt  
1/4 tsp. pepper  
2 8-ounce cans tomato sauce  
1/2 c. water  
3 T. vinegar  
3 T. brown sugar  
2 T. prepared mustard  
2 T. Worcestershire sauce

Mix together beef, onion, crumbs, beaten egg, salt, pepper, and 1/2 can of tomato sauce. Form into loaf and put in shallow pan. Combine rest of tomato sauce, water, vinegar, brown sugar, mustard, Worcestershire sauce and pour over loaf. Bake in a preheated oven at 350 degrees for 1 hour and 15 minutes. Baste occasionally. YIELD: 8 servings.

NOTE: The more you work ground beef of any kind, the tougher it gets - so work your mixture lightly with your hands or a fork. Handle as little as possible and form your meatloaf in small portions with a fork to ensure a good textured, tender dish.

There's not much fun "padding" even if you're in sight of shore.

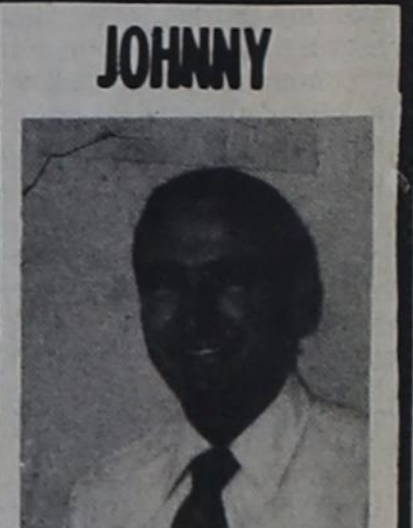
**Use Dip Stick For Oil**

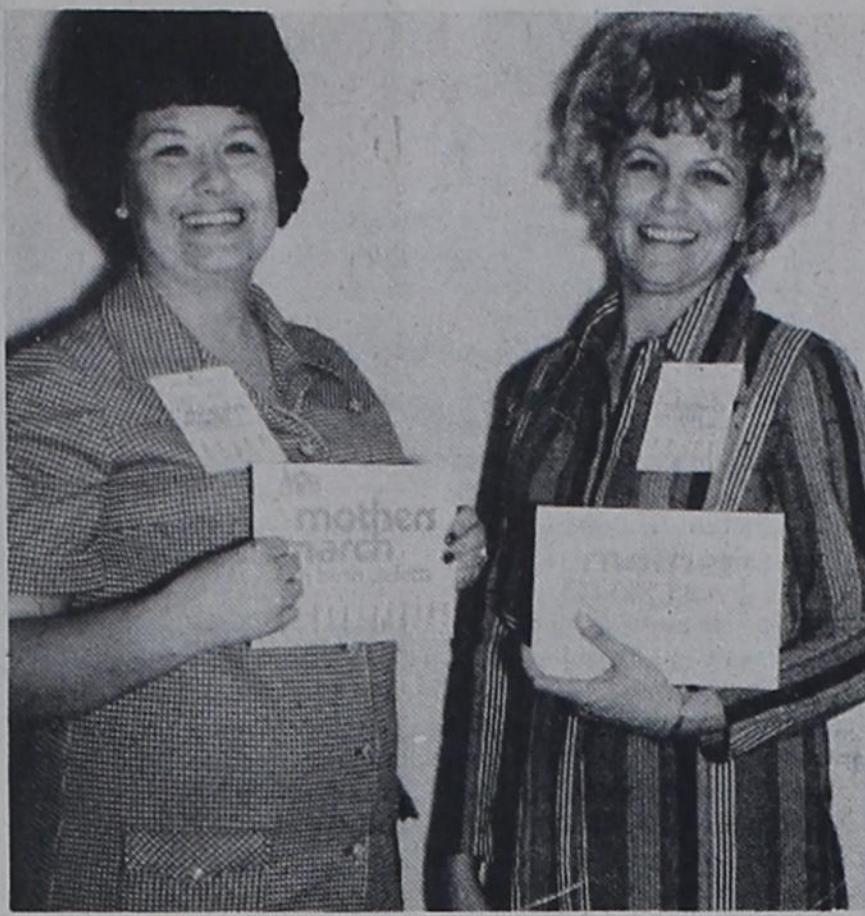

## At Home In Parmer County

Since some of you are still doing some sewing of winter clothing I thought I should remind you that some fake furs need pampering almost as much as the real thing. Yet others require only simple maintenance to keep their good looks.

Check the care label carefully when considering a fake fur garment. It pays to study the label first. Instructions may state "washable" or "machine washable" or "dry clean only." Also look for shrinkage information on the label. Some fabric furs aren't pre-shrunk prior to garment construction -- so shrinkage could present a problem.

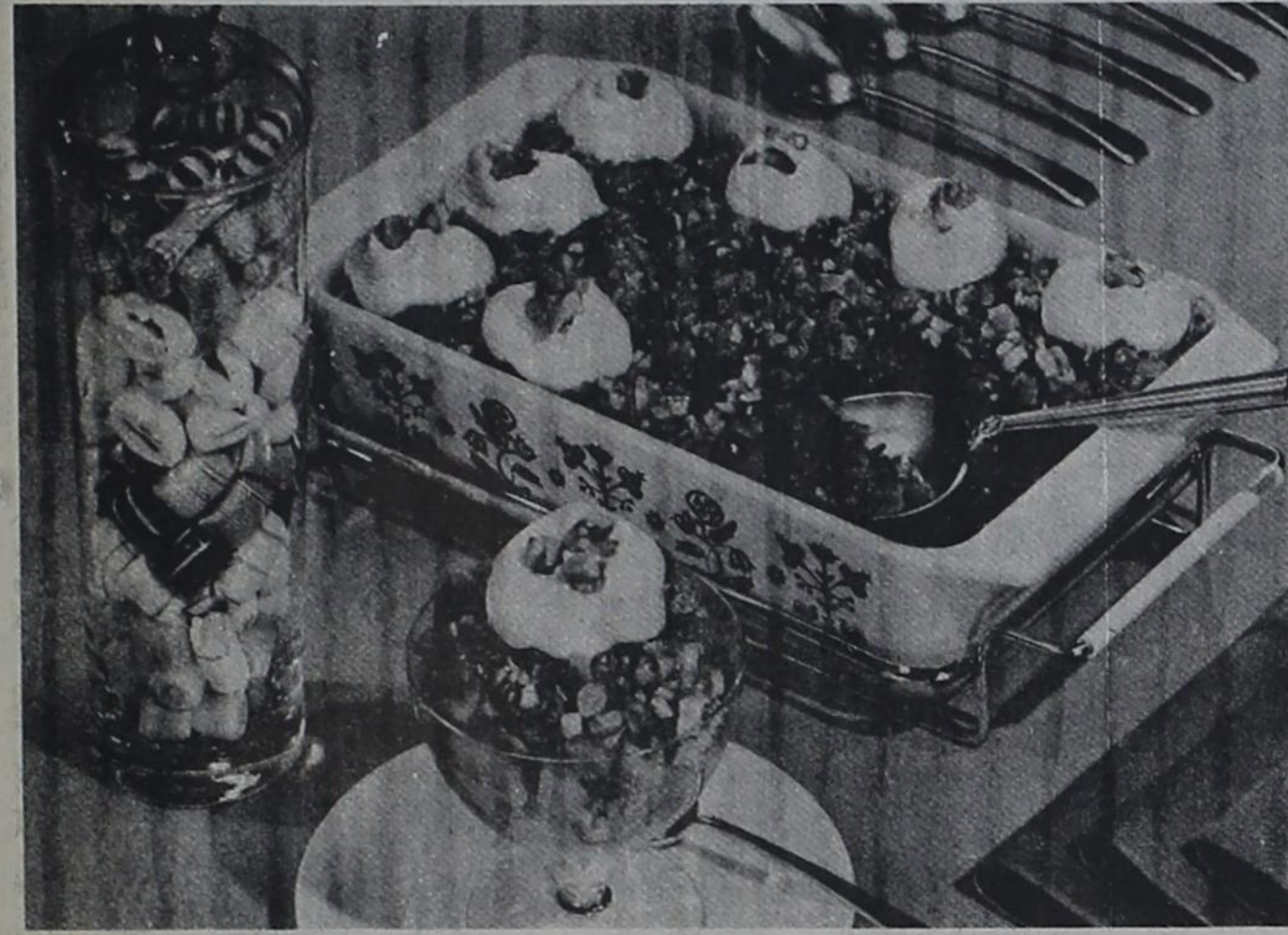
Even "washable" garments should be treated with care -- according to instructions. For example, use warm -- not hot -- water and a mild soap or detergent. Agitation speed also makes a difference. Rapid action of the water results in fur clumping and matting. So

for best results, set washing machine for a slow or delicate speed and a shorter cycle.

Line dry the garment or lay it on a terry towel to dry. These methods help prevent matting of the fur. Although it may look shaggy and matted after drying, a gentle brushing or combing usually fluffs it up again.

So, check the label before buying a fake fur garment -- not all are easy to maintain.

We should all remember to check the care label on all fabrics or any garment that we buy. It is a law now for garments to be permanently labeled and that care instruction be available on demand for fabrics. You can request this information from your retailer. It's your right as a consumer, so exercise your rights and be informed! It may save your hours in the long run if you take a few minutes to look at the label!

Fold the apple mixture into a 10 x 6-inch baking dish. Cover this with the candy-cereal mix and bake in a moderate oven (350 degrees) about 30 minutes, or until apples are tender. Serve hot or cold, plain or with whipped cream. Makes four servings.

- 1/2 cup brown sugar
- 1/2 cup melted butter
- 1 teaspoon cinnamon

Compiled From Sources Of The Texas Department of Agriculture John C. White, Commissioner

For the first time in four months, Texas farm prices have shown an increase. The all-farm products index is now 42 per cent above a year ago, and one per cent above a month ago.

The livestock and livestock products, however, was down one per cent from last month, but is 17 per cent above a year ago. Beef cattle prices have declined 30 per cent from August levels. However, retail meat prices have declined less than 10 per cent.

For Texas, hog prices as of Dec. 15 averaged \$38.30, down \$1.60 from November. Beef cattle averaged \$38.20, down 90 cents from a month ago. Hog prices are 10 cents above beef prices for the month. Calf prices at \$47 were down \$2.90 from a month ago. Sheep prices at \$16.30 per hundred-

weight were down 30 cents from a month ago. Lamb prices were up \$2 from a month ago.

Beef, cattle, calves and lambs are below effective parity levels. Crop prices show that wheat was up 37 cents per bushel from a month ago; corn is up 16 cents; oats are 3 cents per bushel higher; grain sorghum is 24 cents higher. Grain sorghum is currently 14 cents under effective parity.

Wool and mohair prices are unchanged from a month ago. Broilers are also unchanged at 19 cents. Turkey prices declined 2 cents per pound and egg prices advanced 6.2 cents per dozen. With the modest increase in farm prices, some economists were predicting higher food prices.

Contributions Reported Good By Texico City Clerk Wiehl

With this month's Texico City Water bill, Texico City Clerk Clara Wiehl mailed a brief questionnaire asking local residents if they would be willing to increase a former 25 cent per month contribution to \$1.

Mrs. Wiehl explained in the questionnaire that the additional 75 cents would be put in a special fund to purchase a new ambulance for the City of Texico.

More than 300 persons received the questionnaire, and a large number of those contacted not only agreed to send the \$1 per month, but contributions in larger amounts started arriving immediately. At least one person made a \$200 contribution and several smaller contributions were received during the first several days of the month.

To date \$286.00 has been received in the office at the Texico City Hall with contributions continuing to arrive.

Texico Board of Trustee member Bill Thigpen, who also is a member of the Texico Volunteer Fire Department, who in turn handles emergency calls for ambulance runs, reported on the need of a

new ambulance during the December meeting of the city fathers.

He explained that the present vehicle utilized by the fire department as an emergency unit, or ambulance, is a 1959 Chevrolet van, which in no way adequately covers the increasing calls received by the fire department emergency service.

The inside of the van is too jammed to have room for necessary equipment or needed room to work with an emergency victim enroute to a hospital. Thigpen added, "Although the van does carry a portable resuscitator, and an 'enroute' resuscitator, as well as firefighting tools, there is no additional room for an attendant to work inside, and there is also no room for other needed equipment, such as I-V stands, and lifesaving machinery which could be installed in a multi-use emergency vehicle."

Thigpen carefully pointed out that no charge is made to a person who utilizes the emergency service, thus, there are no funds available to replace any item on the unit, or the unit itself. He cited instances where the

emergency unit was at an accident or had been taken to a sickness call, and when loaded, failed to start.

The special-fund will be used only for the purchase of a new emergency unit and equipment as can be purchased if funds become available. It was explained that if the government should purchase the unit, they would more than likely require the city to charge persons a set amount for using the service.

Any contribution, in any amount, will be accepted by the City. The contribution may be left with Mrs. Wiehl, or mailed to the City of Texico, and marked for ambulance fund.

## Reward Increased For Dog Poisoners

Rewards totaling \$300 are presently offered for the apprehension and conviction of dog poisoners who have killed several Farwell dogs recently.

Last week, Farmer County Justice of the Peace and Mrs. Ray Mears lost a pet dog to a poisoner. Judge Mears said he let the family nine-month-old Daschund outside briefly at 10 p.m. just before retiring for the night. He continued that the small dog was ready to come back into the house within five minutes. Within an hour and a half, the Daschund was in convulsions and the Mears started to a veterinarian in Clovis, however failed to reach the veterinarian before the small dog died.

Tests on the dog showed it had been fed strychnine. The Mearses' son, Fred Curtis, initially offered a reward of \$100 for apprehension of the poisoner, but this week upped the reward to \$300.

Curtis expressed a fear that some small child would get some of the poison accidentally while playing outside. He also commented on persons who would poison dogs, especially family pets.

The Mearses' dog poisoning apparently is not an isolated incident in Farwell as several persons have reported recently of dog poisonings. It was reported that the John McFarlands had lost a dog to poisoners, and that Earl Roberts had lost at least one dog by poison.

Roberts said his dogs were always penned up except for rare occasions when one of the dogs would ride in his pickup with him. There have also been other reportings of dogs being fed poison in the Texico area during recent weeks.

It is suggested that anyone

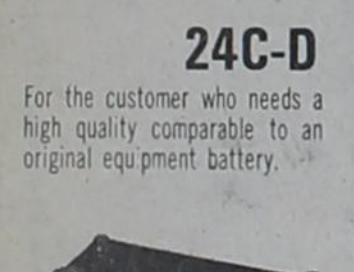

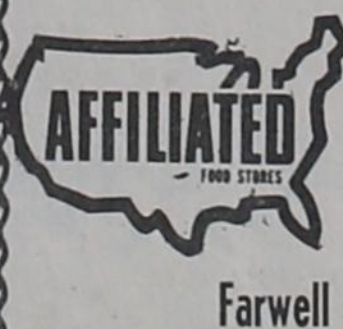
